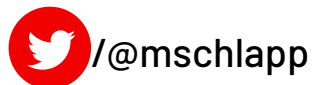
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LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

CENTER FOR
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SELECTING THE VOTES

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the “gold standard” and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America’s federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.

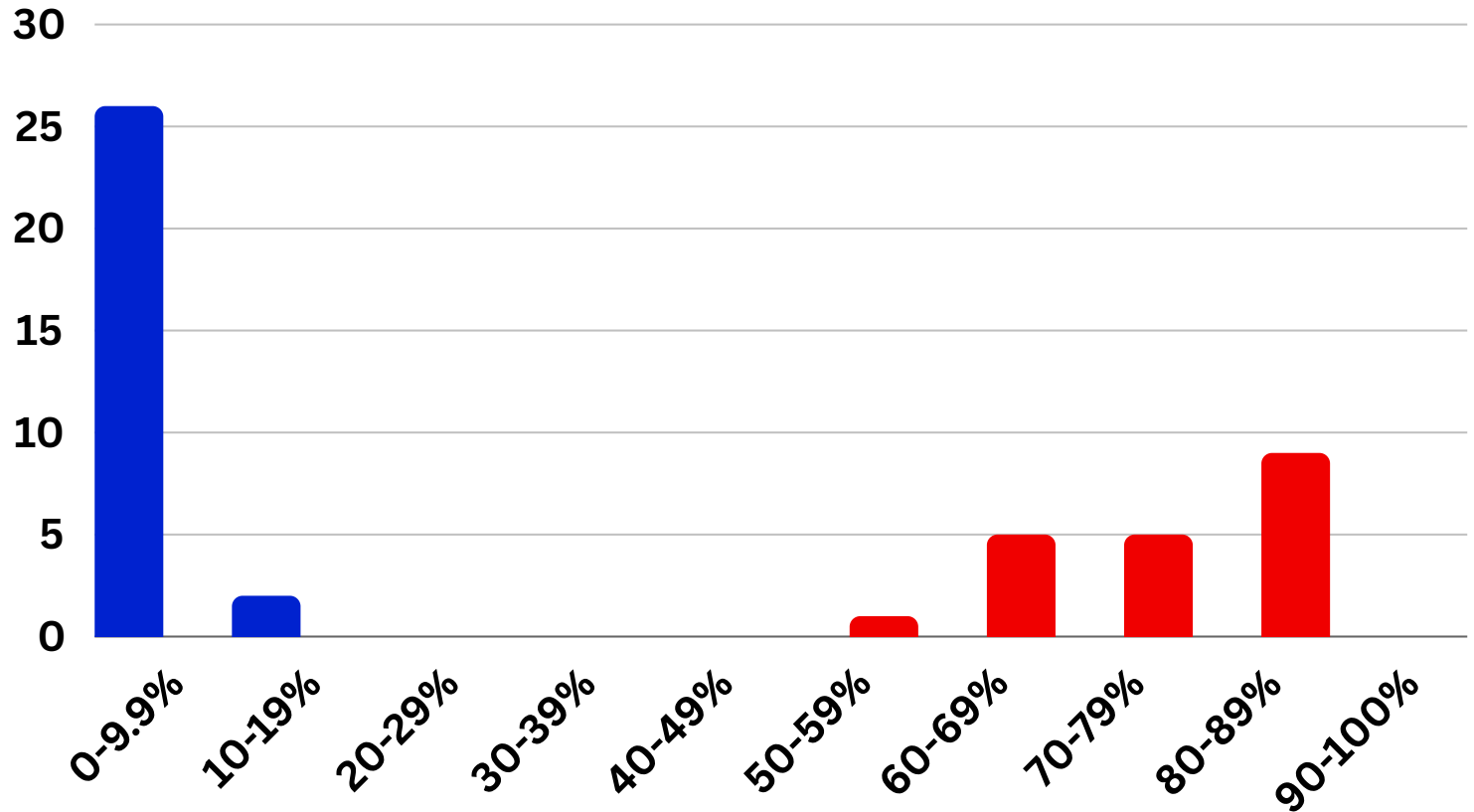

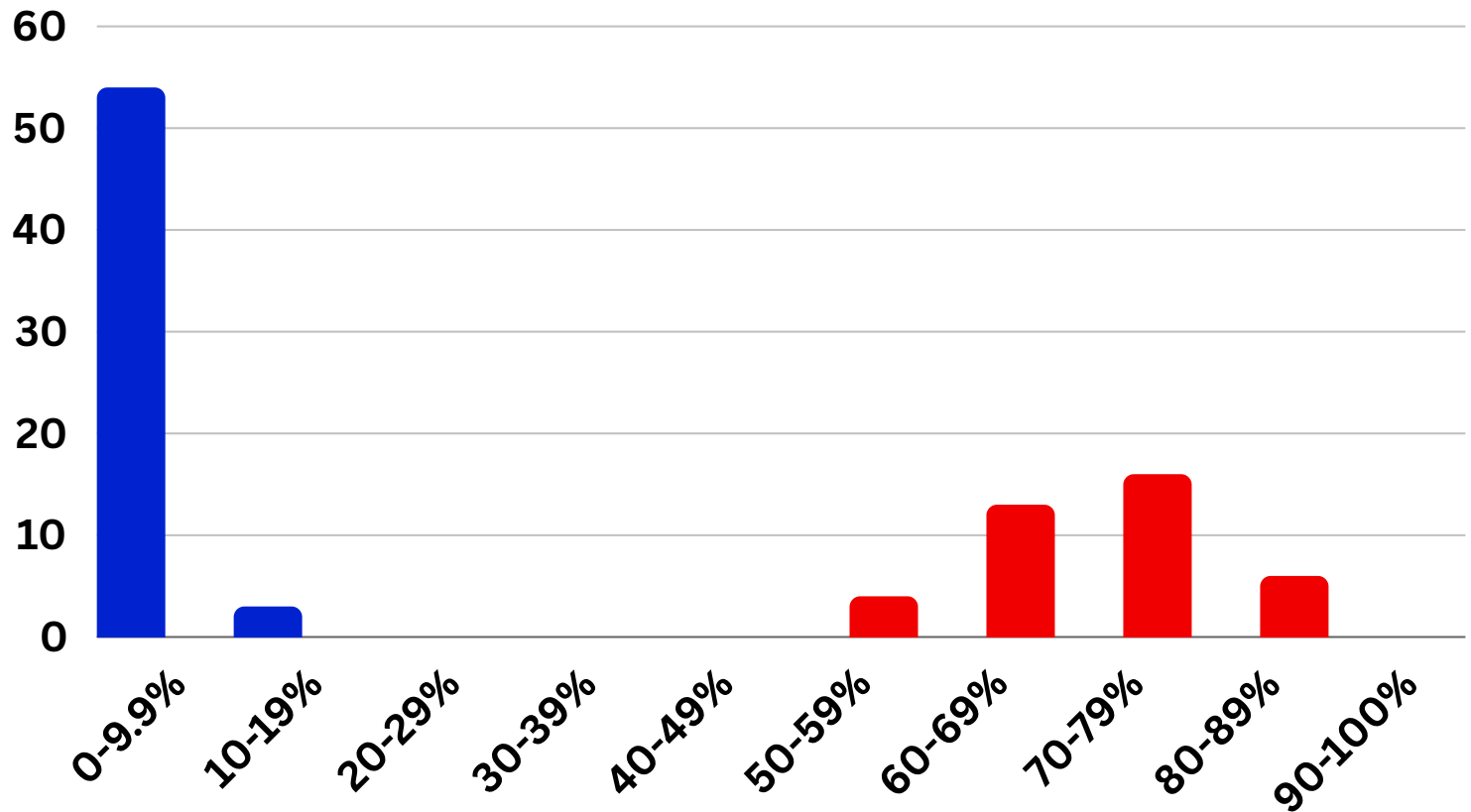

HB 1085 Smorgasbord of Plastic Mandates.

This bill enacts several provisions regulating the use of plastic throughout the state. For example, it prohibits lodging establishments from providing customers with health or beauty products in small plastic containers. It also bans the sale of overwater structures containing non-enclosed expanded foam. CPAC opposes these types of regulations and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 8, 2023 by a vote of 37-11 and the bill later became law.

HB 1122 Allowing Public Managers to Unionize.

This bill grants members of the Washington Management Service the power to collectively bargain. CPAC opposes the expansion of public unions and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 10, 2023 by a vote of 40-9 and the bill later became law.

HB 1207 Making it Easier for Schools to Grind their Bootheel into Conservative Students.

