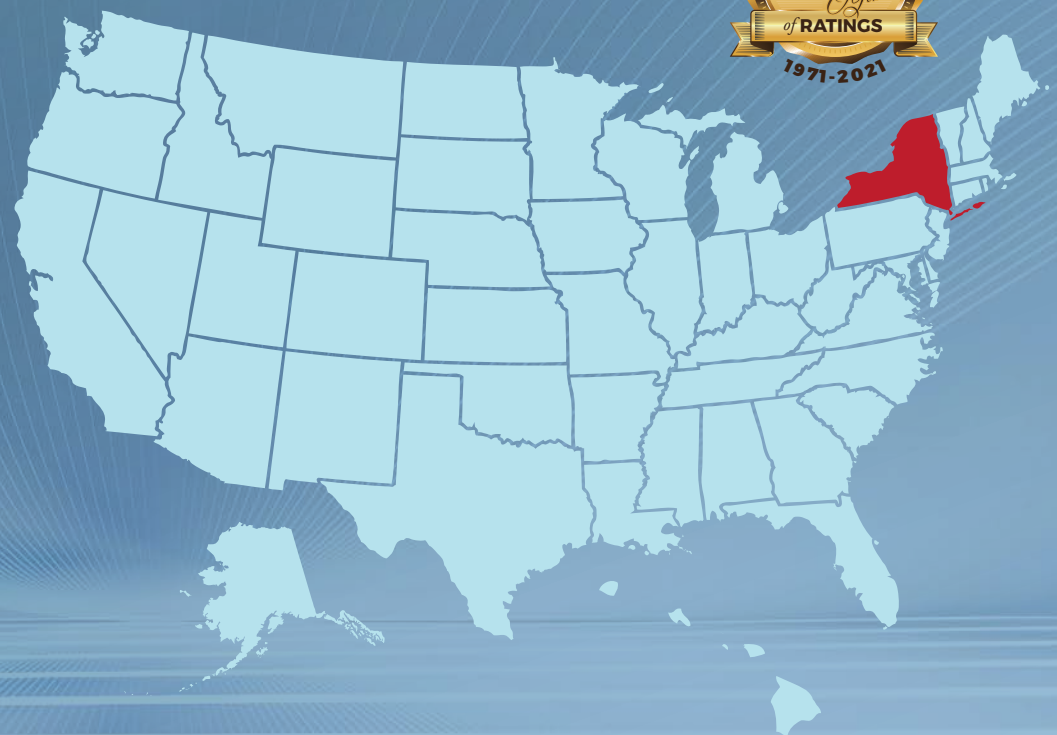

ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)

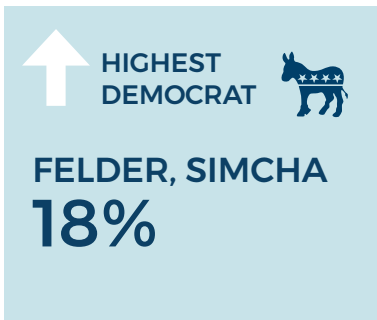
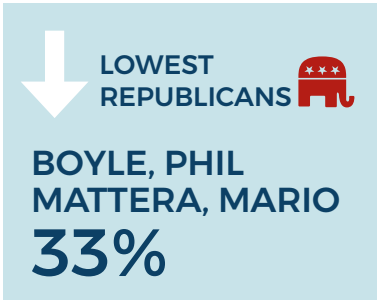
NEW YORK SENATE STATISTICS



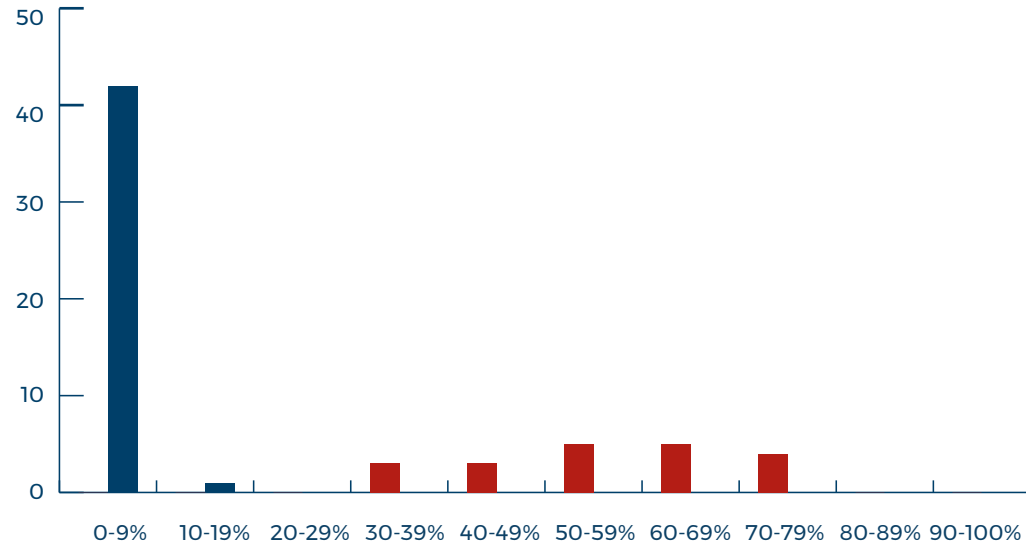
NEW YORK SENATE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

