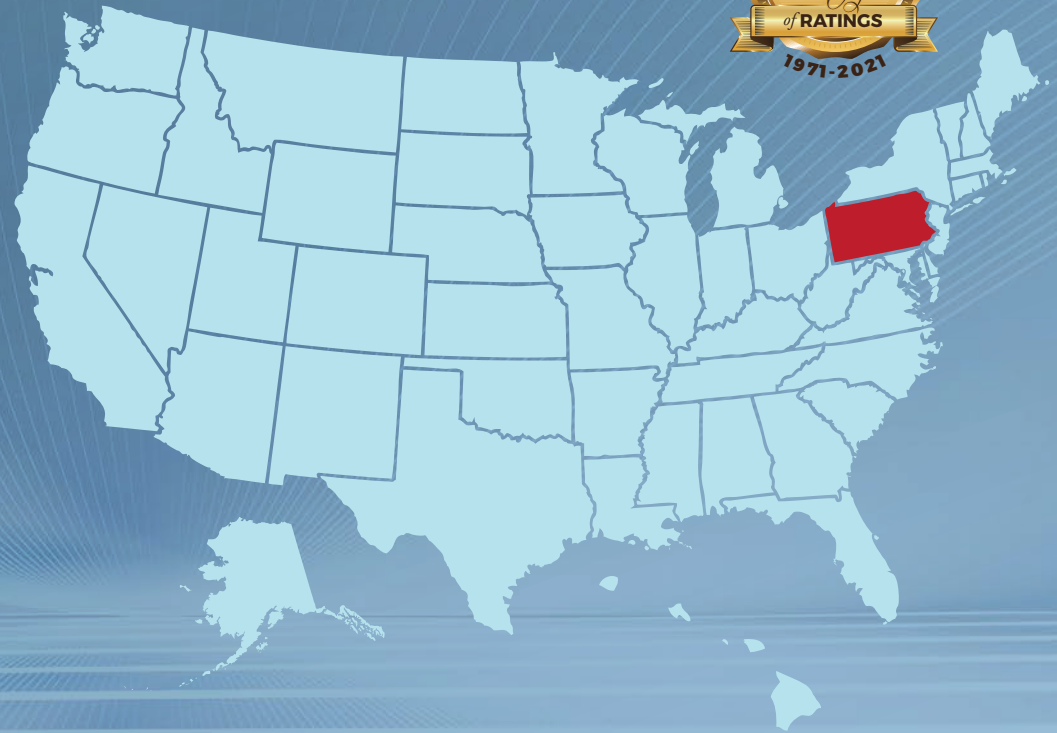

## ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

## METHODOLOGY

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)

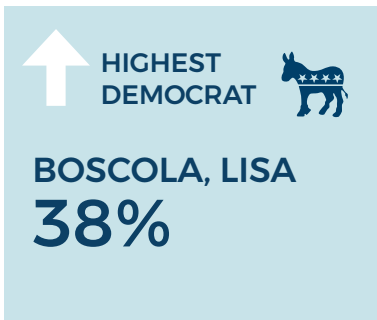

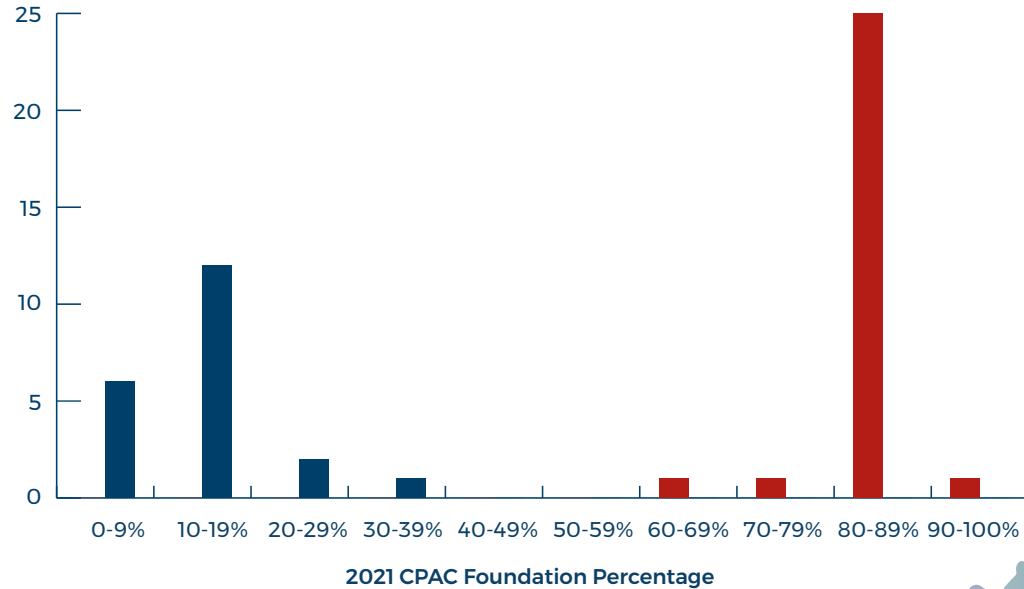
## PENNSYLVANIA SENATE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS

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## PENNSYLVANIA SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SCRRR 1 Preventing Skyrocketing Energy Costs by Disapproving Entrance into the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI).** ACU opposes driving up the utility costs of millions of Pennsylvanians to advance Leftist initiatives and a politicized global warming agenda and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 32-18.
