The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

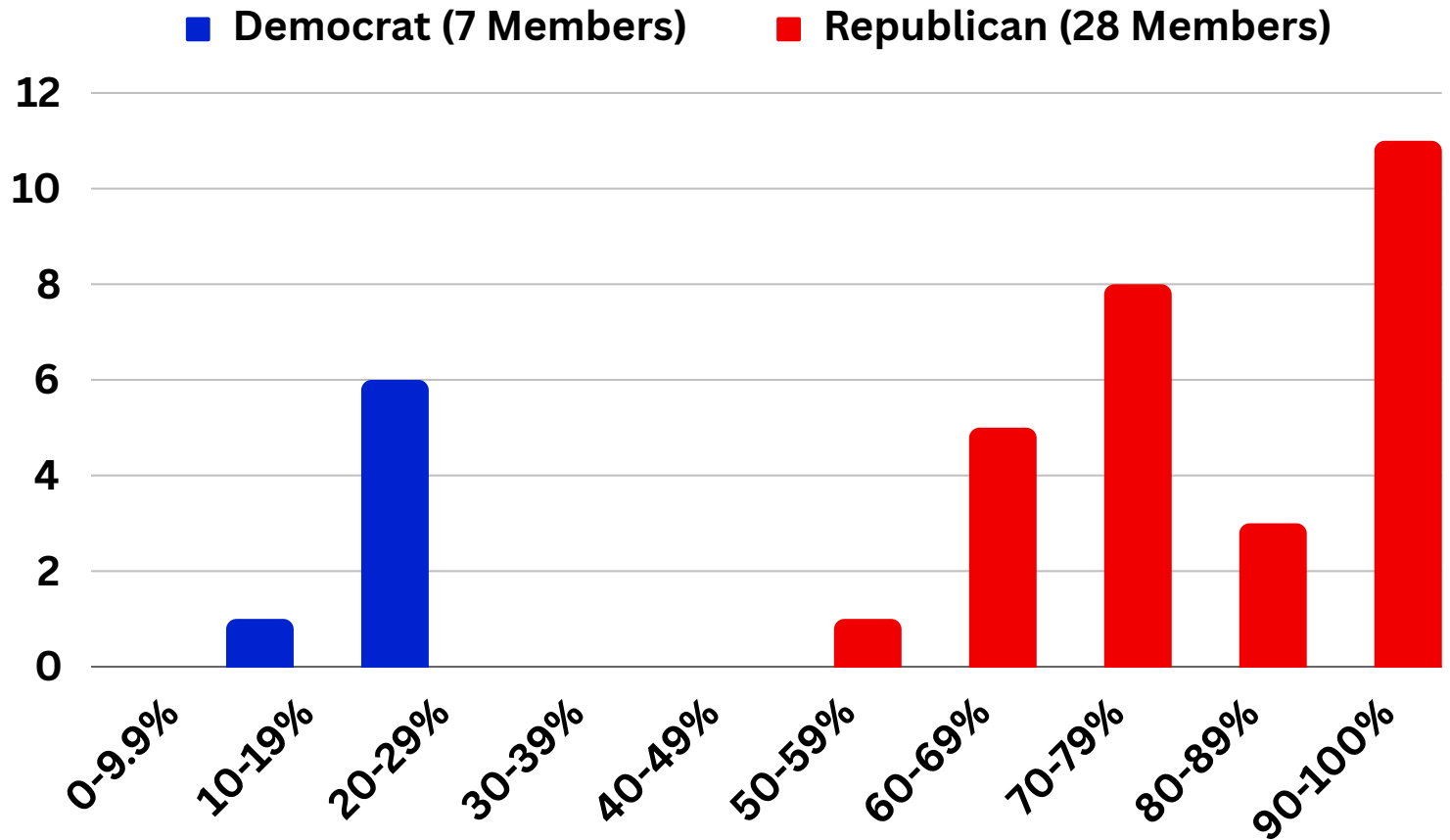

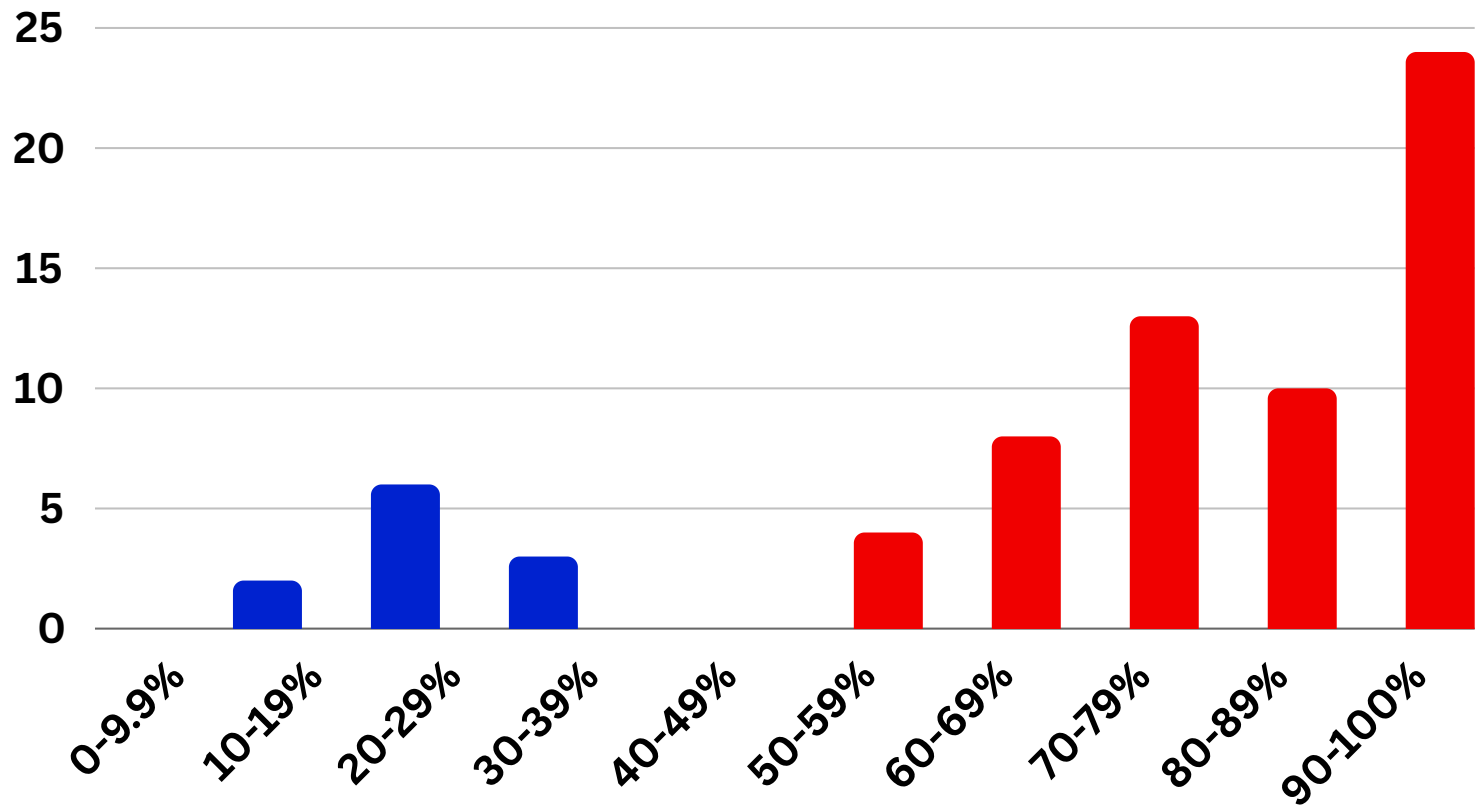

H 22 Ensuring the Protection of Law and Order in Municipalities in Idaho.

This bill allows the state government to withhold proceeds from the sales and use tax from municipalities if the municipality refuses to investigate or enforce certain felonies. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to establish law and order within American cities and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

H 24 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People’s Post-High School Careers.

This bill appropriates millions of dollars in funds to a grant program that will apportion thousands of dollars to qualifying young adults such that they may pursue their careers in college or technical school. Students who are attempting to enter “in-demand” careers will be prioritized for this funding. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help fund other people’s higher education aspirations, opposes programs that favor certain industries over others, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 22, 2023 by a vote of 20-15 and the bill later became law.

H 71 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Idaho.

This bill prohibits physicians from performing radical gender surgeries on or administering puberty blockers to minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation and castration of children and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 28, 2023 by a vote of 56-13 and the bill later became law.

H 106 Cracking Down on Democrat-Backed Gas Stove Bans.

This bill prohibits localities from creating restrictions that prevent the connection of certain utilities to a person’s house. In doing so, this bill prevents localities from fully instituting gas stove bans. CPAC supports efforts to oppose municipal overreach and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 14, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

H 149 Idaho’s Clean Slate Bill.