NEW YORK SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 14A Infringing Second Amendment Rights and Firearm Customization by Banning So-Called “Ghost Guns.”** ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 48-15 and the bill was signed into law.

2. **SB 255B Driving Up Taxpayer-Funded Construction Costs by Expanding Applicability of the “Prevailing Wage” Mandate to Include Supply Delivery and Hauling.** ACU has long opposed the Davis-Bacon Act and prevailing wage mandates which unnecessarily drives up the cost of taxpayer-funded projects and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 48-15 and the bill was signed into law.

3. **SB 360 Weakening Election Integrity Through a Constitutional Amendment Implementing a Permanent Vote-by-Mail Scheme.** ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards, such as reserving absentee voting for individuals who would otherwise be incapable of voting, are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 11, 2021 by a vote of 50-13. (The proposed amendment appeared on the November 2021 ballot for voter approval but was defeated.)

4. **SB 471A Further Infringing Property Rights by Extending the COVID-19 Eviction Moratorium on Commercial Property to May 1, 2021.** ACU recognizes that landlords oftentimes have mortgages and other expenses themselves, and firmly opposes the Left's “cancel rent” movement which drives up rental costs for everyone and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 19, 2021 by a vote of 46-17 and the bill was signed into law.

5. **SB 517 Weakening Election Integrity by Establishing Same-Day Voter Registration.** ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as requiring advance registration are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 12, 2021 by a vote of 42-20. (The proposed amendment appeared on the November 2021 ballot for voter approval but was defeated.)

6. **SB 528 Advancing a Radical Leftist Agenda Through an “Environmental Bill of Rights” Constitutional Amendment.** ACU opposes attempts by the Left to infringe property rights and foster runaway spending in their quest to advance a politicized environmental agenda and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 12, 2021 by a vote of 48-14.

7. **SB 841A Increasing Oil Distribution Costs Through Overreaching Mandates Concerning the Paint Color of Petroleum Storage Tanks.** ACU opposes this government overreach which drives-up business costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 1, 2021 by a vote of 52-11 and the bill was signed into law.

8. **SB 979A Imposing New “Cultural Competency Training” Mandates on Real Estate Brokers.** ACU opposes making it even more costly and time consuming to obtain a license under the state's draconian real estate licensing regime and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 61-2 and the bill was signed into law.

9. **SB 1383 Raising Housing Construction Costs by Mandating Builders Offer Fire Sprinkler Systems.** ACU opposes this government mandate which increases housing design and construction costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 20, 2021 by a vote of 44-19 and the bill was signed into law.

10. **SB 1451A Imposing a New Barrier for Hospital Expansion by Mandating Submittal of “Health Equity Impact Assessments.”** ACU supports the complete elimination of all unnecessary barriers for hospital and healthcare facility expansion such as the state's certificate of need law which restrict competition and drive-up costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 44-19 and the bill was signed into law.



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11. **SB 1453B Socializing the Costs of Non-Paying Utility Customers Through a Moratorium on Utility Shutoffs.** ACU opposes this measure which will ultimately stick utility companies with unpaid bills which will then be passed onto other utility customers through higher rates (cost recovery) and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 30, 2021 by a vote of 54-9 and the bill was signed into law.

12. **SB 1630A Invoking Unnecessary Government Interference in the Private Operations of Food Delivery Platforms and Restaurants.** ACU recognizes this measure is largely designed to use government to provide restaurants greater leverage in their negotiations with delivery platforms, as restaurants already have the freedom to refuse to provide their products to a delivery platform. ACU further recognizes that any specific issue, such as use of a restaurant logo by a delivery platform, should be addressed through targeted legislation. ACU opposes invoking government interference in the free marketplace to provide more favorable outcomes to one party over another in their negotiations and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 19, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.

13. **AB 2111 Establishing a New Government Fund to Promote Leftist Anti-Gun Research.** ACU recognizes there are already countless charitable groups engaging on firearm-related issues, opposes utilizing taxpayer resources to advance efforts by the Left to disarm Americans and infringe Second Amendment rights and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 49-14 and the bill was signed into law.

