SELECTING THE VOTES

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected. To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.





SJR 242 Repealing the True Definition of Marriage.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that repeals another constitutional amendment defining marriage as a union between one man and one woman. CPAC supports efforts to preserve the true definition of marriage and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed this bill on February 6, 2023 by a vote of 25-14 but the resolution stalled in the House.

SJR 255 Creating a Non-Existent Right to Have an Abortion in Virginia.

This resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that would arrogate to the people the right to have an abortion. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its expansion, and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed this resolution on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 21-18 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 956 Increasing Government Intervention in the Marketplace with New Business Improvement Districts.

This bill allows localities to set up business improvement districts. These districts have the power to charge fees to businesses, the likes of which they may then use for business promotion and recruitment activities. CPAC opposes increasing fees on businesses, believes that it is not the job of the government to promote entities within the private sector, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 20, 2023 by a vote of 38-2 and the bill later became law.

SB 1134 Crony Special Interest Grants for Precision Plastic Manufacturing Firms.

This bill sets up a \$56,000,000 grant fund for qualifying precision plastic manufacturing enterprises. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward certain industries, does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help pay the costs of private businesses, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 3, 2023 by a vote of 38-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 1136 Interfering in the Private Negotiations Between Employers and Prospective Employees.

This bill prohibits employers from seeking out information concerning the salary history of a prospective employee. It also prevents them from determining a prospective employee's wages based on their salary history. CPAC opposes efforts to institute more mandates on the employee hiring process and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 3, 2023 by a vote of 20-18 but the bill stalled in the House.





SB 1167 Waging War on the Firearms Industry.

This bill creates certain ill-defined "standards of conduct" that a firearms industry member must follow when engaged in the sale of a weapon. It then allows individuals to initiate lawsuits against entities that do not follow these standards. CPAC opposes the imposition of vague and ill-defined regulations on members of the firearms industry and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 26, 2023 by a vote of 21-19 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1192 Expanding Virginia's Gun-Free Zones.

This bill prohibits individuals from carrying semi-automatic rifles, pistols, or shotguns in places open to the public. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 30, 2023 by a vote of 21-18 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1243 Attempting to Turn Virginia into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits the state from extraditing individuals in response to criminal charges from another state that target their involvement in an abortion procedure. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its protection, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 23-17 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1248 Incentivizing Companies to Adopt Racist Promotion and Hiring Processes.

This bill prohibits the MEI Project Approval Commission from approving projects for businesses that do not commit to having 30% of their board be women or from "historically underrepresented groups." CPAC opposes racial discrimination, opposes measures that encourage companies to engage in racial discrimination, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 22-18 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1258 Forcing Taxpayers to Finance Bread and Circuses.

This bill adds entertainment arenas to the definition of "public facilities." It then allows municipalities to issue bonds in order to finance the construction of public facilities. CPAC does not believe that taxpayer resources should be placed on the hook such that places of entertainment may be constructed and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 24, 2023 by a vote of 31-9 and the bill later became law.





SB 1312 Instituting Costly Green Building Mandates.

This bill allows localities to require that a certain number of EV charging stations be created on residential properties. CPAC opposes unnecessary building mandates, the likes of which drive up construction and housing costs, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 22-18 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1333 Propping Up the Solar Industry.

This bill expands the Low to Moderate Income Solar Loan and Rebate Fund such that it now may provide grants to customers who complete certain solar installations. CPAC opposes the expansion of programs that already execute government favoritism toward certain industries and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 3, 2023 by a vote of 26-13 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1382 Banning a Litany of So-Called Assault Weapons.

This bill bans the sale and possession of certain "assault weapons" identified by the government. This list of weapons includes semiautomatic center fire pistols and shotguns. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 31, 2023 by a vote of 23-16 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1408 Adding to Everyone's Sales Tax Burden.

