**[1] DHS; reporting; abortions (SB 1394)** – Enhancing abortion reporting requirements. **Passed Senate 17-13. Passed House 35-22-3. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on April 12, 2018.**

**[2] Dissolution; human embryos; disposition (SB 1393)** – Requiring courts in a divorce proceeding to award in vitro embryos to the spouse that wants them for the purpose of having children. **Passed Senate 18-12. Passed House 33-25-2. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on April 3, 2018.**

**[3] Kinship care; aggravated circumstances; dependency (SB 1473)** – Making sure young children in the foster care system are placed in a permanent home in a shortened and more reasonable time period. **Passed Senate 30-0. Passed House 57-1-2. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on April 5, 2018.**

**[4] Charter schools; vacant buildings; equipment (HB 2460)** – Prohibiting district schools from withdrawing a property for sale or lease solely because a charter or private school is the highest bidder. **Passed House 34-23-3. Passed Senate 17-12-1. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on March 27, 2018.**

**[5] Zoning regulations; private schools (HB 2461)** – Ensuring municipalities and counties do not discriminate against private schools by requiring more acres to operate than are required for charter schools. **Passed House 33-25-2. Passed Senate 17-12-1. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on March 27, 2018.**

**[6] Dual enrollment; homeschooled children (HB 2536)** – Allowing homeschool students to receive college credit when enrolled in a dual enrollment course. **Passed House 42-17-1. Passed Senate 30-0. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on March 29, 2018.**

**[7] Postsecondary institutions; free expression policies (HB 2563)** – Strengthening free speech rights of college students at public universities and colleges. **Passed House 34-23-3. Passed Senate 17-13. Signed into law by Gov. Ducey on April 25, 2018.**
