

### VOTING INFORMATION

To exercise your right and duty as an American Citizen to vote in an election, it is necessary that you first register.

**TO REGISTER:** Go to the Registration Office in your county. Be sure to take your naturalization certificate with you. Registration is open in your county:

Five (5) days after the Primary Election and Thirty (30) days after the general election and closes Thirty (30) days before the next Primary or General Election.

### DISPLAY YOUR FLAG

The flag of the United States may be displayed on any day when the weather permits, and as approved by action of the Congress, should be displayed between sunrise and sunset, especially on the following days:
