Ald. Quinlan was elected Mayor of Greater Newcastle by 16 votes to five last night. Ald. Ewart Lewis was elected Deputy Mayor by 12 votes to nine.

The Mayor allowance was again fixed at £1000. There were three candidates for Mayor-Ald. Quinlan, the retiring Mayor (Ald. Norris), and Ald. Soper. In the first ballot, Ald. Quinlan received 14 votes, Ald. Soper five and Ald. Norris two. With the elimination of Ald. Norris, the second ballot was held, and Ald. Quinlan received 16 votes to five.

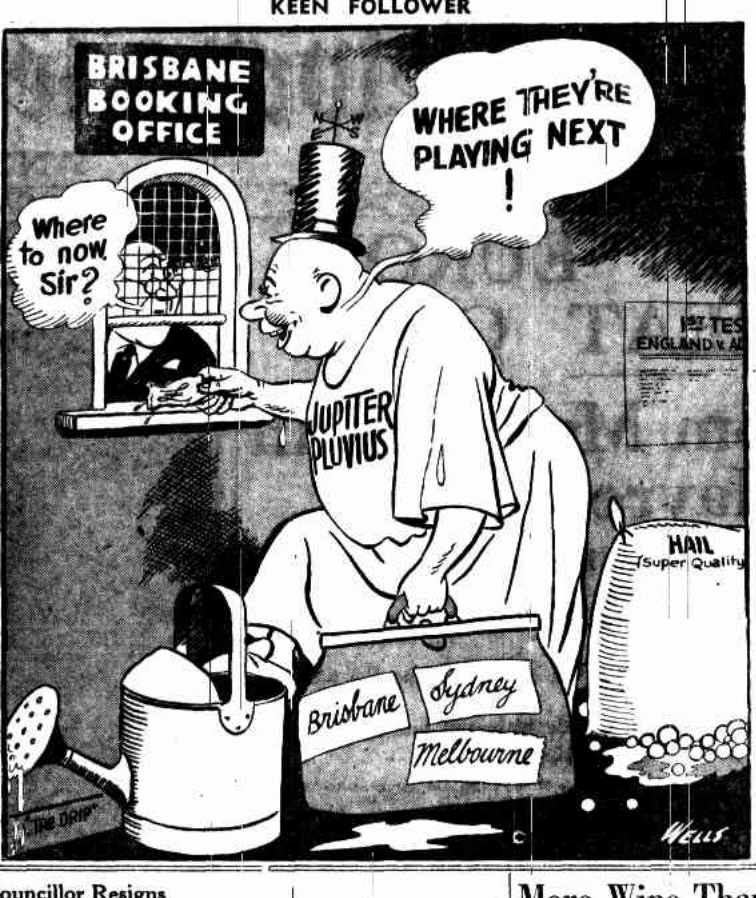

Newcastle will have its most convivial Christmas since the austere war years, but she will have to make shift with many drinks other than beer. Wine and spirits are more readily available.

A slight increase in Newcastle's beer supplies is being anticipated for Christmas, but the quota will still be short of its pre-war level. The shortage is largely caused by a shortage of hops and barley.

Toombs Ltd. will distribute 10 percent more draught beer in December than in November. It is expected that most of its extra ration will be kept until Christmas.

Another brewing firm has not fixed any quota increase, but is "doing its best" to bring supplies to satisfy the heavy Christmas demand.

Many men had been buying beer a few bottles at a time for several weeks, and must have accumulated good hoards of beer for their seasonal celebrations, hotelkeepers said yesterday.

Most hotels have stocks of wines and spirits, including Australian gin and whiskey. Scotch whiskey is still rare. A good selection of liquors is offering. Some bars display bottles of vodka under an Australian label.
