


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

SYNOPSES OF LAWS ENACTED BY CHAPTER

Chapter 1 FOOD DONATIONS

Allows a person to donate food to a charitable organization for redistribution without being liable for civil or criminal liability from injury or death due to the food, except where there is gross negligence, recklessness, or intentional misconduct. Immunizes a donor of unsold hot food from liability if the food is apparently fit to eat and the donor places a specific label on the food. Immunizes from liability a charitable organization that receives and distributes food, if the charitable organization meets certain inspection and other requirements. Expands "donor" to include delicatessens, restaurants, hotels, and stores. **(HB 186)**

Effective Date: June 4, 2018

Chapter 2 <u>SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET</u>

Makes supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 2018. Amends prior year appropriations. Appropriates \$45,000,000 to the Department of Health and Social Services for Medicaid services. Makes appropriations to capitalize funds. Ratifies certain prior year appropriations. (CSHB 321(FIN) am)

Effective Date: March 28, 2018

Chapter 3 INSURER USE OF CONSUMER CREDIT HISTORY OR INSURANCE SCORE

Allows an insurer to use a consumer's credit history or insurance score at the time of renewal. Requires insurers that use a consumer's credit history or insurance score to provide reasonable exceptions to rates, rating classifications, company or tier placement, or underwriting rules or guidelines for a consumer who has experienced certain extraordinary life circumstances. Allows a consumer to appeal the denial of a request for an exception based on an extraordinary life circumstance. **(HB 195)**

Effective Date: June 25, 2018

Chapter 4 SUPERIOR COURT JUDGES, FIRST JUDICIAL DISTRICT

Increases the number of superior court judges from 42 to 43 and allocates the extra position to the first judicial district. **(HB 298)**

Effective Date: July 1, 2018

Chapter 5 <u>REGULATION OF INDUSTRIAL HEMP</u>

Requires registration in order to produce industrial hemp. Sets out the requirements for registration to produce industrial hemp. Authorizes the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to adopt regulations regarding industrial hemp. Requires the regulations to include testing requirements and isolation distances, among other requirements. Authorizes the commissioner of DNR to issue a stop order to anyone found to be producing a plant with delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol over 0.3 percent. Allows DNR or an institution of higher education in the state to create and administer an agricultural pilot program to study the growth, cultivation, or marketing of industrial hemp. Requires a person to carry a copy of the person's registration when transporting industrial hemp. Defines industrial hemp and excludes industrial hemp from the definitions of hashish oil and marijuana. Provides that food is not adulterated solely because it contains industrial hemp or an industrial hemp product. Requires DNR to provide a written report to the legislature on the regulation of industrial hemp. (HCS CSSB 6(FIN)(efd add H))

Effective Date: April 13, 2018

Chapter 6 PUBLIC EDUCATION AND TRANSPORTATION APPROPRIATIONS

Makes appropriations for public education and student transportation for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2019, and June 30, 2020. The appropriations for the fiscal year ending June, 30, 2020, are contingent on the passage and enactment of SB 26, relating to the Alaska permanent fund. (SCS HB 287(FIN))

Effective Date: Sections 4, 5(c), and 5(d) are conditional; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2018

Chapter 7 <u>REPEAL OF PERMANENT INTERIM LEGISLATIVE ADMINISTRATIVE</u> <u>REGULATION COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS AGENCY</u> <u>REVIEW OF ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS</u>

Eliminates the Administrative Regulation Review Committee, the review of proposed regulations by the Legislative Affairs Agency, and the requirement under the Alaska Administrative Procedure Act for specified agencies and public corporations to submit regulations, fiscal notes, and other information to the Administrative Regulation Review Committee. Provides that a standing committee of the legislature may, consistent with the committee's jurisdiction, review a proposed or adopted regulation or repeal of a regulation. (HB 168)

Effective Date: August 1, 2018

Chapter 8 <u>ALASKA SENIOR BENEFITS PAYMENT PROGRAM</u> Extends the Alaska senior benefits payment program to June 30, 2024. (CSHB 236(FIN))