14. **SB 2133 Hiking Realtor Licensing Fees to Socialize the Costs of "Statewide Fair Housing Testing."** ACU opposes making it more costly to earn a living in order to further grow unnecessary government initiatives and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 8, 2021 by a vote of 45-17 and the bill was signed into law.
-
15. **SB 4136 Expanding Individual Liberties by Allowing Movie Theaters to Sell Wine and Beer.** ACU supports expanding individual liberties and eliminating unnecessary, anti-competitive regulations that restrict consumer choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 5, 2021 by a vote of 60-3. (The bill failed to advance in the Assembly.)

16. **AB 2505 Holding Businesses Hostage to Kangaroo Courts by Prohibiting Contracts from Designating Venues.** ACU opposes infringing contracting rights as well as driving up consumer and business costs by exposing businesses to lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 47-16 and the bill was signed into law.

17. **AB 2681B Imposing Excessive "Infections Disease Exposure" Mandates on Employers.** ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 20, 2021 by a vote of 46-17 and the bill was signed into law.
-
18. **SB 2928A Further Reducing Employee Pay by Expanding Eligibility under the State's Paid Leave Program.** ACU opposes increasing taxes on employees through the expansion of the state's paid leave program and instead supports the right for employees to purchase their own paid leave insurance through the private sector and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 9, 2021 by a vote of 43-20 and the bill was signed into law.

19. **SB 2987A Paving the Way for Radical Leftist Policies by Declaring Racism a "Public Health Crisis."** ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, that it is the duty of government to ensure all laws are applied equally, and that those who discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes the Left's quest to stoke division and grow the size and scope of government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 5, 2021 by a vote of 48-15 and the bill was signed into law.

20. **SB 2997 Infringing Private Contracting Rights of Homeowners Associations - Solar System Mandates.** ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights works to ensure individuals may freely choose an HOA and level of governance that create neighborhood standards they prefer. ACU opposes this infringement of the right to freely contract and opposes weakening HOAs which serve as free-market alternatives to zoning and other governmental central planning mechanisms and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 10, 2021 by a vote of 47-16 and the bill was signed into law.

21. **SB 3080A Socializing Electric Bike and Scooter Costs onto Taxpayers Through a Crony Rebate Program.** ACU supports all vehicle propulsion systems and methods of transportation but opposes socializing the costs of government-favored products onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 60-3. (The bill failed to advance in the Assembly.)

 22. **SB 4095B Imposing an Overreaching Ban on Pavement Sealants Containing Coal Tar.** While ACU supports reasonable measures that address direct and significant environmental threats, we oppose this excessive state-wide ban on a common driveway sealant that has been utilized for decades and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 46-16 and the bill was signed into law.

 23. **SB 4254 Driving Up Property Insurance Premiums Through a New Mandate Prohibiting Consideration of Dog Breeds.** ACU opposes this mandate which effectively socializes risk and drives up insurance premiums for everyone and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 49-14 and the bill was signed into law.

 24. **AB 4302 Banning the Sale of All Gasoline-Powered Vehicles by 2035.** ACU supports all forms of vehicle propulsion, opposes this attack by Leftists on the automotive industry and consumer choice and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 26, 2021 by a vote of 44-18 and the bill was signed into law.

 25. **SB 4336A Enriching Union Bosses by Dictating the Expenditures of Nursing Homes.** ACU opposes this government takeover of private nursing home operations which are designed to enrich the greedy union bosses of the SEIU while limiting the ability of facilities to provide the best care and environments for their residents and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 22, 2021 by a vote of 44-19. (The bill failed to advance in the Assembly.)

 26. **SB 4402B Advancing Frivolous Litigation by Permitting Alterations of Government Documents Based Solely on Gender "Identity."** ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, and that all individuals should be treated with the utmost dignity and respect. ACU opposes ploys by the Left to fundamentally change women's sports and subject businesses to lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 46-17 and the bill was signed into law.

 27. **SB 4817A Strengthening Free Speech by Ensuring Nonprofit Donor Privacy.** ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, supports this measure to prevent donor intimidation and harassment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.

 28. **SB 4884 Expanding Government Bureaucracy Through the Establishment of the "Office of the Utility Customer Advocate."** ACU recognizes the public service commission already performs these initiatives, opposes expanding government bureaucracy and unnecessarily driving up taxpayer costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 48-15 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.

 29. **SB 5027A Imposing Excessive Regulations on the Carpet Industry Through a New Government Recycling Program.** ACU opposes these overreaching regulations which ultimately are passed onto consumer through higher product costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 54-9. (The bill failed to advance in the Assembly.)

 30. **AB 5082 Advancing New York's War on Plastic by Banning Hotel Shampoo Bottles.** ACU opposes this government interference in the private sector which drives up costs and worsens consumer lodging experiences and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 26, 2021 by a vote of 47-15 and the bill was signed into law.

