BISHOP ODEN: This motion is be fore you to send this communiqué as read. Please vote when the light is on. It is so ordered. And let us take a mo ment in our own way to re flect on our ex pe ri ence last evening of confession and repentance, and how that re al ity is at the very heart of the good news as we send this communiqué representing that indeed, my friends, in the Christain com mu nity we're not better than nor lower than any other ex pres sion of the faith. All of us are distinct in our own ways. All of us have our own his to ries. And in this com mu ni qué that you've sent, we are indeed bonded to gether in Christian love with all of hu man ity, but a spe cial bond ing with those that con fess that Je sus Christ is Lord and Sav ior. Let's think about that for a moment to gether.

## (Prayer)

We turn now to a specialresponsibility for the nominations for Judicial Council and the Uni ver sity Sen ate. First of all, I would like to call your attention to paragraph 2602 in the Book of Dis ci pline, and I'm read ing, "At each qua dren nial ses sion of the Gen eral Con fer ence, the Coun cil of Bishops shall nominate by majority vote three times the num ber of or dained min isters and lay per sons to be elected at such ses sion of the Gen eral Con fer ence. At the same ses sion at which the above nom i nations are announced, nominations of both ministers and lay persons may be made from the floor, but at no other time. The names of all nom i nees iden ti fied with the conference to which each be longs and a biograph i cal sketch that does not ex ceed one hundred words, shall be pub lished by the Daily Christian Advocate 48 hours prior to the time of election." This is the para graph we're deal ing with at this time. Now we'd like for you to turn to page 1749 in your DCA, Vol ume 4, Num ber 3, 1749, in the lower right-hand corner. These are the nom i nees of your Council of Bishops which stand as nom i nees for election. There is one change. The fourth person nominated, Wesley Bailey, is not nominated. You should draw a line through that name and instead a Central Conference person, Rodolfo Beltran, from the Philipines, is a replacement nominee by the Council of Bishops. To facilitate this nomination process, I would ask per sons who have other names to place in nom i na tion to move to mikes and I will ro tate through the mikes. And as the nom i nations are made, you need to identify who you are as a nom i nator, the category, lay or clergy, to which you are nominating, the person's name and conference. And that is all you need to say. There are no speeches at this time. As the nom i nator, you are responsible for the biographical state ment that will be printed along with all others in the *DCA* 48 hours prior to the election next week. The floor is open for nominations to the Judicial Council. You have a nomination, please move to the mikes. Mike four.

BILL COUCH (North west Texas): A lay person for the Judicial Council, Ed Hill, from North west Texas Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Thank you, I need to make one more explanation. Write your nominee down on a sheet paper—the information that you have given—that we are assured that we get the correct spelling and the correct reference. So thank you. Nominators, be sure to bring that im mediately. Send it by page, to the Conference Secretary. Now turn to Mike two.

ALDO MARTIN (Florida): Nominate Daniel Ivey-Soto, New Mexico Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Lay or clergy?

MARTIN: Lay.

BISHOP ODEN: Thank you. Mike eight.

TYRONE GORDON (Kan sas West): I'd like to nom i nate Elsie Crickard, clergy from South Central Juris diction, Kan sas West.

BISHOP ODEN: Num ber five.

MEL BOWDAN (Ken tucky): I'd like to make a lay nomination. Mary A. Daffin, Texas Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike six.

DAVID RICH ARD SON (California Pacific): I'd like to nominate the Honorable Ted Todd, lay per son.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike four.

ALVIN HOR TON (Vir ginia): I'd like to nom i nate Lonnie D. Brooks, lay mem ber of the Alaska Mis sion ary Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike two.

LEICESTER LONGDON (West Mich igan): I'd like to nom i nate a lay can di date, Steven Lett, from West Mich i gan.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike six.

INEZ DAWES (Iowa): I'd like to nom inate a clergy can di date, Rev. Tom Grif fith from the Cal-Pac Con fer ence.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike one.