This bill allows certain ex-criminals to petition the government to shield their records from disclosure if they have not committed a crime for 5 years. CPAC’s Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in conservative solutions to the justice system and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports efforts to reintegrate ex-criminals back into society and reduce recidivism rates. CPAC, therefore, supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 13, 2023 by a vote of 34-0 and the bill later became law.

H 163 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education in Idaho.

This bill requires public schools to notify parents about changes in the mental health and well-being of their children. It also requires that parents be given access to their children’s education records. CPAC supports efforts to improve parental rights in education and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 13, 2023 by a vote of 34-0 and the bill later became law.



H 173 No State Land for Foreign Governments in Idaho.

This bill prohibits foreign governments and foreign state-controlled enterprises from purchasing or acquiring any controlling interest in some types of Idaho's land. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the security interests of the US and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 25-9 and the bill later became law.

H 179 Strengthening Election Integrity in Idaho.

This bill prohibits counties from using ranked choice voting methods in their elections. Ranked choice voting, in some circumstances, allows individuals who receive the second highest number of votes to win an election by apportioning votes from other losing candidates to them. CPAC opposes this consequence, believes that those who place first in an election should win the election, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 21, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

H 190 Preventing Idaho from Using Taxpayer Funds to Support Unfairly Discriminatory Financial Institutions.

This bill prohibits the state from designating credit unions or banks that discriminate against firearms industry members or certain natural resource industry members as state depositories. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the influence of ESG standards and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 28, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

H 191 Preventing the Misuse of Taxpayer Funds by Improving Idaho's Procurement Process.

This bill prohibits the government from awarding contracts to companies because of their ESG rating. CPAC opposes the usage of ESG as a metric for judging companies, supports efforts to ensure that the public procurement process obtains services that will occasion the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 20, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

H 213 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People's Education in Idaho.

This bill establishes a rural nursing loan repayment program. Under this program, nurses may receive up to \$25,000 from the government to pay off their student loans if they practice in a rural area in Idaho. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay the costs of other people's education and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 14, 2023 by a vote of 18-17 and the bill later became law.

H 239 Ensuring that Noncitizens May Not Receive Voting Powers.

This bill clarifies a section in Idaho law declaring that those who are not citizens of the United States may not vote in any election within the state. CPAC opposes measures that provide noncitizens with the power to vote, an initiative that has most notably been promoted by Democrats in Washington D.C., and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 28, 2023 by a vote of 35-0 and the bill later became law.



H 242 Penalizing Abortion Traffickers in Idaho.

This bill makes it a crime for individuals to, with the intent to conceal an abortion from the parents of an unemancipated minor, procure an abortion or procure drugs necessary for an abortion for a minor. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports the rights of parents to direct the upbringing of their children, supports efforts to increase parental rights and place restrictions on the practice of abortion, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 27-7 and the bill later became law.

H 274 No TikTok on Government Devices in Idaho.

This bill prohibits public employees from downloading TikTok onto government devices and from accessing TikTok's website through government devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 21, 2023 by a vote of 32-0 and the bill later became law.

H 276 Continuing to Fund Obsolete Public Television.

This bill funds Idaho Public Television for FY 2024. CPAC opposes using taxpayer resources to fund public television services and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 17, 2023 by a vote of 22-12 and the bill later became law.

H 295 Second Amendment Financial Privacy Act in Idaho.

This bill prohibits the government from maintaining a registry of those who have purchased and own a gun. The bill also prohibits payment networks from discriminating against firearms retailers in certain ways. For example, the network may not decline a card transaction based solely on the assignment or non-assignment of a firearms code to the retailer. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, supports efforts to diminish the government's surveillance of lawful gun owners, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 29, 2023 by a vote of 34-1 and the bill later became law.

H 314 No Porn for Minors in Idahoan Public School Libraries.

This bill prohibits schools from making literature that is harmful to minors available to students. Such material includes those that depict sadomasochistic and sexual conduct. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the indoctrination of minors into the radical Left's woke beliefs about gender and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 26-9 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.

S 1030 Ensuring the Enforcement of Federal Immigration Laws.

This bill prohibits government entities from adopting policies that interfere with the enforcement of federal immigration laws. CPAC supports efforts to ensure that federal immigration laws are properly followed and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 22, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.



S 1038 Attempting to Promote Universal School Choice in Idaho.

This bill establishes education savings accounts for Idaho's students, the likes of which provide funds to parents such that they may defray the expenses of sending their child to a nonpublic school. CPAC supports school choice and supported this bill. The Senate defeated this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 12-23.