2. **SB 2 Amending the Constitution to Place a Legislative Check on Executive Branch Emergency Declaration Powers.** ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports providing a legislative check on executive orders and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on January 26, 2021 by a vote of 28-20 and the amendment was passed by voters.
3. **SB 28 Increase Government Transparency Within the Permitting Process.** ACU supports efforts to increase government transparency and reduce regulatory burdens and delays within the permitting process and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 28-20 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
4. **SB 64 Expanding the Scope of the Crony Farmland Preservation Fund.** ACU recognizes this bill expands eligibility under the farmland preservation fund and paves the way for a greater infusion of taxpayer funds into the program in future years. ACU opposes this program which socializes the costs of farmland preservation onto the backs of taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 23, 2021 by a vote of 42-4 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
5. **HB 101 Protecting the Agritourism Industry from Unreasonable Legal Liabilities.** ACU supports tort reform and expanding agritourism by protecting farms from lawsuit abuse due to circumstances outside of their control and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 48-2 and the bill was signed into law.
6. **HR 106 Reopening the Economy by Terminating Gov. Wolf's COVID-19 Emergency Declaration.** ACU supports ending the state's emergency declaration, believes many of government's reactions to COVID-19 did more harm than good and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 30-20 and with the concurrence of the House the emergency declaration ended.
7. **SB 115 Reducing Regulatory Barriers by Entering the State into the Nurse Licensure Compact.** ACU recognizes this bill would make Pennsylvania the 37th state to join the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC). ACU supports expanding competition and employment opportunities through licensing reciprocity and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 12, 2021 by a vote of 32-16 and the bill was signed into law.
8. **SB 119 Protecting Pennsylvanians from the Draconian Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative.** ACU recognizes the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) is a cap-and-trade program which places limits and assesses fees on the carbon dioxide emissions of electric energy producers, which costs are then passed on to consumers through higher utility rates. The revenue collected through this scheme is oftentimes directed to Leftist initiatives relating to climate change and energy efficiency. ACU opposes driving up the utility costs of millions of Pennsylvanians to advance Leftist initiatives and a politicized global warming agenda and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 14, 2021 by a vote of 35-15 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
9. **SB 126 Combatting Excessive Regulations Through an Automatic Three-Year Review of Economically Significant Regulations.** ACU supports expanding economic growth through the review and repeal of all unnecessary regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 27-21 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
10. **SR 139 Urging the EPA to Reform the Renewable Fuel Standard and Reduce RIN Credit Prices.** ACU opposes ethanol fuel mandates which cause significant damage to older vehicles and small engines due to ethanol's corrosive properties, opposes driving up refinery costs by mandating the purchase of RINs under the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) and supported this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 47-3.



11. **SB 157 Socializing the Housing Costs of “First-Time Homebuyers” onto Taxpayers.** ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes this cronyism which further distorts the real estate market while transferring tax burdens onto other individuals not favored by government (e.g., renters) and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 19, 2021 by a vote of 46-3 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  12. **SB 191 Exempting Agricultural Buildings Used for Special Events from Excessive Building Regulations.** ACU supports advancing “Agritainment” by exempting barns and other structures from the state’s stringent Uniform Construction Code and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 24, 2021 by a vote of 28-19 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  13. **SB 266 Providing Unnecessary Funding to the University of Pittsburg Without Safeguards Against Abhorrent Abortion Practices.** ACU recognizes the University of Pittsburg is the 27th wealthiest university in the country with a \$4.2 billion endowment and further recognizes socializing higher education costs represents one of the largest wealth transfers from low-income to higher income individuals. ACU opposes channeling taxpayer funds to a wealthy university that has committed atrocities in its “research” on aborted children and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 45-5 and the bill was signed into law.