BARBARA LEMMEL: (Troy): I would like to nominate the Rev. Francine Taylor-Thirus from Northern Illinois Conference

BISHOP ODEN: Mike four.

JOE KILPATRICK (North Georgia): I would like to place a name in nom i na tion, the name of James Holsinger from the Kentucky Conference. Lay.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike six.

NOE VALDERAMA (North-West Mindanao): I'd like to nominate attorney Oscar Ferrer from the Philippine Central Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike one.

RUBIN PERRY (North Georgia): I'd like to place a nom i na tion. The name of Paul Ervin who is a lay.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike four.

MAXIE DUN NAM (Ken tucky): I'd like to nom i nate a clergy, Rev. Keith Boyette from the Virginia Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike three.

SHARON MOE (Pa cific North west): I'd like to place a nomination, lay member Sally Geis of the Rocky Moun tain Con ference.

BISHOP ODEN: Mike one.

JUL IUS ARCHIBALD (Troy): I'd like to nominate a clergy nominee, Rev. Tom Shanklin of the Troy Con fer ence.

BISHOP ODEN: Sally Geis is already nominated, so that nomination will not come from the floor. She is on the list already. Is there any one else at mike one? I see no other per sons at mikes. There fore I will de clare that the nom i na tions for the Judi cial Coun cil. Do you have an ad di tional nom i na tion? Please move to mike eight.

SAM WYNN (North Carolina): I'd like to nom i nate Belton Joy ner, clergy.

BISHOP ODEN: What con fer ence?

SAM WINN: North Carolina Conference

BISHOP ODEN: OK. If you have nom inations, please move to the mikes. We're trying to fa cil i tate this. I see one per son here. I don't see any one else moving to the mike. OK, per son at num ber two and then we'll turn to mike one.

DAVID WILSON (Oklahoma Indian Mis sion ary): A la ity, Miss Ann Saunkeah from the Okalahoma Indian Missionary Conference.

BISHOP ODEN: Lay or clergy? Da vid?

DAVID WIL SON: Laity.

BISHOP ODEN: Num ber one.

NIPPY-TOE JACKSON (Liberia): I would like to nom i nate James Lamark Cox of the Liberian Annual Conference, Monrovia, Li be ria. A layper son.

BISHOP ODEN: Thank you. I would declare that the nominations for Judicial Coun cil are closed.

BISHOP BLAKE: No one else at the mike. Now we turn to ... (pause), yes, did

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you want to make a nom i na tion? I did not, (pause) OK, move to num ber five, please.

MARK TROTTER: (Cali for nia Pa cific) I'd like to move to suspend the rules, if that's in or der, Bishop.

BISHOP BLAKE: What you are do ing is to sus pend the rules for what pur pose?

TROTTER: To allow the General Conference to consider the petitions related to member ship that are before them.

BISHOP BLAKE: Is there a second? (*Pause*) It is sec onded.

TROTTER: That the mo tion is to per mit the leg is la tive com mit tees that have been assigned petitions seeking to amend the 1996 *Discipline*, paragraphs 215, 222.1 through 5; 227.2; 231.1 and to consider them as pe ti tions to de lete the 1992 *Discipline* para graphs 216.4; 222 through 224; 232.1 and 2 and re place them with the language of the 1996 *Discipline* paragraphs which in clude the amend ments pur posed in the DCA.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, now this item; that's the subject of the rea son for the suspension of the rules. If you suspend the rules to deal with this mat ter, you are suspend ing your agenda and the rules to deal with this matter. If you will suspend the rules to deal with this mat ter vote ac cordingly when the light co mes on.

University Senate Nominations

BISHOP BLAKE: The rules are not suspended for that pur pose.

Now let's go to the University Senate nominations. These nominations are also in your DCA on p. 1749 and in the Judicial Council, I mean in the University Senate, in the *Bookof Discipline*, the members elected by the General Conference shall be nominated and elected by the following procedure, reading from paragraph 1417: "Twelve persons shall be nominated by the Council of Bishops..." and the qualifications for those persons are identified. Then, "At the same daily session at which the above nominations are announced, additional nominations may be made from the floor but at no other time."

On page 1749, in the right hand col umn, you have the nominations by the Council of Bishops for University Sen ate. Please note those names. These per sons are all ready in nomination.

Now, the floor is open for additional nominations for the University Senate. We will follow the same procedure. Please move to mikes and I will ro tate among the mikes. Again, be sure you give the name of the per son and mark on this card of nomination "University Senate," so we will be sure

to dis tin guish those from those who were nom i nated by the Ju di cial Coun cil for the Uni ver sity Sen ate. I see some one at mike six. Mike six, please.

CONNIE DIXON: (California Pacific con fer ence) I would like to nom i nate Dr. Willie Jones, lay person, California-Pacific conference.

BISHOP BLAKE: Would you, as nom inations are made, we have categories of per sons to be nom i nated. Would you identify in your nomination the position that this per son holds in re la tion ship to higher ed uca tion. The elections are for per sons who are chief ex ec utive of ficers of United Methodist related educational institutions and per sons holding other positions relevant to ac a demic or financial af fairs or church re la tion ships. I think that ref er ence would be help ful in terms of the nominating process. We have re turned to mike six. You have made your nomination. Position, and the relation ship to higher ed u cation that this person holds?

CON NIE DIXON: Dr. Jones is a dean at Compton College in Compton, California.

BISHOP BLAKE: Please in clude that in your nom i nation sheet. Number 8.

BEN ALFORD: Clergy delegate, Tennes see con fer ence. I would like to place in nomination Dr. Ted Brown, president, Martin Method ist College.

BISHOP BLAKE: Mike 2.

FLO MARTIN: (South Geor gia Con ference) I would like to place in nom i na tion, Dr. Charlene Black, lay, South Geor gia, assistant...as so ci ate vice pres i dent for academic affairs and dean of undergraduate studies at Geor gia South ern University in Statesboro, Geor gia.

BISHOP BLAKE: Mike 8.

DAVID E. PEÑALVA: (South Indiana con fer ence) I would like to nom i nate Dr. David Maldonado. He is the newly appointed president of Illiff College, Illiff School of The ol ogy, ex cuse me, and he's from the Rio Grande Con fer ence.

BISHOP BLAKE: Mike one.

WIL LIAM H. HINSON (Texas Con ference): I would like to nom i nate Dr. Maxie Dunnam, who is president of Asbury seminary

BISHOP BLAKE: Num ber six.

CHEOL H. KWAK: (Cal i for nia Pa cific Con fer ence) I would like to place a nom i nation for Dr. Leong S. Lee, from Iowa conference. He's a professor at Iowa State University in Political Science also serving as CPT.

BISHOP BLAKE: I see no other per sons on mikes, there fore I will de clare that the nominations for University Senate are closed. Thank you for the par tic i pa tion in this pro cess. Again, these will all be published in the DCA and the elections will take place in ple nary next week.

BISHOP BLAKE: Now, friends, many of you have been here since eight o'clock. It's 10:30. I would like for you to look at your watches, because in thirteen minutes we will have the action before us on the Connectional Process Team Re port, so look at your watches, thir teen min utes, we will be gin our ses sion ex actly at that time.

(Singing)

BISHOP BLAKE: Thank you so much, and please be seated, as we continue the agenda as you adopted. Let the con fer ence be in or der. Not quite every body is here yet.

We would like to an nounce for delegates that the dead line for the bio graph i cal in formation for the nominees for Judicial Council and the University Senate, the dead line is 3:00 p.m. this after noon. I will ask Carolyn Marshall, our secretary, to make that announcement again at the end of the morning. But some of you who are responsible for that need to be attentive to that, three o'clock this after noon. Now we're under an or der of the day at this time, an or der that you prescribed in your rules on Tuesday. And let me remind you what you voted on Tues day in terms of your rules. The rule relating to Fri day morning is as follows:

"On Fri day, May 5, fol lowing the Africa University Report"—if you want references, this is on page 1730 of your DCA—"the floor of the con fer ence shall be open for de bate upon amend ments to or any other action upon the re port as the con ference may direct. This action shall precede any leg is lative com mit tee's action on specific petitions related to the CPT report." This has been ful filled, the last half of that motion, in that there are no leg is lative committee actions concerning this report. So that has been ful filled.

Now we turn to the Connectional Process Team. Mi nerva Carcaño is a rep re sentative of the team who will put the mat ter be fore us from the team. This Connectional Process Team was au tho rized by the 1996 session of Gen eral Con fer ence, so it has the standing of a committee that the General Con fer ence has au tho rized. She will put the mat ter be fore us from the com mit tee, and then we'll have an op por tu nity to speak to putt ing the mat ter be fore us. So we turn to Mi nerva Carcaño.

MINERVA CARCAÑO (Rio Grande): Bue nas días. I greet you in the name and in

the peace of Je sus Christ on this fifth day of May, Cinco de Mayo, a day of great lib er ation and cel e bration for Mexico.

(Applause)

And the peo ple of God say viva México y viva la grande Iglesia Metodista de México.

Adop tion of "Liv ing Into the Fu ture" Recommended

I would refer you to the report of Connectional Process Team, which is found in your Ad vance Edition of the Daily Christian Advocate, volume one, section one, pages 5 through 21. The Ad vanced Edition of the DCA volume one, section one, pages 5 through 21. In an effort to facilitate the delib er a tions of this Gen eral Con fer ence on this morning, the Connectional Process Team has a recommendation. The Connectional Process Team recommends the adoption of the section of its report titled "Living Into the Future." This section is found on pages 18, be gin ning on the sec ond column, and extending through page 20. We would fur ther rec om mend that the first sec tion of the re port, pages one through 18, be referred to general church Covenant Council pro posed in the "Liv ing Into the Future" section for its further study and con sid er ation. I would like to speak to the mo tion if I am al lowed.

BISHOP BLAKE: Yes, is there a sec ond? UNIDENTIFIEDSPEAKER: Seconded. BISHOP BLAKE: It's sec onded.

CARCAÑO: The CPT has sought to listen to God's will for The United Meth od ist Church through prayer and the study of Scrip ture, through the good work of our sisters and our broth ers who worked tire lessly on the Connectional Is sues Study, as well as through the vi sion ary work of the Coun cil of Bishops in their study of the global na ture of The United Meth od ist Curch.

We have also attempted to hear God's will through Christian conferencing with United Meth od ists through out the con nection, and now as we gather as the Gen eral Conference. We are clear on the fact that God has placed on our col lec tive heart the need for change. Change not for the sake of change, but for the sake of the mis sion of the church: to make dis ci ples of Je sus Christ, faithful fol low ers of Christ who pro claim that in Je sus Christ is found our sal va tion, dis ci ples who live in God's reign of jus tice in vit ing oth ers to do the same for the peace of all of God's cre ation.

The re port of the Council of Bishops, the re port of the laity, the General Council on Min is try re port, have pointed to the need for change. Our conversation through Wednesday's reflection groups of discernment have

held up the need for change. Our con ver sations as a Connectional Process Team with United Meth od ists from across the church spoke the need for change. In this spirit of seeking confirmation of what we understand to be God's will by listen ing to God's peo ple, we are also clear that change in The United Meth od ist Church must come gradu ally. By adopt ing the "Liv ing Into the Future" sec tion of the Connectional Pro cess Team report, the General Conference would ini ti ate a pro cess of grad ual change that would enable The United Methodist Church to move in a transformational di rection, in those ar eas where the dis cern ment process of this very General Conference has af firmed that there is con sen sus—mainly. our need of God's transformation; secondly, the need to prayer fully and to gether discern God's vision for the church; the need for us to model a new style of lead ership that makes us part ners in mis sion—laity and clergy United Methodists in the U.S., in the Phil ip pines and Africa, and in Asia, part ners in mis sion to all the globe.

