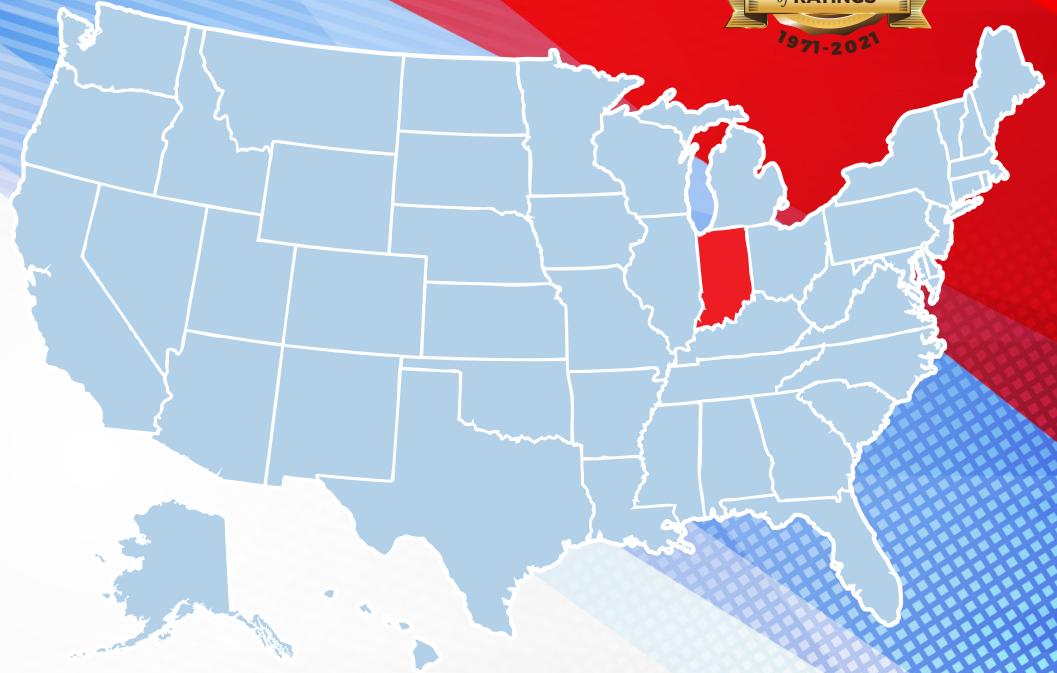

ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

ACUF's Center for Legislative Accountability researches and selects a range of bills to evaluate a member's adherence to conservative principles. We begin by defining conservatism (i.e., the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person). Next, we apply our understanding of the proper role of government (i.e., protecting Life, Liberty and Property). Then, we select bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) fiscal and economic: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) social and cultural: Second Amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) national security: preserving our nation's security by maintaining a strong national defense. The wide range of issues covered are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment of how Members of Congress view the role of government in an individual's life.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)

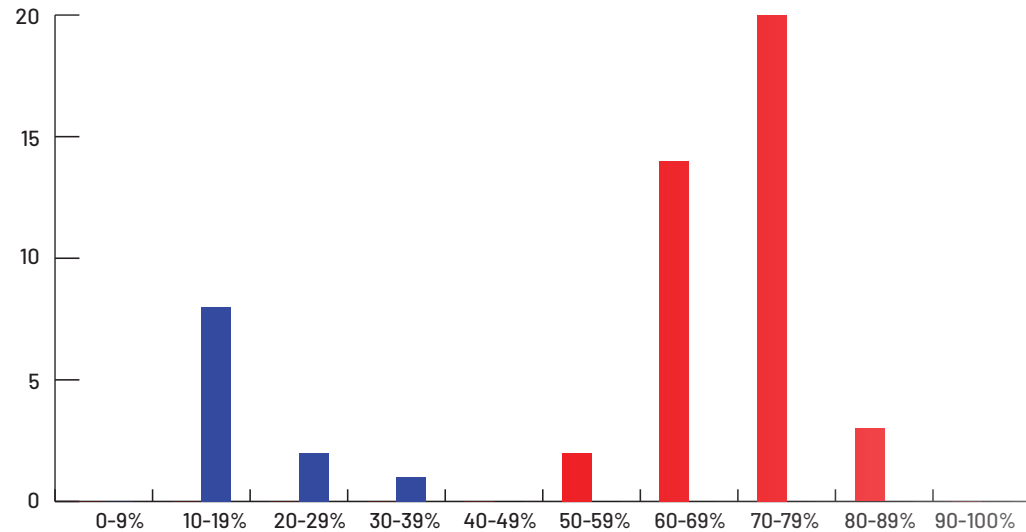

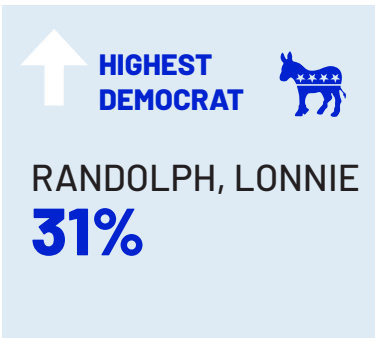
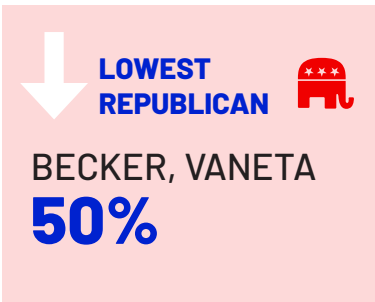

- 1. SB 1 SS (Yoder Amd. 17) Taking the Lives of the Unborn by Authorizing Abortion Prescriptions via Telehealth.** The Yoder (ACUF Lifetime 21%) amendment #17 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 10-37.