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  14. **SB 275 Prohibiting Localities from Restricting or Banning Natural Gas Utility Service.** ACU recognizes this bill is largely in response to local governments in California, Washington, and Massachusetts which have banned natural gas in new residential developments. ACU supports all sources of energy, does not believe the government should favor one type of energy source over another, supports strengthening property rights, and supported the bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 35-15 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  15. **SB 341 Advancing Deregulation Within the Telecommunication Industry.** ACU supports this measure to reduce antiquated and unnecessary regulations impacting landline telephone companies while paving the way for greater private investment in rural broadband and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 28-19 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  16. **SB 347 Providing Tax Relief by Aligning State Code to Federal Regarding “Like-Kind” Property Tax Deferrals.** ACU supports expanding economic growth through broadly provided tax relief and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 9, 2021 by a vote of 33-17 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  17. **SB 349 Providing Tax Relief by Aligning State Code to Federal Regarding Section 179 Business Expense Deductions.** ACU supports expanding economic growth through broadly provided tax relief and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 27, 2021 by a vote of 31-19 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  18. **SB 426 Combatting Excessive Regulations by Providing Additional Legislative Oversight of the Regulatory Review Process.** ACU supports expanding economic growth by reducing unnecessary regulations and providing a legislative check on the powers of unaccountable government bureaucrats and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 27-20 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

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  19. **SB 448 (Santarsiero Amd.) Establishing a Costly and Burdensome Barrier to Exercise Second Amendment Rights – Private Party Background Checks (Motion to Defeat).** The Santarsiero (ACUF Lifetime 12%) amendment to the firearm preemption bill. ACU recognizes that countless studies have found no correlation between imposing universal background checks and reducing unlawful usage of firearms. These sorts of legislative barriers do nothing to stop criminals from engaging in additional criminal behaviors; they just make it more difficult for law-abiding citizens who are not committing crimes to exercise their constitutional rights. ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment, opposes this political attack intended to prevent law-abiding citizens from accessing firearms and opposed this amendment. The Senate voted to table (defeat) the amendment on November 9, 2021 by a vote of 30-20. (A “YES” vote supported the ACU position.)
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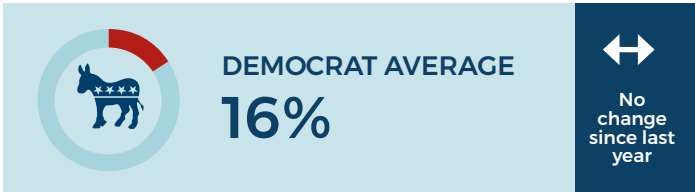
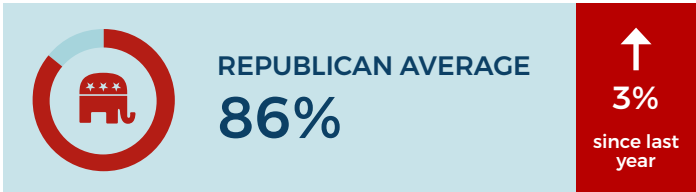
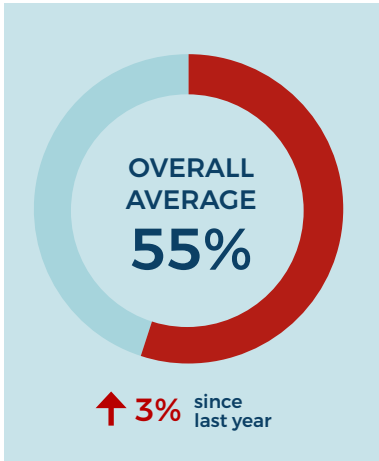
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20. **SB 448 (Fontana Amd.) Seizing Firearms without Due Process Through “Red Flag” Confiscations (Motion to Defeat).** The Fontana (ACUF Lifetime 23%) amendment to the firearm preemption bill. ACU opposes this and other so-called “red flag” measures, supports the founders’ belief in both in the Second Amendment and due process under the law and opposed this amendment. The Senate voted to table (defeat) the amendment on November 9, 2021 by a vote of 30-20. (A “YES” vote supported the ACU position.)
