ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

ANNUAL METRICS







To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)













REPUBLICAN AVERAGE 64%






DEMOCRAT AVERAGE 19%

- HB 2864 Expanding Access to Emergency Medical Services in Rural Regions by Reducing Unnecessary

ILLINOIS SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SJRCA 11 Empowering Union Bosses by Inserting a "Fundamental Right" to Collective Bargaining in the Constitution. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes enriching union bosses at the expense of consumers and taxpayers and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on May 21, 2021 by a vote of 49-7. (The proposed amendment will appear on the November 2022 election ballot for approval by voters.)
- 2. HB 14 Reducing Unnecessary Occupational Licensing Barriers for Reformed Individuals with Prior Criminal Convictions. ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. ACU opposes the proliferation of licensing requirements which are primarily designed to restrict competition, supports efforts to lower recidivism by reducing barriers to the workforce and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 29, 2021 by a vote of 59-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 3. HB 25 Providing "Free" Legal Representation to Illegal Immigrants. ACU supports assisting the federal government in its constitutional role to enforce our nation's immigration laws, opposes forcing taxpayers to pay the legal costs of individuals residing in the country unlawfully and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 39-16. (The Senate passed an amended version of the bill and the differences were not reconciled in conference committee.)
- 4. SB 104 Expanding Consumer Choice Through an Extension of To-Go Cocktails and Alcoholic Beverages. ACU supports expanding consumer choice through a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry, supports fostering economic growth by eliminating unnecessary, anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 57-1 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. HB 119 Reducing Prescription Drug Costs by Allowing Donation of Unused Medications. ACU supports this effort to reduce prescription drug and health care costs and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 57-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 6. SB 166 Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Expanding Racial Discrimination in the Government Procurement Process. ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, believes it is the duty of government to ensure all law are applied equally, opposes driving up taxpayer costs by awarding projects based on racial discrimination and opposed this bill. The Senate gave final approval to the bill on June 1, 2021 by a vote of 36-17 and the bill was signed into law.
- 7. SB 317 Expanding Cronyism by Making More Entities Eligible for Taxpayer-Funded Tourism Grants. A recent study conducted by the ACU found significant waste already occurring within the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to engage in tourism promotion, opposes the further waste of taxpayer funds, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 29, 2021 by a vote of 54-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. SB 525 Increasing Taxpayer Costs and Empowering Union Bosses Through the Reclassification of State Employees. ACU opposes unnecessarily increasing taxpayer costs and further empowering greedy union bosses and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 29, 2021 by a vote of 44-11 and the bill was signed into law.
- 9. SB 536 Infringing Free Political Speech Through Donor Disclosure Mandates. Omnibus elections bill. ACU supports the Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United v. FEC, supports free political speech as protected under the First Amendment, opposes subjecting PACs and other organizations to harassment through additional disclosure mandates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 28, 2021 by a vote of 41-17 and the bill was signed into law.