This bill allows counties to levy an additional 1% sales and use tax on the people such that the county may pay for the construction of schools. CPAC believes that counties should instead construct schools with the revenue that they already possess instead of raising the tax burden on the people and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on January 23, 2023 by a vote of 26-10 but the bill stalled in the House.

SB 1459 No TikTok on Government Devices in Virginia.

This bill prohibits government employees and agencies from using TikTok, WeChat, or any other service offered by the Chinese company ByteDance on sensitive devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to increase national security and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 12, 2023 by a vote of 27-13 and the bill later became law.





SB 1466 Enriching Developers and the EV Industry.

This bill creates the Electric Vehicle Rural Infrastructure Program and Fund. Under this program, developers may collectively receive \$25,000,000 in grants per year in order to help them finance the cost of installing EV charging stations. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 40-0 but the bill stalled in the House.

HB 1660 Crony Special Interest Funds for Dairy Producers.

This bill extends the sunset date from 2023 to 2028 on provisions setting up the Dairy Producer Margin Coverage Premium Assistance Fund. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular industries and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 21, 2023 by a vote of 40-0 and the bill later became law.

HB 2171 Protecting Religious Freedoms During Emergencies.

This bill prohibits the Governor from issuing emergency orders that impose restrictions on places of worship that are more severe than those placed on businesses. CPAC opposed the issuance of emergency orders during the COVID-19 pandemic that penalized the free exercise of religion and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed this bill on February 22, 2023 by a vote of 35-5 and the bill later became law.

SB 956 Increasing Government Intervention in the Marketplace with New Business Improvement Districts.

This bill allows localities to set up business improvement districts. These districts have the power to charge fees to businesses, the likes of which they may then use for business promotion and recruitment activities. CPAC opposes increasing fees on businesses, believes that it is not the job of the government to promote the private sector, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 16, 2023 by a vote of 85-13 and the bill later became law.

SB 1134 Crony Special Interest Grants for Precision Plastic Manufacturing Firms.

This bill sets up a \$56,000,000 grant fund for qualifying precision plastic manufacturing enterprises. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward certain industries, does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to help pay the costs of private businesses, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 16, 2023 by a vote of 92-7 and the bill later became law.

SB 1258 Forcing Taxpayers to Finance Bread and Circuses.

This bill adds entertainment arenas to the definition of "public facilities." It then allows municipalities to issue bonds in order to finance the construction of public facilities. CPAC does not believe that taxpayer resources should be placed on the hook such that places of entertainment may be constructed and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 24, 2023 by a vote of 66-29 and the bill later became law.

SB 1459 No TikTok on Government Devices.

This bill prohibits government employees and agencies from using TikTok, WeChat, or any other service offered by the Chinese company ByteDance on sensitive devices. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to increase national security and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 12, 2023 by a vote of 65-29 and the bill later became law.

HB 1378 Repealing Expensive Green Vehicle Mandates.

This bill removes a provision in state law that required the State Air Pollution Control Board to implement a low-emissions or zero-emissions motor vehicle plan by 2025. CPAC supports efforts to roll back the radical Leftist green agenda in states whenever possible and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on January 25, 2023 by a vote of 52-48 but the bill stalled in the Senate.





HB 1379 Shining a Spotlight on Explicit Material Used in Classrooms.

This bill requires that schools maintain a list of the explicit materials that they show to students and then requires that they make that list available to parents. CPAC supports transparency in the classroom and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on January 26, 2023 by a vote of 51-45 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1387 Protecting Girls' Sports in Virginia.

This bill requires that schools designate their teams as being for males, females, or both (coed). It then prohibits males from competing on teams designated for females. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and fair environment of play in school sports and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 51-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1427 Diminishing Virginia's Gun-Free Zones.

This bill divests localities of the power to prohibit the carrying of firearms in public parks, community center facilities, and on public sidewalks. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 52-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1444 Requiring the Presentation of a Voter ID with a Photograph to Vote.

