## EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS.

The following communications were received from the Governor:

STATE OF MINNESOTA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, St. Paul, April 14, 1891.

Hon. G. S. Ives, President of the Senate:

Dear Sir:—I beg to return herewith, without my approval, Senate File No. 554, entitled "A act to legalize the acts of the supervisors of the town of Wellington, in the county of Renville, state of Minne-

sota, in laying out certain public roads in said town."

This bill purports to validate the laying out of certain highways. It does not appear from the text of the bill what irregularities it is designed to correct, nor does it appear that the officers have secured any jurisdiction over the matter, It must properly be assumed therefore, that the bill contravenes two distinct constitutional provisions, in that, first, it assumes to take property without due process of law; and second, it assumes in effect to lay out a highway.

For these reasons I am constrained to withhold my approval.
