ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

ANNUAL METRICS







To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)

NEW HAMPSHIRE SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. HB 1 (Rosenwald Amd.) Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Planned Parenthood and Abortion Providers. The Rosenwald (ACUF Lifetime 3%) amendment #1854s to the budget bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 11-13.
- 2. HB 2 (Soucy Amd.) Removing Protections Against Critical Race Theory and Leftist Propaganda Within the Budget. The Soucy (ACUF Lifetime 7%) amendment #1815h to the budget bill. ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to utilize taxpayer funds to advance this indoctrination on children and across workplaces and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 9-14.
- 3. HB 2 (Birdsell Amd.) Protecting Life by Banning Abortion After 24 Weeks. The Birdsell (ACUF Lifetime 88%) amendment #1842s to the budget bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The Senate adopted the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 14-9 and the underlying bill was signed into law.
- 4. HB 2 (Khan Amd.) Blocking School Choice by Eliminating the Education Freedom Account Program Within the Budget. The Khan (ACUF Lifetime 7%) amendment #1852s to the budget bill. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 9-14.
- 5. HB 2 (D'Allesandro Amd.) Blocking the Phaseout of the Interest and Dividend Tax. The D'Allesandro (ACUF Lifetime 6%) amendment #1861s to the budget bill. ACU has long opposed these and other taxes on capital gains which stifle investment and economic growth and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 10-13.
- 6. HB 2 (Rosenwald Amd.) Weakening Abortion Restrictions Through a "Right to Terminate a Pregnancy." The Rosenwald (ACUF Lifetime 3%) amendment #1875s to the budget bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 9-14.
- 7. HB 15 Reducing Cronyism by Closing a Loophole that Allows Online Sharing Platforms to Skirt the 9% Meal, Hotel and Car Rental Tax. ACU supports a broadly applied tax code with as low of rates as possible on all products and individuals. ACU supports this effort to reduce tax cronyism, whereby select companies and industries are provided competitive advantages, resulting in tax burdens being shifted to other companies and industries not favored by government and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 16-7 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. SB 17 Empowering Brew Pubs to Enter into Contracts with Brewers and Establish Their Own Policies Concerning Dogs in Outdoor Areas. ACU supports eliminating unnecessary and anti-competitive regulatory barriers and empowering brew pubs to better serve their customers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 11, 2021 by a vote of 23-1. (This version failed to advance in the House.)
- 9. SB 50 Harming Educational Outcomes by Further Restricting the Ability of Schools to Remove Poor Performing Teachers (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes trapping students in classrooms with poor performing teachers and harming their education attainment and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on a procedural motion on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 10. SB 54 Reducing Voter Fraud by Strengthening the Integrity of the Absentee Ballot Process. ACU supports strengthening election integrity and ensuring eligible voters are not disenfranchised through vote fraud and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 4, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)



- 11. SB 58 (Committee Amd.) Restricting Employment Opportunities for Reformed Individuals Through New Criminal Record Check Mandates for Electricians.

 Committee amendment #617 (sections 166 and 178). ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and safely reduce incarceration rates. ACU supports efforts to lower recidivism by reducing barriers to the workforce and opposed this amendment. The Senate failed to adopt the amendment on March 11, 2021 by a vote of 12-12.
- 12. SB 59 Driving-Up Health Insurance Premiums Through a New Mandate Concerning Reimbursements Under a "Psychiatric Collaborative Care Model." ACU opposes insurance mandates which infringe contracting rights and ultimately drive-up insurance premiums for consumers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 11, 2021 by a vote of 24-0. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 13. SB 61 Ensuring the "Right to Work" Without Being Forced to Pay Union Dues. ACU believes the right to own and exercise individual liberty over one's labor is inherent to a free society, has long supported the "right to work" and protecting workers from the theft and coercion of greedy and politically powerful union bosses and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 11, 2021 by a vote of 13-11. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 14. SB 62 Advancing the War on Individual Liberties and Nicotine by Banning Flavored Vapor Products. ACU believes the usage of tobacco and e-cigarettes is a personal liberty issue, believes government regulations on products are only appropriate when their usage substantially impacts others and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on a procedural motion on February 11, 2021 by a vote of 15-9. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 15. SB 63 Reopening the Economy Through COVID-19 Liability Protections (Motion to Defeat). ACU supports this critical measure to help allow businesses to reopen by protecting them from frivolous litigation and supported this bill. The Senate voted to return the bill to committee (defeat) on March 4, 2021 by a vote of 21-3. (A "No" vote supported the ACU position).
- 16. SB 67 Increasing Hiring Costs Through a New Paid Leave Mandate on Private Employers (Motion to Defeat). ACU believes employers and employees should be free to negotiate their own benefits, and opposes this infringement of the right to contract, which may limit the ability of employees to receive other benefits or job perks and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill through a procedural motion on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 17. SB 69 Exposing Businesses to Frivolous Litigation Through Excessive New Mandates Pertaining to Breastfeeding. ACU recognizes the challenges with choosing life and raising a child but opposes this measure which will empower plaintiffs' attorneys to pursue frivolous litigation against employers. ACU opposes this excessive government mandate that interferes with private business operations and holds businesses hostage via additional litigation and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 24-0. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 18. HB 71 Strengthening Transparency and Accountability Surrounding School Collective Bargaining Agreements. ACU supports protecting taxpayers and improving educational outcomes by strengthening government transparency and accountability and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 13, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. SB 73 Placing Taxpayer Funds at Risk Through a New "Green Building" Loan Program (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes placing taxpayer funds at risk and enriching government-favored companies in order to advance a radical Leftist environmental agenda and opposed this bill. The Senate voted to defeat the bill on March 11, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 20. HB 95 Strengthening Individual Liberties and Food Freedom by Permitting the Sale of Raw Milk Ice Cream Products (Motion to Defeat). ACU supports the expansion of individual liberties by strengthening "food freedom" and the right to consume raw milk and supported this bill. The Senate voted to return the bill to committee (defeat) on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 12-12. (A "No" vote supported the ACU position.)




- 21. SB 97 Invoking Further Government Interference in the Healthcare Industry Through New Mandates on Insurers and Pharmacy Benefit Mangers. ACU supports a freer market in healthcare, opposes this government interference in private contracting agreements which further drive-up insurance and pharmaceutical costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 18, 2021 by a vote of 23-1 and was later amended and signed into law.
- 22. SB 108 Harming School Safety and Learning Environments by Advancing the Left's Politicized Attack on School Resource Officers (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes the Left's quest to promote lawlessness and defund the police and this measure which prevents school resource officers from maintaining safe and productive learning environments and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on a procedural motion on March 4, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 23. SB 115 Destroying Economic Growth by Advancing "Net-Zero" Greenhouse Gas Emissions by 2050 (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes destroying economic growth and subjecting consumers to skyrocketing new costs in order to advance a politicized, leftist climate change agenda and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on a procedural motion on March 11, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 24. SB 136 Increasing Unemployment by Raising the Minimum Wage to \$12 per Hour (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes these artificial wages that hurt those who especially need employment experience, such as students and inexperienced employees, and opposed this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on a procedural motion on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 25. SB 138 (Sherman Amd.) Increasing Scarcity by Imposing Anti-Price Gouging Controls on "Necessities" During "Abnormal Market Disruptions." The Sherman (ACUF Lifetime 6%) amendment #1061s to a bill relating to investment metal contracts. ACU opposes all anti-price gouging controls that worsen disasters by preventing the market from allocating scarce resources and incentivizing the flow of additional goods and opposed this amendment. The Senate defeated the amendment on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 7-17.
- 26. SB 141 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Ending the Burdensome "Gun Line" Program. ACU recognizes that countless studies have found no correlation between imposing universal background checks and reducing unlawful usage of firearms. These sorts of legislative barriers do nothing to stop criminals from engaging in additional criminal behaviors; they just make it more difficult for law-abiding citizens who are not committing crimes to exercise their constitutional rights. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 but the bill was later vetoed by the governor.
- 27. SB 144 Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Hiking Payouts to Childcare Providers Through a New Pilot Program (Motion to Defeat). ACU opposes placing even greater burdens on taxpayers by further socializing childcare costs and opposed this bill. The Senate to return the bill to committee (defeat) on March 11, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 28. SB 150 Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Medicaid to Include Dental Coverage. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes efforts that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty, and opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 24-0.
- 29. SB 151 Driving-Up Consumer Electricity Costs Through New Off-Shore Wind Procurement Mandates. ACU supports all sources of energy and believes government should not favor one source of energy over another. ACU opposes this measure which unnecessarily drives up consumer electricity costs in order to advance a radical Leftist renewable energy agenda and opposed this bill. The Senate voted to pass the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 23-1. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 30. SB 154 Protecting Second Amendment Rights from Unconstitutional Executive Orders Issued After January 20, 2021. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, opposes gun control measures that do not improve public safety and infringe the right of law-abiding individuals to keep and bear arms and supported this bill. The Senate passed this version on April 1, 2021 by a vote of 14-10. (This version of the bill failed to advance in the House.)



- 31. HB 177 Weakening Property Rights Through an Excessive Ban on Landfills Within 2 Miles of State Parks (Motion to Defeat). While ACU supports reasonable environmental protections, we believe such legislative actions should be narrowly tailored to address specific threats. ACU opposes weakening property rights through a broad new mandate and opposed this bill. The Senate voted to defeat the bill on May 20, 2021 by a vote of 14-8. (A "Yea" vote supports the ACU position.)
- 32. HB 220 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Prohibiting Government-Imposed COVID-19 Vaccination Mandates. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 27, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 33. HB 260 Reducing Motorist Costs and Vehicle Damage by Eliminating the State's Front License Plate Mandate (Motion to Defeat). ACU supports reducing consumer costs and protecting vehicles (especially collector cars) from unnecessary damage by eliminating a mandate that is primarily designed to enrich manufacturers such as 3M and supported this bill. The Senate voted to defeat the bill on May 6, 2021 by a vote of 20-3. (A "No" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 34. HB 282 Expanding School Choice by Removing Barriers for School Districts to Contract with Religious Schools. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by empowering families through school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 13, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 35. HB 285 (Committee Amd.) Strengthening Election Integrity by Cleaning the Voter Rolls. ACU supports maintaining and updating voter registration databases to help prevent the disenfranchisement of eligible voters due to voter fraud and supported this amendment. The Senate adopted the amendment on May 13, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the underlying bill was signed into law.
- 36. HB 388 Expanding School Choice by Allowing Parents to Request Transfers to Private Schools. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by empowering families through school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 13, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the bill was signed into law.
- 37. HB 542 Strengthening Religious Freedom by Limiting the Government's Ability to Shutdown Religious Services During States of Emergency. This bill is in response to actions taken by government officials throughout the country during the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak which prevented individuals from gathering and practicing their religion together. ACU supports the First Amendment and strengthening protections for all to express and practice their sincerely held religious beliefs and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 14-10 and the bill was signed into law.

NEW HAMPSHIRE HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. CACR 1 Protecting Taxpayers Through a Constitutional Amendment Prohibiting an Income Tax. ACU supports expanding economic growth through the lowest possible levels of taxation and supported this resolution. The House failed to pass the resolution with the required three-fifths vote on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 202-171.
- 2. HB1 (Wallner Amd.) Increasing Government Dependency by Expanding Medicaid to Include Dental Coverage. The Wallner (ACUF Lifetime 3%) amendment #1085h to the budget bill. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes efforts that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty, and opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on April 7, 2021 by a vote of 184-197.
- 3. HB 2 (Rogers Amd.) Forcing Taxpayers to Fund Planned Parenthood and Abortion Providers. The Rogers (ACUF Lifetime 5%) amendment #1068h to the budget bill. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on April 7, 2021 by a vote of 181-199.
- 4. HB 2 (Hatch Amd.) Removing Protections Against Critical Race Theory and Leftist Propaganda in the Budget. The Hatch (ACUF Lifetime 6%) amendment #1063h to the budget bill. ACU recognizes that CRT is a tool used by the radical Left to advance division amongst Americans and expand the role of government. ACU believes it is abhorrent to utilize taxpayer funds to advance this indoctrination on children and across workplaces and opposed this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on April 7, 2021 by a vote of 186-193.
- 5. CACR 8 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights Through a Constitutional Amendment Prohibiting Additional Local Firearm Regulations. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this resolution. The House failed to pass the resolution with the required three-fifths vote on April 7, 2021 by a vote of 201-174.
- 6. CACR 9 Protecting Taxpayers Through a Constitutional Amendment Preventing Local Property Tax Increases from Exceeding 2%. ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect property owners from losing their properties through excessive taxation. ACU supports this measure to control runaway spending and protect property owners and supported this resolution. The House failed to pass the resolution with the required three-fifths vote and a vote to reconsider failed on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 164-208.
- 7. HB 15 Reducing Cronyism by Closing a Loophole that Allows Online Sharing Platforms to Skirt the 9% Meal, Hotel and Car Rental Tax. ACU supports a broadly applied tax code with as low of rates as possible on all products and individuals. ACU supports this effort to reduce tax cronyism, whereby select companies and industries are provided competitive advantages, resulting in tax burdens being shifted to other companies and industries not favored by government and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 289-78 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. SB 61 Ensuring the "Right to Work" Without Being Forced to Pay Union Dues. ACU believes the right to own and exercise individual liberty over one's labor is inherent to a free society, has long supported the "right to work" and protecting workers from the theft and coercion of greedy and politically powerful union bosses and supported this bill. The House failed to pass the bill on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 175-199.
- 9. HB 63 Shielding Residents from Penalties for Violations of Executive Orders Pertaining to the COVID-19 Pandemic. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The House voted to pass the bill on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 188-169. (The bill failed to advance.)



- 10. HB 71 Strengthening Transparency and Accountability Surrounding School Collective Bargaining Agreements. ACU supports protecting taxpayers and improving educational outcomes by strengthening government transparency and accountability and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 193-181 and the bill was signed into law.
- 11. SB 86 Protecting Property Owners from Local Bans on Natural Gas and Other Heating Sources. ACU supports all sources of energy, does not believe government should favor one source of energy over another and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 4, 2021 by a vote of 208-167 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. SB 131 (Sylvia Amd.) Protecting Taxpayers by Removing a Special Carveout that Allowed the Forestry Industry to Exceed the Road Weight Limit. The Sylvia (ACUF Lifetime 98%) motion to divide amendment 1801 to the omnibus municipal bill. ACU recognizes that the vast amount of road damage and wear is caused by heavy trucks. ACU supports protecting taxpayers from costly road repairs, opposes this cronyism which provides a special benefit to a select government favored industry and supported this amendment. The House failed to pass the Sylvia motion to divide the amendment (and remove the carveout) on June 4, 2021 by a vote of 90-276.
- 13. HB 177 Weakening Property Rights Through an Excessive Ban on Landfills Within 2 Miles of State Parks. While ACU supports reasonable environmental protections, we believe such legislative actions should be narrowly tailored to address specific threats. ACU opposes weakening property rights through a broad new mandate and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 197-159. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 14. HB 197 Strengthening Self-Defense by Expanding the State's Stand Your Ground Law to Protect Individuals Inside Their Vehicles. ACU supports strengthening the right of self-defense, supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 206-144. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 15. HB 206 Increasing Government Transparency by Subjecting Collective Bargaining to the State's Right to Know Law. While ACU supports the complete elimination of collective bargaining within state government, we support this measure to increase government transparency and better protect taxpayers from greedy union bosses and supported this bill. The House failed to pass the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 168-187.
- 16. HB 220 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Prohibiting Government-Imposed COVID-19 Vaccination Mandates. ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 198-162 and the bill was signed into law.
- 17. HB 233 Protecting Children Who Survive Abortion (Motion to Defeat). ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and supported this bill. The House voted to defeat the bill (Inexpedient to Legislate) on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 46-186 but the bill failed to advance in 2021. (A "No" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 18. HB 251 Imposing an Overreaching New Mandate Forcing Children Under Age 2 to be Placed in Rear-Facing Car Seats. ACU recognizes New Hampshire already has numerous vehicular child restraint laws in place (front-facing car seats, booster seats, etc.). ACU opposes expanding the nanny state and weakening parental rights through this overreaching new mandate and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 198-176 and the bill was signed into law.
- 19. HB 260 Reducing Motorist Costs and Vehicle Damage by Eliminating the State's Front License Plate Mandate. ACU supports reducing consumer costs and protecting vehicles (especially collector cars) from unnecessary damage by eliminating a mandate that is primarily designed to enrich manufacturers such as 3M and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 210-163. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)