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21. **SB 448 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Preempting Local Gun Control.** ACU supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment and protecting Pennsylvanians from having their rights infringed by localities and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 9, 2021 by a vote of 31-19 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
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22. **SB 461 Providing a Legislative Check on the Appointment of the Director of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency.** ACU supports this legislative check on executive branch power and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 21, 2021 by a vote of 30-19 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
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23. **SB 520 Combatting Excessive Regulation Through a State Version of the Federal REINS Act.** ACU has long supported the federal REINS Act (Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny) and greater oversight of costly regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 26, 2021 by a vote of 27-21 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
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24. **SB 565 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights Through “Constitutional Carry” (Permitless Carry).** ACU supports the founder’s belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on November 9, 2021 by a vote of 29-21 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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25. **SB 566 Expanding Competition within the State’s Liquor License Auction System.** ACU supports a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry through the elimination of caps on liquor licenses but supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 26-24 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
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26. **SB 618 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Banning Government-Mandated COVID-19 Vaccine Passports.** ACU supports strengthening individual liberties, supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses and decide whether or not to receive a COVID-19 vaccination and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 29-21 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 
27. **SB 635 Expanding the Crony Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE) Program.** ACU does not believe it is the proper role of government to provide financing or loan collection services, opposes the C-PACE program which harms the lending industry and places taxpayers at risk in the event of a default and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 42-8 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
28. **SB 706 Socializing Manufacturing Costs of Government-Favored Companies Through the Max Manufacturing Initiative Fund.** ACU opposes this cronyism which provides competitive advantages to select companies and industries favored by government while socializing the costs onto taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 13, 2021 by a vote of 44-5 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
29. **SB 735 (Cappelletti Amd.) Amending the State Constitution to Provide a Right to Abortion (Motion to Defeat).** The Cappelletti (ACUF Lifetime 10%) amendment to the voter ID constitutional amendment. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and opposed this amendment. The Senate voted to table (defeat) the amendment on June 23, 2021 by a vote of 29-21. (A “YES” vote supported the ACU position.)
- 
30. **SB 735 Strengthening Election Integrity Through a Constitutional Amendment Requiring Voter ID.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 23, 2021 by a vote of 30-20 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.

31. **SB 777 Reducing Regulatory Burdens by Exempting Vehicles Less than 5 Years Old from Emissions Testing.** ACU supports protecting motorists from burdensome and costly vehicle emissions testing and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 19, 2021 by a vote of 29-20 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
32. **SB 786 Expanding School Choice by Broadening the State's Open Campus Initiative to Include Charter Schools.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on October 19, 2021 by a vote of 29-20 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
33. **SB 913 Reducing Taxpayer Costs and Improving the Utilization of Public Safety Resources Through Probation Reform.** ACUF's Nolan Center for Justice is a national leader in criminal justice reform and works to cut crime, reduce taxpayer costs, protect victims, define the proper scope of government, and responsibly reduce incarceration rates. ACU supports this measure to help better direct limited taxpayer resources to fighting crime and improving public safety and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 46-4 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
34. **SB 937 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Prohibiting COVID-19 Vaccination Mandates for Public School Students.** ACU supports strengthening parental rights and individual liberties, supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illness and COVID-19 and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 13, 2021 by a vote of 28-21 but the bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.
- 
35. **HB 952 Expanding Cronyism through Countless Subsidies and Tax Carve-Outs to Government-Favored Companies.** ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes tax carve-outs which provide competitive advantages to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens to individuals and businesses not favored by government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 46-4 and the bill was signed into law.
- 
36. **HB 1154 Permanently Legalizing To-Go Sales of Cocktails and Alcoholic Beverages.** ACU supports expanding individual liberties and consumer choice through a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry and eliminating unnecessary and anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 26-24 but the Senate failed to later advance the bill with the House amendments.