Adopting the "Living Into the Future" section would also en able us to continue our Chris tian conferencing on that point which we are yet not clear-on which we are yet not clear: How do we live to gether, work together, serve to gether as United Method ists who by the grace of God now rep re sent not only the di ver sity of the United States, but also the rich di ver sity of God's peo ple in the Phil ip pines and Africa and in Europe. The adoption of the "Living Into the Future" sec tion of the CPT report would establish a Cov e nant Coun cil whose life as di rected in the re port would span only for the next quadren nium and that would be ac count able to the 2004 General Conference, with the added re spon si bil ity of re port ing its progress annually to all of the annual conferences of the de nom i na tion as well as to the Coun cil of Bishops.

The CPT ear nestly be lieves that the adoption of the "Liv ing Into the Fu ture" sec tion, with the re fer ral of the bal ance of the CPT report to a temporary Covenant Council, faithfully and with integrity responds to God's call for God's peo ple called United Meth od ists on this day.

Pro posal to Refer "Liv ing Into the Fu ture" Gen eral and Ju di cial Administration Committee

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, this mat ter is before you. Let me state the mo tion for our clarification. Moved, that the adoption of the sec tion of the re port ti tled "Liv ing Into the Fu ture," and the sec ond part of the motion, that first section of the report be referred to the general church Covenant Council proposed in the "Living Into the

Fu ture." OK, let's start over here, at mi crophone five.

CHRISTINE HARMAN (Kentucky): Thank you, Bishop. I move that we re fer the section of the CPT report titled "Living Into the Future" to Legislative Committee Number Six, Gen eral and Ju di cial Ad min is tration, for scru tiny, per fection, and re turn to the ple nary through our nor mal leg is la tive process. This again is the section that be gins on page 18 of the red DCA and is also printed on page 1686 of the May 3rd daily DCA, where it is noted as pe ti tion num ber 31967.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, if there's a—is there a sec ond? Would you like to speak to your mo tion of re fer ral, and then—this is what's be fore us now, just a mo tion to re fer. Yes, mi cro phone five.

HARMAN: Here. Since the printing of the sec tion in our daily DCA came after this amendment for the process that we were dealing with, I think that the in tention was to get this in petition form to a leg is lative commit tee where we could work on it in a normal process and then bring the whole of that piece back to this body for de liber ation. That is what I would like to see hap pen.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, is there a... Now we need a state ment against the mo tion to re fer. I don't see any one seek ing that. The motion to referto the legislative committee the section is before you. Vote when the light comes... I am sorry, the maker of the main mo tion al ways has the right to the last speech, but no speeches will be allowed from the floor. Do you wish to speak to the motion to refer?

MI NERVA CARCAÑO: In be half of the CPT, and in a spirit of Christian conferencing and in sup port of our leg is lative pro cess, we would accept that recommendation.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, you cannot accept it, it's in the po si tion of the floor . . .

CARCAÑO: We would sup port it.

BISHOP BLAKE: . . . but that's a statement in re sponse to the team. The mo tion is to re fer, vote 1 for "yes"; 2 for "no." Vote when the light co mes on. "Yes," 566; "No," 308. OK, you have re ferred the mat ter. All it takes is a ma jor ity vote on re fer ral. Now, what I un der stand is that now the mat ter is in the leg is la tive com mit tee. I want to be sen si tive to . . . I know as the chair of all kinds of responses that were considered, and now, for those of you who are new delegates, we just want to ex plain that the whole re port will come back to you after the leg isla tive com mit tee deals with it, and that will be sub mit ted back to the floor in the nor mal

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process of the legislative committee reports.

OK, does it have to do with the mat ter that we've already . . . Let me check, here, there's per sons seek ing the floor—I'll look over here, first of all, to mi crophone seven.