This bill creates a “primary contact” position at schools to investigate instances of so-called bullying and harassment, especially in relation to transgender students. CPAC recognizes that this measure strengthens the ability of schools to indirectly cram down pronoun mandates through punitive measures onto students and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 5, 2023 by a vote of 28-20 and the bill later became law.

HB 1240 Arbitrary Assault Weapons Bans.

This bill bans the distribution, manufacture, and sale of a laundry list of firearms deemed to be “assault weapons.” For Washington, “assault weapons” means everything from semi-automatic rifles that are too long to the wrong type of grip. CPAC supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment, opposes this extensive infringement on Second Amendment freedoms, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 18, 2023 by a vote of 28-21 and the bill later became law.

HB 1447 Engorging the Bloated Welfare State.

This bill makes TANF Time Limit Exemptions permanent and increases asset limits for some of the state’s cash assistance programs to a total of \$8,000. The bill also lets individuals waive the value of a car when considering these asset limits. CPAC opposes measures that increase the people’s dependence on the welfare state and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 21, 2023 by a vote of 31-18 and the bill later became law.



HB 1469 Further Transforming Washington into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits the issuance of out-of-state subpoenas that seek out information relating to the abortion services that one has received. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes the protection of its practice, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 10, 2023 by a vote of 29-20 and the bill later became law.

HB 1474 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund a Racist Housing Program.

This bill establishes a covenant homeownership account and program that will assist certain government-favored racial groups in making down payments and closing costs. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for other people's housing, does not believe that the government should consider race as a factor in its decision-making process, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 7, 2023 by a vote of 30-19 and the bill later became law.

HB 1762 More Regulations for Warehouse Employers.

This bill establishes several new onerous regulations on warehouse employers. For example, it requires such employers to prepare exact measures of the quotas that employees must meet. It then requires employers to designate a reasonable amount of rest time for the quotas that are set. CPAC does not believe that the government should micromanage warehouses and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 22, 2023 by a vote of 28-21 and the bill later became law.

SB 5078 Promoting Frivolous Litigation Against Firearms Industry Members in Washington.

This bill requires that firearms manufacturers implement "reasonable controls" against selling firearms to certain entities. It also prohibits the manufacturer from selling to vendors that do not implement similar controls. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, believes that this measure paves the way for a bevy of frivolous lawsuits against firearms manufacturers, further opposes the vague language used in this bill that leaves the definition of "reasonable controls" indeterminate, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 26-20 and the bill later became law.

SB 5112 Reducing Election Security through Automatic Voter Registration.

This bill automatically registers individuals to vote at the time that they are using other government services that require proof of citizenship. CPAC opposes measures that weaken election security and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 33-13 and the bill later became law.



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WASHINGTON SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SB 5197 Wedging the Government Further into Tenant-Landlord Relationships.

This bill increases the list of information that must be provided to renters on eviction notices. Such information, for example, must include a notice that low-income tenants have the ability to receive legal counsel from the state during eviction proceedings. CPAC already opposes measures that grant people taxpayer-sponsored legal counsel in eviction proceedings, opposes measures that expand the number of people using these services, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 28-18 and the bill later became law.

SB 5238 Expanding Collective Bargaining Rights to Even More Public Employees.

This bill expands collective bargaining rights to public university employees enrolled in academic programs at a public institution of higher education. CPAC opposes the expansion of public sector unions and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 2, 2023 by a vote of 34-15 and the bill later became law.

SB 5242 Raising Health Insurance Costs by Prohibiting Cost-Sharing for Abortions.

This bill prohibits insurance companies from imposing cost-sharing requirements for the abortion of a pregnancy. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its expansion, opposes insurance mandates, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 29-19 and the bill later became law.

SB 5269 Green Central Planning Initiative Across Manufacturing Industries.

This bill directs the Department of Commerce to conduct an independent assessment that plans out how the state will capture emerging green industries and support minority- and women-owned firms. It also requires the state to appoint an industrial policy advisor to help it reach its carbon emissions and manufacturing goals. CPAC opposes central planning initiatives and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 28-14 and the bill later became law.

SB 5331 Loosening Work Search Requirements for Unemployment Benefits.

This bill moves up the date at which individuals are no longer required to, as part of their qualifications for unemployment benefits, perform certain in-person job search activities. It additionally greatly increases the ambiguity of the ways in which one may fulfill these requirements. CPAC opposes measures that expand the welfare state and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 15, 2023 by a vote of 34-15 and the bill later became law.