- 20. HB 282 Expanding School Choice by Removing Barriers for School Districts to Contract with Religious Schools. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by empowering families through school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 198-178 and the bill was signed into law.
- 21. HB 285 Strengthening Election Integrity by Cleaning the Voter Rolls. ACU supports maintaining and updating voter registration databases to help prevent the disenfranchisement of eligible voters due to voter fraud and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 199-172 and the bill was signed into law.
- 22. HB 292 Reducing Voter Fraud by Strengthening the Integrity of the Absentee Ballot Process. ACU supports strengthening election integrity and ensuring eligible voters are not disenfranchised through vote fraud and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 198-174. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 23. HB 334 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Authorizing Firearm Carry on Off-Road Vehicles and Ending the Burdensome "Gun Line" Program. ACU recognizes that countless studies have found no correlation between imposing universal background checks and reducing unlawful usage of firearms. These sorts of legislative barriers do nothing to stop criminals from engaging in additional criminal behaviors; they just make it more difficult for law-abiding citizens who are not committing crimes to exercise their constitutional rights. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House failed to override the Governor's veto on January 13, 2022 by a vote of 138-212 (a two-thirds vote was required).
- 24. HB 368 Increasing Business and Consumer Costs by Permitting Lawsuits for "Medical Monitoring" (Motion to Defeat). ACU recognizes this bill would increase litigation and drive-up consumer costs by imposing on manufacturers unreasonable standards and liabilities concerning chemical exposure. While ACU supports strong property rights and just compensation for individuals who have been harmed by chemical exposure, we oppose this overreach which is primarily designed to enrich trial lawyers through increased litigation costs and opposed this bill. The House voted to table (defeat) the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 172-169. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 25. HB 373 Ensuring New Hampshire Does Not Join the Draconian Low Carbon Fuel Standards Program. This bill protects New Hampshire residents from skyrocketing utility costs by preventing the governor from committing the state into any state, regional, or national low carbon fuel standards program or any similar program that requires quotas, caps, or mandates on any fuels used for transportation, industrial purposes, or home heating without first receiving legislative and executive council approval. ACU opposes driving up transportation costs in order to advance a politicized Leftist climate initiative and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 195-158 and the bill was signed into law.
- 26. HB 381 Improving Access and Reducing Costs to Obtain a Lab Test by No Longer Requiring Physician Approval. ACU supports reducing patient costs and improving access to health care by eliminating unnecessary and excessive government regulations on health care and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 264-89. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 27. HB 388 Expanding School Choice by Allowing Parents to Request Transfers to Private Schools. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by empowering families through school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 199-175 and the bill was signed into law.
- 28. HB 402 Strengthening Property Rights by Requiring Two-Thirds Legislative Approval to Take Property During a State of Emergency. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect the rights of all property owners. ACU supports strong protections against government seizure of private property and supported this bill. The House failed to pass the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 166-171.



- 29. HB 439 Combatting Government Overreach by Limiting the Rule Making Authority of City Councils Overregulation by Limiting Local Government Regulatory Power. ACU recognizes that the person is the fundamental unit of government, that the two other levels of government recognized in the U.S. Constitution are the states and federal government, and that cities and municipalities merely derive their authority from other levels of government. ACU supports this measure to combat local government overreach and supported this bill. The House failed to pass the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 185-192.
- 30. HB 523 Strengthening Election Integrity by Requiring Voters Without Photo-IDs to Have Their Photo Taken When Registering to Vote on Election Day. ACU supports strengthening election integrity by reducing opportunities for voter fraud which disenfranchises legal voters and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 8, 2021 by a vote of 197-172 and the bill was signed into law. (The Senate refused to take a position publicly on the bill by holding a voice vote to pass the bill.)
- 31. HB 542 Strengthening Religious Freedom by Limiting the Government's Ability to Shutdown Religious Services During States of Emergency. This bill is in response to actions taken by government officials throughout the country during the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak which prevented individuals from gathering and practicing their religion together. ACU supports the First Amendment and strengthening protections for all to express and practice their sincerely held religious beliefs and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 205-158 and the bill was signed into law.
- 32. HB 590 Increasing Hiring Costs Through a New Paid Leave Mandate on Private Employers (Motion to Defeat). ACU believes employers and employees should be free to negotiate their own benefits, and opposes this infringement of the right to contract, which may limit the ability of employees to receive other benefits or job perks and opposed this bill. The House defeated the bill on a procedural motion on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 202-148. (A "Yea" vote supported the ACU position.)
- 33. HB 625 Protecting Life by Banning Abortion After 24 Weeks. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 26, 2021 by a vote of 191-160. (The failed to advance in the Senate.)