- 2. SB 1 SS (Pol Jr. Amd. 29) Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding the State's Housing First Welfare Program to Cover Pregnancy and One Year Postpartum.** The Pol Jr. (ACUF Lifetime 12%) amendment #29 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives by encouraging them to become more self-sufficient, opposes this measure which further increases government dependency and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 10-36.
- 3. SB 1 SS (Lanane Amd. 35) Taking the Lives of the Unborn by Extending Abortion Under SB 1 to 20 Weeks.** The Lanane (ACUF Lifetime 18%) amendment #35 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 13-33.
- 4. SB 1 SS (Melton Amd. 39) Authorizing Abortion Until the Moment of Birth by Exploiting the Principle of Religious Freedom.** The Melton (ACUF Lifetime 19%) amendment #39 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy and supports restrictions on the practice, opposes this attempt to pervert the principle of religious freedom to advance a radical leftist anti-life agenda and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 12-33.
- 5. SB 1 SS (Breux Amd. 50) Increasing Health Insurance Premiums by Mandating Coverage for Doula Services.** The Breux (ACUF Lifetime 17%) amendment #50 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU opposes health insurance mandates which ultimately drive up the cost of health insurance for everyone by preventing individuals from obtaining the policies that best suit their needs and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 12-35.
- 6. SB 1 SS Protecting Life by Strengthening Abortion Restrictions.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on August 5, 2022 by a vote of 28-19 and the bill was signed into law.
- 7. SCR 2 Urging Congress to Prevent the Expansion of the Supreme Court.** ACU opposes the Left's calls to pack the Supreme Court in order to "legislate from the bench" and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the concurrent resolution on January 18, 2022 by a vote of 37-10. (The resolution was not taken up in the House.)
- 8. SB 83 Strengthening Government Integrity by Ensuring Public Comment at School Board Meetings.** ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability by ensuring the public is provided an opportunity to voice their concerns regarding local school operations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 39-11 and the bill was signed into law.
- 9. SB 88 Further Regulating and Distorting the Pharmaceutical Market Through New Price Controls on Pharmacy Benefit Managers.** ACU recognizes the infinite number of government regulations imposed within the pharmaceutical industry on insurers, manufacturers and PBMs have restricted competition and led to skyrocketing consumer costs. ACU believes government should instead drastically reduce regulations and make enormous reforms within the FDA to reduce pharmaceutical costs and expand life-saving drugs. ACU opposes further driving up costs and reducing supply through even greater government regulation and central planning of healthcare and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 31, 2022 by a vote of 31-18. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)



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10. **SB 111 Reducing Equine Dentistry Costs by Providing a Licensing Exemption to Individuals Performing Horse “Teeth Floating”.** ACU supports improving and expanding animal healthcare by reducing unnecessary regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 25, 2022 by a vote of 37-9. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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11. **SB 119 Socializing the Costs of New Agricultural Equipment and Facilities by Authorizing an Additional Local Tax Abatement Scheme.** ACU supports free markets and a broadly applied tax code with the lowest possible rates for all individuals and companies. ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages to select companies and individuals while shifting tax burdens to other individuals and industries not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 24, 2022 by a vote of 47-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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12. **SB 133 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Authorizing Localities to Establish “Outdoor Refreshment Areas” for Alcoholic Beverage Consumption.** ACU supports expanding individual liberties and business growth by reducing unnecessary regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 42-7. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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13. **SB 134 Strengthening Government Integrity by Prohibiting Private Funding of Elections and Reporting of State Employees whose Salaries are Funded Through Donated Funds.** ACU recognizes this bill is in response to individuals such as Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg who in the 2020 election channeled over \$400 million through his nonprofits to influence the operations of local election offices. ACU supports strengthening government integrity by ensuring elections and other government functions are not tainted by outside interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 3, 2022 by a vote of 43-4 and the bill was signed into law.
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14. **SB 136 Invoking Greater Government Interference in the Dental Industry by Infringing the Contracting Rights of Insurers and Dentists.** ACU opposes further expanding the government regulatory state in order to provide more favorable outcomes in the negotiations and contracting agreements of one party over another and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 47-1 and the bill was signed into law.
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15. **SB 139 Strengthening Property Rights by Prohibiting Localities from Imposing Additional Regulations on Mobile Homes within Trailer Parks.** ACU opposes driving up housing costs by imposing additional unnecessary regulations on mobile homes and manufactured housing, supports strengthening property rights, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 35-11 and the bill was signed into law.
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16. **SB 143 Strengthening Self Defense by Clarifying “Pointing a Firearm” is a “Reasonable Force” to Prevent an Unlawful Trespass or Hijacking.** ACU supports strengthening the right of self-defense, supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 40-9. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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17. **SB 165 Increasing Public Safety by Authorizing the AG to Appoint Special Prosecutors if Local Prosecutors Categorically Fail to Prosecute Crime.** ACU opposes prosecutors (oftentimes funded by George Soros) using their offices to make political statements, supports strengthening government accountability to improve public safety and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 37-11. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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18. **SB 179 Placing Additional Financial Burdens on Motorists by Implementing Speed Camera Programs in Work Zones.** ACU opposes all automated traffic citation systems and the state’s continued expansion of their usage, has serious concerns over the use of these systems to grow the government surveillance state and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 35-14. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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- 19. SB 245 Socializing the Costs of Sporting Events by Authorizing a New “Bid Fund” and Taxpayer Funding via the Indiana Sports Corporation.** ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to fund sporting events and believes low tax rates and the free market is the best mechanism to attract investment as opposed to this bill's central planning scheme. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches select companies and sports teams while socializing the costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 47-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 20. SB 262 Socializing Housing Costs and Enriching Developers Through the Creation of an “Affordable and Workforce Housing Tax Credit” Program.** ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU has long opposed this same scheme at the federal level known as the Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program which enriches government-favored developers while shifting tax burdens to other property owners and taxpayers not favored by government. ACU believes the best way to make housing truly “affordable” is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 24, 2022 by a vote of 47-0. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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- 21. SB 288 Strengthening Property Rights by Providing Landowners Greater Ability to Challenge Eminent Domain Proceedings Involving Public Utilities and Pipelines.** ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect property rights and combat abuse of eminent domain. ACU supports efforts to strengthen property rights, believes eminent domain should only be used for public purposes and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 43-6. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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- 22. SB 297 Ensuring School Employees are Made Aware of Their “Right to Work” Without Joining a Union.** ACU has long supported the “right to work” without being forced to join a union, opposes the power of greedy union bosses to hold children's education hostage and hike taxpayer costs and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 37-12 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 23. SB 343 Protecting the Agritourism Industry from Frivolous Litigation by Expanding the List of Activities Protected from Legal Liability.** ACU supports expanding agritourism by protecting property owners and companies from frivolous litigation being advanced by greedy plaintiffs' attorneys and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 47-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 24. SB 352 Increasing Borrowing and Lending Opportunities by Increasing the State's Price Control on Certain Consumer Loans from 25% to 36%.** ACU supports protecting borrowers from fraud and the freedom of borrowers to know the terms of their loans. ACU opposes the state's stringent price controls on lending which infringe the right of borrowers and lenders to freely contract and limit the free market but supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 27-22. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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- 25. SB 356 Combatting Teacher Shortages Through the Creation of Part-Time Teaching Permits.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes by providing schools the ability to hire the most qualified and best-performing teachers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 39-11 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 26. SB 361 Worsening Cronyism Under the Indiana Economic Development Corporation by Eliminating Caps and Expanding Special-Interest Tax Break Schemes.** ACU supports a broadly applied tax-code with as low of rates as possible for everyone and believes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment. ACU opposes this government central planning scheme which provides competitive advantages to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens onto other individuals and companies not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 50-0 and the bill later became law.
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- 27. SB 407 Reducing Taxpayer Medicaid Costs Through the Transition to a Risk-Based Managed Care System.** ACU recognizes the transition from the existing “fee-for-service” based model will remove the incentivize for healthcare providers to inflate costs. ACU supports efforts to reform the Medicaid system and reduce taxpayer costs and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 1, 2022 by a vote of 47-2. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
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- 28. HB 1041 Protecting Women’s Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex.** ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The Senate voted to override the governor’s veto of the bill on May 24, 2022 by a vote of 32-15 and the bill later became law.
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- 29. HB 1106 Strengthening Property Rights by Providing Greater Oversight of Eminent Domain and Requiring Property Owners to be Compensated at 120% Market Value.** ACUF’s Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to combat policies that abuse eminent domain and undermine the founders’ belief in strong property rights. ACU supports efforts to strengthen property rights, believes eminent domain should only be used for public purposes and supported this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 19-31.
-
- 30. HB 1116 Strengthening Election Integrity by Requiring a Driver’s License or Social to Request an Online Absentee Ballot and Expediting Paper Ballots Requirements.** ACUF’s Center to Protect Voters and their Voices is a leader in rebuilding the safeguards of our election systems and ensuring that each legal vote count once and only once. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as ID and paper ballot requirements are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and combat vote fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 35-10 and the bill was signed into law.
-
- 31. HB 1140 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Post-Partum Medicaid Income Eligibility and Coverage from 60 Days to 12 Months.** ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes efforts that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty, opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 49-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
- 32. HB 1190 Strengthening Free Speech Protections by Ensuring Colleges May Not Restrict Speech to Only Limited “Free Speech Zones” on Campus.** ACU supports the freedom of association and the freedom of speech as protected under the First Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 44-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
- 33. HB 1196 Infringing Private Contracting Rights of Homeowners Associations – Solar System Mandates.** ACUF’s Center for 21st Century Property Rights works to ensure individuals may freely choose an HOA and level of governance that create neighborhood standards they prefer. ACU opposes this infringement of the right to freely contract and opposes weakening HOAs which serve as free-market alternatives to zoning and other governmental central planning mechanisms and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2022 by a vote of 40-8 and the bill was signed into law.
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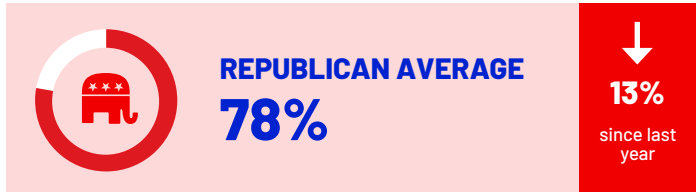
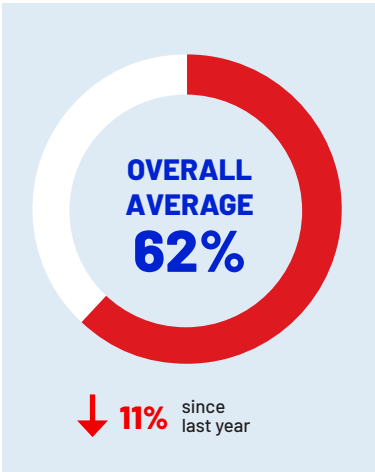
- 34. HB 1211 Strengthening Legislative Oversight by Requiring More Frequent Renewal of Regulations and Requiring the AG to Approve the Emergency Rules of State Agencies.** ACU supports this measure to strengthen legislative oversight and combat overreaching regulations imposed by unaccountable bureaucrats which infringe personal liberties and harm economic growth and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill March 8, 2022 by a vote of 31-19 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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- 35. HB 1217 Protecting Life and Pregnant Women by Criminalizing Coerced Abortions.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports efforts to protect women from coercive medical procedures and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 38-10 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 36. HB 1221 Socializing Electric Vehicle Costs by Authorizing Utility Cost Recovery Through Deployment of Charging Infrastructure.** ACU supports all forms of vehicle propulsion and believes the private sector and the free market is the best mechanism to direct deployment and investment as opposed to government central planning. ACU opposes this measure which enriches utility companies while socializing the costs onto all Indians through higher electricity costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 21, 2022 by a vote of 33-13 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 37. HB 1245 Strengthening Property Rights by Restricting the Ability of Localities to Impose Overreaching Septic and Sewer Ordinances.** ACU supports strengthening property rights and combatting government overreach at all levels of government and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 40-10 and the bill was signed into law.

- 38. HB 1248 Prohibiting Baby Animal Petting Events Through an Excessive Ban on Tiger and other “Big Cat” Public Contact.** ACU believes all animals should be treated with dignity and respect and believes animal abuse issues such as declawing should be addressed through targeted legislation. ACU opposes this overreaching mandate which comes at the expense of good actors and prevents families from experiencing memorable baby animal encounters and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 43-4 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 39. HB 1251 Implementing Education Reforms and Reducing K-12 Teacher Shortages by Allowing the Hiring of Adjunct Teachers Free from Collective Bargaining Agreements.** ACU supports providing the ability of local schools to hire the most qualified and effective educators, supports reducing taxpayer costs by undermining the collective bargaining process and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 9, 2022 by a vote of 33-17 and the bill was signed into law.

- 40. HB 1294 Protecting the Wellbeing of Incarcerated Pregnant Women and their Unborn Children Through New Guidelines on Restraints.** The ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect the dignity of incarcerated women. ACU supports this effort to ensure safe prison conditions to protect pregnant women and their unborn children from injury and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 46-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 41. HB 1296 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Enacting “Constitutional Carry” or the Carrying of a Firearm without a Special Permit.** ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 30-20 and the bill was signed into law.

- 42. HB 1298 Reducing Excessive and Anti-Competitive Regulations in the Alcoholic Beverage Industry and Making it Easier for Craft Producers to Sell their Products.** ACU supports a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry, supports expanding individual liberties and reforming anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 40-8 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 43. HB 1306 Reducing Housing Costs Through the Establishment of a Task Force to Review Restrictive Zoning, Land Use and Building Regulations.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen property rights and make housing more affordable by combatting overreaching zoning, land use and building imposed at both the state and local level and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 48-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 44. HB 1361 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Income and Asset Eligibility for TANF and Childcare Welfare Programs.** ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives by encouraging them to become more self-sufficient. ACU opposes this measure which further grows government dependency while expanding federal and state taxpayer burdens and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 45-3 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 45. HB 1410 Reducing Government Dependency by Strengthening Job Search Provisions Under the State's TANF Welfare Program.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen government integrity, as well as helping people live happier, healthier, more productive lives by obtaining employment and becoming less dependent on government and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 36-12 and the bill later became law.

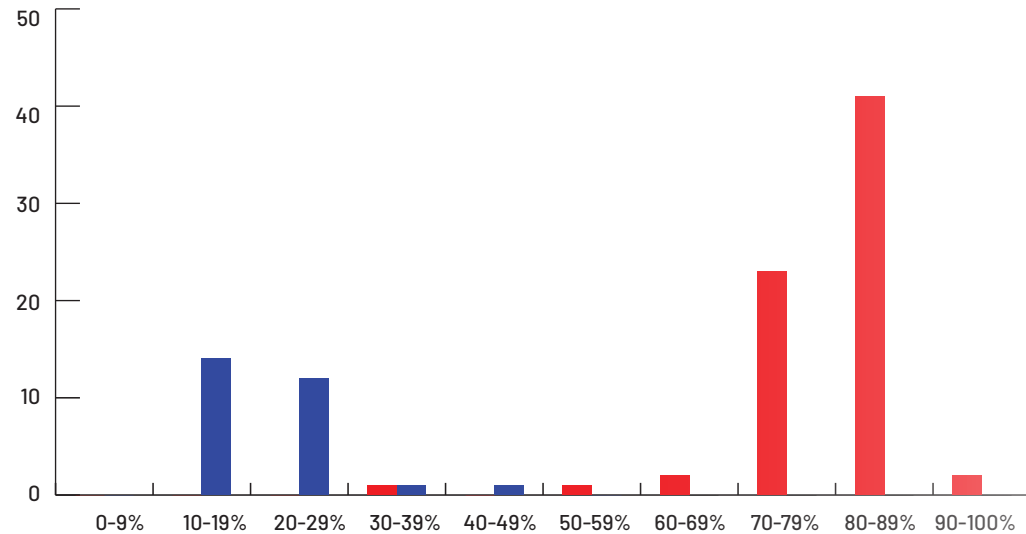
INDIANA HOUSE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

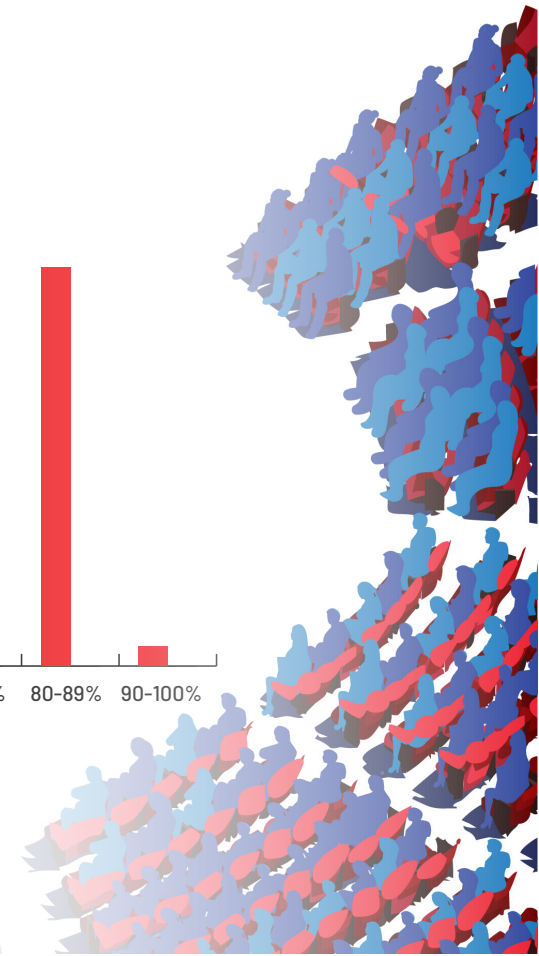
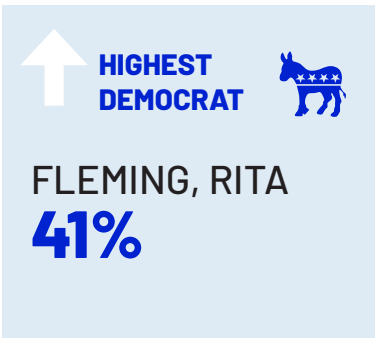
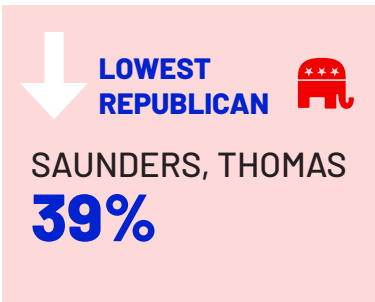

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INDIANA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SB 1 SS (Hatfield Amd. 57) Making it Harder to Revoke the Licenses of Doctors Performing Illegal Abortions.** The Hatfield (ACUF Lifetime 33%) amendment #57 to the abortion restriction bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on August 4, 2022 by a vote of 34-65.
- 2. SB 1 SS Protecting Life by Strengthening Abortion Restrictions.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on August 5, 2022 by a vote of 62-38 and the bill was signed into law.
