These are geographic areas that are allowed to "capture" a portion of any increases in the state portion of school property tax revenue, and use the money to partially subsidize college tuition for local</td><td>access to dental care by allowing mid-level dental professionals known as dental therapists to perform certain procedures under the supervision</td><td>state to pay up to 8% more than the lowest bidder for road salt if it comes from a Michigan mine. The bill is designed to steer business to Detroit Salt Company, which is actually owned by a Canadian holding</td><td>enter into joint operating agreements with certain businesses to build hospitals/transportation facilities.
