Rules of Order and the Plan of Organization of the 2000 General Conference

Preamble

From the days of Wesley, the "People called Meth od ist" have gath ered in 'con ference.' The early Methodists attended to practical affairs of the movement but focused pri mar ily on the spir i tual af fairs and on the vi sion of "spread ing scrip tural ho liness through out the land." 'Conferencing,' the com ing to gether to be of one mind and to know the mind of Christ is our legacy. 'Conferencing' must not be lost in our conferences.

The Gen eral Con fer ence is the rep re senta tive, de lib er a tive body for the Church. It has de vel oped an or derly, ra tio nal and fair process for making majority decisions in the prac ti cal af fairs of the Church. Yet, it also protects the rights of minority positions. There is no sub stitute for such care ful deliberation.

However, the spiritual affairs of the Church and its Mis sion are al ways be fore the body whether or not they are ap par ent in the pas sions of de bate on tem por al affairs. The Gen eral Con fer ence has spir i tual and prophetic leadership which must always form the con text of its gov er nance.

All through our his tory, there have been power ful and commit ted groups in tension with each other to win majority position. Forex ample, 'confessional' Wesley ans and 'experiential' Wesley ans have vied for the hearts of the people since the time of Whitefield and Wesley. At particular points in our history, social forces have pulled us apart and, in the case of the slav ery is sue, pro duced schism.

In that case, we have come back to gether in the firm conviction that the unity of United Methodism is God's will and the best way to "spread scrip tural holi ness" in a global movement of the "People called Methodist."

To learn the wisdom in the theological and spir i tual ten sions; and to fo cus our vision of God's will for us amid con flicting issues of our times we must: First, rec og nize that our Plan of Or ga ni za tion must be honored with in teg rity by all. How ever, at the

same time it must be open to prayer ful discernment of God's will for us. Second, there will be times, in the midst of de lib er ation, when we will need to stop, pray together, listen in silence together, and re fo cus our com mon vi sion of where the Spirit is lead ing the Church.

The times of prayer and dis cern ment may be varied and sur prising. While they do not substitute for de cent and or derly de bate, they do serve to hold our temporal affairs up to the light of the larger, common vision for the "People called Method ist."

Plan of Organization

I. Opening Session and Organization

The General Conference will as semble on the day fixed at the place des ig nated in accor dance with the action taken by the preceding General Conference or the Commission on the General Conference. The Holy Com mu nion and Me mo rial Service shall be cel e brated by the Con fer ence, the Council of Bishops being in charge. During the Me morial Service, there shall be called the names of the bish ops and bishops' spouses who have died since the adjournment of the preceding General Con fer ence, and like wise the names of the del e gates-elect who have died. The opening busi ness ses sion of the Conference shall be on the day and at the hour fixed by the Commission on the General Conference and shall be called to or der by the bishop designated, as provided in the Discipline ¶15.11.

The following or der of business shall be observed:

- A. Roll Call. The record of attendance shall be made in writing to the Sec re tary of the General Conference by:
- (1) The Secretary of the Council of Bishops for the bish ops,
- (2) The Sec re tary of the Ju di cial Coun cil for that body,
- (3) The General Sec re tary of the General Council on Min is tries for all general sec retaries,

- (4) The chairperson of each delegation for its mem ber ship. The chair per son shall be pro vided with a form on which to re port daily the at ten dance of its mem bers. Any re serve seated in the place of a regular delegate shall have been duly elected as a reserve del e gate by the An nual Con fer ence and shall meet the re quire ments set forth in the Dis ci pline 32-34. Del e gates, in cluding re serves when the latter are sub stituted for a del e gate or del e gates, shall be seated in the or der of their election, ex cept when a reserve is seated tem po rarily, in which case the reserve shall occupy the seat of the delegate for whom the sub sti tu tion is made. All del e gates ar riving after the opening roll call shall be reported by the chair per son of the delegation to the Committee on Credentials (See sec tion VIII.A.4. and Rule 5. See also Dis ci pline 506 de fin ing a Quo rum.) and
- (5) The chair per son of the delegation for affiliated Autonomous Methodist and United Churches delegations.
 - B. Es tab lish the bar of the con fer ence.
- C. Report of The Commission on The GeneralConference.
- D. Re port of The Plan of Or ga ni za tion and Rules of Or der.
 - E. Elections
- (1) Coordinator of Calendar. (See IV-C)
- (2) Committee on The Plan of Or ga ni zation and Rules of Or der.
 - F. Re port of Com mit tee on Agenda.
 - G. Mis cella neous Business.
 - H. Adjourn ment.
 - II. Epis co pal and Laity Ad dresses

The Qua dren nial Ad dress of the Coun cil of Bishops shall be de liv ered early in the Con fer ence, at such hour as de ter mined by the Commission on the General Conference.

The Quadrennial Address of the Laity shall be de liv ered early in the Con fer ence, at such hour as de ter mined by the Com mission on the Gen eral Con fer ence. The National Association of Annual Conference Lay Leaders shall coordinate the prepara-

tion and presentation of the Quadrennial Lay Ad dress from sub mis sions by an nual con fer ence lay lead ers. This op por tu nity shall be open to all an nual con fer ence lay lead ers in Africa, Asia, Eu rope, and North America.

III. Pre siding Of ficers

The pre sid ing of fi cers for the several sessions of the Con fer ence, the open ing session ex cepted (See Section I, above), shall be chosen from among the effective bish ops by the Committee on Presiding Officers. (See Section VIIIA.6.)

IV. Sec re tarial Staff

- A. The Sec re tary of the Gen eral Con ference shall be re spon si ble for all functions of the of fice in prep a ration for the ses sion of the Gen eral Con fer ence.
- B. The secretary shall select persons from the clergy and lay membership of The United Meth od ist Church to serve on the secretarial support staff.
- C. The Conference shall elect, upon nomination by the Secretary, a Coor dinator of Calendar, who shall as sist the Committee on Agenda and Calen dar in presenting reports in such or der as to expedite the business of the Conference, as well as in other responsibilities of the committee. (See I.E.1 and VIII.A.1).
- D. After as certaining that petitions, resolutions, and similar communications in hand and dealing with the regular business of the Conference meet the requirement of 507 of The Book of Discipline, the Secretary shall be responsible for preparing the same for reference to the appropriate legislative committee, subject to review by the Committee on Reference. (See Section VIIIA.7.) In the case of a single petition signed by a number of people, the Committee need print only the name of the first signer with an indication of the total number of signers.
- E. The work of the Sec re tary shall be supervised by the Executive Committee of the Commission on the General Conference. A budget for the work of the Sec re tary shall be presented by the Commission on the General Conference to the General Council on Finance and Admin is tration. Such budget shall be paid out of the General Admin is tration Fund.
- F. If in the interim of the quadren nial sessions of the General Conference the of fice of Secretary shall for any reason be vacated, the Council of Bishops shall elect a successor to serve until the next session.
 - V. Nominations and Elections

The Secretary of the General Conference shall de velop a time line for the sub mis sion of nominations and elections/appoint ments by the Council of Bishops. In making these nominations, elections and appointments, attention shall be given to en suring continuity of mem ber ship from the pre vious quadrennium.

It shall be the re spon si bil ity of the Council of Bishops to present nominations for The Commission on the General Conference, Commit tee on Plan of Or ganization and Rules of Order, Commission on Central Conference Affairs, General Conference standing committees, and secre tary-designate of The General Conference. These nominations shall be presented to the General Conference for election.

Dis ci plin ary pro vi sions shall gov ern the nomination and election procedures for:

General Commission on Archives and History (¶1704.2)

VI. Com mis sion on The General Con ference

A. There shall be a Com mis sion on the General Conference composed of one clergy and one layperson from each Ju risdiction and four mem bers-at-large, at least one of whom should be lay and one clergy from the Central Conferences of the continents of Africa, Asia and Europe. They shall be nominated by the Council of Bishops at its Fall meet ing next pre ced ing the Gen eral Con fer ence and elected by the General Conference for a term of eight years; half of the mem bers shall be elected by the Gen eral Con fer ence each qua drennium. If vacancies occur, the Council of Bishops shall elect succes sors to serve un til the next ses sion of the General Conference and then nom i nate for election by the General Conference persons to serve any remain der of the term. The Sec re tary of the Gen eral Con fer ence, the Trea surer of the Gen eral Coun cil on Fi nance and Ad min istration, and the Business Manager of the Gen eral Con ference shall also be ex-officio mem bers but with out vote. The Com mission may elect three additional members-at-large for each quadrennium, providing that one of these ad di tional members shall be the chairperson of the local Host Com mit tee in the An nual Con ference which will be the site of the next Gen eral Conference.

The Coun cil of Bishops shall des ig nate one of its mem bers to convene and or ganize the Commission be fore the adjournment of the General Conference.

B. This Commission shall determine the place and time (within such lim its as may be set up by the General Conference) of the next Gen eral Con fer ence and shall send an official no tice to all elected del e gates announcing specifically the opening day and hour of the Gen eral Con fer ence and an tic ipated time of ad journ ment. It shall fur ther ad vise the General Conference delegates in ad vance of all such spe cial events and orders of the day, the dates and times of which have been de ter mined prior to the open ing of the General Conference, in or der that the del e gates may have an over view of the General Conference program. The Commission shall make all nec es sary ar range ments, including arrange ments for the publication of the Daily Christian Advocate and quadrennial re ports of the gen eral agen cies of the church, the same to be published by the United Meth od ist Pub lishing House. The Daily Christian Advocate shall print the list of nominees for election to the Judicial Coun cil, with bio graph i cal sketches not to ex ceed 100 words in length for each nom i-

- C. The Com mis sion shall take the nec essary mea sures to as sure full partic i pation of all General Con fer ence Del e gates, in cluding providing accommodation for language, physical challenges and access to approved licensed childcare during the session at or near the site of the General Conference for children of elected General ConferenceDelegates.
- D. The Com mis sion shall plan the schedule for the open ing day of the Con fer ence.
- E. The Commission shall recommend to the General Conference the perdiemal lowance to be paid to the elected delegates. (See Section X.)
- F. The Sec re tary, on be half of the Commission on the General Conference, shall

issue in vitations to ecu menical representatives after con sultation with the Council of Bishops and The General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. The Commission shall arrange for local hospitality and presentation of ecumenical representatives to the General Conference.

- G. The Com mis sion is au tho rized, if it deems it ad vis able, to se lect the site of the Gen eral Con fer ence up to four qua dren nia in ad vance.
- H. The General Secretary of the General Council on Finance and Administration shall confer with the Commission on the General Conference through its chairperson concerning the selection and performance review of the Business Manager of the General Conference.

VII. Plan of Or ga ni za tion and Rules of Order

A. There shall be a Com mit tee on Plan of Organization and Rules of Order composed of ten lay and clergy members, including mem ber ship from each of the Ju ris dic tions and from the Central Conferences of the continents of Africa, Asia and Europe, nom i nated from the elected del e gates to the General Conference by the Council of Bishops at its Fall meeting preceding the General Conference and elected by the Gen eral Con fer ence to serve un til the next ses sion of the General Conference. Members may be elected for ad di tional terms of four years, provided no more than four mem bers of the new com mit tee are re turning members. If va can cies oc cur, the Council of Bishops shall elect suc ces sors to serve until the next ses sion of the General Conference. The Sec re tary and Business Man ager of the Con fer ence shall be ex-officio members with out vote. The Coun cil of Bishops shall desig nate one of its mem bers to convene and or ga nize this com mit tee af ter it is elected.

Outgoing members of the committee present at General Conference may meet with the newly elected committee during the current sessions of General Conference. These out go ing mem bers will have voice but no vote.

- B. To this committee shall be referred any proposed amendments to the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order (See Rule 40). To it may be referred any other matters relating to parliamentary order or procedure in the business of the General Conference.
- C. This com mit tee shall serve as an Interim Committee be tween ses sions of the Gen eral Con fer ence. The com mit tee shall

re study the Plan of Or ga ni zation and Rules of Or der and make needed changes and adaptations and, after printing in the Ad vance DCA, shall present them to the General Con fer ence for con sider ation and final action, same to be published in the Daily Christian Advocate which serves as the Journal of the General Con ference.

D. The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order of the General Conference shall be the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order as published in the journal of the preceding General Conference until they have been altered or modified by action of the General Conference (Discipline §505.)

VIII. Committees

The Gen eral Con fer ence shall have the standing committees here in after in dicated, with such functions, responsibilities, and limitations respectively as are here in after prescribed, and such special committees as it may or der.

A. Standing Administrative Committees

The mem bers of the following committees shall be ap pointed by the Coun cil of Bishops at its Fall meeting preceding the Gen eral Con fer ence. All ex cept the Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision shall be from the elected del e gates to the Gen eral Con fer ence. (See Sec tion V.) Mem bers of standing ad min is tra tive committees which meet prior to the day on which the General Conference convenes, shall re ceive the del e gate per diem for each ad di tional day on which their at ten dance is re quired. Del e gates who are ap pointed to such com mit tees less than 60 days prior to the opening session of General Conference shall be en ti tled to re im burse ment for any additional transportation costs.

- (1) Agenda and Cal en dar.
- (a) There shall be a Committee on Agenda and Calendar composed of ten members, at least five of whom shall be laypersons, to be constituted as follows: one from each Juris diction, one from the Central Conferences of each of the continents of Africa, Asia, and Europe, the Coordinator of the Cal en dar, and the chair per son or substi tute for the Chair per son of the Pro gram Com mit tee of the Com mis sion on the General Con fer ence. No mem ber of the committee shall be chairperson of a Standing Legislative Committee or staff person of any gen eral agency. The Com mit tee shall be con vened, for the pur pose of or ga ni zation, by the Sec re tary of the Gen eral Confer ence at least the day be fore the open ing of the General Conference.

Following the presentation and adoption of the report of the Commission on the General Conference at the opening session of the General Conference, the Committee on Agenda and Calendarshall immediately become responsible for guiding the order of business of the Conference.

- (b) The Com mit tee on Agenda and Calendar shall:
- (1) Present calen dar reports in such an order as to expe dite the business of the Conference.
- (2) In form the bishop pre siding as soon as possible of the agenda items, in cluding order of priority, to be considered,
- (3) Keep an over view of cal en dar progress:
- (4) Re port to each ses sion of the Gen eral Conference recommendations concerning business agenda, in cluding time allocation and order in which legislative committee reports shall be presented;
- (5) Give priority to calendar items as soon as they are avail able;
- (6) Give pri or ity to cal en dar items involving minority reports;
- (7) An nounce, at the last ple nary ses sion of each day, a ten ta tive agenda for the next day;
- (8) Consult daily with the legislative committee chairpersons to expedite the business of the General Conference; and
- (9) Receive all requests for special or ders of the day, except those requested in the report of the Commission on the General Conference on the first day of the Conference.
- c) Proposals, questions, communications, res o lu tions, and other mat ters not included in the regular business of the General Conference shall be referred to the Commit tee on Agenda and Cal en dar without mo tion or de bate. This commit tee shall de ter mine whether or not the mat ter presented shall be considered by the General Conference. Appeal from the decision of this committee may be presented to the Conference upon the written signature of twenty delegates, and the item shall be presented to the Conference if the appeal is supported by a one-third vote.

(2) Correlation and Editorial Revision.

There shall be a Com mit tee on Cor re lation and Editorial Revision of four persons not members of the General Conference and the Book Editor, who shall be an

ex-officio mem ber. They shall be en ti tled to reimbursement of expenses for at tendance at meet ings of the com mit tee. Two al ternates shall be ap pointed by the Council of Bishops. The Book Ed i tor shall con vene the com mit tee for the pur pose of or ga ni zation. The function of this com mit tee shall be:

- (a) To re view all pro posed leg is la tion reported in the Daily Chris tian Ad vo cate and that pre sented in spe cial re ports to the General Con fer ence. The Com mit tee shall report to the stand ing com mit tees con cerned, or to the General Con fer ence as the sit u ation may war rant, all con tra dictions, du plications, and inconsistencies discovered.
- (b) To as sure that, when a cal en dar item approved on the Consent Calendar or under an om ni bus vote is found to be in con flict with parts of another calendar item discussed and voted upon at a ple nary ses sion, the item discussed and voted shall pre vail.
- (c) To edit the Dis ci pline in ac cor dance with Sec tion XI.B.

(3) Cour tesies and Privileges.

There shall be a Com mit tee on Cour tesies and Privi leges of eight mem bers com posed of one dele gate from each Ju ris diction and one dele gate from a Cen tral Con fer ence from each of the con ti nents of Africa, Asia, and Eu rope. The com mit tee shall be convened by a Bishop for the pur pose of or ganization.

The com mit tee has the following duties andresponsibilities:

- (a) To consider, as presented to it by members of the Conference, what said mem bers re gard as questions or mat ters of privilege, to decide whether they are such or not, and if they are re garded as being such, to recom mend to the Conference that they be heard.
- (b) To con sider res o lu tions of com mendation, courtesy, appreciation, etc., sub mitted in writing by delegates. The com mittee may initiate similar resolutions and edit and amend those sub mitted to it. Resolutions approved by the committee shall be printed in the Daily Christian Advocate and brought to the floor if the committee considers them of un usual importance or ur gency.
- (c) To arrange for extending courtesies of the Conference to any to whom they may be due, ecumenical representatives and official visitors excepted.
- (d) To limit its re port, in clud ing the statement of the chair per son and the hear ing of such per sons as may be pre sented, to a maximum of ten min utes in any one busi ness

day. No person or persons shall be presented whose request has been denied by the Commission on the General Conference, nor after the sixth day unless approved by a two-thirds vote of the Conference. (See Rule 27.3.)

(4) Cre den tials.

There shall be a Committee on Cre dentials of eight mem bers, composed of one delegate from each juris diction and one delegate se lected from a Central Conference from each of the continents of Africa, Asia, and Europe. The committee shall be convened by a Bishop for the pur pose of or ganization.

To this Committee, the chairpersons of the respective annual conference delegations shall report on a form provided for that pur pose any change in seating of delegates, in dicating the length of time for which the change shall be effective. (See Section I.A.4.) The chair per son of this commit tee shall make a daily written report to the Secretary of the General Conference, listing all changes of seating ap proved by the Committee. In the event of questions which may arise regarding the eligibility of seating any delegates, this Committee shall report directly to the General Conference with its recommendations. (See Rule 5.)

(5) Jour nal.

There shall be a Com mit tee on the Jour nal of three mem bers to ap prove daily the record of Pro ceed ings of the General Con ference prepared by the Secretary and as sis tant(s). The com mit tee shall be convened by a Bishop for the pur pose of or ganization.

(6) Pre siding Of ficers.

There shall be a com mit tee on Pre siding Of fi cers of six teen mem bers, com posed of one clergy and one lay del e gate from each juris diction and one clergy and one lay del e gate from mem bers from a Central Con ference from each of the continents of Africa, Asia and Europe. The Committee shall be convened by a Bishop for the pur pose of organization.

The Committee shall se lect and no tify the pre sid ing of fi cer(s) of each ses sion at least 24 hours in ad vance, in so far as pos si ble. The Committee shall be free to select a bishop for more than one session and to change the pre sid ing of fi cer during the session, whenever it seems advisable. (See Section III.)

(7) Reference.

There shall be a Com mit tee on Ref er ence of sixteen members, composed of one

clergy and one lay delegate from each ju risdiction, one clergy and one lay delegate from a Cen tral Con fer ence from each of the con ti nents of Africa, Asia and Eu rope. The membership of this Committee shall include at least one mem ber from each leg isla tive com mit tee. This com mit tee shall be con vened, for the pur pose of or ganization, by the Secretary of the General Conference the day prior to the open ing of the General Conference.

- (a) After reviewing the proposed as signments by the Sec re tary to standing com mittees of the petitions, resolutions, and similar communications dealing with the regular business of the Conference, this committee shall refer the same to the appropriatelegislative committees. (See Section IV.D.) One member of each legislative com mit tee serv ing on this com mit tee shall be designated to coordinate petitions assigned to his/herre spec tive leg is lative committee. This Committee shall also be responsible for reviewing the as sign ment, by the Sec re tary, of all re ports, rec om mendations, and resolutions from general agencies, standing or special commissions and com mit tees, and all other com mu ni cations which shall come into the Sec re tary's hands after the convening of the General Conference, all of which shall be re ferred di rectly to appropriate legislative committees without pre sen ta tion to a ple nary ses sion of the General Conference.
- (b) The Committee on Reference may with draw a pa per that has been as signed to a committee, either upon are quest or upon its own motion. It may also with hold from reference or publication any document it shall deem im proper.
- (c) Where the Com mit tee finds two or more substantially identical petitions, it may group them un der one ti tle and number, in dicating the total number of petitions.
- (d) No pe ti tions shall be as signed by the Committee on Reference to any General Conference Committee unless they meet there quire ments of the Book of Discipline.
- B. Com mis sion on Cen tral Con fer ence Affairs.

(For mem ber ship, see Dis ci pline, 2201.)

To this Com mis sion shall be re ferred all petitions, resolutions, etc., relating to the Central Conferences, Autonomous Churches, Affiliated Churches, Affiliated United Churches and Con cor dant re la tionships (Discipline, ¶¶26-29, 428, 535-553, 2201.)

The Commission on Central Conference Affairs shall submit its report and any leg is-

la tive pro pos als re lated to the para graphs as signed to it di rectly to the Gen eral Conference.

If the Commission on Central Conference Affairs has a concern for any para graphs assigned to one of the leg is lative committees, the Commission shall of fer its recommendation to the appropriate legislative committee for consideration and recommendation to the General Conference.

C. Standing Leg is lative Committees.

The General Conference shall have the following standing leg is lative committees, which shall con sider all pro pos als look ing toward new legislation or changes in the present leg is lation of the church, in cluding all reports and recommendations from general agen cies, and standing or special commissions or committees, and report recommendations relating thereto, to the Conference.

Any legislative committee considering legislation affecting the concerns of the Commission on Central Conference Affairs shall consult with the Commission be fore submitting its proposed legislation to the General Conference.

(1) Church and So ci ety.

To this com mit tee shall be referred all petitions, resolutions, etc., relating to the work and con cerns of the Boards of Church and Society.

D. Member ship of Standing Leg is lative Committees.

(1) Each dele gate shall serve as a member of one of the stand ing leg is la tive com mittees num bered 1 to 10. Within the an nual conference del e ga tion each mem ber shall choose from the leg is lative committees 1 to 10 the committee on which to serve, the choice being made in or der of election. Begin ning with 1996, the clergy first elected shall be en ti tled to the first choice, the lay delegate first elected, the second choice, and thus the right of choice shall con tinue to al ter nate be tween clergy and lay del e gates in the or der of their election. For sub sequent Gen eral Con fer ences, first choice shall alternate between the lay and clergy delegates, provided that two members of a del e ga tion may not serve on any one of the above-designated standing leg is lative commit tees 1 to 10 un less the said del e ga tion is rep re sented on each of them. All del e gations com posed of eleven or more mem bers shall as sign all mem bers in ex cess of ten accord ing to this same prin ci ple of dis tri bution. (For example, a conference with six teen del e gates shall have two mem bers on each of any six of these ten com mit tees and one on each of the re main ing four. Similarly, a conference with 26 delegates shall have three mem bers on each of six com mittees and two on each of the re main ing four. Each del e gate may, in the or der herein in dicated, se lect any one of these ten com mittees, provided that the fore going division of the delegates among the committees is maintained.) Whenever a delegation has more than one member on a legislative com mit tee, its mem bers shall be di vided as equally as pos si ble be tween lay and clergy. Thus, if there are three mem bers on a commit tee, they shall be two clergy and one lay or vice versa.

(2) If a mat ter is un der con sid er ation in any standing leg is lative committee which in the judg ment of any an nual con fer ence delegation vitally affects the interests of its con stit u ency, and if the said an nual con ference is not rep re sented in the mem ber ship of said com mit tee, then the dele gation may choose one of its mem bers to rep re sent its an nual con fer ence in the com mit tee when the matter judged to be vital to the interests of this constituency is under consideration. Such a per son shall be entitled to sit with the committee while this particular matter is being considered and shall be entitled to the floor, subject to such limitations as are imposed on the reg u lar mem bers of the commit tee, but shall not be en ti tled to vote. (See Section VIII.E.4.)

(3) Each person seated in the General Con fer ence with the right to speak but not vote may submit to the Secretary of the Gen eral Con fer ence a choice of a leg is lative committee and shall have the same right in that com mit tee to speak but not to vote.

E. Meeting of Committees.

- (1) For Organization. All standing legislative and admin is trative committees shall meet for organizationat such time as the Commission on the General Conference shall de ter mine. A bishop ap pointed by the Coun cil of Bishops and an as sis tant sec retary ap pointed by the Sec re tary of the General Conference shall serve, respectively, as chair per son and sec re tary to effect an or ganization in each of the several standing com mit tees, ex cept where other pro vi sion is spec i fied. The first meeting of the leg isla tive com mit tees shall be held as soon as pos si ble fol lowing the first ple nary ses sion of the General Conference. The orientation of the com mit tee, fol lowed by the election of of fi cers, shall be the or der of busi ness of the first meeting of the committee.
- (a) The election of chairperson, vice-chairperson, and secretary of each standing committee, both administrative and leg is lative, shall be by ball lot.
- (b) The Sec re tary of the Gen eral Con ference shall be re spon si ble for arranging for a training session for all chairpersons, vice-chairpersons, and sec re tar ies of leg isla tive com mit tees as soon as pos si ble after their elec tions. The training shall in clude in struction in their duties, all procedures in the han dling of petitions, the times of the daily dead line for publishing re ports, and other in for mation to expedite the work of the committees. The Commission on the General Conference shall arrange for a time and place for such a training session.
- (2) Reg u lar Meet ings. The standing legis la tive com mit tees 1 to 10 in clu sive shall meet for business as scheduled by the Agenda and Calendar Committee unless other wise or dered by the Conference, until their work is com pleted, and at such other times as the com mit tees may deter mine.
- (3) Quo rum for Com mit tee Meet ings. A major ity of the mem bers shall con sti tute a quo rum for the trans action of busi ness in all committees.
- (4) Each leg is la tive com mit tee shall estab lish an area in which only vot ing committee members will be seated. Staff, resource persons, and visitors may speak only when au tho rized, in each in stance by

specific committee action. (See Section VIII.D.2.)

- (5) Leg is la tive com mit tees are urged to give pri or ity to sig nif i cant and con tro versial leg is la tion so that their re ports on such mat ters may be printed as soon as pos si ble in the Daily Christian Advo cate and con sidered by the General Con ference.
- (6) Mi nor ity re ports should be en couraged so that differ ing views held by a sig nificant portion of the committee may be care fully pre pared and ex pressed and the issues clearly defined for decision by the General Conference. Ade quate time should be given for the mi nor ity to pre pare its report and the major ity and mi nor ity re ports shall be printed to gether in the Daily Christian Ad vo cate (See Rules 33, 34, and 36).
- F. Func tion and Au thor ity Of Com mittees.
- (1) The standing ad min is trative committees, with out specific in struction or direction from the Conference, shall assume responsibility for considering and reporting to the Conference upon all matters which fall within their respective responsibilities. (VIII.A.)
- (2) The stand ing leg is la tive committees may not orig i nate busi ness, but shall consider and re port only upon that which is referred to them by the Committee on Ref er ence, or which has been re ferred to them di rectly by the Con fer ence and processed by the Committee on Reference. (See Rule 31.)
- IX. Proposal Involving Expenditure of Unbudgeted Funds

A. Any proposal sub mitted to the General Con fer ence to es tab lish an in terim or continuing board, commission, committee or task force shall be re ferred to the General Council on Finance and Admin is tration or its executive committee for are port and recommendation be fore final action is taken.

The Gen eral Coun cil on Fi nance and Administration or its executive committee shall provide the Gen eral Con fer ence with the following be fore action is taken:

- (1) an esti mated bud get for the proposed board, commission, committee or task force for the next qua dren nium; and
- (2) a state ment ex plain ing how the creation of the proposed board, commission, com mit tee, or task force will af fect the budget or bud gets for existing boards, com missions, com mit tees and task forces al ready presented by the General Council on Finance and Administration.

B. Any proposal submitted to the General Conference which in volves the expenditure of funds not in cluded in the estab lished budget shall be referred to the General Council on Finance and Admin is tration for advice and recommendation before final action is taken.

X. Dele gates' Ex pense Ac counts

A. The re port of the chair per son of the re spective annual conference delegations shall be the basis for set tle ment with principal and reserve delegates for their per diem allowances. The total traveling expense including per diem shall be payable to the principal delegate if present and seated. If during the Conference are serve delegate is seated for a principal delegate for one or more full days, the principal delegate shall adjust the per diem with such reserve on the basis of the time served by each.

- B. Full travel ex penses and per diem shall be paid for the num ber of all ot ted dele gates from each con fer ence whether those delegates are principal or reserve.
- C. Air travel ex pense shall be on the basis of the most economical round-trip tourist/coach air fare di rectly to and from the seat of the General Conference. Special excur sion and pro mo tional fares shall be utilized whenever possible. Additional ex penses may be al lowed del e gates from Con fer ences out side the United States for ar rival and de par ture not to ex ceed two days before or after General Conference. The per diem expense allowance for all such days be fore and af ter Gen eral Con fer ence shall be at the same rate as granted del e gates during General Conference. Exceptions to these lim i ta tions must be ap proved by the Busi ness Man ager of the Gen eral Con ference.
- D. When one or more del e gates come in the same au to mo bile, the owner will be allowed the es tab lished rate per mile plus the cost of room and meals en route up to the established General Conference per diem rate. Guest pas sen gers who are the prin cipal delegates to the General Conference shall submit only the cost of room and meals en route up to the es tab lished Gen eral Conference per diem rate. Max i mum use of automobiles for travel may not exceed 1,000 miles round-trip, for re im burse ment purposes. If automobile travel exceeds 1000 miles round-trip, re im burse ment will be based upon the most economical round-trip tour ist/coach air fare, or the mileage re im burse ment, which ever is less. In all

cases del e gates shall re port only the ac tual cost of travel.

E. For the dates Gen eral Conference is in session, no General Conference delegate shall re ceive ex pense money from the general church or any of its boards and agen cies other than ap proved per diem and travel expenses avail able to all del e gates. This provi sion is not to re strict of fi cial as sis tance to delegates from their own annual conferences. This shall be come ef fec tive with the Gen eral Conference of 2000.

XI. Ma te rial to be In cluded in The Dis cipline

- A. No non-legislative material shall be ordered printed in the Discipline without first refer ring it to the Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision for consideration and report to the General Conference for further consideration and final action.
- B. The Book Ed i tor, the Sec re tary of the Gen eral Con fer ence, the Pub lisher of The United Method ist Church, and the Committee on Correlation and EditorialRevision shall be charged with editing the Discipline. These ed i tors, in the ex er cise of their judgment, shall have the authority to make changes in phrase ol ogy as may be nec essary to harmonize legislation without changing its substance. The editors, in consultation with the Judicial Council, shall also have au thor ity to de lete pro vi sions of the Dis ci pline which have been ruled unconstitutional by the Judicial Council. Any chal lenge of a de ci sion made by the Commit tee on Cor re la tion and Ed i to rial Re vision shall be in writing. If the matter should go to the Judicial Council, the appealing party shall give no tice thereof to the Commit tee. Any es tab lished er rata in the Dis cipline shall be forwarded by the United Method ist Pub lishing House to the Council of Bishops.

XII. Dis tri bu tion to the Desks of Del egates

Af ter the first day, only the Daily Christian Ad vo cate shall be placed on the desks of the del e gates, with ad di tional copies for the first clergy and first lay re serve del e gate from each del e gation.

XIII. Distribution of Unofficial Material

Daily, periodic, or regular news letters, or any special interest material published at General Conference by United Method ist boards, agencies, and related United Method ist groups may be distributed under the following conditions:

A. Two cop ies of each pub li ca tion shall be de pos ited in the of fice of the Com mis-

sion on the Gen eral Con fer ence in ad vance of the time of dis tri bution.

- B. Material distributed should be used for information relative to matters that have been be fore or are coming be fore the General Conference and not for soliciting membership in an organization.
- C. Dis tri bu tion shall be at least 30 feet out side any en trance door to the ple nary or committee meeting rooms.
- D. Dis tri bution shall be done by representatives of the publishing groups. Dis tributors shall be in the small est number capable of effecting adequate distribution to those entering. During distribution it is the responsibility of the distributors not to impede or in terfere with the entrance or exit of persons or to ham per the general flow of pedestriantraffic.
- E. Distributors are responsible for the disposal of unused or unclaimed materials.
- F. Distributors violating these regulations will be pro hib ited from fu ture distributions.
 - XIV. Re ports to be Mailed

Be fore General Conference

The reports, recommendations, and resolutions, requiring action by the General Con fer ence, as well as pe ti tions sub mit ted in ac cor dance with Dis ci pline 507.7, shall first be as signed a Pe ti tion Num ber by the Sec re tary of the Gen eral Con fer ence or the Petitions Secretary and then shall be printed in an Ad vance Edi tion of the Daily Christian Ad vo cate and dis trib uted to all del egates and to the first clergy and first lay re serve del e gates at least sixty days prior to the opening of the General Conference. If neces sary to meet this dead line, material to del e gates from Cen tral Con fer ences shall be sent by air mail. Such re ports shall be printed in the same size and style as the Daily Chris tian Ad vo cate and be punched for binding.

In or der to ac com plish this, the fin ished copy of all such re ports and rec om men dations shall be sub mit ted to the editor of the Daily Christian Ad vo cate at least 150 days prior to the open ing of the General Conference. Any such re ports and rec om men dations not so sub mit ted and not printed in an Ad vance Edition of the Daily Christian Advocate shall be received by the General Conference only upon three-fourths vote of the General Conference. The General Council on Finance and Administration shall be ex empt from this require ment to the ex tent nec es sary to allow in clusion of general funds re ceipts in for mation for the first

three years of the qua dren nium. The General Council on Finance and Admin is tration will provide data in cluding the third year of the qua dren nium and other appropriate information to delegates prior to the convening of the General Conference.

Rules of Order

I. Daily Sched ule

Rule 1. Hours of Meet ings

The following shall be the daily or der for the General Conference, Sundays excepted:

- (1) 8:00 a.m. Cho ral mu sic
- (2) 8:15 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. De vo tional service under direction of the Council of Bishops
- (3) 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Conference business or committee meetings
- (4) 2:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Conference business or committee meetings
- (5) 7:30 p.m. Evening programs as planned by the Com mis sion on the Gen eral Con fer ence, Con fer ence busi ness or committee meetings
- (6) Re cess may be called dur ing any plenary ses sion at a time deemed ap pro pri ate by the bishop pre sid ing.

Rule 2. Or der of Busi ness

After the devotional service, the daily sessions of the Conference shall be conducted as follows:

- (1) Reports of standing administrative and special committees
 - (2) Agenda and cal en dar items
- (3) Consent calendar (See Rule 28.5 29.5.)
 - (4) Mis cellaneous business
 - II. Presiding Officers

Rule 3. Au thor ity of the Chair per son

- (1) The bishop presiding shall be the chair per son of the General Conference session.
- (2) The bishop presiding shall decide points of or der raised by the del e gates and shall rule on points of or der not raised by del e gates, as the chair deems nec es sary to con form to these rules of or der, sub ject in both cases to an ap peal to the Con fer ence by any del e gate with out de bate, ex cept that the chair per son and the ap pel lant, in the or der

here named, shall each have three min utes for a state ment in sup port of their re spec tive po si tions. A tie vote in the case of ap peal shall sus tain the chair. (See Rule 27.2) Any del e gate who raises a point of or der shall cite the rule be lieved to have been vio lated.

- (3) At the dis cre tion of the bishop pre siding a time for prayer ful dis cern ment may be taken during deliberation. Such a time should be for personal meditation or for group prayer and shall end at the call of the bishop pre siding; at which time nor mal deliberation shall be re sumed.
- (4) The bishop pre sid ing shall have the right to re cess a ses sion of the Gen eral Confer ence at any time at the chair's dis cre tion and to re con vene at such time as the chair shall an nounce. The bishop pre sid ing shall also have the right to stip u late that the session shall re con vene with only delegates, authorized personnel, and authorized guests per mit ted to at tend such a ses sion following recess.

Rule 4. Call ing the Con fer ence to Or der

When the bishop pre sid ing calls the Conference to or der, no mem ber shall speak, address the chair, or stand.

III. Rights and Duties Of Mem bers

Rule 5. Attendance and Seating Reserves

No delegate, un less hin dered by sick ness or other emer gency sit u a tion, shall be absent from the ses sions of the Con fer ence with out per mis sion of the Con fer ence. All ab sences shall be re ported by the chair persons of the several An nual Con fer ence delegations to the Com mit tee on Cre den tials on a form provided for this pur pose. A reserve delegate may be seated upon au thority of the chair per son of the delegation who shall report the substitution in writing to the Com mit tee on Cre den tials on a form provided for this pur pose. Reserves are cho sen to be seated:

- 1. by rea son of being of the same or der as the ab sent member,
- 2. in or der of their election as reserve delegates.

If the Com mit tee dis ap proves the sub stitution, after con sul tation with the chair person of the del e ga tion, it may re port to the General Conference with its recom men dation. The chair per son of the Com mit tee on Credentials shall make a daily written report to the Sec re tary of the General Conference, listing all changes of seating. (See Plan of Or ga ni za tion IA.4 and VIII-A.4.)

Rule 6. Voting When On The Plat form

<u>1711 May 3, 2000</u>

Elec tronic vot ing de vices shall be available on the plat form for delegates making a presentation to the Conference. Reserves shall not be seated for such delegates.

Rule 7. Directions for Securing the Floor

A del e gate de sir ing to speak to the Confer ence shall hold up the ap pro pri ate placard pro vided for that pur pose. A del e gate shall not move to the mi cro phone un til recognized by the bishop presiding. Unless rais ing a point of or der or par lia men tary inquiry, the delegate shall not speak until given the floor. The bishop pre sid ing shall con sider the var i ous sec tions of the au di torium in ro ta tion. The del e gate rec og nized shall pro ceed to the near est mi cro phone and shall first an nounce her or his name and the name of the Con fer ence rep re sented; which in turn, the bishop pre sid ing shall then announce to the Con fer ence.

Rule 8. In ter rupting the Speaker

No del e gate who has the floor may be interrupted ex cept for a point of or der, a misrepresentation, a parliamentary inquiry, a point of in formation, or to call at tention that the time has ar rived for a special or der.

Rule 9. Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

A. No del e gate shall speak a sec ond time on the same ques tion if any del e gate who has not pre vi ously spo ken on the ques tion de sires the floor.

- B. No delegate shall speak more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, except as provided in Rule 37.2.
- C. No delegate shall speak longer than three min utes un less that time is ex tended by the Con fer ence. (See Rule 37.3)
- D. The three minute limit on delegate speeches may be amended by a majority vote of the Con fer ence at any time and for any period of duration.

Rule 10. Point of Or der

A del e gate wish ing to raise a point of order shall ad dress the bishop pre sid ing and say, "I rise to a point of or der." The bishop presiding shall interrupt the proceeding; if a del e gate is speak ing that one shall im me diately yield the floor. The bishop pre sid ing shall then direct the delegate raising the point of or der to state the point as briefly and con cisely as pos si ble, cit ing the rule invoked in the point of or der that the del e gate shall not pre sume to de cide the question or ar gue the point.

A point of or der is de cided by the bishop presiding without de bate un less in doubt ful

cases the chair sub mits the question to the body for advice or decision. When the bishop presiding rules on a point, debate is closed, but the decision may be appealed.

Rule 11. Bar of the Con fer ence

The bar of the con fer ence shall pro vide for the integrity of the General Con fer ence. It is for delegates, pages, and others who have been granted access to the area for General Conference business. Delegates are not to distract others near them by engaging in unrelated business activity.

Rule 12. Voting Pro ce dure

- (1) Voting shall be by electronic means unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, pro vided, how ever, that in elections, voting may be by written ballot.
- (2) When elec tronic voting is not in use, a standing count vote or vote by written ballot may be or dered on call of any delegate, supported by one-third of the delegates present and voting.
- (3) In the event the elec tronic voting system is in operable, the chair persons of the delegations shall poll their respective delegations.
- (4) Only del e gates within the bar of the Con fer ence when the vote is taken shall be entitled to vote. No del e gate shall cast a vote in place of any other del e gate.
- (5) No other business shall be in order when a vote is be ing taken or when the previous question has been called un til the process is completed, except such as relates to the vote it self or such business as the chair may deem appropriate.

Rule 13. Di vi sion of Question

Be fore a vote is taken, any del e gate shall have the right to call for a di vi sion of any ques tion, if it is sub ject to such di vi sion as the del e gate in di cates. If no del e gate objects, the di vi sion shall be made; but if there is objection, the chair shall put the ques tion of di vi sion to vote, not waiting for a sec ond.

IV. Business Procedure

$Rule\,14.\,Motion\,for\,Adop\,tion\,of\,Re\,ports$

When ever a re port of a com mit tee signed by the chairperson and secretary is presented to the Conference for action, it shall be deemed in proper or der for consider ation by the Conference with out the formal ity of a sec ond.

Rule 15. Required Forms for Reports, Resolution, Motions, Amendments.

All resolutions and committee reports shall be pre pared in trip li cate; and mo tions, in clud ing amend ments, shall be pre sented in writ ing. (See Rules 29.2, 32.2. 34.)

Rule 16. Alter ations of Motions

When a motion is made and sec onded or a res o lution is in tro duced and sec onded or a com mit tee re port is read or is pub lished in the Daily Christian Advocate, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Conference and may not be altered except by action of the Conference. (See Rule 33.)

Rule 17. Nondebatable Mo tions

The following motions shall be acted upon with out de bate:

- (1) To ad journ, when un qual i fied, ex cept to ad journ the Conference finally
 - (2) To sus pend the rules
- (3) To lay on the table, ex cept as pro vided in Rule 37.2
 - (4) To take from the table
- (5) To call for the pre vi ous questions (See Rule 23)
- (6) To re consider a non-debatable motion (See Rule 28)
 - (7) To limit or extend the limits of debate
- (8) To take time for prayerful discernment at the im me di ate mo ment.

Rule 18. Rights of the Main Ques tion

The main question may be opened to debate under the following motions: to adopt, to commit or refer, to substitute, to postpone, and to reconsider. No new motion, resolutions, or subject shall be entertained until the one underconsideration shall have been disposed of except as provided in Rule 12.5. The fore going does not apply to secondary motions if other wise allowable.

Rule 19. Pre ce dence of Sec ond ary Mo-

If any one or more of the following motions shall be made when one or more other motions are pending, the or der of their precedence in relation to one an other shall be the same as the order of their listing below:

- (1) To fix the time the conference shall ad journ. (This mo tion is subject to amendment, or it may be laid on the table.)
 - (2) To ad journ
 - (3) To take a re cess
 - (4) To lay on the table

- (5) To or der the pre vi ous ques tion (See Rules 23, 25.)
 - (6) To limit or extend the limits of debate
 - (7) To post pone to a given time
 - (8) To com mit or re fer
- (9) To amend or to amend by sub sti tu tion (one amendment being allowed to an amendment)
 - (10) To post pone in definitely

Rule 20. Mo tion to Ad journ in Or der Except:

The motion to adjourn, when un qualified, shall be taken with out de bate and shall always be in or der, ex cept:

- (1) When a del e gate has the floor
- (2) When a question is actually put or a vote is being taken and before it is finally decided
- (3) When the pre vi ous question has been or dered and action there under is pending
- (4) When a mo tion to ad journ has been lost and no business or debate has intervened
- (5) When the mo tion to fix the time to which the con fer ence shall ad journ is pending

The fore go ing does not ap ply to a motion for final ad journ ment of the Conference.

Rule 21. Fi nal ad journ ment shall be sine die; there fore, all un fin ished busi ness shall re main un fin ished.

Rule 22. Ta bling Re lated Mo tions

No mo tion which ad heres to an other motion or has an other mo tion ad hering to it can be laid on the table by it self. Such mo tions, if laid on the table, carry with them the motions to which they ad here or which ad here to them.

Rule 23. Pre vi ous Question

Any member who moves the previous question (that is, that the vote be now taken on the motion or motions pending) shall also in dicate to what it is in tended to ap ply, if any sec ond ary motion or motions are also pend ing. If said mem ber does not so in dicate, it shall be re garded as ap ply ing only to the immediately pending question. This motion shall be taken with out de bate and shall re quire a two-thirds vote of those present and voting for its adoption; if it is adopted, the vote shall be taken on the motion or motions to which it ap plies with out

fur ther de bate ex cept as pro vided in Rule 37. (See also Rules 17, 25e, 26.)

Rule 24. Re ferring Re ports, Etc.

It shall be in or der for the Con fer ence to re fer to a com mit tee a sec tion or part of a report or res o lu tion which is be fore the Conference for consideration of any amend ment of fered thereto.

Rule 25. Procedure for Amending by Substitution

- (A) When a res o lu tion or com mit tee report is prop erly be fore the Con fer ence for consideration and action, even if amendments are pending, a sub stitute may be offered by any member moving that the same be substituted for the report, resolution, or amendment under consideration. The substitute shall be an alternative to what is before the house and not simply a negation of the main motion.
- (B) The Conference shall proceed first to perfect the original report or resolution, including consider ation and action upon any amend ments which may be of fered to it
- (C) The same per fecting process shall be followed with respect to the substitute.
- (D) The questions shall be put first on the motion to substitute, followed by the motion to adopt the report or resolution.
- (E) The motion for the pre vious questions shall not be in or der on the adoption of the report or recommendation or on making the proposed substitution until opportunity has been given for at least two members to speak on each side of the question of substitution or adoption. (Also see Rule 36.2 for handling minority reports.)

Rule 26. Unlaw ful Motion After Speech

It shall not be in or der for a del e gate imme di ately after dis cussing a pending question and before relinquishing the floor to make a motion which, if adopted, would limit or stop de bate.

Rule 27. Ex ceptions to Majority Vote.

A majority of those voting, quo rum being present (Discipline 506), shall decide all questions, with the following exceptions:

- (1) One-third of those present and voting shall suffice to sus tain a call for a recorded vote in case the decision of the chair is challenged. (See Rule 12.2.)
- (2) A tie vote sustains the chair. (Rule 3.2.)
- (3) A two-thirds vote shall be re quired to sus tain a mo tion to sus pend (Rule 39) or amend (Rule 40) the rules; to set aside a

- spe cial or der (Rule 29.1); to con sider a special or der be fore the time set there for; to sustain the request of the Committee on Courtesies and Privileges for the presentation of any person after the sixth day of the General Conference. (Plan of Organization VIII.A.3.)
- (4) A call for the pre vi ous question is a motion to sus pend the rules and there fore requires a two-thirds vote.
- (5) A two-thirds vote shall be re quired to approve a proposal for a constitutional amend ment. (Discipline, 57-59.)

Rule 28. Reconsideration

A mo tion to re con sider an ac tion of the Con fer ence shall be in or der at any time if offered by a del e gate who voted with the pre vail ing side. If the mo tion pro posed for re consider a tion was non-debatable, the motion to re con sider shall be non-debatable. (See Rule 17.)

Rule 29. Reg u lar Cal en dar and Con sent Calendar

- (1) The Sec re tary shall keep the Cal en dar which in cludes the or ders of the day and the re ports of com mit tees (See Rule 33). Business placed on the cal en dar shall be con sidered in the order recommended by the Committee on Agenda and Cal en dar, un less by two-thirds vote of the Conference, an item is taken up out of order. (See Rule 27.3.)
- (2) When a com mit tee presents are port, it shall also list the numbers of all petitions relating to the report on which the com mit tee voted non-concurrence so that all related mat ters may be con sidered to gether. (See Rules 31.3, 32, 34.)
- (3) Ac tion from a leg is la tive com mit tee shall be placed on the Con sent Cal en darif:
- (a) No more than five votes were cast against the pre vail ing position in the Committee:
- (b) The item has been pre vi ously printed in the Daily Christian Ad vo cate;
- (c) The item has been in the hands of del egates for at least 24 hours; and
- (d) The item is neither a constitutional amend ment nor one having financial implications.
- (4) The Daily Christian Advocate shall clearly identify the Consent Calendar which will list items in three sections sub-headed as fol lows:
 - (a) Dis ci pline Changes Con cur rence
 - (b) Non-Discipline Items Con cur rence

- (c) Dis ci pline and Non-Discipline Items Nonconcurrence
- (5) The Con sent Cal en dar shall be called up daily pur su ant to Rule 2. Adop tion of the Consent Calendar by vote of the Con ference shall be deemed action on all cal en dar items on the Con sent Cal en dar.
- (6) Any five del e gates may have a Consent Cal en daritem re moved by having such a re quest on file with the Sec re tary by 3:00 p.m. of the day the cal en dar item first appears in the Daily Christian Advocate. Such items shall be called up in the reg u lar or der of busi ness.
- Rule 30. Rules of Order of Legislative Committees

The rules of or der of the Gen eral Con ference, ex cept for Rule 37, shall be ob served in meetings of standing leg is lative committees in so far as they apply.

- Rule 31. Duties and Pre rog a tives of Legislative Committees
- (1) Following election and orien tation of of fi cers, as its first or der of busi ness, each com mit tee shall uti lize the re sources of its leg is lative co or dinator (see Com mit tee on Reference). Each com mit tee shall eval u ate the peti tions as signed to the com mit tee, estab lish pri or i ties, and out line the com mittee's work on the basis of those pri or i ties un less it is given special in structions by the Gen eral Con ference. (See Plan of Or ga nization VIII.A.(7)(a).)
- (2) When a pe ti tion or res o lu tion or any sim i lar item is re ferred to one of the sev eral stand ing leg is la tive com mit tees, it shall be understood that the whole question with which the pa per has to do is re ferred to that com mit tee for such ac tion as it may deem wise. In addition to concurrence and non-concurrence, a com mit tee may rec ommend ac tion or re fer ral to the next Gen eral Con fer ence or to a board, coun cil, com mission, or com mit tee ei ther for ac tion or for re port to the next Gen eral Con fer ence.
- (3) Com mit tees shall report to the Con ference upon all mat ters re ferred to them by the Conference, directly or through the Committee on Reference. Com mit tee reports on resolutions, petitions, etc., shall cite the same, iden tify ing them by num bers they bear re spec tively in the pub lished reports of the Com mit tee on Reference or in some other suit able man ner.
- (4) When a commit tee as certains that another committee is, or in its judgment should be, considering a subject which the former is considering, it shall report the matter to the Committee on Reference for

such adjustment as the situation may require.

Rule 32. Leg is la tive Com mit tee Re port to the Daily Christian Advocate

- (1) As quickly as material can be prepared, each sec re tary of a stand ing leg is lative committee shall present each of the committee's re ports to a re corder as signed to the committee. The re corder will prepare the re port and send it to the Daily Chris tian Ad vo cate. A copy of the re port as it will appear in the Daily Chris tian Ad vo cate will be sent to the chair and vice chair for their approval and sig na ture. After copy has been ap proved, it will be re turned to the Daily Christian Advocate. A calendar number will be as signed and it will be printed as approved.
- (2) Committee and minority reports which propose changes in the Discipline shall give chapter, section, and para graph to be af fected and shall be pre pared in the following manner.

Ex isting words used as ref er ence points shall be in quo ta tion marks; words to be deleted shall be sin gle-underscored; words to be added shall be dou ble-underscored. In the pub li ca tion of these re ports, the Daily Christian Advo cate shall substitute ital ics for single underscoring and boldface for double un der scor ing. (See Rule 34.)

Rule 33. Pub lished Re ports in Pos session of Conference

Re ports sub mit ted by the com mit tee accord ing to the dead line, as an nounced by the Sec re tary of the Con fer ence, shall appear in the next day's Daily Christian Ad vocate. The report as printed in the Daily Christian Advocate becomes the official copy, subject only to gram matical or other ob vi ous ed i to rial changes and shall be regarded as in the pos ses sion of the Con fer-On the day following its first appear ance in the Daily Christian Advocate or any time there after, a report is in or der for con sid er ation at the plea sure of the con ference. The same rule shall ap ply to a re port of a mi nor ity of any com mit tee. (See Rules 16, 36.)

Rule 34. Prep a ration and Printing of Reports

(1) All com mit tee re ports shall be presented to the Daily Chris tian Ad vo cate on a form pro vided there fore and using a process ap proved by the Sec re tary of the Con ference. The form shall bear at the top the name of the com mit tee, its to tal mem bership, the num ber present at the time the report was adopted, the num ber voting for and against the report, respectively, and the

- num ber not vot ing. (See Rule 15, 29.2, 31.3, 32.)
- (2) Consent Calendar items (see Rule 29.3, 4) shall be clearly marked with an identifying symbol on the report cover and in the Daily Christian Advocate printing, this symbol to be sup plied by the General ConferenceSecretary.
- (3) Reports of the standing legislative committees shall be printed in the Daily Christian Ad vo cate at least one day be fore being presented for consideration by the Con fer ence. Com mit tee re ports to which minority reports are appended shall be printed in se quence, and so num bered.
- (4) Every effort should be made by the sec re tary of the Leg is la tive Com mit tee to re port con sec u tively all pe ti tions which address the same is sue.

Rule 35. Com mit tee Chair per son Not in Har mony with Re port

When the chair per son of a com mit tee is not in har mony with a re port adopted by the committee, it shall be the chairperson's duty to state the fact to the com mit tee. The com mit tee shall elect one of its mem bers to present it in the present ation and discussion of the re port in the Con fer ence. If, in such a case, the com mit tee shall fail to se lect a representative, the chair person shall designate a mem ber to rep re sent the com mit tee, and said rep re sen ta tive shall have all the rights and privileges of the chair person in relation to such re port.

Rule 36. Mi nor ity Re port

- (1) Mi nor ity re ports rep re sented as substitutes for a com mit tee re port shall conform to Rule 25 and Rule 32 re spec tively and in dicate the specific report number with which it re lates. The names of the mem bers of the com mit tee signing the re port shall be in dicated. A mi nor ity re port shall be signed by one-tenth or by ten mem bers of the commit tee, which ever is the lesser.
- (2) A mi nor ity re port shall be pro cessed as a sub sti tu tion for the re port of the commit tee pur su ant to Rule 25 as would any other substitute.
- (3) The signers of the minority report shall se lect one of their num ber to pres ent the re port. This per son shall have the same rights and priv i leges as the chair per son in the pre sentation of the committee report. In closing de bate on the minority report, the member presenting the minority report shall speak first and the chair per son last.

Rule 37. Speakers For and Against

- (1) When the re port of a com mit tee is under con sid er ation, it shall be the duty of the bishop pre sid ing to as cer tain, when rec ognizing a member of the Conference, on which side the mem ber pro poses to speak; the chair shall not as sign the floor to any member proposing to speak on the same side of the pend ing ques tion as the speaker im me di ately pre ced ing if any mem ber desires to speak on the other side thereof.
- (2) Except for un de bat able motions (Rule 17), no re port shall be adopted or question re lating to the same de cided with out op portunity having been given for at least two speeches for and two against the said proposal. Af ter three speeches for and three against and provided no sec ond ary motions come be fore the floor, the questions shall be put au to matically. How ever, the chair person and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report chair person or representative if there be one) shall be entitled to speak be fore the vote is taken. (See Rule 36.)
- (3) The right of the chairperson and/or other mem ber or mem bers to close the debate shall pre vail in like man ner to a limit of three min utes when a vote is about to be taken on a motion to amend, to sub stitute, to post pone, to re fer, or to lay on the ta ble or any other motion whose adoption would vitally affect the report under consider ation. (See Rules 9, 36.)

Rule 38. Ef fec tive Date

All leg is lation of the General Conference of the United Meth od ist Church shall become effective January 1 following the session of the General Conference at which it is enacted, unless otherwise specified. (See Discipline 508.)

VI. Sus pending, Amending, and Sup plementing

Rule 39. Sus pen sion of the Rules

The operation of any of the provisions of the Plan of Organization or of these Rules of Order may be suspended at any time by two-thirds vote of the Conference. (See Rule 27.3.)

Rule 40. Amending Rules

The Plan of Organization and these Rules of Or der may be amended or changed by a two-thirds vote of the Conference; provided the proposed change or amendment has orig i nated in the Com mit tee on Plan of Organization and Rules of Order or has been presented to the Conference in writing and referred to this com mit tee, which com mit tee shall report thereon not later than the following day. (See Rule 27.3 and Plan of Organization VII.B.)

The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order as adopted at the opening session shall be printed in the next Daily Christian Advocate.

Rule 41. Rob ert's Rules of Or der, Supplemental Authority

In any parliamentary sit u a tion not covered by the Plan of Or ga ni za tion or these Rules of Order, the General Conference shall be governed in its action by the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.

Rule 42. Per sons With out Right to Make or Sec ond a Motion

A per son seated in the con fer ence with the right to speak, but with out vote, does not have the right to make a mo tion or sec ond motions.

Connectional Process Team Presentation

We pro pose that the Connectional Process Team (CPT) Re port come be fore the Gen eral Con fer ence in the following manner:

1. The Connectional Pro cess Team will present its report to the General Conference

in ple nary ses sion on Wednes day morning, May 3, as an or der of the day.

- 2. Following this presentation, the delegates to General Conference will be divided into 25 randomly selected non-legislative groups for reflection and dialogue on the CPT report.
- 3. Each group will meet for 90 min utes guided by a con vener bishop se lected by the Coun cil of Bishops.
- 4. Each group will be pro vided a re corder who is a non-delegate.
- 5. On Wednes day eve ning, May 3, the con ven ers and re cord ers will meet to compare experiences and to identify areas of con sen sus with, dis sent from, or questions about the CPT re port and pro pos als.
- 6. On Thurs day evening, May 4, im me diately following the opening worship, the conveners and recorders will provide the General Conference with a written summary of the small group meetings.
- 7. Fol low ing time to read the writ ten report, the General Conference will enter into a time of prayer ful dis cern ment to ask the Holy Spirit to give the Conference the mind of Christ and make clear the will of God for our Church on this is sue.
- 8. On Fri day, May 5, fol lowing the Africa Com mit tee Re port, the floor of the con ference shall be open for de bate upon amendments to or other action upon the re port as the con ference shall direct. This action shall proceed any legislative committee action upon spe cific pe ti tions re lated to the CPT report.
- 8. Pe ti tions re lated to the CPT re port as assigned to the appropriate legislative Committees will follow the legislative process in ac cordance with the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order adopted by the General Conference.

"We Who Are Many . . . Are One Body"

Communion Meditation

by Bishop Robert C. Morgan

Mark 5:1-20

[The be gin ning of this ad dress is in au dible on the au dio tape.]

[The de mo niac is] barely a hu man be ing. He is ex iled to the grave yard, to the place where only silence and the dead reside. How many people is he? How many voices come from him? He is many, so very many, that he seems a mon ster who can not be under stood or cared for by other peo ple. For Je sus sees this man as we do, bruised and tat tered, and twisted. Je sus hears the voices of the le gion, but Je sus also sees some thing else. For when Jesus gazes upon him, he sees what no one else can see. He sees the one loved and blessed child of God whom this poor man once had been. Je sus sees Legion, not as he is, but as he can be again, whole and re stored to life. Je sus sees him as God has created him, before the demons had come. So af ter Je sus had in structed the de mons to come out of him, he asked the man his name, gave him a chance to speak, to give the name by which he is known. But the response comes from even more demons: "We are called Le gion," they cried, "for we are many in this one man."

Well, is it pos si ble to see our selves in this gos pel ac count, dear friends, as a peo ple, as a General Conference, as a church? Here we gather at this General Conference to discuss, to debate, to share, and-yes-to strug gle, of ten with each other, we who are many. Now when the world watches us—and be sure, the world watches us—do we appear as Christ sees us, whole and blessed? When the world lis tens to us, do our voices sound as Christ would hear us? Do our words seem faith ful and com mit ted to him, loving and sup port ive of one another? Are we the one, the loved body of Christ our Lord? Or do we ap pear as the demoniac in the graveyard, talking incessantly, filled with a thousand conflicting voices, filled with an ger, filled with rage?

Well, there's a hope ful prom ise for us in this gos pel les son. When we find our selves trapped, as was this man, Jesus stands among the tomb stones. Where we're hiding, bruised and shaken, he hears us as we raise our many voices to each other. He is with us in this place and will hear our ev ery word. Let us in vite him, now, to touch us so our exile among the dead can be ended. When Christ touched the man who was Legion, he was re stored, and his many voices were healed and har mo nized into a beau tiful voice with only one word to share. The Sav ior tells a man, now healed, "Go back and tell your friends of what the Lord has done for you and what mercy has been shown you." Once pos sessed of a thou sand voices, now a sin gle mes sage re mains: Tell the world what God has done for you and what mercy has been shown you.

As we gather for the General Conference, we'll come to the Ta ble of the Lord and we will celebrate Eucharist to remind ourselves-no, more than that-to claim our identity. The theme of our conference is "We who are many are one body" in Christ. Do we need to re mind our selves that we are many? Did you see that opening procession? We come from all over the world! We speak multiple languages. We differ in theological opinions. And we represent differ ent cul tures. We who are gath ered here are many, but we're gath ered here as one body. This is Christ's vi sion for us. Don't for get it. For the Chris tian fam ily, unity is both a gift given and an ideal we seek. Diver sity is a gift of God as well, not to be man aged, ma nip u lated, but to claim.

Early in the epis tle to the Ephe sians, Paul makes clear the source of our unity. He

sounds the pri mary evan gel i cal protestant core doctrine of justification by grace through faith. The gen tile read ers, the first read ers of the epis tle, re ceive Paul's words with great joy. The way is now open for all. Those who were far off and those who are near have been rec on ciled, brought into one body by the cross. All now have ac cess by the Spirit to the Fa ther. See, unity is a gift to those who have been reconciled to God through Christ. Dear friends, Christ is our peace. Our unity is a gift but is also a promise to be claimed.

Oh, what a chal lenge! What a chal lenge as we come together! Some believe our unity ap pears to be frag ile, but not be cause his gift is not complete and to tally suf ficient. We must claim it and live in it. But as Je sus looked past the de mons, he saw a person, whole and healthy. And he looks at us, and we can look at each other and see each other for who we are. We can look past all di vi sions to see a brother's face, a sis ter's face, even the face of our be loved, the face of Je sus Christ. Oh, all of us gath ered in this place are pre cious to him. Christ would not stifle any one's voice, for through our voices comes the Spirit. We would hear everyone's voice in this body who, in con viction and faith, of fers an opin ion or a plea be fore this conference.

Now am I talk ing about unity at any cost? Well, we know this: Christ paid our cost, and there is never a time for draw ing a line in the sand. We must re mem ber that if Je sus drew in the sand, it would not be a line, but it'd be a cir cle; it would be a cir cle. Friends, the cru ci fied Christ paid the high est cost to draw a cir cle around all of us.

In June, 1998, an article about one of our Kentucky Methodist congregations appeared on the front page of the *Wall Street*

<u>1716</u> May 3, 2000

Journal. It was about a church, Bryantsville, a small ru ral church just south of Lou is ville. They had dug deep into their pock ets to buy a 93-year-old farm house to be used as a par son age. But bur ied deep into the fine print of the deed—and un known to the church before the purchase—was a valuable commodity, a permit to grow 1,850 pounds of bur ley to bacco. Well, this meant a generous financial dividend for the church, and what began with excitement grew into a painful dispute over emphysema, and can cer, and the responsibilities of church going Christians regarding to bacco. Well, in Bryantsville, the de bate was primarily be tween a majority of the congregation and just one fam ily. Both groups were devoted to their church, and both [were] profoundly opposed to the other's position.

The young student pastor, James Williams, stu dent at Asbury, along with the vast majority of the congregation, never doubted what the church should do. They said, "We just can not be in the busi ness of rais ing a crop that is harmful to people's health." Well, Grover Drew, a won der ful man in the church, a mem ber of the church all of his life—and a to bacco farmer him self—bristled at the very idea that the church would not rent or sell their to bacco al lot ment, and his posi tion was, "We will rent or sell the allot ment or I'll look for me an other church."