- 3. SB 2 SS (Porter Amd. 32) Increasing Government Dependency by Mandating 80% Expenditure of TANF Welfare Funds.** The Porter (ACUF Lifetime 18%) amendment #32 to the tax and appropriations bill. ACU supports efforts that help individuals live happier, healthier, and more prosperous lives. ACU opposes further hiking welfare spending which increases government dependency, leading to intergenerational poverty, and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on August 4, 2022 by a vote of 24-63.
- 4. SB 83 Strengthening Government Integrity by Ensuring Public Comment at School Board Meetings.** ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability by ensuring the public is provided an opportunity to voice their concerns regarding local school operations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 93-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. SB 119 Socializing the Costs of New Agricultural Equipment and Facilities by Authorizing an Additional Local Tax Abatement Scheme.** ACU supports free markets and a broadly applied tax code with the lowest possible rates for all individuals and companies. ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages to select companies and individuals while shifting tax burdens to other individuals and industries not favored by government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 76-16 and the bill was signed into law.
- 6. SB 134 Strengthening Government Integrity by Prohibiting Private Funding of Elections and Reporting of State Employees whose Salaries are Funded Through Donated Funds.** ACU recognizes this bill is in response to individuals such as Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg who in the 2020 election channeled over \$400 million through his nonprofits to influence the operations of local election offices. ACU supports strengthening government integrity by ensuring elections and other government functions are not tainted by outside interests and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 67-25 and the bill was signed into law.
- 7. SB 136 Invoking Greater Government Interference in the Dental Industry by Infringing the Contracting Rights of Insurers and Dentists.** ACU opposes further expanding the government regulatory state in order to provide more favorable outcomes in the negotiations and contracting agreements of one party over another and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 21, 2022 by a vote of 93-4 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. SB 139 Strengthening Property Rights by Prohibiting Localities from Imposing Additional Regulations on Mobile Homes within Trailer Parks.** ACU opposes driving up housing costs by imposing additional unnecessary regulations on mobile homes and manufactured housing, supports strengthening property rights, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 82-3 and the bill was signed into law.
- 9. SB 245 Socializing the Costs of Sporting Events by Authorizing a New "Bid Fund" and Taxpayer Funding via the Indiana Sports Corporation.** ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to fund sporting events and believes low tax rates and the free market is the best mechanism to attract investment as opposed to this bill's central planning scheme. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches select companies and sports teams while socializing the costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 86-6 and the bill was signed into law.



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- 10. SB 297 Ensuring School Employees are Made Aware of Their “Right to Work” Without Joining a Union.** ACU has long supported the “right to work” without being forced to join a union, opposes the power of greedy union bosses to hold children’s education hostage and hike taxpayer costs and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 23, 2022 by a vote of 58-31 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 11. SB 343 Protecting the Agritourism Industry from Frivolous Litigation by Expanding the List of Activities Protected from Legal Liability.** ACU supports expanding agritourism by protecting property owners and companies from frivolous litigation being advanced by greedy plaintiffs’ attorneys and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 15, 2022 by a vote of 65-25 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 12. SB 356 Combatting Teacher Shortages Through the Creation of Part-Time Teaching Permits.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes by providing schools the ability to hire the most qualified and best-performing teachers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 64-30 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 13. SB 361 Worsening Cronyism Under the Indiana Economic Development Corporation by Eliminating Caps and Expanding Special-Interest Tax Break Schemes.** ACU supports a broadly applied tax-code with as low of rates as possible for everyone and believes the free market is the best mechanism to direct investment. ACU opposes this government central planning scheme which provides competitive advantages to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens onto other individuals and companies not favored by government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 70-22 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 14. HB 1001 SS (Summers Amd. 35) Enriching Leftist Activist Groups Under the Guise of Improving Mental Health Through the Creation of a New Grant Fund.** The Summers (ACUF Lifetime 20%) amendment #35 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU opposes this measure which includes provisions that foster government racial discrimination and is primarily designed to enrich Leftist organizations and activist groups and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 34-57.
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- 15. HB 1001 SS (Porter Amd. 46) Expanding Wealth Redistribution Through a Refundable Tax Credit of Up to \$5,000 for Each Child Born in 2022.** The Porter (ACUF Lifetime 18%) amendment #46 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU supports a broadly applied tax code with the lowest possible rates for all individuals and companies. ACU opposes the creation of yet another wealth redistribution scheme and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 28-62.
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- 16. HB 1001 SS (Porter Amd. 47) Diluting the Tax Base and Shifting Tax Burdens by Exempting Most Infant Products from the Sales Tax.** The Porter (ACUF Lifetime 18%) amendment #47 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU recognizes the need to reduce tax burdens, but further recognizes that any time a cut is applied only to particular products, that what necessarily follows are tax increases on other products to make up the difference. ACU opposes narrowly tailored tax carve-outs that ultimately shift tax burdens to other products and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 32-56.
