



WBUR Poll Survey of 501 Registered Voters in Massachusetts Field Dates: May 22-26, 2018

There may be a measure on the 2018 ballot that would repeal the law which allowed transgender people to use public restrooms and locker rooms consistent with their gender identities, regardless of their sex at birth. Would you support or oppose repealing this law? **PROBE**: And do you strongly (support/oppose) this idea, or just somewhat?

About the Poll

These results are based on a survey of 501 Massachusetts registered voters. Live telephone interviews were conducted May 22-26, 2018 via both landline and cell phone using conventional registration based sampling procedures. The margin of sampling error is 4.4 percentage points with a 95 percent level of confidence. The poll was sponsored by WBUR, a National Public Radio station in the Boston area.