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WASHINGTON SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SB 5341 Using Government Resources to Promote Washington-Based Food.

This bill sets up a program that will help Washington food producers promote their products and enhance their visibility to consumers. CPAC does not believe that the government should expend its resources on promotional efforts for favored industries and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on February 27, 2023 by a vote of 47-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 5447 Government Largesse for the Alternative Jet Fuel Industry.

This bill enacts several provisions aimed at promoting the growth of the alternative jet fuel industry in Washington. For example, it directs the statewide office of renewable fuels to begin furthering the development and use of alternative fuels throughout the state. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 19, 2023 by a vote of 48-1 and the bill later became law.

SB 5599 Aiding and Abetting Human Traffickers.

This bill allows runaway youths to stay in publicly controlled temporary shelters without telling the youth's parents if it is found that the minor is seeking gender reassignment medical services. CPAC recognizes that the government is not a better parent than actual parents, opposes measures that allow government agents to shield critical information about minors from their parents, and strongly opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 19, 2023 by a vote of 29-20 and the bill later became law.

SB 5768 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay for Abortions for Prisoners.

This bill grants the Department of Corrections the authority to acquire, sell, and distribute abortion medications to individuals, regardless of whether they are in the department's custody or not. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes the expansion of its practice, further opposes the usage of taxpayer resources to fund abortions, and strongly opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 28-18 and the bill later became law.

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HB 1085 Smorgasbord of Plastic Mandates.

This bill enacts several provisions regulating the use of plastic throughout the state. For example, it prohibits lodging establishments from providing customers with health or beauty products in small plastic containers. It also bans the sale of overwater structures containing non-enclosed expanded foam. CPAC opposes these types of regulations and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 97-0 and the bill later became law.

HB 1122 Allowing Public Managers to Unionize.

This bill grants members of the Washington Management Service the power to collectively bargain. CPAC opposes the expansion of public unions and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 4, 2023 by a vote of 88-8 and the bill later became law.

HB 1207 Making it Easier for Schools to Grind their Bootheel into Conservative Students.

This bill creates a “primary contact” position at schools to investigate instances of so-called bullying and harassment, especially in relation to transgender students. CPAC recognizes that this measure strengthens the ability of schools to indirectly cram down pronoun mandates and through punitive measures onto students and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2023 by a vote of 64-32 and the bill later became law.

HB 1240 Arbitrary Assault Weapons Bans.

This bill bans the distribution, manufacture, and sale of a laundry list of firearms deemed to be “assault weapons.” For Washington, “assault weapons” means everything from semi-automatic rifles that are too long to the wrong type of grip. CPAC supports the founders’ belief in the Second Amendment, opposes this extensive infringement on Second Amendment freedoms, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 19, 2023 by a vote of 56-42 and the bill later became law.

HB 1282 Increasing Public Building Costs through New Green Construction Mandates.

This bill requires firms with public construction contracts to submit environmental product declarations and any office of women- and minority-owned business certifications that they may possess in relation to the contract. CPAC opposes onerous building mandates, believes that public projects should be executed in a manner that incurs the lowest costs to the taxpayer, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on March 8, 2023 by a vote of 57-40 but the bill did not progress in the Senate.



HB 1447 Engorging the Bloated Welfare State.

This bill makes TANF Time Limit Exemptions permanent and increases asset limits for some of the state's cash assistance programs to a total of \$8,000. The bill also lets individuals waive the value of a car when considering these asset limits. CPAC opposes measures that increase the people's dependence on the welfare state and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 22, 2023 by a vote of 62-36 and the bill later became law.

HB 1469 Further Transforming Washington into a Sanctuary State for Abortionists.

This bill prohibits the issuance of out-of-state subpoenas that seek out information relating to the abortion services that one has received. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes the protection of its practice, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 59-38 and the bill later became law.

HB 1474 Forcing Taxpayers to Fund a Racist Housing Program.

This bill establishes a covenant homeownership account and program that will assist certain government-favored racial groups in making down payments and closing costs. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to pay for other people's housing, does not believe that the government should consider race as a factor in its decision-making process, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 17, 2023 by a vote of 52-44 and the bill later became law.

HB 1762 More Regulations for Warehouse Employers.

This bill establishes several new onerous regulations on warehouse employers. For example, it requires such employers to prepare exact measures of the quotas that employees must meet. It then requires employers to designate a reasonable amount of rest time for the quotas that are set. CPAC does not believe that the government should micromanage warehouses and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 22, 2023 by a vote of 56-42 and the bill later became law.

SB 5078 Promoting Frivolous Litigation Against Firearms Industry Members in Washington.

This bill requires that firearms manufacturers implement "reasonable controls" against selling firearms to certain entities. It also prohibits the manufacturer from selling to vendors that do not implement similar controls. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment, believes that this measure paves the way for a bevy of frivolous lawsuits against firearms manufacturers, further opposes the vague language used in this bill that leaves the definition of "reasonable controls" indeterminate, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 10, 2023 by a vote of 57-41 and the bill later became law.



SB 5112 Reducing Election Security through Automatic Voter Registration.

This bill automatically registers individuals to vote at the time that they are using other government services that require proof of citizenship. CPAC opposes measures that weaken election security and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 7, 2023 by a vote of 57-40 and the bill later became law.

SB 5197 Wedging the Government Further into Tenant-Landlord Relationships.

This bill increases the list of information that must be provided to renters on eviction notices. Such information, for example, must include a notice that low-income tenants have the ability to receive legal counsel from the state during eviction proceedings. CPAC already opposes measures that grant people taxpayer-sponsored legal counsel in eviction proceedings, opposes measures that expand the number of people using these services, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 7, 2023 by a vote of 57-40 and the bill later became law.

SB 5238 Expanding Collective Bargaining Rights to Even More Public Employees.

This bill expands collective bargaining rights to public university employees enrolled in academic programs at a public institution of higher education. CPAC opposes the expansion of public sector unions and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 6, 2023 by a vote of 72-24 and the bill later became law.

SB 5242 Raising Health Insurance Costs by Prohibiting Cost-Sharing for Abortions.

This bill prohibits insurance companies from imposing cost-sharing requirements for the abortion of a pregnancy. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes its expansion, opposes insurance mandates, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 7, 2023 by a vote of 57-39 and the bill later became law.

SB 5269 Green Central Planning Initiative Across Manufacturing Industries.

This bill directs the Department of Commerce to conduct an independent assessment that plans out how the state will capture emerging green industries and support minority- and women-owned firms. It also requires the state to appoint an industrial policy advisor to help it reach its carbon emissions and manufacturing goals. CPAC opposes central planning initiatives and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 6, 2023 by a vote of 95-2 and the bill later became law.



SB 5331 Loosening Work Search Requirements for Unemployment Benefits.

This bill moves up the date at which individuals are no longer required to, as part of their qualifications for unemployment benefits, perform certain in-person job search activities. It additionally greatly increases the ambiguity of the ways in which one may fulfill these requirements. CPAC opposes measures that expand the welfare state and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 7, 2023 by a vote of 82-15 and the bill later became law.

SB 5341 Using Government Resources to Promote Washington-Based Food.

This bill sets up a program that will help Washington food producers promote their products and enhance their visibility to consumers. CPAC does not believe that the government should expend its resources on promotional efforts for favored industries and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 11, 2023 by a vote of 97-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 5447 Government Largesse for the Alternative Jet Fuel Industry.

This bill enacts several provisions aimed at promoting the growth of the alternative jet fuel industry in Washington. For example, it directs the statewide office of renewable fuels to begin furthering the development and use of alternative fuels throughout the state. CPAC supports all forms of energy, does not believe that the government should support one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 14, 2023 by a vote of 96-0 and the bill later became law.

SB 5599 Aiding and Abetting Human Traffickers.

This bill allows runaway youths to stay in publicly controlled temporary shelters without telling the youth's parents if it is found that the minor is seeking gender reassignment medical services. CPAC recognizes that the government is not a better parent than actual parents, opposes measures that allow government agents to shield critical information about minors from their parents, and strongly opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 12, 2023 by a vote of 57-39 and the bill later became law.

SB 5768 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay for Abortions for Prisoners.

This bill grants the Department of Corrections the authority to acquire, sell, and distribute abortion medications to individuals, regardless of whether they are in the department's custody or not. CPAC believes abortion is always a human tragedy, opposes the expansion of its practice, further opposes the usage of taxpayer resources to fund abortions, and strongly opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 20, 2023 by a vote of 55-40 and the bill later became law.