- 
37. **HB 1300 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter-ID and Multiple Other Reforms to Reduce Vote Fraud.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 29-21 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 
38. **HB 1332 Improving Public School Accountability through Curriculum Transparency.** ACU supports strengthening parental rights, supports efforts to improve the accountability of public schools to parents and students and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 13, 2021 by a vote of 28-21 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 
39. **HB 1510 Advancing Unnecessary Spending Within the Department of Community and Economic Development.** ACU recognizes that according to the Office of Small Business Advocate's website, the entity is "fully funded by annual assessments levied on Pennsylvania utilities and workers' compensation insurers" and "not funded under Pennsylvania's General Fund for its operations". ACU further recognizes the entity has grown into a bureaucracy with over seven full time employees. ACU supports all efforts to restrain runaway government spending, opposes this nearly \$2 million appropriation and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 50-0 and the bill was signed into law.
- 
40. **HB 1642 Improving Educational Outcomes by Expanding School Choice Under the Economically Disadvantaged Schools Program.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on December 14, 2021 by a vote of 30-19 but the amended version failed to advance in the House in 2021.
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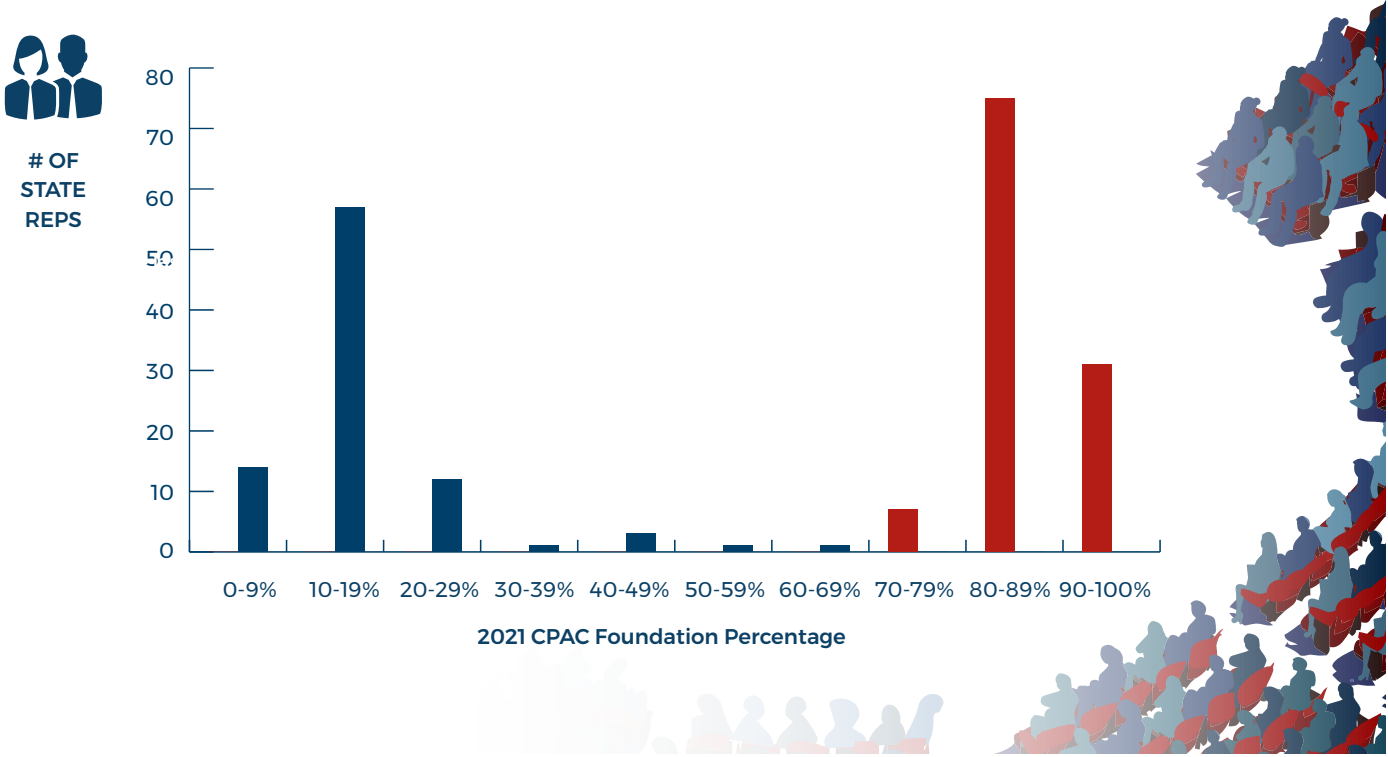
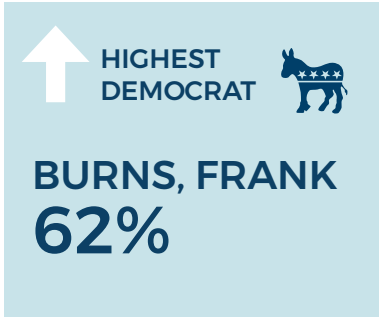
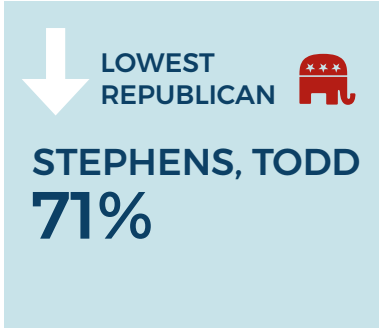

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## PENNSYLVANIA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1. SCRRR 1 Preventing Skyrocketing Energy Costs by Disapproving Entrance into the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI).** ACU opposes driving up the utility costs of millions of Pennsylvanians to advance Leftist initiatives and a politicized global warming agenda and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 130-70.