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- 17. HB 1001 SS (Andrade Amd. 63) Attacking Pro-Life Pregnancy Centers by Mandating Presence of Physicians and RN’s During Their Operating Hours.** The Andrade (ACUF Lifetime 24%) amendment #63 to the tax and fiscal omnibus. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, opposes this attempt to block a pro-life pregnancy center from saving the lives of the unborn through a substantial and unnecessary new regulatory burden and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on July 28, 2022 by a vote of 37-52.
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- 18. HB 1002 (DeLaney Amd. 3) Socializing Higher Education Costs Through a New “Parental Tuition Reduction Fund”.** The DeLaney (ACUF Lifetime 22%) amendment #3 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU believes higher education subsidies represent one of the largest transfers of wealth by government, especially at the expense of individuals who chose to persuade the trades or start small businesses. ACU opposes further socializing higher education costs, which ultimately enriches university departments that serve to advance radical leftist and Marxist ideologies and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on January 18, 2022 by a vote of 26-60.
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- 19. HB 1002 (DeLaney Amd. 4) Blocking Scheduled Income Tax Reductions for Couples Earning \$300k and Above.** The Delaney (ACUF Lifetime 22%) amendment #4 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU supports expanding economic growth by establishing a tax code with the lowest possible rates for everyone, opposes this movement away from a flat tax which expands wealth redistribution and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on January 18, 2022 by a vote of 27-59.
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- 20. HB 1002 (Pryor Amd. 11) Expanding Wealth Redistribution by Hiking Payouts Under the State’s Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Welfare Program.** The Pryor (ACUF Lifetime 18%) amendment 11 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier lives by encouraging them to become self-sufficient, opposes expanding government dependency which oftentimes leads to intergeneration poverty and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on January 18, 2022 by a vote of 26-58.
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- 21. HB 1002 (Campbell Amd. 15) Socializing Childcare Costs Through a New \$10,000 Tax Deduction.** The Campbell (ACUF Lifetime 21%) amendment #15 to the omnibus tax bill. ACU supports a broadly applied tax-code with as low of rates as possible for everyone, opposes this manipulation which shifts tax burdens to other individuals, believes the best way to reduce childcare costs is by reducing unnecessary regulations and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on January 18, 2022 by a vote of 25-57.
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- 22. HB 1041 Protecting Women’s Athletics from Competition with Men by Basing K-12 Sports on Biological Sex.** ACU believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect and have the same opportunities under the law. ACU also recognizes that there are numerous standard classifications in sports (such as age, weight, etc.) to ensure fair competition. Therefore, ACU supports ensuring fair competition among teams competing across the state and supported this bill. The House voted to override the governor’s veto of the bill on May 24, 2022 by a vote of 67-28 and the bill later became law.
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- 23. HB 1063 Combatting Overreach by Government Bureaucrats by Preventing Courts from Providing Deference to Factual Determinations of State Agencies.** ACU supports this measure to reduce the advantage state regulatory agencies receive within the court system, while helping businesses and property owners combat the overreaching actions taken by government bureaucrats and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 20, 2022 by a vote of 74-17. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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- 24. HB 1072 Strengthening School Choice by Ensuring Charter Schools Receive a Portion of the Funding Authorized Through Voter-Approved Referendums.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes by responsibly expanding school choice and this measure which helps make taxpayers better aware of the total amount of their funds being directed to education and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 27, 2022 by a vote of 52-39. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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- 25. HB 1077 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Enacting “Constitutional Carry” or the Carrying of a Firearm without a Special Permit.** ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 11, 2022 by a vote of 64-29. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate but a different constitutional carry bill - HB 1296 - became law).
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- 26. HB 1100 Combatting Overregulation by Requiring State Agencies to Repeal an Existing Rule before Adopting a New One and Submit Economic Impact Statements.** ACU supports this effort to increase economic growth by eliminating unnecessary rules and shrinking the government regulatory state and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 27, 2022 by a vote of 61-29. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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- 27. HB 1106 Strengthening Property Rights by Providing Greater Oversight of Eminent Domain and Requiring Property Owners to be Compensated at 120% Market Value.** ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to combat policies that abuse eminent domain and undermine the founders' belief in strong property rights. ACU supports efforts to strengthen property rights, believes eminent domain should only be used for public purposes and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 71-19 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 28. HB 1116 Strengthening Election Integrity by Requiring a Driver's License or Social to Request an Online Absentee Ballot and Expediting Paper Ballots Requirements.** ACUF's Center to Protect Voters and their Voices is a leader in rebuilding the safeguards of our election systems and ensuring that each legal vote count once and only once. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as ID and paper ballot requirements are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and combat vote fraud and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 31, 2022 by a vote of 66-28 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 29. HB 1134 Combatting Critical Race Theory and Strengthening Parental Rights Through Curriculum Transparency.** ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU supports strengthening parental rights and increasing transparency within the education system, believes it is abhorrent to advance this indoctrination and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 26, 2022 by a vote of 60-37. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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- 30. HB 1140 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Post-Partum Medicaid Income Eligibility and Coverage from 60 Days to 12 Months.** ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes efforts that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty, opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 7, 2022 by a vote of 93-1 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 31. HB 1190 Strengthening Free Speech Protections by Ensuring Colleges May Not Restrict Speech to Only Limited "Free Speech Zones" on Campus.** ACU supports the freedom of association and the freedom of speech as protected under the First Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 3, 2022 by a vote of 92-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 32. HB 1196 Infringing Private Contracting Rights of Homeowners Associations – Solar System Mandates.** ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights works to ensure individuals may freely choose an HOA and level of governance that create neighborhood standards they prefer. ACU opposes this infringement of the right to freely contract and opposes weakening HOAs which serve as free-market alternatives to zoning and other governmental central planning mechanisms and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 1, 2022 by a vote of 84-7 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 33. HB 1211 Strengthening Legislative Oversight by Requiring More Frequent Renewal of Regulations and Requiring the AG to Approve the Emergency Rules of State Agencies.** ACU supports this measure to strengthen legislative oversight and combat overreaching regulations imposed by unaccountable bureaucrats which infringe personal liberties and harm economic growth and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 63-28 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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- 34. HB 1217 Protecting Life and Pregnant Women by Criminalizing Coerced Abortions.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports efforts to protect women from coercive medical procedures and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 25, 2022 by a vote of 73-18 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 35. HB 1221 Socializing Electric Vehicle Costs by Authorizing Utility Cost Recovery Through Deployment of Charging Infrastructure.** ACU supports all forms of vehicle propulsion and believes the private sector and the free market is the best mechanism to direct deployment and investment as opposed to government central planning. ACU opposes this measure which enriches utility companies while socializing the costs onto all Indians through higher electricity costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 66-25 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 36. HB 1245 Strengthening Property Rights by Restricting the Ability of Localities to Impose Overreaching Septic and Sewer Ordinances.** ACU supports strengthening property rights and combatting government overreach at all levels of government and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 70-27 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 37. HB 1248 Prohibiting Baby Animal Petting Events Through an Excessive Ban on Tiger and other “Big Cat” Public Contact.** ACU believes all animals should be treated with dignity and respect and believes animal abuse issues such as declawing should be addressed through targeted legislation. ACU opposes this overreaching mandate which comes at the expense of good actors and prevents families from experiencing memorable baby animal encounters and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 22, 2022 by a vote of 66-26 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 38. HB 1251 Implementing Education Reforms and Reducing K-12 Teacher Shortages by Allowing the Hiring of Adjunct Teachers Free from Collective Bargaining Agreements.** ACU supports providing the ability of local schools to hire the most qualified and effective educators, supports reducing taxpayer costs by undermining the collective bargaining process and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 70-28 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 39. HB 1269 Reducing Taxpayer Costs and Expanding Competition by Weakening Union Project Labor Agreements for State Design Build Projects.** ACU opposes project labor agreements, an anti-competitive scheme to enrich powerful union bosses, instead supports a free and open competitive bidding process for public works projects that provides the greatest value to taxpayers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 25, 2022 by a vote of 53-38. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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- 40. HB 1294 Protecting the Wellbeing of Incarcerated Pregnant Women and their Unborn Children Through New Guidelines on Restraints.** The ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect the dignity of incarcerated women. ACU supports this effort to ensure safe prison conditions to protect pregnant women and their unborn children from injury and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 89-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 41. HB 1296 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Enacting “Constitutional Carry” or the Carrying of a Firearm without a Special Permit.** ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 8, 2022 by a vote of 69-30 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 42. HB 1298 Reducing Excessive and Anti-Competitive Regulations in the Alcoholic Beverage Industry and Making it Easier for Craft Producers to Sell their Products.** ACU supports a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry, supports expanding individual liberties and reforming anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 3, 2022 by a vote of 86-6 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 43. HB 1306 (Campbell Amd. 1) Further Empowering Union Bosses to Drive Up Costs by Mandating their Representation on a Housing Task Force.** The Campbell (ACUF Lifetime 21%) amendment #1 to the housing task force bill. ACU opposes providing unions greater influence and ability to enrich their members by restricting competition and imposing above market wages for construction services and opposed this amendment. The House failed to pass the amendment on January 24, 2022 by a vote of 34-56.
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- 44. HB 1306 Reducing Housing Costs Through the Establishment of a Task Force to Review Restrictive Zoning, Land Use and Building Regulations.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen property rights and make housing more affordable by combatting overreaching zoning, land use and building imposed at both the state and local level and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 88-2 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 45. HB 1361 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Income and Asset Eligibility for TANF and Childcare Welfare Programs.** ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives by encouraging them to become more self-sufficient. ACU opposes this measure which further grows government dependency while expanding federal and state taxpayer burdens and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on January 27, 2022 by a vote of 86-2 and the bill was signed into law.
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- 46. HB 1410 Reducing Government Dependency by Strengthening Job Search Provisions Under the State's TANF Welfare Program.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen government integrity, as well as helping people live happier, healthier, more productive lives by obtaining employment and becoming less dependent on government and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 2, 2022 by a vote of 68-24 and the bill was signed into law.
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