- 10. HB 633 Strengthening Property Rights by Ensuring Individuals Are Able to Grow Vegetables on their Private Property. ACU recognizes that the person is the fundamental unit of government, that the two other levels of government recognized in the U.S. Constitution are the states and federal government, and that cities and municipalities merely derive their authority from the other levels of government. ACU supports protecting property rights from being infringed at all levels of government, supports this measure to combat government overreach and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 46-9 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 667 Weakening National Security by Blocking Enforcement of Federal Immigration Law and Closing All Immigrant Detention Centers. This bill prohibits law enforcement officials from inquiring about or investigating anyone's immigration status or place of birth of anyone in custody unless presented with a federal criminal warrant. ACU opposes the state's sanctuary city status, supports assisting the federal government in its constitutional role to enforce our nation's immigration laws and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 28, 2021 by a vote of 36-19 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. SB 817 Imposing New Mandates on Private Schools Concerning "Protective Hairstyles." ACU recognizes that for centuries schools have instituted uniform, grooming and professional standards to reduce peer pressure and improve learning environments. ACU opposes this government intrusion into the dress code policies of private schools and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 41-12 and the bill was signed into law.
- 13. SB 825 Weakening Election Integrity Through a Permanent Vote-By-Mail Registry Scheme and Establishing Polling Locations at Jails. ACU opposes weakening election integrity by removing safeguards protecting against voter fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 41-18 and the bill was signed into law.
- 14. HB 1092 Seizing Firearms without Due Process by Worsening the State's "Red Flag" Confiscation Law. ACU opposes this and other so-called "red flag" measures, supports the founders' belief in both in the Second Amendment and due process under the law and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 33-19 and the bill was signed into law.
- 15. SB 1365 Maintaining High Health Care Costs by Preserving Obamacare. ACU has long opposed Obamacare, which has sent health care costs skyrocketing, opposes its mandates which prevent individuals from obtaining more affordable health care by selecting the plan that best fits their needs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 58-0. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 16. SB 1596 Further Advancing Unequal Justice Under the Law by Adding "Immigration Status" to the State's Hate Crime Statute. ACU recognizes this measure further violates the "double-jeopardy" clause of the U.S. Constitution, opposes increasing penalties for crimes committed against select individuals which runs afoul of the whole concept of equal application of justice and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 58-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 17. HB 1745 Increasing Health Insurance Costs Through New Mandates on Policies Offering Prescription Drug Copayments. ACU opposes health insurance mandates which increase the cost of health insurance for everyone and prevent individuals from choosing the coverages that best suit their needs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 57-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 18. HB 1769 Expanding Cronyism Through Special Tax Breaks for the Electric Vehicle Industry. ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages and benefits to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens to other taxpayers not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 28, 2021 by a vote of 55-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. SB 1846 Dictating Children's Beverage Offerings in the Restaurant Industry. ACU opposes this attack on parental rights and this needless new regulatory burden on restaurants and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 39-16 and the bill was signed into law.



- 20. HB 1871 Further Weakening Election Security Through the Expansion of Drop Boxes and Mail-in Voting. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as in-person voting are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 25, 2021 by a vote of 48-7 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. SB 2408 Imposing a Cataclysmic "Green New Deal" Climate Package. ACU opposes this skinny "Green New Deal" and the devastating impact the bill will have on energy and consumer costs, not to mention the measure's enormous cost to taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 13, 2021 by a vote of 37-17 and the bill was signed into law.
- 22. SB 2444 Enriching Developers of "Affordable" Housing by Extending the State's Crony Tax Credit Program. ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches developers of "affordable" housing while shifting tax burdens to other industries and individuals not favored by government. ACU believes the best way to make housing truly "affordable" is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 56-0. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 23. HB 2521 Empowering Union Bosses by Prohibiting Employers from Terminating Workers on Strike. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes holding businesses hostage to the demands of greedy union bosses and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 40-15 and the bill was signed into law.
- 24. HB 2864 Expanding Access to Emergency Medical Services in Rural Regions by Reducing Unnecessary Regulations. ACU supports increasing access to emergency medical services by reducing excessive government regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 57-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 25. HB 3100 Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Forcing Government Employees to Receive "Implicit Bias" Training. ACU believes all government work environments should be safe and respectful, and employees held to high standards. ACU opposes enriching Leftist providers of "implicit bias" training services, which sow division and disrupt employee work and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 38-17 and the bill was signed into law.
- 26. HB 3714 Establishing an Excessive Fire Sprinkler Contractor and Inspector Licensing Regime. ACU opposes this excessive licensure mandate which restricts competition and drives up consumer costs which in some cases may reduce safety by causing consumers to put off needed installations and repairs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 41-15 and the bill was signed into law.
- 27. HB 3940 Invoking Government Interference in Private Automobile Dealer and Manufacturer Franchise Agreements. ACU recognizes the costs of these mandates are ultimately passed onto consumers through higher vehicle prices and weaker warranties. ACU supports the freedom to contract, opposes measures which invoke government interference in private franchise or contract agreements to benefit select parties (in this case dealers), and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 58-0 and the bill was signed into law.



ILLINOIS HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. HB 7 Establishing a Commission to Increase School District Efficiency. ACU supports efforts to reduce costs and improve educational outcomes by making public schools more responsive to the needs of students rather than the teacher's unions and supported this bill. The House defeated the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 42-55. (A "yes" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 2. HB 9 Advancing Frivolous Litigation by Permitting Alterations of Gender on Birth Certificates Based Solely on "Identity." ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, and that all individuals should be treated with the utmost dignity and respect. ACU opposes ploys by the Left to fundamentally change women's sports and subject businesses to lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 66-45. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 3. SJRCA 11 Empowering Union Bosses by Inserting a "Fundamental Right" to Collective Bargaining in the Constitution. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes enriching union bosses at the expense of consumers and taxpayers and opposed this resolution. The House passed the resolution on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 80-30. (The proposed amendment will appear on the November 2022 election ballot for approval by voters.)
- 4. HB 14 Reducing Unnecessary Occupational Licensing Barriers for Reformed Individuals with Prior Criminal Convictions. ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. ACU opposes the proliferation of licensing requirements which are primarily designed to restrict competition, supports efforts to lower recidivism by reducing barriers to the workforce and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 110-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. HJR 16 Supporting Expanding Democratic Political Power Through DC Statehood. ACU recognizes DC Statehood is purely a political measure to shift the balance of power in Congress by granting a heavily liberal region three new members. ACU negatively scored DC statehood in our 1993 Ratings of Congress and continues to oppose the political maneuver to empower leftist politicians and opposed this resolution. The House passed the resolution on May 5, 2021 by a vote of 71-42. (The resolution failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 6. HB 25 Providing "Free" Legal Representation to Illegal Immigrants. ACU supports assisting the federal government in its constitutional role to enforce our nation's immigration laws, opposes forcing taxpayers to pay the legal costs of individuals residing in the country unlawfully and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 16, 2021 by a vote of 82-25. (The Senate passed an amended version of the bill and the differences were not reconciled in conference committee.)
- 7. HR 39 Attacking Parental Rights by Advocating a "Right" to Sex Education. ACU supports strong parental rights, opposes Leftist attempts to bypass parents and indoctrinate children on sensitive issues and opposed this resolution. The House adopted the resolution on April 28, 2021 by a vote of 64-44.
- 8. HB 93 Exposing Realtors to Frivolous Litigation Through Overly Broad Mandates Pertaining to Discrimination. ACU believes discrimination is wrong and business that discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. However, ACU opposes this measure's open-ended provisions which expose realtors to frivolous claims of discrimination and are primarily designed to enrich plaintiffs' attorneys and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 77-25. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 9. SB 104 Expanding Consumer Choice Through an Extension of To-Go Cocktails and Alcoholic Beverages. ACU supports expanding consumer choice through a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry, supports fostering economic growth by eliminating unnecessary, anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 108-6 and the bill was signed into law.



- 10. HB 119 Reducing Prescription Drug Costs by Allowing Donation of Unused Medications. ACU supports this effort to reduce prescription drug and health care costs and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 114-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 166 Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Expanding Racial Discrimination in the Government Procurement Process. ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, believes it is the duty of government to ensure all law are applied equally, opposes driving up taxpayer costs by awarding projects based on racial discrimination and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 73-42 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. HR 215 Urging Biden and Congress to Adopt Open Border-Esque Immigration Policies. ACU opposes decimating national security and growing the welfare state through the promotion of open border immigration policies and opposed this resolution. The House adopted the resolution on May 6, 2021 by a vote of 63-43.
- 13. HR 293 Urging the Covernor to Sign a Multi-State Agreement Advancing 100% Zero-Emission Vehicle Sales by 2050. ACU supports all vehicle propulsion systems and believes the free market and private sector is the best institution to expand electrification. ACU opposes the Left's quest to eliminate consumer choice and dictate the offerings of automotive manufacturers and opposed this resolution. The House adopted the resolution on May 29, 2021 by a vote of 68-39.
- 14. SB 317 Expanding Cronyism by Making More Entities Eligible for Taxpayer-Funded Tourism Grants. A recent study conducted by the ACU found significant waste already occurring within the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to engage in tourism promotion, opposes the further waste of taxpayer funds, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 117-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 15. HB 347 Infringing Privacy Rights by Requiring Healthcare Providers to Report Vaccine Information to the Government. ACU opposes this clear attack on privacy rights (which may have the unintended consequence of reducing vaccinations) and further growing the government surveillance state and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 62-41. (The Senate passed an amended version on April 8, 2022.)
- 16. SB 525 Increasing Taxpayer Costs and Empowering Union Bosses Through the Reclassification of State Employees. ACU opposes unnecessarily increasing taxpayer costs and further empowering greedy union bosses and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 20, 2021 by a vote of 76-39 and the bill was signed into law.
- 17. SB 536 Infringing Free Political Speech Through Donor Disclosure Mandates. Omnibus elections bill. ACU supports the Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United v. FEC, supports free political speech as protected under the First Amendment, opposes subjecting PACs and other organizations to harassment through additional disclosure mandates and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on October 28, 2021 by a vote of 72-42 and the bill was signed into law.
- 18. HB 633 Strengthening Property Rights by Ensuring Individuals Are Able to Grow Vegetables on their Private Property. ACU recognizes that the person is the fundamental unit of government, that the two other levels of government recognized in the U.S. Constitution are the states and federal government, and that cities and municipalities merely derive their authority from the other levels of government. ACU supports protecting property rights from being infringed at all levels of government, supports this measure to combat government overreach and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 92-24 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. SB 667 Weakening National Security by Blocking Enforcement of Federal Immigration Law and Closing All Immigrant Detention Centers. This bill prohibits law enforcement officials from inquiring about or investigating anyone's immigration status or place of birth of anyone in custody unless presented with a federal criminal warrant. ACU opposes the state's sanctuary city status, supports assisting the federal government in its constitutional role to enforce our nation's immigration laws and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 68-47 and the bill was signed into law.



- 20. SB 817 Imposing New Mandates on Private Schools Concerning "Protective Hairstyles." ACU recognizes that for centuries schools have instituted uniform, grooming and professional standards to reduce peer pressure and improve learning environments. ACU opposes this government intrusion into the dress code policies of private schools and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 89-22 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. SB 825 Weakening Election Integrity Through a Permanent Vote-By-Mail Registry Scheme and Establishing Polling Locations at Jails. ACU opposes weakening election integrity by removing safeguards protecting against voter fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 31, 2021 by a vote of 72-46 and the bill was signed into law.
- 22. HB 1092 Seizing Firearms without Due Process by Worsening the State's "Red Flag" Confiscation Law. ACU opposes this and other so-called "red flag" measures, supports the founders' belief in both in the Second Amendment and due process under the law and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 61-47 and the bill was signed into law.
- 23. HB 1160 Further Empowering the Bosses of the Chicago Teacher's Union by Eliminating the 3/4th Vote to Strike Requirement. ACU opposes further empowering the greedy union bosses of the Chicago Teacher's Union (CTU) to reduce educational quality and substantially raise taxpayer costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 23, 2021 by a vote of 67-42. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 24. SB 1596 Further Advancing Unequal Justice Under the Law by Adding "Immigration Status" to the State's Hate Crime Statute. ACU recognizes this measure further violates the "double-jeopardy" clause of the U.S. Constitution, opposes increasing penalties for crimes committed against select individuals which runs afoul of the whole concept of equal application of justice and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 116-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 25. SB 1730 Forcing Private Businesses to Report the Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity of their Board of Directors. ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, vehemently opposes discrimination and believes those who discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes this measure which is designed to harass companies and foster discrimination based on sexual and gender identity and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 20, 2021 by a vote of 69-43 and the bill was signed into law.
- 26. HB 1745 Increasing Health Insurance Costs Through New Mandates on Policies Offering Prescription Drug Copayments. ACU opposes health insurance mandates which increase the cost of health insurance for everyone and prevent individuals from choosing the coverages that best suit their needs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 117-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 27. HB 1769 Expanding Cronyism Through Special Tax Breaks for the Electric Vehicle Industry. ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages and benefits to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens to other taxpayers not favored by government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on October 28, 2021 by a vote of 110-2 and the bill was signed into law.
- 28. SB 1846 Dictating Children's Beverage Offerings in the Restaurant Industry. ACU opposes this attack on parental rights and this needless new regulatory burden on restaurants and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 86-28 and the bill was signed into law.
- 29. HB 1871 Further Weakening Election Security Through the Expansion of Drop Boxes and Mail-in Voting. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as in-person voting are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 70-41 and the bill was signed into law.



- 30. SB 2408 Imposing a Cataclysmic "Green New Deal" Climate Package. ACU opposes this skinny "Green New Deal" and the devastating impact the bill will have on energy and consumer costs, not to mention the measure's enormous cost to taxpayers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on September 9, 2021 by a vote of 83-33 and the bill was signed into law.
- 31. HB 2521 Empowering Union Bosses by Prohibiting Employers from Terminating Workers on Strike. ACU has long supported the "right to work" without joining a union, opposes holding businesses hostage to the demands of greedy union bosses and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 71-43 and the bill was signed into law.
- 32. HB 2622 Exposing Businesses to Frivolous Litigation Surrounding Employee Terminations Due to Work Absences. ACU supports the right of employees and employers to freely contracts and opposes this measure which subjects businesses to frivolous litigation and opposes this bill. The House passed the bill on April 20, 2021 by a vote of 65-44. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 33. HB 2775 Infringing Property Rights by Mandating Landlord Acceptance of Government Welfare Vouchers. ACU opposes subjecting property owners to lawsuit abuse, opposes this mandate which forces them to participate in programs such as Section 8, which require additional property inspections and limit a property owner's ability to recover compensation for damages to property, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 62-48. (An amended version of the bill was passed by both chambers in 2022 and signed into law.)
- 34. HB 2789 Providing Health Department Bureaucrats Unchecked Powers to Shutdown Schools and Impose Mandates. ACU opposes exiling students to unproductive learning environments, supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 70-42. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 35. HB 2864 Expanding Access to Emergency Medical Services in Rural Regions by Reducing Unnecessary Regulations. ACU supports increasing access to emergency medical services by reducing excessive government regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 115-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 36. HB 2943 Expanding the Nanny State to Regulate "Loot Boxes" in Video Games. ACU opposes further expanding the government nanny state and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 72-45. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 37. HB 3100 Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Forcing Government Employees to Receive "Implicit Bias" Training. ACU believes all government work environments should be safe and respectful, and employees held to high standards. ACU opposes enriching Leftist providers of "implicit bias" training services, which sow division and disrupt employee work and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 30, 2021 by a vote of 77-36 and the bill was signed into law.
- 38. HB 3107 Enriching Government-Favored Developers by Doubling the Affordable Housing Tax Credit Program. ACU believes the free-market is the best mechanism to direct housing investment and supports making housing truly "affordable" by eliminating unnecessary government zoning and land use regulations. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches government-favored housing developers (who heavily lobbied for this bill) while socializing the costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 110-0. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 39. HB 3452 Prohibiting Landlords from Charging Application Fees to Welfare Recipients. ACU opposes this government intrusion into the private sector and foisting these regulatory costs onto the backs of landlords and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 15, 2021 by a vote of 70-43. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)



- 40. HB 3520 Lowering Business Costs by Combatting Fraud within the Unemployment Insurance System. ACU supports reducing business costs and increasing employment through measures that reduce fraud within the unemployment insurance system and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2021 by a vote of 113-0. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 41. HB 3714 Establishing an Excessive Fire Sprinkler Contractor and Inspector Licensing Regime. ACU opposes this excessive licensure mandate which restricts competition and drives up consumer costs which in some cases may reduce safety by causing consumers to put off needed installations and repairs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 78-33 and the bill was signed into law.
- 42. HB 3940 Invoking Government Interference in Private Automobile Dealer and Manufacturer Franchise Agreements. ACU recognizes the costs of these mandates are ultimately passed onto consumers through higher vehicle prices and weaker warranties. ACU supports the freedom to contract, opposes measures which invoke government interference in private franchise or contract agreements to benefit select parties (in this case dealers), and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 85-24 and the bill was signed into law.