 31. **SB 5151A Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Prohibiting Schools from Attempting to Collect Unpaid School Meal Fees.** ACU opposes discouraging parental responsibility and the payment of school meal fees, while socializing these costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.
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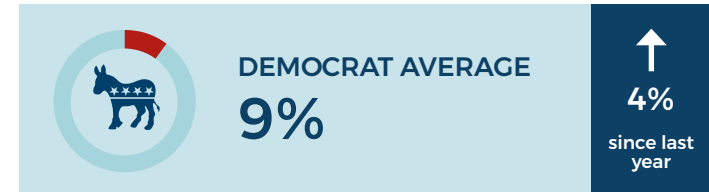
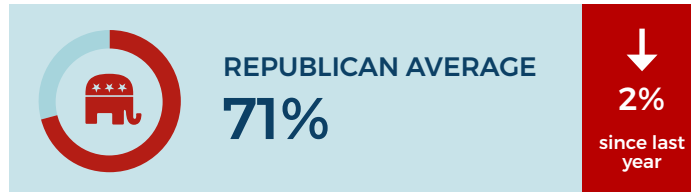
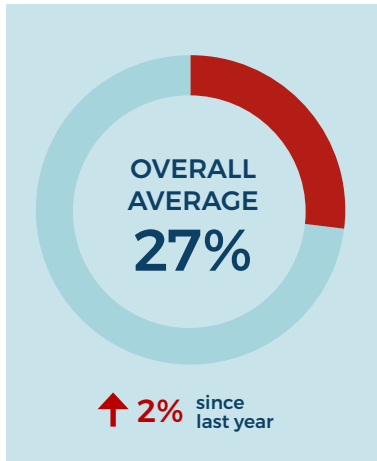
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32. **SB 5257C Further Socializing “Affordable” Housing Costs onto Taxpayers Through a New Government Program.** ACU opposes government schemes which socialize affordable housing costs and believes the best way to make housing truly “affordable” is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 49-14 and the bill was signed into law.

33. **SB 6173 Increasing Energy Costs by Extending the State’s Moratorium on Petroleum and Natural Gas Facilities.** ACU supports all sources of energy, believes government should not support one source of energy over another, opposes this mandate which unnecessarily drives up energy costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 19, 2021 by a vote of 61-2 and the bill was signed into law.
-
34. **SB 6191 Expanding Government Land Purchases to Advance a Politicized Environmental Agenda.** ACU recognizes the private sector is best equipped to manage land, and further recognizes the federal government already owns 28% of all land in the nation. ACU believes government should reduce rather than increase its land holdings and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 26, 2021 by a vote of 54-8. (The bill failed to advance in the Assembly.)
-
35. **AB 6193 Driving Up Costs by Mandating Utility Companies Change Communication Systems to Address Customers by Preferred Pronouns.** ACU recognizes updating all company verbal and written communication systems and tracking preferred pronouns creates significant costs. ACU opposes this mandate which drives up costs and exposes companies to lawsuit abuse which is ultimately passed onto utility customers through higher rates and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 46-17 and the bill was signed into law.
-
36. **SB 6576 Hiking Taxpayer Medicaid Spending by Covering Services of Clinical Social Workers.** ACU opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and this measure which is largely designed to enrich the social work industry and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
37. **SB 6610 Fueling Out-of-Control Spending by Extending the Ability of New York City to Issue Bonds (Debt).** ACU opposes further plunging taxpayers into debt and fueling the out-of-control spending of a city that is ranked as one of the worst financially run cities in the nation and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
38. **SB 6697 Increasing Costs within the Unemployment System by Extending the Self-Employment Assistance Program.** While ACU supports entrepreneurship we oppose abuse of the unemployment system which results in less investment and hiring due to higher payroll taxes on businesses and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.

39. **SB 6797 Reducing Economic Growth by Extending the City of Yonkers’ Income Tax Surcharge.** ACU supports fostering economic growth by establishing a tax code with the lowest possible rates for everyone and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 54-9 and the bill was signed into law.
-
40. **AB 7119 Driving Up Nursing Home Costs by Imposing Staffing Level Mandates.** ACU opposes driving up nursing home costs through these mandates primarily designed to enrich the greedy union bosses of the SEIU and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 54-9 and the bill was signed into law.
-
41. **AB 7192A Expanding Mobility Options by Allowing the Operation of a Three-Wheel Autocycles with a Regular Driver’s License.** ACU supports expanding mobility options by making New York one of 48 other states that permits the operation of an autocycle without a special motorcycle license and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 60-3 and the bill was signed into law.
-
42. **SB 7196 Attempting to Shut down the Firearm Industry by Subjecting Manufactures to Unreasonable Legal Liabilities.** ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment opposes the Left’s quest to shutdown firearm manufacturing and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 43-20 and the bill was signed into law.

43. **AB 7290 Increasing Home Heating Costs Through Biodiesel Fuel Mandates.** ACU supports all sources of energy and believes government should not favor one source of energy over another. ACU opposes this mandate which drives up heating costs for businesses and families and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 24, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
44. **AB 7688 Placing Taxpayer Funds at Risk by Further Expanding the Lending Authority of the State's Dormitory Authority.** ACU opposes placing nearly a billion dollars of additional taxpayer funds at risk and believes the state should instead eliminate certificate of need laws and countless other government regulatory barriers (such as AB7119 and AB5685 in this year's scorecard) to spur private investment in hospital and nursing home projects and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 63-0 and the bill was signed into law.
-
45. **SB 50001 Further Infringing Property Rights by Extending the COVID-19 Eviction Moratorium on Residential and Commercial Property to Jan. 15, 2022.** ACU recognizes that landlords oftentimes have mortgages and other expenses themselves, and firmly opposes the Left's "cancel rent" movement which drives up rental costs for everyone and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 1, 2021 by a vote of 38-19 and the bill was signed into law.

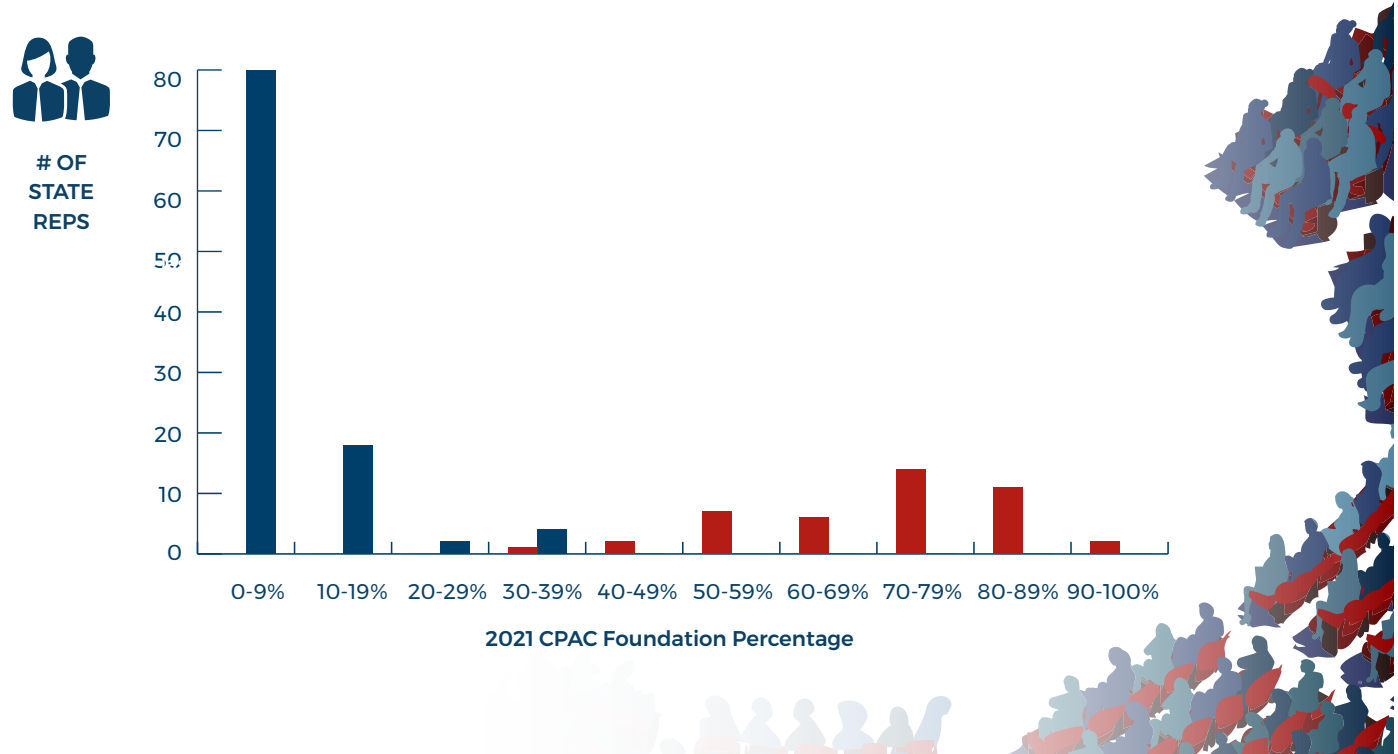
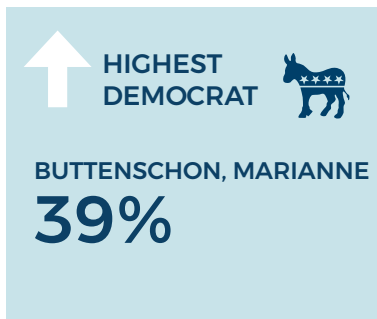
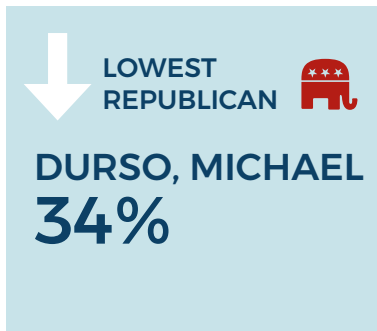

NEW YORK ASSEMBLY VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 14A Infringing Second Amendment Rights and Firearm Customization by Banning So-Called “Ghost Guns.”** ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 106-43 and the bill was signed into law.

2. **SB 255B Driving Up Taxpayer-Funded Construction Costs by Expanding Applicability of the “Prevailing Wage” Mandate to Include Supply Delivery and Hauling.** ACU has long opposed the Davis-Bacon Act and prevailing wage mandates which unnecessarily drives up the cost of taxpayer-funded projects and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 118-31 and the bill was signed into law.

3. **SB 360 Weakening Election Integrity Through a Constitutional Amendment Implementing a Permanent Vote-by-Mail Scheme.** ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards, such as reserving absentee voting for individuals who would otherwise be incapable of voting, are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 117-30. (The proposed amendment appeared on the November 2021 ballot for voter approval but was defeated.)

4. **SB 471A Further Infringing Property Rights by Extending the COVID-19 Eviction Moratorium on Commercial Property to May 1, 2021.** ACU recognizes that landlords oftentimes have mortgages and other expenses themselves, and firmly opposes the Left’s “cancel rent” movement which drives up rental costs for everyone and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on January 26, 2021 by a vote of 133-17 and the bill was signed into law.

5. **SB 517 Weakening Election Integrity by Establishing Same-Day Voter Registration.** ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards such as requiring advance registration are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 104-43. (The proposed amendment appeared on the November 2021 ballot for voter approval but was defeated.)

6. **SB 528 Advancing a Radical Leftist Agenda Through an “Environmental Bill of Rights” Constitutional Amendment.** ACU opposes attempts by the Left to infringe property rights and foster runaway spending in their quest to advance a politicized environmental agenda and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on February 8, 2021 by a vote of 124-25. The amendment appeared on the November 2021 ballot and was approved by voters.

7. **SB 841A Increasing Oil Distribution Costs Through Overreaching Mandates Concerning the Paint Color of Petroleum Storage Tanks.** ACU opposes this government overreach which drives-up business costs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 100-49 and the bill was signed into law.

8. **SB 979A Imposing New “Cultural Competency Training” Mandates on Real Estate Brokers.** ACU opposes making it even more costly and time consuming to obtain a license under the state’s draconian real estate licensing regime and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 11, 2021 by a vote of 146-3 and the bill was signed into law.

9. **SB 1383 Raising Housing Construction Costs by Mandating Builders Offer Fire Sprinkler Systems.** ACU opposes this government mandate which increases housing design and construction costs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 24, 2021 by a vote of 107-40 and the bill was signed into law.

10. **SB 1451A Imposing a New Barrier for Hospital Expansion by Mandating Submittal of “Health Equity Impact Assessments.”** ACU supports the complete elimination of all unnecessary barriers for hospital and healthcare facility expansion such as the state’s certificate of need law which restrict competition and drive-up costs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 1, 2021 by a vote of 102-45 and the bill was signed into law.