Well, for many in the church, Mr. Drew was draw ing that line in the sand. An admin is tra tive board meeting was called, and they decided to pray over the issue and study the Social Principles to discern God's will, and after the study and many long discus sions and prayers, the church mem bers finally reached the conclusion that they would rather—they would not sell and they would not rent the allot ment. They de termined that the church would not profit from this to bacco allot ment.

Well, Mr. Drew and his wife were the only ones who voted against it. The young pas tor and the con gre ga tion were very anxious. They were wor ried whether or not Mr. Drew would return. Well, their anxieties were sort of re lieved the following Sunday morn ing when Grover and his wife pulled up in the church yard in his pickup truck. He seemed to be in a good mood. James said that Mr. Drew never said a whole lot. He was al ways cheer ful and smil ing and support ive, and each week, the only words he ever heard him say, he would walk up to him and shake his hand and say to him some thing like this: "That was a mighty fine sermon, Brother Jim, and I do hope you have a good week." But some one said to him as he got out of his pickup truck in the park ing lot, "We were afraid that you'd be

mad and you would not come back to the church." And Grover quickly responded, "Shucks, I'm not goin' to let a little to bacco come between me and the people I care about."

Well, when the wor ship ser vice was concluded and peo ple gath ered on the church steps, Grover came up to the young preacher, smiled, and extended his hand, and said, "That sure was a mighty fine sermon, Brother Jim," and the peo ple re laxed because they knew all was well with Grover.

At some point, we need to un der stand that living to gether in the bond of love is God's will for us. Unity's a pre cious thing. In fact, unity is the gift that is ours, through our salva tion and Bap tism. It is our unity in Christ that is the miracle that makes us strong! With out it, we will have lost each other, and we should not be will ing to lose one. The ques tion might very well be: Can we have unity without uniformity? Well, once Christ's saving hand has touched us, and once our conversations are over and the Holy Spirit has led us—once his com mandment to go out into all the world has sent us from here—our mis sion be youd these walls is sa cred. We are to spare the world our differ ences. Once our strug gles to de cide are over, once our de ci sions have been made, once each voice has been heard and weighed, we must allow the hand of Je sus to touch us, heal our hurts, and give us one voice with which we are then sent out to tell the world one thing—one thing, one simple, holy thing—we're to tell the world what God has done for us and what mercy has been shown us in Christ Je sus.

Oh, the blood of Je sus Christ brought us who were once far off near. Nothing else can give life to a des per ate world. Nothing else can heal our world but the mercy of God. Not our do ing, not our de bat ing, not our striv ing. To the world that watches us, lis tens to us, strains to un der stand us, let us only speak of this one thing: speak of the mercy Christ has shown us, tell and dem onstrate that we who were once aliens and strangers to the cove nants of promise, having no hope with out God in the world, now in Jesus Christ have been redeemed and made one body with one mis sion-to share his say ing grace with all the world and make of the whole world disciples in Je sus Christ.

Hear me friends, this must be our pri mary fo cus for the Gen eral Con fer ence, and it is this mis sion and the strate gies for ful fill ing this mis sion that should re quire the overwhelming amount of our attention during these days.

Elizabeth (unintelligible middle name) Pitts, a mem ber of the Duke Uni ver sity faculty, has given me the per mis sion to tell you about her older sister, Mary Blair. Beth claims that it was her sis ter who taught her what it meant to be loved of God. Mary Blair is men tally re tarded and has lived in a spe cial home for the men tally re tarded for over 40 years. Beth tells how her brother, Carl, who had not seen Mary Blair in over 25 years, de cided that he would over come his dis taste for hos pi tals and travel down to Gracewood near Augusta, Geor gia, to visit her. Carl was about two years older than Mary Blair, and he had not seen her since she was 11 and he was 13, and now they were both in their early for ties. You need to know that Mary Blair does not have language, and her mind is frozen at about 18 months. Her life con sisted of en joy ing music and food and sun light on a swingset. So Carl had no idea whether Mary Blair would even rec og nize him when he came to see her af ter so many years apart. Beth said that when Carl and the par ents were there in the hos pi tal unit, they sat around and talked together while Mary Blair, as always, watched and rocked and lis tened from the bed. But all the time, she was staring at Carl, that forty-something-looking man with graying hair and widening midsection and a beard on his face. And she stared at him for a long time. Then she sud denly did something ex traor di nary. She got out of her bed and went over to him, she grabbed him by the wrist and started drag ging him to ward the door and down the hall. And Beth says that she can be very per sua sive when she wants some thing. So he went with her, and the mother and the fa ther fol lowed as she led him into the patient lounge near the nurse's station, which was really little more than a glass booth with a tele vi sion set and a long, vi nyl sofa. Once in the room, Mary Blair sat on the sofa in front of the TV, and she pulled Carl down next to her so that they were sitting side by side. In that action, Mary Blair had said ev ery thing she needed to say. She had made it abun dantly clear to all of them that she had rec og nized Carl and she knew who he re ally was. He was n't just some forty-something-year-old man, some strange, gray-haired per son. She had seen past the weight and the tracks of life upon his face. She saw the boy she had once sat next to on a sofa back at home. Here was a lit tle boy with whom she had watched TV so long ago in child hood. She knew that the man who came to see her was once, and was still, the boy who was her brother.

This is how Je sus saw Le gion—not as he was, but as he could be again, whole and restored to life. Je sus saw him as God cre ated

him, before the demons had come. Jesus looked past the actions of a shat tered man to see him as he once was and could be again. And that hap pens to us, over and over again, as we come to the Ta ble of the Lord. Here in this place we will hear God's mes sage of grace and mercy. Je sus will take us by the hand in this place, at this mo ment, and lead us to the ta ble, and we will re mem ber who we re ally are and who our sis ters and brothers are. This is the table he has prepared with his own bleed ing hands, and we are his guests. This is the table he has set to bring us home to one an other, to make us whole and set us free. But be ware, hear me, be ware all who come here, look around at those who are with you as you come. No body de serves it, but all of us are here. Are we not all here? The one with whom you agree and the one with whom you dis agree. There are those whose faces are different color, the ones who hear the gospel in different accents. We need each other to hear the full ness of the gos pel.

Unity does not mean same ness. Who ever comes to the table of Christ must be reminded that we did not make up the guest list, be cause we're all a guest, adopted children. Every one must agree to be a sister or a brother to all others, be cause what we cele-

brate here is the only thing that gives us unity, and that is the shed blood of our Lord Je sus Christ and the re minder of his res urrec tion and liv ing pres ence with us as his body, the church.

Barbara Brown Tay lor has said that no mat ter how much we may mess things up, some things are goin' to keep turn ing out all right, because we are not in charge. Although to come to this ta ble is to come confessing our sins and receiving Christ's for give ness, an activity we're not in charge of. As Paul said once, we've come here-to this ta ble, that is—once we have re ceived his sav ing grace, we're all broth ers and sisters in the body of Christ. Here, Le gion will give way to Je sus, and we will arise and speak only of God's mercy and what great things have been done for us. Oh, if you would be healed, if you will be a source of heal ing for a bro ken world, if you will be a dynamic of healing as we move through these days of Gen eral Con fer ence, come to the ta ble. Here you will find bread for the wil der ness and wine for the jour ney. Here the claim of Christ will be laid upon you again to be his body, to speak his Word, to be his presence of love and mercy in a world that never more des per ately needed it.

Now hear the epistle, once more, just some brief verses. From the pen of Eu gene Pe ter son, let me read this para phrase.

In the light of all this—the fourth chap ter of Ephe sians—in the light of all this, here's what I want you to do. While I'm locked up here, a pris oner for the mas ter, I want you to get out there and walk-better yet, run-on the road God called you to travel. I don't want any of you sitting around on your hands. I don't want anybody strolling off down some path that goes no where. And mark that you do this with hu mil ity and discipline; for not in fits and starts, but steadily pour ing your selves out for each other in acts of love, alert at noticing differences and quick at mend ing fences, you are all called to travel in the same road and in the same direction. So stay together, both outwardly and in wardly. You have one mas ter, one faith, one Bap tism, one God and Fa ther of all who rules over all, works through all, and is present in all. Every thing you are and think and do is per me ated with one ness.

Oh, if we have heard these words so that they take root in our hearts and change the way we live our lives, then they will become for us and all who know us truly the words of the liv ing God. Amen.

BISHOP ROB ERT C. MOR GAN (Louis ville): We're a lit tle be hind, but we're going to catch up if you'll take your seats. All right, if you'll come to or der. It's been a wonderful, celebrative after noon and we're now ready to do a lit tle bit of busi ness. Once again, the del e gates would please take their places. When you are in your places, I'll call you to or der and we'll be gin. All right, if I might have your at ten tion. By the grace of God, we're here and the Gen eral Con ference 2000 of The United Meth od ist Church will come to or der.

Well, you have no ticed that we are long halls. I feel that I'm sit ting un der a goalpost at this end and the peo ple from the Holston conference, North Carolina conference, I know that you're back there. I know you're back there and Oklahoma, I know you're back there. And we got these wimps up here in the front row from West ern Penn syl va nia and Cen tral New York, you know. If you'll start putt ing your tithes in like they do, back

in the back, we'll move you for ward, and so on. Oh, it's a great . . . We come from all over this world to meet and what a de light it is. So we must move now to get or ga nized. Now turn to Car olyn Mar shall, the sec re tary of the General Conference to help us along.

CAR OLYN MAR SHALL: Bishop Morgan, one an nounce ment needs to be made be fore we be gin that part, and that is a request that all bish ops and pres i dents of autonomous affiliated, autonomous concordat Methodist churches sitting as delegates come to the front of the stage on your left in order that you may be introduced quite soon.

Our Coun cil of Bishops re joices in welcom ing our col leagues to Cleve land and to this Gen eral Con fer ence. You have been read ing and see ing in the me dia, the various media, the imminent confrontation that is likely to hap pen there. We would ask on be half of Bishop Vera Mendez and other ecumenical leaders that we hold them in our prayers, in our thoughts during these hours and during these days of general conference. Mr. Pres i dent, I hope at the ap pro priate time prayer might be of fered in the midst of our col leagues here on be half of Bishop Vera Mendez and the church in Puerto Rico.

BISHOP MOR GAN: And Bishop Mar tinez, I ask you now, while you're here, to offer that prayer for not only our brother the bishop but for all of our Meth od ist friends in Puerto Rico, especially on the island of Vieques.

ConcordatRelationships

BISHOP WILLIAM BOYD GROVE: We have re la tion ships, which we call concordat relationships with three churches, and we want to rec og nize those churches. The Methodist Church in Great Britain, which is the mother church of world Methodism and The United Methodist Church have a some what unique re lation ship in that we have two voting delegates annually in their con fer ence and they have four voting annually our-quadrennially-in our general confer ence. The leader of their delegation is not at the present time a presi dent, al though he has been president of the Methodist Church in Great Brit ain, but he is sec re tary of conference, Reverend Nigel Collinson, and with the other del e gates from Great Britain—they're seated in section D, row 2, and we'll ask them in just a mo ment to stand, but not un til I also men tion the oth ers. We have a concordat relation with the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas-they're seated in section A, row 9-and the Methodist Church in Mex ico—they're seated in section A, row 5. The af filiated autono mous delegates are seated in the back, and I'm told the only rea son for that has to do with the voting ma chines and the placement of voting machines since those delegates do not have votes. But I would like to ask that the del e gates from the concordat church that I mentioned-Great Britain, Caribbean and the Amer i cas, and Mex ico—to stand, and the delegates from the Affiliated Autonomous Churches—the churches have al ready been named as your bish ops and presidents were presented-if you would all stand, and we'll ask the Presi dent of the Council of Bishops to wel come you for mally on be half of the Coun cil of Bishops, on be half of the Gen eral Con fer ence, and then the con ference will greet you. Bishop Mor gan.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Yes, we see them here. What a joy it is have you. We wel come you.

(applause)

BISHOP MORGAN: The other day I preached for Bishop Nathaniel Lindsay at (unidentifiable) Me morial Church in Lou isville at the occasion of their conference, sev eral states in the CME church, and as I was leaving to go over there, my wife, Martha, said, "Where are you go ing?" and I told

her, and she said, "Oh, they're our cous ins." I said, "No, they're not our cous ins, they're our broth ers and sis ters." And all of you are broth ers and sis ters with us in this fam ily, and we are hon ored with your pres ence this day, in deed. Now, I turn now to Car o lyn to set the bar of the con fer ence.

CAR OLYN MAR SHALL: Bishop Morgan, the bar of the con fer ence has been estab lished as those seats at the tables on the floor of the con ven tion hall. There are voting boxes and places for the delegates who would have them, as well as the several places on the plat form for per sons with responsibility here, and in order that they would be able to vote at that time.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, if you'll make that the bar of the con fer ence, please show the hand, please. Down, closed, and it is so or dered. Now, I turn to Bishop Jon athan Keaton, our marvelous host here in Cleveland, in the East Ohio Conference, and he is going to bring some words of greeting and make some in troductions. We welcome—I think you ought to welcome—Bishop Keaton.

BISHOP KEA TON: I have asked Dr. Julius Trimble and Dr. Ken neth Chalker to join me while I share these words of welcome. Wel come to Cleve land, Ohio. "Be en cour aged." We'll need a lot of that this week and next.

We are glad that you're here. All of East Ohio rejoices that you are here. And you know what? We'll be happy to see you go. (laughter, applause) But we'll be happy to see you go to the ex cit ing five-star con cert where the home of the Cleve land Or ches tra is, Severance Hall. Remember, Sunday, May 7th at 7:00 p.m. We want you to go on the tours where possible, learn about our his tory and en gage our di ver sity. We want you to go and build one of three Hab i tat for Hu man ity houses for low-income fam i lies. We want you to use your hands, we want you to use your feet, and we want you to use your heart. We want you to go to all of your meetings-morning, noon, and night. Make your wit ness known. Yes, we'll be glad to see you go.

Here's the last paragraph. Just over 192,000 United Methodists, 774 active clergy, 402 re tir ees, 830 churches com prise East Ohio Annual Conference. Some of them are here to serve you. Call on us for assis tance. We shall try to be the best host and host esses pos si ble. But I want you to do me a fa vor: Eat our cook ies.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You can count on it!

BISHOP KEATON: Eat our cookies. I want you to feast on them. For cook ies are com ing to this con ven tion hall from the ovens of the en tire Ohio East area. But now listen to this. I want you to consider our cookies a reminder of common elements used for Holy Communion. Thank you, Lord. As with Christ, we have spread the table. As with Christ, we have de sire to sup with you. As with Christ, we have longed for your pres ence, and now you are gathered here. Finally, we have re alized the universal presence called the church. That leads me to two thoughts. One, thank you, Jesus. But more importantly, welcome home. We who are many are one body. May it be so, on this earth as it is in heaven. In the name of Je sus the Christ, wel come.

BISHOPMOR GAN: We're so grate ful to East Ohio. We discovered some thing last night, man; they know how to throw a party, don't they? That was some more bash, and we're grate ful for the good fel low ship and the good food. Now I turn to Mollie Stewart, who is the chair of the Com mis sion on the Gen eral Church, to make their re port.

MOLLIE STEWART: Good afternoon. To Bishop Robert Mor gan, and mem bers of the Council of Bishops, delegates, of ficials, and visitors. On be half of the Commission on the General Conference, we extend

greet ings and wel come to each of you. We welcome you to the conference, which meets for the first time in the twenty-first century. We especially welcome those who are attending General Conference for the first time as elected delegates and reserve delegates, And I'm going to take a prerogative now—all of the first-timers stand, whether you are reserve or the official elected delegates. (applause)

CAR O LYN MAR SHALL: Bishop Morgan, I would move

All right, Mollie, I'm sorry.

Introduction of Commission on the General Conference.