Effective Date: August 8, 2018

Chapter 9 BOARD OF MASSAGE THERAPISTS

Extends the termination date of the Board of Massage Therapists to June 30, 2024. **(SCS CSHB 275(FIN))**

Effective Date: May 16, 2018

Chapter 10 BOARD OF MASSAGE THERAPISTS AND THE PRACTICE OF MASSAGE THERAPY

Removes the exclusion of former members of another occupational licensing board from the Board of Massage Therapists. Extends the duties of the board to adopt regulations governing massage therapy establishments. Increases the number of required hours of in-class supervised instruction and clinical work from 500 hours to 625 hours and decreases the number of hours of safety education covering bloodborne pathogens and universal precautions required of an applicant. Requires fingerprinting and a national criminal history record check every six years as a qualification for license renewal. (CSHB 110(L&C))

Effective Date: Sections 1 - 3 take effect July 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect May 16, 2018

Chapter 11 BOILERS AND UNFIRED PRESSURE VESSELS

Shortens the time for a company to file the inspection report of a special inspector for a boiler or unfired pressure vessel. Requires the report to be entered directly into an electronic inspection report system of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development. Charges a fee for not using the electronic inspection report system. Deposits the fees into the building safety account. (SCS HB 114(FIN))

Effective Date: August 14, 2018

Chapter 12 OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ENFORCEMENT PENALTIES Allows the Commissioner of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development to establish by regulation occupational safety and health enforcement penalties and provides that the maximum amount of civil penalties may not exceed the amount of the corresponding federal penalty for the specified violation. (HB 121)

Effective Date: Section 8 takes effect May 17, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect August 14, 2018

Chapter 13 <u>RELOCATION ASSISTANCE FOR FEDERALLY ASSISTED PUBLIC</u> <u>CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS</u>

Provides that relocation assistance and related real property acquisition practices are for persons displaced because of federally assisted public construction and improvement projects and programs. Changes state eligibility requirements and maximum reimbursement amounts for displacement payments to correspond with federal law. **(HB 131)**

Effective Date: May 17, 2018; this Act is retroactive to October 1, 2014

Chapter 14 ESTABLISHING THE JONESVILLE PUBLIC USE AREA

Establishes the Jonesville Public Use Area. Sets the boundaries, describes the purposes and provides for the management of the area. Addresses law enforcement authority within, and penalties for violations relating to, the area. (CSHB 6(RES) am)

Effective Date: September 5, 2018

Chapter 15 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES; FOSTER CARE; CHILDREN IN NEED OF AID

Makes a finding related to foster children's contact with prior caregivers. Requires the Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) to (1) search for an appropriate placement of a child with an adult family member or family friend and to assist the person in obtaining a foster care home license; (2) engage a child who is 14 years of age or older in DHSS's plans for the child; (3) provide siblings with contact information for each other and encourage the children's caregivers to provide opportunities for contact between siblings; (4) implement workload standards and a training program for certain employees of DHSS who work with children in need of aid and their families and who investigate reports of harm; (5) refer certain parents and guardians after an investigation of a report of harm for support services; (6) provide individuals who were in state custody or assist them in obtaining certain information after being released from state custody; and (7) to the extent feasible, approve or deny a foster care home license within 45 days. Authorizes DHSS to issue or renew a foster home license to certain entities, individual service providers, or persons that would have previously been ineligible for a license if certain requirements are met. Gives foster parents the right and responsibility to make certain decisions relating to a child in their care. Provides legislative intent that an audit be conducted. (SCS CSHB 151(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 23 takes effect June 8, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect September 5, 2018

Chapter 16 PERMANENT FUND INCOME

Requires the Permanent Fund Corporation to determine the amount available for appropriation each year as 5.25 percent of the average market value of the fund for the first five of the preceding six fiscal years, including the fiscal year just ended, computed annually for each fiscal year in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Amends this amount to 5 percent on July 1, 2021. Provides that the legislature may not appropriate from the earnings reserve account to the general fund a total amount that exceeds the amount available for appropriation in a fiscal year. Provides that the transfer to the dividend fund under AS 37.13.145(b), and an appropriation from the earnings reserve account to the general fund combined cannot exceed the amount available for appropriation. Clarifies that the unexpended balance of the Permanent Fund Corporation's operating budget shall be treated as part

of the market value of the fund and that net income from the mental health trust fund is not part of the market value of the fund. (CCS SB 26)

Effective Date: Section 2 takes effect July 1, 2021; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2018

Chapter 17 OPERATING AND LOAN PROGRAM APPROPRIATIONS

Makes appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of the state government and for certain programs, capitalizes funds, amends appropriations, makes supplemental appropriations, and makes appropriations under art. IX, sec. 17(c), Constitution of the State of Alaska, from the constitutional budget reserve fund. (CCS HB 286)

Effective Date: Sections 22(a), 25(a), 32, and 33(e) take effect June 14, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2018; the appropriations made in section 1 of this Act that appropriate either the unexpended and unobligated balance of specific fiscal year 2018 program receipts or the unexpended and unobligated balance on June 30, 2018, of a specified account are retroactive to June 30, 2018, solely for the purpose of carrying forward a prior fiscal year balance

Chapter 18 MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM APPROPRIATIONS

Makes appropriations for the operating and capital expenses of the state's integrated comprehensive mental health program for fiscal year 2019. (CCS HB 285)

Effective Date: July 1, 2018

Chapter 19 CAPITAL BUDGET

Makes appropriations for capital projects. Amends prior appropriations and reappropriates money from prior appropriations for capital projects and other purposes. Capitalizes funds. Makes supplemental appropriations and other fund transfers and appropriations. (HCS CSSB 142(FIN) am H)

Effective Date: Sections 4 - 16 and 37 take effect June 14, 2018; sections 20, 21(a), 22, 26(a), (b), (e), (h), and (i), 27(a), and 32 - 34 take effect June 30, 2018; section 27(c) takes effect July 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2018; sections 4 - 16 are retroactive to May 16, 2018

Chapter 20 MARRIAGE SOLEMNIZATION

Authorizes elected public officials in the state to solemnize marriages. Provides that, except for a marriage commissioner or judicial officer of the state, the authority to solemnize a marriage does not create or imply a duty or obligation on a person to solemnize any marriage. (CSHB 20(JUD))

Effective Date: September 11, 2018

Chapter 21 RESTORATIVE JUSTICE ACCOUNT

Deletes statutory language in AS 12.55.045(m) and AS 47.12.160(f) relating to the Department of Law collecting restitution. Authorizes the court to forward a copy of an order of restitution to the office of victims' rights. Requires the Department of Law to inform a person of the right to receive payment from the restorative justice account. Extends the time period to 90 days to collect on restitution orders. Authorizes the office of victims' rights to pay outstanding balances on orders of restitution and sets a priority order for payment from the account. Changes the public notice on the permanent fund dividend form to include that the legislative purpose of making certain felons and misdemeanants ineligible for permanent fund dividends is to provide funds for services for and payments to crime victims, treatment of offenders, and for other programs and related costs. Creates the restorative justice account in the dividend fund. Authorizes appropriations from the fund for the stated purposes. Requires a person whose order of restitution is paid from the account to reimburse the state for that amount. Authorizes a person to donate from their dividend to the crime victim compensation fund. (CSSSHB 216(FIN) am)

Effective Date: January 1, 2019

Chapter 22 <u>CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES; PRETRIAL RELEASE DECISIONS;</u> <u>SURCHARGES; ARREST WITHOUT A WARRANT</u>

Authorizes the attorney general to schedule substances onto the controlled substance schedules on an emergency basis. Provides that such substances remain on the schedules for 1,095 days unless the legislature schedules the substance by law or annuls the scheduling. Authorizes a peace officer to arrest without a warrant for assault in the fourth degree committed at a health care facility. Allows a person to be held for up to 48 hours for the prosecuting authority to demonstrate that the person has an out of state criminal history that should prevent pretrial release. Amends pretrial release decisions for persons charged with certain misdemeanors or class C felonies to eliminate mandatory release on own recognizance and allows a judicial officer to set release conditions if there is clear and convincing evidence that the person is a reoffending risk for release on the person's own recognizance. Allows criminal history outside the state to be considered when setting pretrial release conditions. Raises the surcharges that can be assessed after conviction. Creates a sentencing aggravator if a person committed the crime at a health care facility and directed the conduct at a medical professional because of the medical professional's exercise of professional duties. Allows a pretrial services officer to arrest without a warrant under certain circumstances. Authorizes pretrial services officers to also serve as probation or parole officers. (SCS HB 312(RLS) am S)

Effective Date:

Sections 1, 10 - 15, 18, 19, 29, and 31 take effect June 15, 2018; section 16 takes effect January 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect September 12, 2018

Chapter 23 THE BOARD OF BARBERS AND HAIRDRESSERS; NONRENEWAL OF OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES FOR DEFAULT ON STUDENT LOANS

Creates a licensing process for hair braiding. Separates licensing for tattooing and permanent cosmetic coloring. Limits the Department of Environmental Conservation's authority to investigate the practices of a person, shop, or school involved in the practice or teaching of body piercing, tattooing, or permanent cosmetic coloring. Creates a limited license for non-chemical barbering and permits the Board of Barbers and Hairdressers to create an apprenticeship for an applicant for a license to practice non-chemical barbering with fewer hours than an apprenticeship required for an applicant for a license to practice barbering. Permits the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development (DCCED) to set fees for licenses and renewals for hair braiding, permanent cosmetic coloring, and nonchemical barbering. Amends the definitions of "practitioner," "shop," and "tattooing," and defines "hair braiding," "non-chemical barbering," and "permanent cosmetic coloring." Amends the provision allowing for denial, revocation, suspension, cancellation, and withdrawal of registration of an investment broker or agent by removing the authority of the commissioner of DCCED, to deny, suspend or revoke a registration of a person whose license renewal is denied for student loan default under AS 14.43.148. Repeals provisions relating to loan default, nonrenewal of license, and temporary licenses. (HCS CSSSSB 4(RLS))

Effective Date: Section 33 takes effect June 16, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 24 TERMINATION OF PARENTAL RIGHTS

Clarifies that the relationship of a parent and a child may be terminated by a court order issued in an independent proceeding on the grounds that the parent committed an act constituting sexual assault, sexual abuse of a minor, or incest that resulted in conception of the child. Provides that the court may appoint a guardian ad litem or attorney for a minor whose parent is the subject of a petition to terminate parental rights. Provides that a court may order a biological parent to pay child support following termination of parental rights. (SB 134 am H)

Effective Date: September 13, 2018

Chapter 25 BACKGROUND CHECKS

Requires a state contractor or state employee who accesses federal tax information to pass a background check that includes a state and national history criminal background check. Requires a contractor to reimburse the state for the cost of the national criminal history check. Requires a state agency that works with federal tax information to establish procedures regarding access to tax information. **(CSHB 219(JUD))**

Effective Date: July 1, 2018

Chapter 26 ALASKA BIDCO ASSISTANCE PROGRAM; BIDCOs

Repeals the Alaska BIDCO licensing and financing assistance program. Directs the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development to oversee the administration of outstanding loans and financial assistance made under the repealed program. Transfers money left in the Alaska BIDCO fund to the general fund. Removes an information disclosure provision tied to a previous BIDCO assistance program. Provides for the program's repealed statutes to continue to apply as necessary to a BIDCO that received a loan or other financial assistance under the program. (HB 340)

Effective Date: September 13, 2018

Chapter 27 PREMIUM FINANCE COMPANIES

Removes the requirement that premium finance companies be examined every 18 months. Allows the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development to conduct examinations of premium finance companies at the discretion of the department. (HB 343)

Effective Date: September 13, 2018

Chapter 28 PHYSICIANS; PRACTICE OF MEDICINE

Exempts, from licensure in Alaska, physicians licensed in another state who are under a written agreement with an athletic team in that state to provide medical services to members of the athletic team when the athletic team is traveling to or from or participating in a sporting event in Alaska. Includes these physicians in the provision which permits qualified persons to evaluate and clear student athletes for participation in practice or a game after suspicion of a concussion. **(SB 126)**

Effective Date: September 16, 2018

Chapter 29 TEMPORARY LICENSURE OF DENTISTS

Authorizes the Board of Dental Examiners to issue a temporary permit to practice dentistry in Alaska when necessary to substitute for an incapacitated dentist. Exempts dentists issued a temporary permit from being required to be licensed in Alaska. (SCS CSHB 346(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 3 takes effect June 19, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 30 DISBURSEMENT TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PLANS OF THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM OF ALASKA AND THE TEACHERS RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Allows a participant in the defined contribution plan of the Public Employees' Retirement System of Alaska or the Teachers' Retirement System of Alaska to receive distribution from the participant's individual account by means of payments authorized by the Commissioner of the Department of Administration. (CSHB 306(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 3 takes effect June 19, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect September 16, 2018

Chapter 31 <u>COLLECTION OF SALES TAX BY TRANSPORTATION NETWORK</u> <u>COMPANY</u>

Allows municipalities to require that a transportation network company collect and pay municipal sales tax on behalf of transportation network company drivers. (HCS CSSB 14(RLS))

Effective Date: June 19, 2018

Chapter 32 STATEWIDE WORKFORCE AND EDUCATION-RELATED STATISTICS PROGRAM

Authorizes the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education to administer a statewide workforce and education-related statistics program for the purpose of compiling statewide workforce and education-related statistics and analyzing education and training outcomes. (HB 221)

Effective Date: June 19, 2018

Chapter 33 BONDS TO PURCHASE, PAY, AND REFUND OIL AND GAS TAX CREDITS AND TAX CREDIT CERTIFICATES

Establishes the Alaska Tax Credit Certificate Bond Corporation for the purpose of issuing bonds to purchase, pay, and refund oil and gas tax credits and tax credit certificates. Adds an exception to the state procurement code for the corporation. Authorizes the corporation to issue bonds. States that bonds may not be issued unless the discount rate on tax credits is at least the interest rate paid on bonds plus 1.5 percent. States that the bonds do not constitute a general obligation of the state. Allows the corporation to (1) enter into agreements and contracts; (2) establish and maintain a reserve fund for the payment of interest on and principal of bonds; (3) transfer money to the Commissioner of the Department of Revenue (DOR) for purchase, repayment, or payment of oil and gas tax credits and tax credit certificates; (4) issue bond resolutions; and (5) refund bonds and issue refunding bonds.

enforcement of certain terms by a bond owner or group of bond owners. States that a person may not bring a judicial action to contest the constitutionality or validity of a bond issued or sold under the act unless the action is commenced within 45 days after the corporation issues a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds. Amends the statutes related to the oil and gas tax credit fund and related to tax credits to accommodate the payment and repayment of oil and gas tax credits and purchase of oil and gas tax credit certificates. Requires DOR to calculate a maximum amount of a tax credit purchase, repayment, or payment, including the calculation of a discount rate that may be reduced by certain actions of a credit holder. Modifies the calculation of money to be appropriated to the oil and gas tax credit fund if bonds are issued. States that the legislature may appropriate money for the purposes of purchasing, repaying, or refunding tax credits and for the maintenance of the required debt service on bonds issued by the corporation and money received from an overriding royalty interest to the corporation. Allows the Department of Natural Resources to enter into an overriding royalty interest agreement with a credit holder for a reduced discount rate. (CSHB 331(FIN))

Effective Date: June 21, 2018

Chapter 34 <u>MEDICAL ASSISTANCE REIMBURSEMENT FOR EMERGENCY</u> <u>MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION SERVICES</u>

Establishes a supplemental reimbursement program for eligible emergency medical transportation service providers for the cost of providing services to medical assistance recipients. Establishes eligibility requirements for an emergency medical transportation service provider to participate in the program. Authorizes the Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) to charge an administrative fee to a provider to cover the department's costs of administering the program if the department authorizes the use of intergovernmental transfers under the program or the use of certified public expenditures under the program. Requires DHSS to notify the legislature if the United States Department of Health and Human Services revokes approval of the program. Provides that supplemental reimbursement payments are subject to appropriation. Adds definitions for "program," "provider," and "state plan." (CSHB 176(FIN))

Effective Date: June 21, 2018

Chapter 35 BACKGROUND CHECKS FOR POLICE OFFICERS

Authorizes a national criminal history record check for admittance to a police training program or for certification as a police officer if the person's prospective employer does not have access to a criminal justice information system. Authorizes the Alaska Police Standards Council to require a state and national criminal history record check of an applicant to a training program or for certification as a police officer. States that the Alaska Police Standards Council may not issue a certificate as a police officer unless the council determines the applicant will undergo a national criminal history record check before employment as a police officer. (SB 148)

Effective Date: September 19, 2018

Chapter 36 <u>EMPLOYEE RIGHT TO A LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR ACTIVE DUTY IN</u> NATIONAL GUARD OF ANOTHER STATE

Requires an employer to grant a leave of absence to an employee who is a resident of Alaska, and a member of the National Guard of another state, to perform active National Guard service under a law of the other state. Gives the employee a limited right to return to the job the employee was on leave from, or a similar job, after the active service or a hospitalization resulting from the active service. (SCS CSHB 3(STA))

Effective Date: September 21, 2018

Chapter 37 MARIJUANA CONTROL BOARD

Extends the termination date of the Marijuana Control Board to June 30, 2024. (HB 273)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 38 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL BOARD

Establishes term limits for members of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board (ABC Board). Provides that the director of the ABC Board may not vote on a matter before the board. Extends the termination date of the ABC Board to June 30, 2022. Repeals the ABC Board's authority to make licensing decisions without considering past precedent. (SCS CSHB 299(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 3 takes effect June 30, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect September 27, 2018

Chapter 39 BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

Extends the termination date of the Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers to June 30, 2026. (HB 278)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 40 REAL ESTATE COMMISSION

Extends the termination date of the Real Estate Commission to June 30, 2026. (HB 279)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 41 BOARD OF PSYCHOLOGIST AND PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSOCIATE EXAMINERS

Extends the termination date of the Board of Psychologist and Psychological Associate Examiners to June 30, 2026. (HB 274)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 42 BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS

Extends the termination date of the Board of Professional Counselors to June 30, 2026. (HB 302)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 43 BOARD OF SOCIAL WORK EXAMINERS

Extends the termination date of the Board of Social Work Examiners to June 30, 2026. Removes the requirement that at least one of the licensed board members work for a private nonprofit organization that is exempt from federal income tax, among other employment options. (CSHB 318(FIN))

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 44 BOARD OF PHARMACY

Extends the termination date of the Board of Pharmacy to June 30, 2022. (HB 323)

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 45 <u>EXTENDS BOARD OF MARITAL AND FAMILY THERAPY; STATE</u> <u>MEDICAL BOARD DUTIES; DELEGATION OF ROUTING MEDICAL</u> <u>DUTIES</u>

Extends the termination date of the Board of Marital and Family Therapy to June 30, 2026. Authorizes the State Medical Board to adopt regulations regarding licensure and delegation of routine medical duties to an agent of a physician, podiatrist, osteopath or physician assistant. Removes the duration of residence from the required contents of medical licensing application. Allows the State Medical Board's executive secretary to grant licenses. Allows a member of the State Medical Board, the executive secretary, or a designated person to issue temporary permits to a physician, osteopath, or podiatry applicant. (SCS HB 280(RLS))

Effective Date: Sections I and II take effect June 30, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 46 ALASKA COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSURANCE FUND

Removes the requirement that the Department of Administration separately account for and deposit certain insurance-based tax revenue into the Alaska comprehensive health insurance fund. Extends the sunset date of the Alaska comprehensive health insurance fund from June 30, 2018, to June 30, 2024. (SB 165)

Effective Date: Sections 2 and 4 take effect June 30, 2018; sections 1 and 3 take effect July 1, 2018