11. **SB 1453B Socializing the Costs of Non-Paying Utility Customers Through a Moratorium on Utility Shutoffs.** ACU opposes this measure which will ultimately stick utility companies with unpaid bills which will then be passed onto other utility customers through higher rates (cost recovery) and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 31, 2021 by a vote of 111-35 and the bill was signed into law.
12. **SB 1630A Invoking Unnecessary Government Interference in the Private Operations of Food Delivery Platforms and Restaurants.** ACU recognizes this measure is largely designed to use government to provide restaurants greater leverage in their negotiations with delivery platforms, as restaurants already have the freedom to refuse to provide their products to a delivery platform. ACU further recognizes that any specific issue, such as use of a restaurant logo by a delivery platform, should be addressed through targeted legislation. ACU opposes invoking government interference in the free marketplace to provide more favorable outcomes to one party over another in their negotiations and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 145-2 and the bill was signed into law.
13. **AB 2111 Establishing a New Government Fund to Promote Leftist Anti-Gun Research.** ACU recognizes there are already countless charitable groups engaging on firearm-related issues, opposes utilizing taxpayer resources to advance efforts by the Left to disarm Americans and infringe Second Amendment rights and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 124-25 and the bill was signed into law.
14. **SB 2133 Hiking Realtor Licensing Fees to Socialize the Costs of “Statewide Fair Housing Testing.”** ACU opposes making it more costly to earn a living in order to further grow unnecessary government initiatives and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 113-35 and the bill was signed into law.
15. **AB 2452A Expanding Individual Liberties by Allowing Movie Theaters to Sell Wine and Beer.** ACU supports expanding individual liberties and eliminating unnecessary, anti-competitive regulations that restrict consumer choice and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 11, 2021 by a vote of 137-12. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
16. **AB 2505 Holding Businesses Hostage to Kangaroo Courts by Prohibiting Contracts from Designating Venues.** ACU opposes infringing contracting rights as well as driving up consumer and business costs by exposing businesses to lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 107-40 and the bill was signed into law.
17. **AB 2681B Imposing Excessive “Infections Disease Exposure” Mandates on Employers.** ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government’s reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on April 19, 2021 by a vote of 95-55 and the bill was signed into law.
18. **SB 2928A Further Reducing Employee Pay by Expanding Eligibility under the State’s Paid Leave Program.** ACU opposes increasing taxes on employees through the expansion of the state’s paid leave program and instead supports the right for employees to purchase their own paid leave insurance through the private sector and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 113-35 and the bill was signed into law.
19. **SB 2987A Paving the Way for Radical Leftist Policies by Declaring Racism a “Public Health Crisis.”** ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, that it is the duty of government to ensure all laws are applied equally, and that those who discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes the Left’s quest to stoke division and grow the size and scope of government and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 110-39 and the bill was signed into law.
20. **SB 2997 Infringing Private Contracting Rights of Homeowners Associations - Solar System Mandates.** ACUF’s Center for 21st Century Property Rights works to ensure individuals may freely choose an HOA and level of governance that create neighborhood standards they prefer. ACU opposes this infringement of the right to freely contract and opposes weakening HOAs which serve as free-market alternatives to zoning and other governmental central planning mechanisms and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 22, 2021 by a vote of 120-29 and the bill was signed into law.