S 1071 Diverting Elementary School Instruction Away from Radical Gender Ideology.

This bill prohibits schools from teaching about gender identity or human sexuality to kids that have not yet reached grade 5. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the indoctrination of young children in the Left's radical theories about gender and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 8, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 but the bill did not progress in the House.

S 1100 Protecting the Privacy of Intimate Spaces in Idaho.

This bill requires that all public school locker rooms and restrooms be designated as being exclusively for the members of one particular sex. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and private environment in school locker rooms and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 9, 2023 by a vote of 28-7 and the bill later became law.

S 1161 Attempting to Promote School Choice in Idaho.

This bill sets up a program that provides \$6,000 tuition grants to parents such that they may help their child attend a school of their choice. CPAC supports efforts to promote school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 16, 2023 by a vote of 19-15 but the bill did not progress in the House.

S 1169 Wasting Taxpayer Resources by Continuing to Fund Idaho's Commission on the Arts.

This bill appropriates funds to Idaho's Commission on the Arts for FY 2024. This Commission exists to provide grants and other forms of support to artists and organizations in order to promote the cultural environment of Idaho. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to fund cultural endeavors and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 17, 2023 by a vote of 23-11 and the bill later became law.

S 1178 Providing for Racially Discriminatory Bureaucracies.

This bill appropriates funds to Idaho's "Commission on Hispanic Affairs." CPAC does not believe that there should exist bureaucracies within the government that privilege certain government-favored racial groups and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 21, 2023 by a vote of 22-13 and the bill later became law.

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H 22 Ensuring the Protection of Law and Order in Municipalities in Idaho.

This bill allows the state government to withhold proceeds from the sales and use tax from municipalities if the municipality refuses to investigate or enforce certain felonies. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to establish law and order within American cities and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 16, 2023 by a vote of 56-13 and the bill later became law.

H 24 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People's Post-High School Careers.

This bill appropriates millions of dollars in funds to a grant program that will apportion thousands of dollars to qualifying young adults such that they may pursue their careers in college or technical school. Students who are attempting to enter "in-demand" careers will be prioritized for this funding. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help fund other people's higher education aspirations, opposes programs that favor certain industries over others, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 6, 2023 by a vote of 36-34 and the bill later became law.

H 71 No Radical Gender Surgeries for Minors in Idaho.

This bill prohibits physicians from performing radical gender surgeries on or administering puberty blockers to minors. CPAC opposes the mutilation and castration of children and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 28, 2023 by a vote of 56-13 and the bill later became law.

H 106 Cracking Down on Democrat-Backed Gas Stove Bans.

This bill prohibits localities from creating restrictions that prevent the connection of certain utilities to a person's house. In doing so, this bill prevents localities from fully instituting gas stove bans. CPAC supports efforts to oppose municipal overreach and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 17, 2023 by a vote of 58-12 and the bill later became law.

H 149 Idaho's Clean Slate Bill.

This bill allows certain ex-criminals to petition the government to shield their records from disclosure if they have not committed a crime for 5 years. CPAC's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in conservative solutions to the justice system and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. CPAC supports efforts to reintegrate ex-criminals back into society and reduce recidivism rates. CPAC, therefore, supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 22, 2023 by a vote of 66-1 and the bill later became law.

H 163 Strengthening Parental Rights in Education in Idaho.

This bill requires public schools to notify parents about changes in the mental health and well-being of their children. It also requires that parents be given access to their children's education records. CPAC supports efforts to improve parental rights in education and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 67-3 and the bill later became law.



H 173 No State Land for Foreign Governments in Idaho.

This bill prohibits foreign governments and foreign state-controlled enterprises from purchasing or acquiring any controlling interest in some types of Idaho's land. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the security interests of the US and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 31, 2023 by a vote of 64-0 and the bill later became law.

H 179 Strengthening Election Integrity in Idaho.

This bill prohibits counties from using ranked choice voting methods in their elections. Ranked choice voting, in some circumstances, allows individuals who receive the second highest number of votes to win an election by apportioning votes from other losing candidates to them. CPAC opposes this consequence, believes that those who place first in an election should win the election, and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 7, 2023 by a vote of 56-12 and the bill later became law.

H 190 Preventing Idaho from Using Taxpayer Funds to Support Unfairly Discriminatory Financial Institutions.

This bill prohibits the state from designating credit unions or banks that discriminate against firearms industry members or certain natural resource industry members as state depositories. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the influence of ESG standards and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 59-11 and the bill later became law.