- 2. SB 2 Amending the Constitution to Place a Legislative Check on Executive Branch Emergency Declaration Powers.** ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports providing a legislative check on executive orders and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 5, 2021 by a vote of 116-86 and the amendment was passed by voters.
- 3. HB 72 Combatting Excessive Regulation Through a State Version of the Federal REINS Act.** ACU has long supported the federal REINS Act (Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny) and greater oversight of costly regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 108-93 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
- 4. HB 101 Protecting the Agritourism Industry from Unreasonable Legal Liabilities.** ACU supports tort reform and expanding agritourism by protecting farms from lawsuit abuse due to circumstances outside of their control and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 147-54 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. HR 106 Reopening the Economy by Terminating Gov. Wolf's COVID-19 Emergency Declaration.** ACU supports ending the state's emergency declaration, believes many of government's reactions to COVID-19 did more harm than good and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on June 10, 2021 by a vote of 121-81 and with the concurrence of the Senate the emergency declaration ended.
- 6. SB 106 Amending the Constitution to Limit Executive Orders and Strengthen Election Integrity Through Voter ID and Audits.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, supports protecting individual rights through this check on executive branch powers and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 113-87.
- 7. SB 115 Reducing Regulatory Barriers by Entering the State into the Nurse Licensure Compact.** ACU recognizes this bill would make Pennsylvania the 37th state to join the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC). ACU supports expanding competition and employment opportunities through licensing reciprocity and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 146-55 and the bill was signed into law.
- 8. HB 118 Protecting the Dignity of Aborted Fetal Remains.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions to end the practice and ensure that the human remains from this tragedy be treated with the utmost respect and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 9, 2021 by a vote of 118-83 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
- 9. HB 118 (Cephas Amd). Increasing Healthcare Costs by Forcing Obstetricians to Undergo "Implicit Bias" Training.** The Cephas (ACUF Lifetime 14%) amendment to the disposition of fetal remains bill. ACU supports equal rights under the law for all and believes all individuals should be treated with dignity and respect. ACU opposes this measure designed to enrich radical leftist consultants at the expense of Obstetricians and healthcare providers and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 90-113.
- 10. HB 122 Reducing Regulatory Barriers by Authorizing Agricultural Equipment to be Driven to School Events.** ACU supports expanding education and interest in agriculture by reducing regulatory barriers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on November 15, 2021 by a vote of 115-84 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.



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11. **HB 139 Reducing Delays and Improving the Efficiency of the State Permitting Process.** ACU supports limiting delays in the permitting process that increase business costs, reduce employment and harm development and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 113-88 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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12. **HR 148 Urging the EPA to Reform the Renewable Fuel Standard and Reduce RIN Credit Prices.** ACU opposes ethanol fuel mandates which cause significant damage to older vehicles and small engines due to ethanol's corrosive properties, opposes driving up refinery costs by mandating the purchase of RINs under the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on November 8, 2021 by a vote of 192-8.
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13. **HB 186 Protecting the Ability of Milk Haulers to Travel on Highways During Declared Disaster Emergencies.** ACU supports strengthening regulatory certainty and protecting the ability of private companies to operate and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 125-77 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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14. **SB 266 Providing Unnecessary Funding to the University of Pittsburg Without Safeguards Against Abhorrent Abortion Practices.** ACU recognizes the University of Pittsburg is the 27th wealthiest university in the country with a \$4.2 billion endowment and further recognizes socializing higher education costs represents one of the largest wealth transfers from low-income to higher income individuals. ACU opposes channeling taxpayer funds to a wealthy university that has committed atrocities in its "research" on aborted children and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 150-51 and the bill was signed into law.
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15. **HB 288 Helping Businesses Navigate Regulations by Requiring Agencies to Designate an Employee as an Ombudsman.** ACU supports efforts to help small businesses navigate complex regulations and attempts to solve noncompliance before imposing penalties and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 106-95 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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16. **HB 406 Encouraging Employment by Reinstating Work Search Requirements for Unemployment Compensation.** ACU supports expanding economic growth by encouraging individuals to reenter the workforce and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 25, 2021 by a vote of 130-71 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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17. **SB 442 (Lawrence Amd.) Strengthening Government Transparency by Applying the "Right-to-Know" Act to the Broadband Bill.** The Lawrence (ACUF Lifetime 84%) amendment to the broadband bill. ACU supports strengthening government transparency and accountability by ensuring government actions are publicly accessible and supported this amendment. The House passed the amendment on June 21, 2021 by a vote of 150-51.
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18. **SB 565 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights Through "Constitutional Carry" (Permitless Carry).** ACU supports the founder's belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on November 16, 2021 by a vote of 107-92 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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19. **HB 581 Expanding Cronyism Through Tax Exemptions to Government Favored Developers of "Affordable" Housing.** ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches select companies while shifting tax burdens to other industries and individuals not favored by government. ACU believes the best way to make housing truly "affordable" is by eliminating excessive building and zoning mandates and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 183-18 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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20. **HB 598 Strengthening Property Rights by Limiting Prescriptive Easements for Public Use.** ACU believes any prescriptive easements (right to access another's land) should be granted for public uses only and believes the Supreme Court's decision in *Kelo v. New London* was one of the most atrocious decisions in history. ACU supports this measure to strengthen property rights and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on October 26, 2021 by a vote of 111-87 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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21. **HB 605 Reopening the Economy Through COVID-19 Liability Protections.** ACU supports this critical measure to help allow businesses to reopen by protecting them from frivolous litigation and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2021 by a vote of 107-94 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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22. **HB 606 (DeLissio Amd.) Placing Additional Financial Burdens on Motorists by Expanding the Speed Camera Program.** The DeLissio (ACUF Lifetime 16%) amendment to the automated speed enforcement bill. ACU opposes automated traffic citation systems and has serious concerns over the use of these systems to grow the government surveillance state and opposed this amendment. The House passed the Amendment on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 140-61 but the bill failed to advance in 2021.
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23. **SB 618 (Frankel Amd.) Attacking Parental Rights by Providing Vaccinations to 14-Year-Old Children Without Parental Consent.** The Frankel (ACUF Lifetime 13%) amendment to the bill prohibiting vaccine passports in response to COVID-19. ACU opposes this attack on parental rights and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 73-128.
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24. **SB 618 Strengthening Individual Liberties by Banning Government-Mandated COVID-19 Vaccine Passports.** ACU supports strengthening individual liberties, supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses and decide whether or not to receive a COVID-19 vaccination and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 23, 2021 by a vote of 112-89 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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25. **HB 747 Protecting Business Operations During Government Disaster Emergency Declarations.** ACU supports the ability of Americans to manage their own risk related to illnesses, believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2021 by a vote of 117-84 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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26. **HB 860 (Sainato Amendment) Imposing New Costly and Overly Stringent Smoke Detector Mandates.** The Sainato (ACUF Lifetime 40%) amendment to the bill banning replaceable battery smoke alarms. ACU recognizes that while well-intentioned, these additional mandates concerning batteries and interconnected capabilities significantly drives up smoke detector costs, oftentimes resulting in consumers and landlords placing less alarms around homes. ACU opposes this government overreach which leads to unintended consequences and opposed this amendment. The House passed the amendment on November 16, 2021 by a vote of 177-22 but the bill failed to advance in 2021.