21. **AB 3876 Socializing Electric Vehicle Charging Costs by Mandating Utilities Provide Special Rate Structures.** ACU supports all forms of vehicle propulsion but opposes driving up electricity costs for all new Yorkers in order to provide special discounted rates for electric vehicle charging and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on April 20, 2021 by a vote of 119-31 and the bill was signed into law.
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22. **SB 4095B Imposing an Overreaching Ban on Pavement Sealants Containing Coal Tar.** While ACU supports reasonable measures that address direct and significant environmental threats, we oppose this excessive state-wide ban on a common driveway sealant that has been utilized for decades and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 106-41 and the bill was signed into law.
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23. **SB 4254 Driving Up Property Insurance Premiums Through a New Mandate Prohibiting Consideration of Dog Breeds.** ACU opposes this mandate which effectively socializes risk and drives up insurance premiums for everyone and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 112-37 and the bill was signed into law.
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24. **AB 4302 Banning the Sale of All Gasoline-Powered Vehicles by 2035.** ACU supports all forms of vehicle propulsion, opposes this attack by Leftists on the automotive industry and consumer choice and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on April 20, 2021 by a vote of 110-40 and the bill was signed into law.
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25. **SB 4402B Advancing Frivolous Litigation by Permitting Alterations of Government Documents Based Solely on Gender “Identity.”** ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, and that all individuals should be treated with the utmost dignity and respect. ACU opposes ploys by the Left to fundamentally change women’s sports and subject businesses to lawsuit abuse and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 113-36 and the bill was signed into law.
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26. **SB 4817A Strengthening Free Speech by Ensuring Nonprofit Donor Privacy.** ACU supports free speech as protected under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, supports this measure to prevent donor intimidation and harassment and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 11, 2021 by a vote of 148-1 and the bill was signed into law.
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27. **SB 4884 Expanding Government Bureaucracy Through the Establishment of the “Office of the Utility Customer Advocate.”** ACU recognizes the public service commission already performs these initiatives, opposes expanding government bureaucracy and unnecessarily driving up taxpayer costs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 122-27 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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28. **AB 5082 Advancing New York’s War on Plastic by Banning Hotel Shampoo Bottles.** ACU opposes this government interference in the private sector which drives up costs and worsens consumer lodging experiences and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on April 20, 2021 by a vote of 113-37 and the bill was signed into law.
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29. **SB 5151A Increasing Taxpayer Costs by Prohibiting Schools from Attempting to Collect Unpaid School Meal Fees.** ACU opposes discouraging parental responsibility and the payment of school meal fees, while socializing these costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 118-30 and the bill was signed into law.
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30. **SB 5257C Further Socializing “Affordable” Housing Costs onto Taxpayers Through a New Government Program.** ACU opposes government schemes which socialize affordable housing costs and believes the best way to make housing truly “affordable” is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 146-2 and the bill was signed into law.
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31. **AB 5685A Enriching Union Bosses by Dictating the Expenditures of Nursing Homes.** ACU opposes this government takeover of private nursing home operations which are designed to enrich the greedy union bosses of the SEIU while limiting the ability of facilities to provide the best care and environments for their residents and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on March 9, 2021 by a vote of 101-47. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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32. **SB 6173 Increasing Energy Costs by Extending the State's Moratorium on Petroleum and Natural Gas Facilities.** ACU supports all sources of energy, believes government should not support one source of energy over another, opposes this mandate which unnecessarily drives up energy costs and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 19, 2021 by a vote of 112-35 and the bill was signed into law.
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33. **AB 6193 Driving Up Costs by Mandating Utility Companies Change Communication Systems to Address Customers by Preferred Pronouns.** ACU recognizes updating all company verbal and written communication systems and tracking preferred pronouns creates significant costs. ACU opposes this mandate which drives up costs and exposes companies to lawsuit abuse which is ultimately passed onto utility customers through higher rates and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 99-48 and the bill was signed into law.
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34. **SB 6576 Hiking Taxpayer Medicaid Spending by Covering Services of Clinical Social Workers.** ACU opposes further expanding a program rife with fraud and waste and this measure which is largely designed to enrich the social work industry and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 3, 2021 by a vote of 136-12 and the bill was signed into law.
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35. **AB 6608A Expanding the Government Nanny State by Mandating Lead Paint Tests for Every Real Estate Transaction and Reporting Results to Government.** ACU opposes this government overreach and invasion of privacy while unnecessarily increasing taxpayer costs (who pay for the tests) and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 102-46. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
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36. **SB 6610 Fueling Out-of-Control Spending by Extending the Ability of New York City to Issue Bonds (Debt).** ACU opposes further plunging taxpayers into debt and fueling the out-of-control spending of a city that is ranked as one of the worst financially run cities in the nation and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 1, 2021 by a vote of 100-47 and the bill was signed into law.
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37. **SB 6697 Increasing Costs within the Unemployment System by Extending the Self-Employment Assistance Program.** While ACU supports entrepreneurship we oppose abuse of the unemployment system which results in less investment and hiring due to higher payroll taxes on businesses and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 2, 2021 by a vote of 135-13 and the bill was signed into law.
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38. **SB 6797 Reducing Economic Growth by Extending the City of Yonkers' Income Tax Surcharge.** ACU supports fostering economic growth by establishing a tax code with the lowest possible rates for everyone and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 113-36 and the bill was signed into law.
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39. **AB 7119 Driving Up Nursing Home Costs by Imposing Staffing Level Mandates.** ACU opposes driving up nursing home costs through these mandates primarily designed to enrich the greedy union bosses of the SEIU and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 126-24 and the bill was signed into law.
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40. **AB 7192A Expanding Mobility Options by Allowing the Operation of a Three-Wheel Autocycles with a Regular Driver's License.** ACU supports expanding mobility options by making New York one of 48 other states that permits the operation of an autocycle without a special motorcycle license and supported this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 1, 2021 by a vote of 146-1 and the bill was signed into law.
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41. **SB 7196 Attempting to Shut down the Firearm Industry by Subjecting Manufactures to Unreasonable Legal Liabilities.** ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment opposes the Left's quest to shutdown firearm manufacturing and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 94-55 and the bill was signed into law.
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42. **AB 7290 Increasing Home Heating Costs Through Biodiesel Fuel Mandates.** ACU supports all sources of energy and believes government should not favor one source of energy over another. ACU opposes this mandate which drives up heating costs for businesses and families and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on May 19, 2021 by a vote of 143-4 and the bill was signed into law.
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43. **AB 7688 Placing Taxpayer Funds at Risk by Further Expanding the Lending Authority of the State's Dormitory Authority.** ACU opposes placing nearly a billion dollars of additional taxpayer funds at risk and believes the state should instead eliminate certificate of need laws and countless other government regulatory barriers (such as AB7119 and AB5685 in this year's scorecard) to spur private investment in hospital and nursing home projects and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on June 7, 2021 by a vote of 140-9 and the bill was signed into law.
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44. **SB 50001 Further Infringing Property Rights by Extending the COVID-19 Eviction Moratorium on Residential and Commercial Property to Jan. 15, 2022.** ACU recognizes that landlords oftentimes have mortgages and other expenses themselves, and firmly opposes the Left's "cancel rent" movement which drives up rental costs for everyone and opposed this bill. The Assembly passed the bill on September 1, 2021 by a vote of 81-60 and the bill was signed into law.
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