H 191 Preventing the Misuse of Taxpayer Funds by Improving Idaho's Procurement Process.

This bill prohibits the government from awarding contracts to companies because of their ESG rating. CPAC opposes the usage of ESG as a metric for judging companies, supports efforts to ensure that the public procurement process obtains services that will occasion the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 59-10 and the bill later became law.

H 213 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Other People's Education in Idaho.

This bill establishes a rural nursing loan repayment program. Under this program, nurses may receive up to \$25,000 from the government to pay off their student loans if they practice in a rural area in Idaho. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay the costs of other people's education and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 3, 2023 by a vote of 39-30 and the bill later became law.

H 239 Ensuring that Noncitizens May Not Receive Voting Powers.

This bill clarifies a section in Idaho law declaring that those who are not citizens of the United States may not vote in any election within the state. CPAC opposes measures that provide noncitizens with the power to vote, an initiative that has most notably been promoted by Democrats in Washington D.C., and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 14, 2023 by a vote of 66-0 and the bill later became law.



H 242 Penalizing Abortion Traffickers in Idaho.

This bill makes it a crime for individuals to, with the intent to conceal an abortion from the parents of an unemancipated minor, procure an abortion or procure drugs necessary for an abortion for a minor. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports the rights of parents to direct the upbringing of their children, supports efforts to increase parental rights and place restrictions on the practice of abortion, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 58-11 and the bill later became law.

H 259 Preventing Vote Fraud by Improving the Absentee Ballot Application Process.

This bill makes it illegal to provide a person with an absentee ballot application without that person first asking for one. CPAC opposes the sending out of unsolicited absentee ballot applications and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 17, 2023 by a vote of 47-22 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

H 265 Prohibiting the Usage of Public Property for Sexual Exhibitions.

This bill prohibits the state from using its property, funds and/or assets for the purpose of putting on a sexual exhibition. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the state from using precious taxpayer resources for lewd activities and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 7, 2023 by a vote of 48-21 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.

H 274 No TikTok on Government Devices in Idaho.

This bill prohibits public employees from downloading TikTok onto government devices and from accessing TikTok's website through government devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 8, 2023 by a vote of 67-3 and the bill later became law.

H 276 Continuing to Fund Obsolete Public Television.

This bill funds Idaho Public Television for FY 2024. CPAC opposes using taxpayer resources to fund public television services and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 9, 2023 by a vote of 47-22 and the bill later became law.

H 295 Second Amendment Financial Privacy Act in Idaho.

This bill prohibits the government from maintaining a registry of those who have purchased and own a gun. The bill also prohibits payment networks from discriminating against firearms retailers in certain ways. For example, the network may not decline a card transaction based solely on the assignment or non-assignment of a firearms code to the retailer. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, supports efforts to diminish the government's surveillance of lawful gun owners, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 65-4 and the bill later became law.



H 314 No Porn for Minors in Idahoan Public School Libraries.

This bill prohibits schools from making literature that is harmful to minors available to students. Such material includes those that depict sadomasochistic and sexual conduct. CPAC supports efforts to prevent the indoctrination of minors into the radical Left's woke beliefs about gender and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 31, 2023 by a vote of 42-26 but the bill was vetoed by the Governor.

S 1030 Ensuring the Enforcement of Federal Immigration Laws.

This bill prohibits government entities from adopting policies that interfere with the enforcement of federal immigration laws. CPAC supports efforts to ensure that federal immigration laws are properly followed and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 31, 2023 by a vote of 53-10 and the bill later became law.

S 1100 Protecting the Privacy of Intimate Spaces in Idaho.

This bill requires that all public school locker rooms and restrooms be designated as being exclusively for the members of one particular sex. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and private environment in school locker rooms and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on March 16, 2023 by a vote of 59-10 and the bill later became law.

S 1169 Wasting Taxpayer Resources by Continuing to Fund Idaho's Commission on the Arts.

This bill appropriates funds to Idaho's Commission on the Arts for FY 2024. This Commission exists to provide grants and other forms of support to artists and organizations in order to promote the cultural environment of Idaho. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to fund cultural endeavors and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 22, 2023 by a vote of 51-19 and the bill later became law.

S 1178 Providing for Racially Discriminatory Bureaucracies.

This bill appropriates funds to Idaho's "Commission on Hispanic Affairs." CPAC does not believe that there should exist bureaucracies within the government that seek to privilege certain government-favored racial groups and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 24, 2023 by a vote of 45-16 and the bill later became law.