STEW ART: That's all right. Thank you Bishop Mor gan. That was really im pressive to see all of the new com ers to this Gen eral Con fer ence. It is my be lief that we ought to turn over the plate ev ery now and then and let the new peo ple get in volved. The Commission is given responsibility for determin ing the time and place of the meeting of the Gen eral Con fer ence and making all arrangements for the sessions of General Con fer ence. Anita Iceman, who is not present; from Brooklyn, NY, Shirley Parris; from Sacramento, CA, Kimball Salmon; from Detroit, MI, Rev. Phylemon Titus; from Charlotte, NC, Rev. Denny White; from Rochester, MN, Aileen Williams, and your chair-person, Mollie Stew art, all the way from Valhermosa Springs, AL.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Now you can give them ap plause.

(applause)

STEW ART: In ad di tion to the com mission mem bers who were elected by you, we have ex-officio members; first of all and seated some place out in the ple nary, is Sandra Keller Lackore, the gen eral sec re tary of the Gen eral Coun cil on Fi nance and Admin is tration; from Veedersburn, IN, Car olyn Marshall, secretary of the General Con fer ence; and the per son who has held me together, Gary Bowen, the business man ager of the Gen eral Con fer ence; Steve Zedkoff, also from Evanston, IL, and they are from the Gen eral Coun cil on Fi nance and Administration staff. We have other per sons who have worked real hard to see that this whole event is car ried off suc cessfully. As you have witnessed and experienced this great experience with worship this after noon, our director of mu sic from At lanta, Ga., the Rev. Cynthia A. Wil son.

We tried every way pos si ble to have Mayor White here with us at some point, but ev ery time we had a place in our agenda where it was pos si ble for him to be...for us to have him, to include him with us, he was unavoid ably in an other place. And so when he was avail able, we were not. But we thank Mayor White for all the ways in which he has made Cleve land a place of hos pi tal ity for us. And I would like to say just one more thing, and that is to express my appreciation and the appreciation of the entire Commission on Gen eral Con fer ence for the lead ership that Mollie has pro vided to us. She has made our time to gether a very spe cial time, in deed. Thank you.

(Applause)

STEWART: You have al ready met and heard from Bishop Kea ton. I also want to thank Bishop Kea ton and Rev. Dr. Jul ius Trimble from the Cleve land Dis trict. I want to recognize the Host Committee. The names of the Cleveland local committee chairs are found on p. 1154. And we just want to say that they are there, and you can see their names and meet them as you go in and out of these ses sions.

I want to especially recognize though, out of that group, which hap pened by chance, that the chair per son of the host com mit tee also became a member of the commission—the name of the Rev er end Dr. Kenneth W. Chalker. These persons have worked prayer fully and dil i gently to prepare for your arrival, and we are very ap precia tive for all the work that they have done.

This ses sion of the Gen eral Con fer ence has been planned in accordance with the Plan of Organization of General Conference. To fa cili tate the work on the con ference, the commission recommends the following schedule of special events for your ap proval. The Epis co pal Ad dress at 8:15 this eve ning. This ser vice will be preceded by hymn-singing at 7:45 in this room.

BISHOP MORGAN: That's been changed, (*unintelligible*), by our action.

STEW ART: Oh, I'm sorry. Right, okay.

BISHOP MOR GAN: It'll be the sing ing at 8:30 and 8:45 at con vening of the con ference this evening.

STEW ART: As you can tell, the chair person of the gen eral com mis sion don't know it all.

BISHOP MOR GAN: You've just got to pay at ten tion, Mollie, that's what you have to do.

(laughter, applause)

STEWART: Well, you know how that goes. I'm get ting older.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Watch it.

STEW ART: Well, we will be here in this room, to night.

(laughter)

And we will enjoy the sing ing and the bishop's ad dress. How about that?

(applause)

BISHOP MOR GAN: Yeah, yeah. That's it.

STEWART: The Cleveland Area program that was referred to by Bishop Kea ton a few min utes ago is for Sunday eve ning, May 7, at 7:00 P.M. The ecu menical worship ser vice with Dr. George Carey, Archbishop of Canter bury, preaching, and the presentation of the ecu menical representatives at 8:15 Wednes day. Bishop Morgan, I move these recommendations for approval.

BISHOP MORGAN: Okay, thank you, Mollie. You heard the mo tion. Those who fa vor, lift the hand. Thank you. Those opposed, same sign. It is adopted. Thank you very much. You need to realize that the com mis sion is also re spon si ble for the seat as sign ments. Sev eral peo ple have fussed at me. I want you to know, I did not do that. Again, Holston. we thought we had a lit tle tele phone net work, but we dis cov ered that you would be in a dif fer ent area code, and we could not work it out, so . . . (laughter) talk to these folks.

STEW ART: Yes, but he's still our pre siding bishop. (laughter) Sec tions of the hall have been des ig nated for per sons that are physically challenged. The marshal and pages will be pleased to direct per sons to those ar eas in the con fer ence. There were some cor rec tions that had to be made in the DCA that came to us, and now that you are all seated, I'm sure the corrections got made.

It is re quested that there be no smok ing in the center during this conference. Food service for breakfast, lunch, and dinner is avail able in the cafe te ria in the exposition hall. No electronic communication devices are to be used in the ple nary hall or in the legis lative committee meetings, except for those per sons who are re sponsible for the ongoing of the General Conference in this convention center, and the staff.

Morning wor ship ser vice is scheduled in this hall at 8:15 daily, ex cept Sunday. The choir will present a brief concert at 8:00 A.M.each of these days. You experienced the massed choir. The com mis sion this time tried to do some things and think out of the box. We wanted to make this an ex cit ing, a spiritual and an up lifting conference. So we are try ing massed choirs for the first time. We ex press our ap pre ci a tion to the mu sic director, the Reverend Cynthia Wilson, and we thank her for her en deav ors on these and the other wor ship ser vices that you will experience. It was the director's responsibility to se lect the sing ing groups to partic i pate at this General Conference. It has not been an easy responsibility for her, because there were many au di tion tapes that she had to consider.

We would like for you to listen to the next statement and not give the marshal and pages a hard time. En try into the wor ship ser vice will be re stricted after the ending of the first hymn. You know, some of us are just late comers, and we stop and talk, and shake hands. But we need you to get on into the worship ser vice. But we are allowing you to the end of the first hymnal-hymn.

I re mind you that an nounce ments are to be made in the *DCA*. The magnification im age projec tor notices are to be limited to the official operation of this conference, its administrative and legislative committees. The commission recommends that the journal be the official record of the General Conference. Bound copies will be available for purchase as a package at a later date. Bishop, I move the ap proval of this recommendation.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, it's be fore you. If you would support it, would you please show the hand? Down. If you oppose, same sign. And it is adopted.

Three Spe cial Offerings Moved

STEWART: The commission recommends three of ferings to be received during the conference. The of fering just received has been designated by the Council of Bishops, and you saw in your wor ship bulle tin that it was designated for the children of Africa, Hope for the Children of Africa. Sec ond, an of fering for Habitat for Humanity. Bishop Kea ton said that there will be three houses be ing built while we are here.

This of fering will be received on Thurs day, May 4. The pro ceeds of this of fering will be split fifty per cent for the East Ohio Hab i tat Project and fifty percent to the national Habitat for Humanity or ganization. Third, an of fer ing for mar shals and pages will be re ceived on Wednes day, May 10, im me diately following morning worship. Ire mind you that these per sons are vol un teers who pro vide their own travel ex pense and other ex penses while they are here. They pro vide an in valuable service to the conference dele gates and other mem bers and staff. In ad dition to these three offerings, you are reminded that this coming Sunday . . . Maybe we ought to vote on the first two, Bishop.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right.

BISHOP MOR GAN: This rec om men dation is be fore you. If you sup port the rec ommendation of the offerings, would you show your hand, please? Down, op posed, same sign, and it is or dered.

STEW ART: In ad di tion to these three offerings, you are reminded this coming Sunday, May 7, is Native American Awareness Sunday. Throughout our denomination they will be raising, lifting of ferings in churches. If you were back home in your local church, you would be in vited to make a con tri bu tion to that of fer ing. So please remember that of fering when you are visiting the lo cal churches in the Cleve land area, and make your contribution through the church where you attend. The business manager of our conference is serving us anew this time. He is a fast learner, by necessity. I'm speaking, of course, of Gary Bowen. And I would now re quest per mission for Gary Bowen to make some announcements concerning matters which per tain to the oper a tion of this Conference. With your per mis sion, Bishop, I would like Gary to speak now to these mat ters.

BISHOP MORGAN: All right, without objection, we will hear now from Gary Bowen.

Voting Sys tem Explained

GARY BOWEN: Thank you, Bishop. Bishop Mor gan and mem bers of the General Conference, we welcome you to the Cleveland Convention Center. We have spent much time pre par ing for your visit, and hope that we have pre pared ad e quately for your busi ness. I would like to share now a cou ple of items re lated to our pro ce dure in the build ing. For sev eral years now, we've been us ing a com put er ized sys tem for our vot ing. Uti lizing the key pad in front of you, you will be able to re cord your votes instantly. When the pre sid ing bishop states,

please vote when the light appears, the green light on your key pad will light, and a mes sage will ap pear on the key pad and on the projection screen directing you to vote. Now this is go ing to be partic i pation, so, at this time, press the button which corresponds to your choice: press but ton 1 for "yes," but ton 2 for "no," or but ton 3 if you wish to abstain. When you do this, your choice will ap pear in the win dow on your individual keypad to confirm your selection. You may change your vote as long as the green light is il lu mi nated on the key pad by first pressing the "star" button in the lower left-hand corner and then entering vour new choice. When the green light on your key pad starts flash ing, you will have three sec onds left to vote. When the light goes off, vot ing is closed and you've lost your vote if you have n't voted. You will notice that voting time will speed up as we progress through the Conference. We've found that you will soon feel com fort able with this equip ment and are able to vote in a faster time, allowing the business to proceed at a faster pace. After the voting is closed, the computer will tally the votes and the re sults will be dis played on the pro jection screen. Please re mem ber that only one re sponse will be taken from each key pad, so pushing the but ton ten times will not get you ten votes, although I'm certain someone will try that. So that we can be come fa mil iar with the voting system, we're going to present you with a few test ques tions for you to an swer at this time. The first ques tion may be the most difficult. Are you present? If "yes," please press but ton 1; if "no," please press but ton 2; if you're not sure and wish to ab stain, please press but ton 3. The question is now before you, please vote when the light ap pears.

(laughter)

Very good, you're mostly here.

(laughter)

OK, so we're gonna try it again. Here's question 2. I know the an swer to this, we'll see if you do. Is El vis still alive?

(laughter)

If "yes," press but ton 1, if "no," press but ton 2, if you're not sure, please press but ton 3. The question is now before you. Please vote when the light ap pears.

(laughter)

Gee, I thought he was still with us, but you'll be glad to know that the General Conference has just ruled El vis to be dead.

When it co mes time to bal lot, for those nominated forcertain of fices, the procedure

is similar. As sume for a moment that there's a contest for denominational mascot. As with the elections that will even tu ally be before us, we will use numbers for all can didates. The nominees for our mascot to day are as following: #1. Bugs Bunny; #2 Kermit the Frog; #3 Mickey Mouse; #4 Bart Simpson; #5 Elmo. These nominees are now be fore you. Please vote when the light appears. In this particular case, just vote for one. (Laugh ter and ap plause).

Well, ev ery thing's green, I guess, right? This is the pro ce dure we'll use when electing per sons to hold of fice. How ever, please re mem ber that the num ber of bal lots taken will correspond to the number of offices we're try ing to fill. An ex am ple, for ex ample, if we're try ing to fill seven slots, we'll have to vote seven times. Un for tu nately, the re sults of this mul ti ple elec tion will not be in stan ta neous be cause of the amount of data that has to be pro cessed, but they still will come back quickly.

The Commission on General Conference and the Committee on the Plan of Organization of Rules wants to remind you that each dele gate has only one vote. And this vote is to be recorded only on the key pad in front of the dele gate. In other words, please don't vote your neighbor's pad. Absentee delegates may not have their votes recorded in absentia. Rather, reserve delegates should be moved in and seated and voted in their place. Obviously, we have prepared if you're on the stage, you can vote. There are keypads here if you're a delegate.

Hope for the Children of Af ri can Artwork

Moving to other matters now. We encourage you to take notice of the images that you will see on the projection center as you enter and leave the plenary sessions. Re sponding to the re quest from the bishops' task forces on children and poverty, and Hope for the Children of Africa, the Commission on the General Conference asked children from through out the church to sub mit art work in terpreting our theme.

It was, be lieve me, for the per son that had to en ter it, it was an over whelming success. We have received 400 different pieces of art which will be be fore you each day on the big screen. In addition, the Council of Bishops has requested that we display a clock on the screen from time to time, a clock that was displayed at their meeting in the fall. This clock displays the number of children who have died of preventable causes through out the world while we are in ses sion. We hope this display will help us to maintain a certain perspective about our work here in Cleve land.

Moving to the fa cil i ties, the pub lic au ditorium in which you're seated at the Cleveland Con vention Centeris a rather different fa cil ity than the one we've used in the past qua dren nium. We want to of fer a few suggestions that will help you during the plenary ses sions.

First, perhaps most important, you will want to know that the restrooms for the main floor of the auditorium are located through the middle doors at the left and right of the hall. Those of you seated in the balcony will find restrooms located on a mezzanine level one floor be low the balcony en trances.

Sec ond, the main floor of the au di to rium is the bar of the con fer ence. You will not be al lowed ac cess to the main floor un less your name badge, one of these, in di cates you are eligible. Please remember that our marshalls are vol un teers, so be easy with them if they re fuse you en trance if you have for got ten your name badge. Those are the in structions under which they are operating. It's your re spon si bil ity to keep track of this lit tle thing around your neck.

Third, the pro posed rules of Gen eral Confer ence and the policy of past gen eral conferences state that after today, only the Daily Christian Ad vo cate may be distributed on the desks of the delegates unless you vote to sus pend the rules. We ask you, please honor those rules and not distribute materials on the desks unless authorized to do so.

Fourth, we are a large body that is of ten trying to come and go at the same time through lim ited space. In or der to help our flow in and out of the au di to rium, we want to sug gest that del e gates seated at the rear of the au di to rium exit through the rear doors, and if pos si ble, if you're able to get down the stairs, which I have some difficulty with, at the rear, down the mar ble stairs into the lower level, while the del e gates on the sides exit through the side ex its. We hope this will help avoid traf fic bot tle necks in the fa cil ity and will fa cil i tate you get ting from place to place.

Fifth, audio and videotapes of worship ser vices and pro ceed ings are avail able for pur chase in the ex hibit area in Hall B.

Finally, if you need more information about lo cation of meeting rooms or other facility questions, I suggest that you check at the information desk located in the main lobby. This desk is staffed by volunteers from East Ohio and from our local host committee, and should be able to of fer you help. When all else fails, come to the Busi-

ness Man ager's Of fice at 223 and we'll certainly try to help you. Have a great con fer ence and thank you. (Ap plause)

BISHOP MOR GAN: Thank you, Gary. Mollie?

MOLLIE M. STEWART (North Alabama): The com mis sion cer tainly wants to thank Gary for his hard work as our business man ager and in ful fill ing his re spon sibilities for this conference. We offer appreciation also to his excellent staff: Steve, who was assigned to us, Merrill Gleason and Rus sell Easler. Our com mission thanks the con tin ued hard work of our conference secretary, Carolyn Mar shall. I think that you would like to ex press your appre ci a tion early in this ses sion for all that they do, and all of Carolyn's as sis tants.

MOLLIE STEW ART: Bishop Mor gan is younger than I am. He said that Sandra Lacoure is in the very back some place.

BISHOP MOR GAN: I thought she was.

STEW ART: She may be. I want to person ally thank you Sandy for your sup port.

BISHOP MORGAN: There she stands back there. I can see her.

STEWART: I want to per son ally ... see he's youn ger. Thank you for both your support and af fir mation of me and I want you to know that I am wear ing my an gel. And I will live through this Gen eral Con fer ence. Gary, thank you, because without you I would've been a bas ket-case.

This morning mem bers of the com mission had the priv i lege of meet ing with the global mem bers of our church, and to explain to them some of the parliamentary procedure and some of the is sues that would be coming before this session. We responded to questions and we very much appreciated the response that we received from that meeting this morning. It is our desire for every one to feel com fort able and to partic i pate as fully as possible during the time that you are here at this con fer ence.