BILL SCOTT (Mississippi): I un der stood the mo tion to re fer from page 18 to the end, not to the be gin ning of that re port; so the whole thing is not re ferred, as I un der stood the mo tion.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, would the maker of the mo tion go to number five and restate the mo tion as you made it and have sub mitted it?

HAR MAN: The motion was as follows: I move that we re fer the sec tion of the CPT report titled "Living Into the Future" to Legislative Committee Number Six, for scru tiny, per fec tion, and re turn to the plenary through our normal legislative process. As I un der stand it, that is where the ac tual ac tion is rec om mended to be taken. The rest of the document—I understand, and cer tainly can be cor rected to that—is background information that leads up to that plan of ac tion which deals with the creation of the Cove nant Coun cil, and then the atten dant re spons i bilities as signed to it for the next four years.

BISHOP BLAKE: The chair ac cepted the mo tion to re fer in re la tion ship to the main mo tion be fore the body. There was no request to divide that issue in the original main mo tion. It was rec om mended that the first sec tion of the re port be re ferred to the general church Cove nant Council proposed in "Liv ing Into the Fu ture" sec tion. There was no ac tion re quested in that part of the

re port. So my rul ing is that the mo tion to refer was not di vided, and the main mo tion was be fore us, and the whole mat ter has been re ferred. The whole mat ter will come back to the ple nary by the route of the leg isla tive com mit tee, and then the re port will be be fore us.

OK, we'll turn here, to mi cro phone four. These are pro ce dural mat ters. State the issue, please, so we can move on. We're trying to protect leg is lative committee time, if at all pos si ble. Yes. Mi cro phone two? OK.

Bishop's Rul ing on "Liv ing Into the Fu ture" Ap pealed

MAC BRANTLEY (North Georgia): I appeal the ruling of the chair on this matter.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK. In ap peal ing the rul ing of the chair, you sim ply—that is an incidental motion. And the matter is be fore you in terms of whether or not you would support the chair's rul ing that I have just made. The matter has been seconded, so that is what is be fore us. It is de bat able; this motion is de bat able. Would some one like to speak on ei ther side of this is sue of ap pealing the de ci sion of the chair?

BISHOP BLAKE: OK. Move to mike 7, please. This is only on the motion to appeal.

AILEEN L. WILLIAMS (Minnesota): Bishop, I would give a point of clarification. The "Living into the Future" material starts on p.18; and in the motion to refer, that is the portion that was asked to be referred. The original motion, the original recommendation given by Minerva Carcaño, from CPT, was that the section be adopted by the body of the General Conference 2000, which would mean that we have moved it into leg-

is la tive com mit tee to be dealt with, as is our process. The other part of the rec om men dation is for a fu ture body, which would be cre ated. There fore, I think it's a mat ter of clar i fi ca tion of your de ci sion that I would ap peal to.

BISHOP BLAKE: Are you speaking in sup port or against the mo tion to ap peal the de ci sion of the chair?

AILEEN WIL LIAMS: I've tried to give a word of clar i fi ca tion. I don't think that the de ci sion of the chair was in cor rect in our procedure, but in terms of which portion has been referred to the committee.

BISHOP BLAKE: OK, I would reg is ter that on the side of op pos ing the mo tion to question the rul ing of the chair. I see of no other per son want ing to speak. OK, I'll see here on p. 5, please state which side of the is sue you're speak ing on. This is only on the ap peal of the de ci sion of the chair. Mike 1. I'm sorry; I said 5 and should have said 1. No. 1, please.

JAMIE E. JENKINS (North Geor gia): In sup port of the mo tion for ap peal, on p. 18, the first sen tence un der "Liv ing into the Future," would cause me to con clude that the first 18 pages was not in cluded in the re ferral be cause it says, "upon adop tion of the foregoing document, transformational directions,..." etc., etc., which be gan on p. 5, so there fore it would seem to me that the pre vi ous 18 pages would not be in cluded in the rec om men da tion to re fer pp. 18b, following, the "Living into the Future" section.