This bill requires that electors present an ID containing a photograph of them on it to election officials in order for them to be permitted to vote. CPAC supports efforts to increase election security and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 52-48 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1507 Reinforcing Parental Rights in Education.

This bill strengthens the public education system's obligation to allow parents the right to direct the upbringing of their child. CPAC supports parental rights in education and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on January 31, 2023 by a vote of 53-46 but the bill stalled in the Senate.





HB 1660 Crony Special Interest Funds for Dairy Producers.

This bill extends the sunset date from 2023 to 2028 on provisions setting up the Dairy Producer Margin Coverage Premium Assistance Fund. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular industries and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 22, 2023 by a vote of 94-1 and the bill later became law.

HB 1783 Fighting a Potential Democrat-backed Gas Stove Ban.

This bill prohibits municipalities from adopting ordinances that prohibit people from receiving natural gas services or supplies from public utilities. CPAC supports all forms of energy, supports efforts to prevent the government from discriminating against one of these forms, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on January 24, 2023 by a vote of 52-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1795 Protecting Born-Alive Infants in Virginia.

This bill requires that abortionists who attempt to terminate a pregnancy protect the life of an infant born alive after an unsuccessful abortion procedure. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, believes that infanticide is evil, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 52-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1816 Acknowledging the Atrocities Committed in the Name of Communism.

This bill requires that, annually, the Governor designate November 7 as Victims of Communism Day in order to honor the millions of lives lost in the name of Communism. CPAC opposes Communism, believes that people should be taught about its atrocities, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 6, 2023 by a vote of 64-36 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 1893 Increasing Transparency in the Classroom.

This bill requires schools to, prior to the start of each school year, post the textbooks and curriculum frameworks that they will be using in order to teach their students. CPAC believes that parents should be allowed to know what their child is being taught and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 3, 2023 by a vote of 51-46 but the bill stalled in the Senate.





HB 1898 Protecting American Interests Abroad.

This bill prevents the government from entering into contracts with companies unless those companies have agreed not to boycott Israel. CPAC supports the US' continued partnership with Israel, supports efforts to prevent the state from contracting with anti-Semitic companies, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 50-48 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 2171 Protecting Religious Freedoms During Emergencies.

This bill prohibits the Governor from issuing emergency orders that impose restrictions on places of worship that are more severe than those placed on businesses. CPAC opposed the issuance of emergency orders during the COVID-19 pandemic that penalized the free exercise of religion and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed this bill on February 23, 2023 by a vote of 53-43 and the bill later became law.

HB 2270 Requiring Informed Consent for Abortions.

This bill requires that physicians procure from women their consent to an abortion prior to performing an abortion. This also means that they must first inform a woman about her right to withdraw her consent to an abortion prior to its performance. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, supports efforts to decrease its practice, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 52-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 2319 Instituting Broad Tax Relief.

This bill reduces the top income tax rate from 5.75% to 5.5%. It also substantially raises the standard deduction for individuals and married couples. CPAC supports efforts to provide appropriate tax relief to Americans and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on January 24, 2023 by a vote of 52-48 but the bill stalled in the Senate.





HB 2432 Providing Parents with Knowledge Concerning their Child's Wellbeing.

This bill requires that parents be notified if their child is experiencing gender dysphoria. It also requires that the school work with the parent in order to develop a plan for the child. CPAC supports efforts to increase parental involvement in schools and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 50-48 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 2454 Cleaning the Voter Rolls and Finding a Use for the USPS.

This bill requires the Department of Elections to perform monthly maintenance on the voter rolls using information provided to it by the US Postal Service. CPAC supports efforts to prevent election fraud and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 7, 2023 by a vote of 50-47 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

HB 2460 Commonsense Gun Control Reform.

This bill prohibits many state agencies from adopting rules that prevent employees from safely storing firearms in locked motor vehicles at their place of work. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on February 2, 2023 by a vote of 54-45 but the bill stalled in the Senate.