I for got to rec og nize at the time that I recog nized the mu sic direc tor per sons who are accompanying Cynthia. And they are, Alicio, Are you still there? Per sons who are accompanying you in the music? Jonetta John son Page from Ben Hill United Method ist Church. Mr. Lo gan, Miss Lo gan, OK. St. Luke Community Church of Dallas, Texas. Lorel Frederick from Ben Hill United Methodist Church, At lanta, Georgia.

(applause)

I had stated ear lier that we are trying new things at this Gen eral Con fer ence and we are re ally trying to op er ate out side the box and think about things that we ought to be think ing about and im por tant things that's an is sue for the on going strength of our confer ence. We have two per sons on our commis sion when we were dis cuss ing this who re ally got in volved in try ing to work with the other connectional de part ments of our church and to bring our youth to gether and to not only just bring them here, but we wanted to orientate them and have them fully partic i pate in the life and body of this con fer ence. So they have had two ori en tation ses sions while they're here, and Eileen Williams who is on the commission and Carol Cot ton Winn who is on the com mission has worked with them. Now I would like for all of those youth in this ses sion to stand.

(applause)

I saw them this morn ing. They were busy at work and they are a fine look ing bunch. I want all of you young peo ple to know that one day way back there some where, that's how I got my start. I can hardly re mem ber that far back, but that's where I started. It is very im por tant for us a church to sup port and to strengthen this body of young people.

Ques tions arise from the del e gates as to reimbursement of expenses in attending this conference. The commission has established the per diem of \$100 for your expenses while here. That is based in part upon our abil ity to pay as well as what we contemplate the average cost of a two-person hotel room and a reasonable cost for meals per day. That will not cover the cost, I'm sure for some of you, and it may be am ple for oth ers. Del e gates will receive two expensereimbursement checks while here. Del e gates will re ceive the first one on Fri day morn ing. It will cover travel ex penses to and from Gen eral Con fer ence. The sec ond check will be for the \$100 per diem for the days here in Cleve land at tending this conference. The chairperson of each del e ga tion should have dis cov ered at his or her desk, upon ar rival, an en ve lope containing travel expenses and vouchers for all members of your particular delegation. I know they are there be cause the head of my del e ga tion gave me mine. And Glo ria Holt said to me, "MollIE I want this back Wednes day morning." It's very im portant that you fol low the in struc tions of your dele ga tion head. Be cause if you do not and delay it, you may not get your check. If a re serve has been seated and is en ti tled to a

travel expense reimbursement, give it to that per son. We ask each of you to do a simple thing. First, read the in structions as you fill out your ex pense voucher. Sec ond, I remind you that the in structions are on the back of the forms. Then fill out the form the way the in structions tell you to do it. I know it's el e men tary, but we must say this anyway. There will still be per sons who will not read the in structions and will do some thing dif fer ent. Give it to your chair per son. The chair per son will ap prove it and sub mit the full delegation's expense claims to gether to the trea surer's of fice. Not one-by-one, but to gether as a group. We're pre pared to process more than a thou sand checks for the del e gations, and it's very help ful if we can get them all to gether.

As to the travel ex pense. If you trave eled by car, it is 30 cents a mile. You travel up to 1,000 miles. If it's over 1,000 miles traveled, then you ei ther get the low est of the cost of mile age above 1,000 or the cost of the least ex pen sive air travel fare that you would have paid for had you come by air. Now that's a mouth ful and I hope you got it. You may claim ac tual ex penses for meals and lodg ing en route to and from this confer ence. Again, at \$100 per diem.

If the chair per son will hand in all ex pense claim forms to the treasurer's office after Tuesday afternoon's business session and be fore Wednes day eve ning, we will get the checks to you on Fri day. If we do not get your claim form by Wednes day eve ning, as I have forestated, we do not know when you will receive your checks. If there are any questions, have the chair per son of your dele ga tion take them to the trea surer's of fice. If there are any questions, give them to the chair per son of your del e ga tions and have them take those questions to the trea surer's of fice. Let me now tell you if you would like to cash your checks while you are here, it's been pro vided for. We have es tab lished an ac count and have made ar range ments with the Fifth Third Bank on the cor ner of Ninth Street and St. Claire.

In addition to the expense re imburse ment checks you re ceive, if you want to cash personal checks, you may do so for up to \$100 per check, pro vided you first go to the treasurer's of fice, which is room 222. I think in the hand book it said 221. But the trea surer's of fice is lo cated in room 222 lo cated on the main floor. So when you look at the map just remember it's one door or one room over. Some one there who is au tho rized by the bank will ini tial it for you. In ef fect we are guar an tee ing your check. In ef fect we are guaranteeing your check, so that the bank does not have to get nervous with checks coming from a variety of places

around the world. And we don't want to be nervouseither.

Bishop Mor gan, I ask for the ap proval of these recommendations concerning the expense claims and the method of claiming.

BISHOP MORGAN: All right. This is be fore you. Are there questions? I do not see any cards. If you would approve this recommendation, would you show your hand?

BISHOP MORGAN: Down. If you oppose, show the same sign. It is adopted.

STEW ART: Thank you. The com mission wishes to ex press its thanks and ap pre ciation to Peggy West and her staff at the United Methodist Communications for their cover age of General Conference and for their work prior to and during this conference, and to Tom McAnally who hung with us for four years, a special thanks to you. To Richard Peck and Neil Alex and er at the Publishing House for the production and distribution of the Daily Christian Advocate.

Now I have a very spe cial and im por tant an nounce ment. In 1996 in Den ver we heard the an nounce ment that we would be coming to Cleve land. Now it is my joy and op por tunity to an nounce to you and to re port that the commission has responded to an in vitation from the West ern Penn syl va nia Conference and has selected Pittsburgh. Penn syl va nia as the site of the next Gen eral Conference. (Applause) Now you know where this group is from. The dates for that conference are April 25 through May 7, 2004. And I thought when I heard that in '96, "that's a long way off", now it seems like it was yesterday. Time moves so swiftly. I wish to thank you for the privilege of having served here on the commission and as your chair. The mem ber ship of this commission serves on a staggered term. Ap prox i mately half of us are go ing off this time and new mem bers will be coming on to the com mis sion. We thank you very much for your understanding and if you have questions, come to the General Conference busi ness of fice on the main floor at Room 220 or 223. It has been really my plea sure to be here and to serve. I have seen so many im por tant peo ple. I met so many sweet and lovely people and the church has been a real sup port for me these past 4 years. Bishop Mor gan, I move to sus pend the rules to allow the dis tri bu tion of a plan to im ple ment the discern ment process un der the CPT presen ta tion plan that is found on p. 1264 of the DCA.

BISHOP MORGAN: Does this come from the Rules Com mit tee?

STEW ART: The Rules Com mit tee is in ac cor dance with that.

BISHOP MORGAN: All right, you're just go ing to sus pend the rules in or der for per mis sion to dis trib ute this...

STEW ART: Right

BISHOP MOR GAN: And to sus pend the rules will take two-thirds vote. All right, if you would vote to sus pend the rules for the pur pose of dis trib ut ing the Rules Com mittee's pro posal for you in a few mo ments, show the hand please. Down, if you op pose, same sign, and it is per mit ted.

STEW ART: Bishop Mor gan, I move to suspend the rules to allow the distribution of copies of the Epis copal Address im mediately preceding that address this evening.

BISHOP MOR GAN: You need to un derstand that we have n't done that be fore, but we feel like it will be a better way to commu ni cate that word. If you would sus pend the rules, two-thirds vote again, in or der to dis trib ute the Epis co pal Ad dress to you as delegates be fore it's de livered, would show the hand, please? Down; if you oppose, show the hand, and it is or dered.

STEW ART: We who are many are one body. That's very obvious as I look out there at you and see all the beau ti ful peo ple in all the ar ray and di ver sity that is among us. I want to thank you and I want to thank Bishop Mor gan for this op por tu nity to give this report, and I want a time of spe cial privilege now to share some things about Bishop Mor gan and my re lation ship. Now, I hope there are no cam era men or re cord ers here. How ever, Bishop Mor gan is on the North Alabama Conference and I am a member of the North Alabama Conference. He was chair per son of the North Al a bama Conference Council on Ministries and I came into that Conference after merger, and I came on the Coun cil of Min is tries at-large and was elected as vice-chair. He shared that time and spot light with me and he even al lowed me to pre side when he was there at cer tain times and through the years we have developed a friendship. I understand that Bishop Mor gan will be re tir ing when we go to the juris dictional conference in July, so I asked the ques tion of him at the re cep tion last eve ning, "You think that means that I also will re ceive a rock ing chair?" (laughter) It's about that time for me, as well, and Bishop Mor gan, we thank you for all your sup port and strength.

BISHOP MORGAN: MollIE, you'll never need a rock ing chair. Thank you so much. This con fer ence wants to thank you for 4 years of hard work.

STEWART: Now that con cludes our report.

BISHOP MORGAN: Now then, the whole report is be fore you. If you would sup port the report as presented by the commis sion, please show the hand; down. If opposed, show the hand. And it is ordered. Now then, we are about to move into the rules. Now, once again, peo ple, this is the chair's privilege, I guess, but you can do what you wish to do. We need to at tend to the rules be fore we leave the ses sion. Now you're going to be going to leg is lative commit tees. They're go ing to have box lunches for you there. I can't do this, but it is time for adjournment. What's the wishes of the body? I'd like to have a mo tion, of fi cially. A mo tion has been moved that we ex tend un til we com plete the rules? Sec ond it? All right, if you would sup port that, show the hand, please; down. If you oppose, same sign. Right now, turn to Jerome Del Pino who chairs the Plan of Organization and Rules Com mit tee. Dr. Del Pino?

Re port of the Com mit tee on the Plan of Or ganization and Rules of Order

JEROME DEL PINO (New England): Bishop Mor gan, mem bers of the Gen eral Conference of 2000, honored guests. On be half of the Com mit tee on the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order, I am pleased to present this report on how we might live our life to gether faith fully and effectively during this his toric session of the Gen eral Conference.

This report represents many hours and days of in ten sive re flection, sharing, and holy conferencing during the last 3 years. It is a re port that en deav ors to ad dress our perennial task of remaining relevant to our current real ities and discerning clearly our impending challenges as the pil grim people of God. Hence, we have sought to be comprehen sive in our under standing of how our plan of or ganization and our rules of or der impinge upon all that we might seek to accomplish in the en suing 2 weeks.

Be cause this re port does not rep re sent the work of any one in di vid ual, I want to acknowl edge just briefly the mem bers of the committee be fore proceeding to our consider ation of the re port. As I in tro duce them, and several are not here, due to the fact that they are not delegates to this General Conference, and we did not be lieve that we were going to have to have a meeting at the site of the conference, but we did. As I in tro duce them, they will stand, and I ask that you hold your ap plause un til they have all been in tro duced. They were supposed to be here on this dais at this time, but imag ine the du-

ties of being delegates called. They are: The Reverend Emory Purcell, Mrs. Betty Trumble, Darlene Amon, who has served as vice-chairperson, Mr. Robert Stevens, Momo Kapon, representing the central conferences, Dr. Charles Brockwell Jr., who served as our secretary, the Reverend Marcus Matthews, and the Reverend David Funocco, and we are tenderly supported, we were rather, ten derly sup ported, and at times guided by our ex-officio members, Car olyn Mar shall, sec re tary of the General Conference, and Mr. Gary Bowen, staff mem ber of the Gen eral Coun cil on Fi nance and Ad min is tra tion and the busi ness manager of this General Conference. We all owe a tre men dous debt of grat i tude to each of them. It has been a con sum mate privilege for me to have been able to serve with them. Would you please greet them now?

It is my in ten tion to be as brief as pos si ble regarding what, in many ways, I would hope is ax i om atic. These rules rep re sent the best think ing of this com mit tee re garding what we might min i mally need in or der to be able to keep faith with our task here at this Gen eral Con fer ence, which is to continue the strong tra di tion of the peo ple of God called United Meth od ists, namely, to be so or dered in our life and our work that we would do as John Wes ley al ways did, ab hor chaos.

The plan of or ga ni za tion is one that has evolved over a num ber of years, and therefore one does not eas ily open up any as pect of it with out being mind ful that if you tug at one of the strings, you might un ravel the entire gar ment. Hence, we did not, in any indiscriminate fashion, choose to make recommendations to you regarding this plan of or ga ni za tion. We will move to the rules in just a mo ment.

How ever, we were in structed at the 1996 General Conference to give due attention to a mo tion that was put, at that time, re garding the need for this General Conference to have a way by which to en gage in a method of deci sion-making that is certainly in keeping with our Christian her i tage, but one that we do not of ten, at least, be lieve is available to us as a de ci sion-making pro cess. That is, a process that would require us to be open to dis cern ment, and in or der for that to hap pen, it was felt that we might need to have more rules. At first, the com mit tee thought this was a con sum mate co nun drum, asking that the Holy Spirit be sub jected to rules. However, with faith ful and pa tient dis cern ment on the part of the mem bers of the com mittee, we were, over the three years, able to de ter mine that we would be able to call this body to conscious ness regarding the importance of this pro cess and to lo cate it within

the his tory and tradi tion of the people called Method ist. Thus, we ar rived at a pre amble that is in cluded be fore the be gin ning of the Plan of Or ga ni za tion. It is our best ef fort at say ing to you that it is, in the words of a former theo lo gian no lon ger read very av idly to day, Paul Tillich, it is an "im pos si ble possibility" to subject discernment to rules. And so we want to call your at ten tion to this pre am ble and for you to un der stand that it is more than sim ply words. It is, in deed, intended to re mind us that we are, as a people, al ready a part of this very rich way of re lating our selves to one an other in or der that we might arrive at de ci sions that are in keeping with the will and pur pose of God.

The only rule that I would identify that would pertain to this where there was a change, in or der that we might fo cus the respon si bil ity for this, should it not be something that would be believed by any mem ber of the body to be nec es sary. If you would turn to page 1258, the left-hand column, the sec ond para graph, or the first full para graph, number three. "At the discretion of the bishop pre siding, a time for prayer ful dis cern ment may be taken dur ing de lib er ation. Such a time should be for personal med i ta tion or for group prayer, and shall end at the call of the bishop presiding, at which time nor mal de lib er a tion shall be resumed.". That is the only rule that per tains to that very im por tant ef fort on our part to ad dress what was be lieved to be so sig nif icant by the 1996 Gen eral Con fer ence.

Sec ondly, I want to call our at ten tion to the fact that other than ed i to rial re vi sions, what is most sub stan tive about this report of the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order is that this committee has endeavored to make possible the real ization of our very laud able ef fort to have the in clu sion of persons across our church glob ally in the very warp and woof, at the very heart beat of the General Conference itself, namely in its stand ing com mit tees. Hence, you will notice that there has been a sig nif i cant change in the way in which we con cep tu al ize who it is we are talk ing about when we speak of persons who must either "fly across the pond," or across the larger pond in or der to get to these shores. We no lon ger use the lan guage of over seas or in ter na tional del egates, but we are re fer ring to those per sons as delegates of the General Conference who hap pen to be in the con ti nents of Eu rope, Af rica, and Asia, as we are in North America. And hence, that lan guage has been incor po rated at ev ery place that we be lieve would be ap pro pri ate.

The third item that I wish to draw at tention to is that this committee has en deavored to see to it that our Plan of Organizationis one that en ables us to accomplish our work in the most efficient and ef fec tive way pos si ble. Hence, we have determined the allocation of legislation for this Gen eral Con fer ence slightly al tered in re gard to the work that was orig i nally held in the Legislative Committee on Church and Society. We have called for the creation of a Legislative Committee on Faith and Order, and that com mit tee, we be lieve, is one that will en able us to have leg is la tion that will be coher ent in relation ship to the work that the General Conference expects. I want to in di cate to you that the com mit tee believes that this is driven by at least two re al ities, namely that we have multiple can ons in our life and work, and cer tainly there is the leg is lation that relates to the admin is trative life of the con fer ence. But then, there are also teaching canons of which the Social Prin ci ples are a ma jor part, and thus, they be long in a con text where they will be discussed and they will be reviewed based upon very serious theological reflection and also questioning.