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27. **HB 939 Reducing Unnecessary Regulations Through the Creation of the "Independent Office of the Repealer."** ACU supports expanding business growth through efforts to evaluate the relevance and costs of the state's many thousands of regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 24, 2021 by a vote of 111-90 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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28. **HB 950 Reducing Unnecessary Regulations by Strengthening the Regulatory Review Act.** ACU supports expanding economic growth by reducing unnecessary regulations and providing a legislative check on the powers of unaccountable government bureaucrats and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 109-92 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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29. **HB 952 Expanding Cronyism Through Countless Subsidies and Tax Carve-Outs to Government-Favored Companies.** ACU supports a tax code that is broadly applied with as low of rates as possible for everyone. ACU opposes tax carve-outs which provide competitive advantages to select companies and industries while shifting tax burdens to individuals and businesses not favored by government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 25, 2021 by a vote of 170-31 and the bill was signed into law.
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30. **HB 979 Strengthening Second Amendment Rights by Prohibiting Localities from Imposing Gun Control.** ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 124-79 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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31. **HB 1041 Providing Home Schooled Students the Ability to Participate in Academic Classes and Co-curricular Activities.** ACU supports school choice and providing home schooled students the same opportunities as other students and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on November 8, 2021 by a vote of 136-64 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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32. **HB 1154 Permanently Legalizing To-Go Sales of Cocktails and Alcoholic Beverages.** ACU supports expanding individual liberties and consumer choice through a freer market in the alcoholic beverage industry and eliminating unnecessary and anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 170-31 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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33. **HB 1300 Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter-ID and Multiple Other Reforms to Reduce Vote Fraud.** ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 22, 2021 by a vote of 110-91 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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34. **HB 1332 Improving Public School Accountability Through Curriculum Transparency.** ACU supports strengthening parental rights, supports efforts to improve the accountability of public schools to parents and students and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 15, 2021 by a vote of 112-88 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
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35. **HB 1387 Strengthening the Integrity of the Unemployment Compensation System by Requiring Claimants to Demonstrate Wage Loss.** ACU recognizes the unemployment system is funded through payroll taxes and measures such as this help lower employment costs. ACU supports efforts to combat fraud and encourage individuals to reenter the workforce and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 15, 2021 by a vote of 113-89 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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36. **HB 1443 Expanding Competition by Permitting Clinical Laboratories to Advertise Services Directly to Consumers.** ACU supports expanding access to healthcare and reducing costs by reforming anti-competitive regulations and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on November 8, 2021 by a vote of 170-30 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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37. **HB 1500 Protecting Life by Prohibiting Abortion Due to Down Syndrome.** ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on June 8, 2021 by a vote of 120-83 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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38. **HB 1510 Advancing Unnecessary Spending Within the Department of Community and Economic Development.** ACU recognizes that according to the Office of Small Business Advocate's website, the entity is "fully funded by annual assessments levied on Pennsylvania utilities and workers' compensation insurers" and "not funded under Pennsylvania's General Fund for its operations". ACU further recognizes the entity has grown into a bureaucracy with over seven full time employees. ACU supports all efforts to restrain runaway government spending, opposes this nearly \$2 million appropriation and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on June 16, 2021 by a vote of 169-33 and the bill was signed into law.
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39. **HB 1615 Restricting Competition by Further Worsening the State's Protectionist Three-Tier Alcoholic Beverage Delivery System.** ACU recognizes this bill is designed to further enrich malt and beer wholesalers by closing a "loophole" that permits out-of-state manufacturers to self-distribute. ACU supports the elimination of the state's three-tiered system which studies by numerous conservative organizations including the Competitive Enterprise Institute, Mercatus Center and CATO Institute have found restricts competition and drives-up consumer costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on October 26, 2021 by a vote of 137-61 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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40. **HB 1642 Improving Educational Outcomes by Expanding School Choice Under the Economically Disadvantaged Schools Program.** ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing taxpayer costs by responsibly expanding school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on October 5, 2021 by a vote of 116-84 but the House failed to later advance the bill with the Senate amendments.
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41. **HB 1738 Combatting Unconstitutional Executive Orders by Directing Review by the Joint State Government Commission.** ACU supports strengthening state rights and placing a check on unconstitutional actions taken by the federal government and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on December 14, 2021 by a vote of 132-71 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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42. **HB 2044 Strengthening Election Integrity by Prohibiting Private Funds for Election Administration.** ACU recognizes this bill is in response to individuals such as Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg who, in the 2020 election, channeled over \$400 million through his nonprofit entities to influence the operations of local election offices. ACU supports efforts to strengthen the integrity of our elections and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on December 14, 2021 by a vote of 113-90 but the bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.
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