Finally, there is also in the re port, an enabling leg is la tion for us to be able to consider the Connectional Process Team re port to this body. You have all ready sus pended the rules in or der that there may be a presentation of those, and I have an amended version that will be placed on the screen at the appropriate time. Bishop, this completes my over view of these rules and we stand ready to respond.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, let me try some thing here as the chair. And again, you can ei ther ap prove it or dis ap prove it. As I see the rules, I see at least two, possibly three distinctive areas. If we can use, for example, pages 1245-1257, which basically put for ward the plan of or ganization. If you could lead us in tak ing that, say, first, we can ask if there are any questions, mo tions, or ad di tions, we'd deal with that. Then we pick up with the Rules of Or der, and that we take them ei ther to the end of that, or we may even take a third part on page 1264. I recommend that we do that, that we do those parts, 1245-1257; then we'll deal with the rules, 1257-1264; and then, we would deal with 1264, the Connectional Process Team. If we could take one of those at a time, per fect them, se ri a tim, and then move on. What do you think?

DEL PINO: Bishop, I'm cer tainly ame nable to that, if that is, in deed, ac cept able to the body, as well.

BISHOP MOR GAN: And the Chair does not want to push you, but we do need to move along. If you would ap prove that ap-

proach, would you show the hand, please? Down.

... So if you would first of all, what's before us right now would be the Plan of Or gani za tion, 1245 to 1257. Now, are there... Yes, recognized, come to Microphone 2. Now let me tell you this again, you can see these, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7. Now, to rec og nize the per son at Microphone 2, now, I'm go ing to try something else, especially for you peo ple in the very back. I may get clob bered for this, but if you will just come up to a microphone, prefer a bly one in the middle I can see, stand there, I will rec og nize you. Microphone 2, please. State your name and your conference.

DEBORAH MCLEOD (Florida Con ference): Deb bie McLeod, Florida.

BISHOP MORGAN: All right, Debbie, McLeod.

DEBORAH MCLEOD: On page 1252, I move that para graphs 301 through 304 be deleted from the paragraphs assigned to Faith and Or der, and that on page 1253, the reference to paragraph 305 to 365 be amended to read "301 to 365."

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, is it seconded?

UNIDENTIFIEDSPEAKER: Seconded.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, you want to speak to it?

DEBORAH MCLEOD: Yes, the rationale is that all the leg is lation related to or dination should be considered by the same leg is lative committee, and the proposed assignment of leg is lation separates the definition of ordination and conference member ship from the para graphs about the requirements for ordination.

BISHOP MORGAN: All right, thank you. All right, the motion is there, the speech has been made in fa vor. We are right now op er at ing un der the rules that are already in ex is tence, of course, which means that a max i mum of three speeches for, three speeches against, you could call for the after two have question ken-three-minute speeches, and we'll call it to or der at that. All right, the mo tion is before you, and it is sec onded. Does any one like to speak to that amendment—the McLeod amendment? I'll come back to Jerome at the end. I don't see any hands? All right, I'll turn to you, Jerome, and you'd like to re spond to that?

JEROME DEL PINO: Bishop, the di vision that was in di cated is not as is been represented, the membership in the annual conference is a mat ter of consider ation for

the entire executive session; it is not some thing that is ger mane for the or dained ministry to consider.

BISHOP MOR GAN: So you would oppose. . .

DEL PINO: That's right.

BISHOP MORGAN: the amendment? All right, you ready to vote? We're go ing to use the light... He has a last speech on this. If you would sup port the McLeod amendment, punch 1, 2 for "no," and 3 for "abstain." Please vote when the light turns on, please. All right, the amendment is defeated. It is now... this pro... Yes. Mi crophone 6, please.

BETH CAPEN (New York Con fer ence): Thank you, Bishop. Beth Capen, from New York Con fer ence. I want to thank the Committee on Rules for the all the hard work they've done. I am concerned and would not move at this time, because I think it would be too bur den some, but had the is sue of the Social Principles being removed from Church and So ci ety been brought up at the last Gen eral Con fer ence, I would have op posed it and would rec om mend that for the next General Conference, that the Social Principles remain in the leg is lative section on Church and So ci ety. My pri mary concern is that the Board of Church and So ci ety is, as I un der stand it, re spon si ble for im ple menting the Social Principles, and I do know that many peo ple do feel that in our re flec tions in church and so ci ety, we have been in deep theo log i cal dis cus sion and reflec tion, and a lot of prayer on many oc casions. So I would recommend that the So cial Principles be returned to the Leg is la tive Com mit tee on Church and So ci ety for the next General Conference.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, so there's not a mo tion . . .

CAPEN: I would move that, your Honor, I mean, I'm sorry, Bishop . . .

(laughter)

BISHOPMOR GAN: That's, that's okay. "His Imminence," "Excellency," any of that will be fine, thank you. (*laughter*) All right, the mo tion is be fore you, to rec ommend to the next Con fer ence . . . and is it sec onded? If you would sup port that, would show the hand, please? Down. Opposed? All right, we will vote again. If you would sup port that mo tion . . .

DEL PINO: Bishop . . . Bishop . . . question. Bishop . . . point of in for ma tion.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Jerome?

DEL PINO: This is ad vi sory to the commit tee that will be con vened for the next quadrennium.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Okay. Now, then, we're go ing to use the key pad. If you support that amend ment, vote, when the light co mes on, 1 for yes, 2 for no. And we will need to have copies of the motions, even the ones that do not carry. All right, it is supported. All right—turn back to your . . . Jerome? Or, to you. Any other matters? We're look ing only at pages 1244 to 1257. Don't see any other hands? Are there other persons? Yes, right here, please—pink card, go to Mi cro phone 6, Con nie . . . or Micro phone 5—go to one of them.

CONNIE MITCHELL (Kentucky Conference): Con nie Mitch ell, Ken tucky Conference.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Yes.

Pro posal to In clude Spouses in Me mo rials

MITCH ELL: On the page—un der where it says the "Plan of Or ga ni za tion," on page 1245—could there be in cluded, un der the opening session of organization, because you did it to day, and as a mat ter of re cord, that you in clude the bish ops'—the spouses? It says, "During the Memorial Service, there shall be called the names of the bishops who have died since the ad journ ment of the preceding General Conference, and like wise the names of the del e gates-elect," but it does not say the spouses, and you did that to day.

BISHOP MOR GAN: We did do that, didn't we? Okay, now, are you altering the amend ment here, Con nie?

MITCH ELL: Yes, I am.

BISHOP MOR GAN: You went to a baseball game last night, did n't you, and cheered real loud? (*laughter*) All right, the Mitch ell motion's before us, that we include bishops' spouses? And is it sec onded?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We will accept that.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, the committee says they will accept that. Is that agreeable to the body? All right. We're look ing, still, at the Plan of Or ga ni za tion. Any more ques tions, or . . . All right, I don't see any. All right. If you will adopt pages 1245 . . .

UN IDEN TI FIED SPEAKER: 1245...

BISHOP MOR GAN: Beg par don?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 1245 to 1257.

BISHOP MOR GAN: . . . to 1257, just to the Rules of Or der. Vote when the light appears, vote 1 for yes, 2 for no. All right, it is sus tained. Now we turn to the Rules of Order, which will be 1257 through 12 . . . just the top of 1264. Now that is be fore you, the Rules of Order. I see a card over here . . . go to Mi cro phone 7.

WILLIAM C. SMALLWOOD (Mississippi): I'd like a lit tle clar i fi ca tion on page 28, the sec ond para graph, "at the discretion of the bishop," read ing on down there, it says "group prayer." By "group prayer," does that mean small groups or the whole body?

BISHOP MORGAN: Excuse me, you said page 28? You mean . . .

SMALLWOOD: 1258.

BISHOP MOR GAN: 1258, okay.

SMALLWOOD: 1258, second paragraph, num ber 3, about 5 sen tences down, "for group prayer." I'd like clarification; what's meant by group prayer? Is it the small group or the whole body?

JEROME DEL PINO: It can be either small groups or it can be the en tirety of the plenary.

BISHOP MORGAN: You might group into 3 or 4—you know, it's a lot of vari a tion of how that might be done.

SMALLWOOD: My question is, group prayer could be a way of influencing the body, and if that should be the case, how are we go ing to gov ern that with out it get ting out of hand—everybody praying for one cer tain po si tion that might or might not be the po si tion of other peo ple here?

JEROME DEL PINO: Sir, it is our un derstanding, just as we have experience at the preceding General Conference, and perhaps you were not there, that when ever we enter into prayer, that is a political statement. It is be cause it raises other pos si bil ities than the ones that we have in mind. So when ever we would be in volved in our discern ment, it is going to be with the intention that we would have some level of in dif ference; that's the hope, that's the prayer. And if that does n't hap pen, then of course, we might get what we ask for. But, bot tom line, it is not un der stood in this pro cess that any of this would be in tended nor im ple mented as be ing ma nip u la tive. We trust our bishops, and that's the rea son we have only one rule per tain ing to the dis cern ment pro cess. It can come from the floor, but the bot tom line is that it is some thing that is not go ing to be the rule, but, more of ten than not, the exception.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, I'm looking in the back, is there any one in sec tions C or D that wishes to ask a question? Don't see a hand—

BISHOP MORGAN: Is there anybody here in A or B? I don't see a hand. We're talk ing about the rules. Are you ready? All right, let's vote then. And we'll vote when the light co mes on. Vote one for "yes," two for "no."; And the vote when the light comes on. The body is not clear. I asked for ques tions on sec tion. Ex cuse me. Stop the vot ing here. I... on p. 1257 to 1264, the top of that. That is be fore us. That's all that is be fore us. The Rules of Or der. And I saw no hands, no mo tions. And that's the rea son I put the question. Let me put it once again to you. If you would sup port those pages on the Rules of Or der, show...vote when the light co mes on. One for "yes," two for "no."

Page 1264, the Connectional Process Team, and you will need to present your amend ment so we will know ex actly what's before us.

DEL PINO: You cer tainly may keep your book let open, but we are go ing to present an amended understanding of the Connectional Process Team presentation plan. And if we could have that on the screen at this time.

BISHOP MORGAN: Let me say, this will be, what they present will be the rules committees report to you. This will be it, not exactly what is on p. 1264. So give at tention to the screen.

DEL PINO: All Right. Thank you, Bishop. We propose that the Connection Process Team (CPT) report come be fore the General Con ference in the following manner. First, the Copnnectional Process Team will present its report at the General Conference in plenary session on Wednesday morning, May third, as an order of the day. Bishop, I will go through the entirety of this?

BISHOP MOR GAN: I think so.

DEL PINO: All right.

BISHOP MORGAN: Let's give the whole pic ture.

DEL PINO: All right

BISHOP MOR GAN: And I would say to the tech ni cians, the Bishops, I un der stand, are not be ing able to see the votes up here. So if you could do some thing so they could see that, as well. Ex cuse me.

DEL PINO: Following this presentation, the delegates to General Conference will be divided into 25 randomly selected non-legislative groups for reflection and dia logue on the CPT report. Trans lations will be provided in specified groups. Three, each group will meet for 90 min utes, guided by a con vener bishop se lected by the Council of Bishops. Four, each group will be pro vided a re corder who is a non-delegate and an observer from the Connectional Process Team. Five, on Wednesday evening, May 3, the conveners and recorders will meet with the CPT ob serv ers to re port the areas of consensus with, dissent from, or ques tions about the CPT re port and pro posals. Six, on Thurs day eve ning, May 4, imme di ately fol low ing the open ing, the CPT re port will pro vide...I'm sorry, the CPT, or Connectional Pro cess Team, will pro vide the General Conference with a written summary of the small group meet ings. Seven, following time to read the written report, the General Conference will enter into a time of prayerful discernment to ask the Holy Spirit to give the confer ence the mind of Christ and make clear the will of God for our church on this is sue. Eight, and fi nally, pe ti tions re lated to the CPT re port shall be submitted to the appropriate legislative com mit tees for study and re view and will follow the leg is lative process in accordance with the plan of organization and rules of or der adopted by the Gen eral Con fer ence. The pro posed leg is la tion is to be re ported out compre hen sively and to gether. That is the amended version of this presentation plan, Bishop, which we now sub mit for the body's consideration.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right, it is properly be fore you now. I rec og nize the gen tleman at mi cro phone 6. Give us your name and your conference.

CARL SCHENCK (Missouri East): Thank you, Bishop. I would like to move an amendment to the report as presented. I move to amend the process set forth on p. 1264, and let me say, set forth by the chair. By the ad di tion of the following new paragraph eight and the renum bering of existing para graph eight as new para graph nine. The new para graph eight shall read, "On Fri day, May 5, following the Africa University Report, the floor of the conference shall be open for debate upon amendments to or other action upon the report as the conference may di rect. This ac tion shall pre cede any leg is la tive com mit tee's ac tion on specific petitions related to the CPT report. If I could have a sec ond, I would like to speak to

BISHOP MOR GAN: It's sup ported.

SCHENCK: I be lieve that the rules commit tee has given us a very help ful process, but that it is aborted at the point of ac tion

and that the house will want and the leg is lative com mit tees will want the coun cil of the Gen eral Con fer ence in regard to the report it self be fore we be gin work on the var i ous im ple ment ing legislations in spe cific pe titions. My amend ment would allow, and call for, time for the conference to express its wishes on the re port section, and to take action as the General Conference of '96 called for when it called for this review, this wholistic review of the structure of the church. Our...if we cannot deal with it wholistically, but only deal with it alseri item to all these var i ous pe ti tions, the confer ence may not be able to ex press its will satisfactorily.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All Right, There's speech in fa vor of the amend ment. Is there a speech op posed to the amend ment? Is there some one who would like to speak for it? Yes, over here, mi cro phone 3, please. Give us your name and con fer ence.

PATRICK STREIFF (Swit zer-land/France Con fer ence):

BISHOP MOR GAN: Wel come, Friend.

STREIFF: I would like to speak against this amend ment. I think it is good thing that we have a general discussion here in the plenary, but then it is our general way of working in General Conference that first in leg is lative committees we have a possi bility re ally to look more in the depths and have a first discussion in the legislative

com mit tee and then bring back to the plenary. And with the motion as we have it now be fore us all these items will keep to gether. So it's no dan ger that will be split up, and I think it is a good proce dure to have in one leg is lative committee the time to discuss on it and then come back after the leg is lative committee.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Thank you, Patrick. Is there a speech in fa vor? I go back again to the gen tle man here. Go to mi cro phone 6, and then I'll rec og nize you, Sir.

RICH ARD PARKER

BISHOP MOR GAN: No, I was n't rec ogniz ing Rich ard. I was rec og niz ing the gentle man here, Right there.

RICHARD PARKER: Oh, I beg your pardon.

BISHOP MORGAN: That's OK. Stay where you are, Rich ard.

BILLY JOE RICH (Alabama/West Florida Con fer ence) I think that the gen tle man has raised a very im por tant point for us to con sider, that be ing the leg is la tive committee as it were the CPT, I understand about three times af ter watch ing it and getting every one's comments on it, it comes to us now as a semi-document that's final ized. I think that if we re ally like it, or re ally don't like it, we aught to fol low his position and ei ther vote it up or down. And if we vote it up, and we want to move in that di rection,

then allow the commit tees to go back and take the process that this gentle man has outlined stand.

BISHOPO MOR GAN: All right there's been two speeches now in favor of the amend ment. Now, one against. Rich ard, do you speak against the motion? Mi crophone 6.

PARKER: In fa vor, Bishop.

BISHOP MOR GAN: Yes. In fa vor. All right, is there some one who speaks against the... Yes, I turn. Mi cro phone 7. Go to micro phone 7. Irec og nize the del e gate there.

SAN DRA LUTZ (East Ohio): We used a similar process with the min is try study four years ago. In my ex pe ri ence with that, serving on the legislative committee that received a good por tion of that was that the comments that come out during those small groups that we're go ing to have, re ally gave a won der ful feel for how the whole body was experiencing that. And then the legislative com mit tee was able to work with that. And I think when we then came back with our re port, we were able to vote on that. If that process for the leg is lative committee is de layed un til Fri day, that leaves the leg is lative com mit tees very lit tle time to work effectively on that report. So I would urge that we de feat the mo tion.

BISHOP MOR GAN: All right. Now your turn, Rich ard.