Chapter 47 <u>ALASKA LIFE AND HEALTH INSURANCE GUARANTY ASSOCIATION</u> Relates to coverage for member insurers of the Alaska Life and Health Insurance Guaranty Association and amends provisions. (CSHB 403(L&C))

Effective Date: Section 59 takes effect June 30, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2018

Chapter 48 <u>LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING AND PROTOCOLS REGARDING</u> <u>SEXUAL ASSAULT; UNTESTED EXAM KITS</u>

Prohibits a person from being appointed as a police officer unless the person has received at least 12 hours of sexual assault training. Requires established police training programs in the state to provide training in sexual assault and the protocols established under AS 18.68.020. Requires the protocols for sexual assault examination kits to allow a victim who is 18 years of age or older to provide a law enforcement report if the victim chooses to participate in the criminal justice system, or an anonymous report if the victim wants to obtain a medical forensic examination but chooses not to have personal identifying information provided to law enforcement. Requires each law enforcement agency and state department charged with the maintenance, storage, and preservation of sexual assault examination kits to conduct an inventory of the untested kits and report the number to the Department of Public Safety (DPS). Requires DPS to report to the legislature the number of untested kits stored by each law enforcement agency or department, the date each untested kit was collected, and a plan for addressing the backlog and prevention of backlog. (SCS CSHB 31(STA))

Effective Date: July 1, 2018

Chapter 49 EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM OF ALASKA

Allows the Commissioner of the Department of Administration to determine the rate of interest on employer contributions to the Public Employees' Retirement System of Alaska (PERS) by municipalities whose population decreased by more than 25 percent between 2000 and 2010. Authorizes the administrator of the defined benefit plan to lower the required minimum employer contribution to PERS for those municipalities. **(HB 47)**

Effective Date: June 30, 2018

Chapter 50 MOTOR VEHICLE FRANCHISES

Places limits on when a failure based on a dealer's sales, service, or level of customer satisfaction is considered good cause for termination of a franchise agreement. Changes certain repurchase and compensation obligations when a franchise is terminated by the manufacturer or distributor. Prohibits a manufacturer from unreasonably preventing or refusing to honor the transfer of a new motor vehicle dealership to a buyer who meets the listed requirements. Establishes whether a manufacturer or dealer has the burden of proving that good cause exists for permitting the proposed establishment or relocation of a new motor vehicle dealer. Requires manufacturers to pay approved warranty work claims from dealers in accordance with a schedule of compensation. Addresses the performance of warranty repairs needed by new motor vehicles in remote locations. Requires manufacturers and distributors to provide new motor vehicle dealers with specific information on the dealer's responsibilities, compensation, and time allowed for preparing new motor vehicles for delivery to buyers. Prohibits manufacturers from engaging in certain practices relating to new motor vehicle dealers. **(CSHB 136(TRA))**

Effective Date: September 30, 2018

Chapter 51 TEEN DATING VIOLENCE AND ABUSE AWARENESS AND PREVENTION

Requires the Department of Education and Early Development to develop and approve a program relating to teen dating violence and abuse awareness and prevention for grades seven though 12. Establishes the month of February as Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month. (SCS HB 214(FIN))

Effective Date: October 9, 2018

Chapter 52 <u>LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON READING PROFICIENCY AND</u> <u>DYSLEXIA</u>

Establishes the Legislative Task Force on Reading Proficiency and Dyslexia as a joint task force of the Alaska State Legislature to examine reading proficiency outcomes and evaluate and make recommendations for outcome improvements, including mitigating the effects of dyslexia, for all public school students in the state. Requires the task force to submit a report summarizing its findings and recommendations by March 29, 2019. (SCS CSHB 64(EDC))

Effective Date: October 10, 2018

Chapter 53 <u>AUTHORIZING THE PRESCRIBING, DISPENSING, AND</u> <u>ADMINISTERING OF AN INVESTIGATIONAL DRUG, BIOLOGICAL</u> <u>PRODUCT, OR DEVICE TO TERMINALLY ILL PATIENTS</u>

Exempts physicians from disciplinary action for prescribing, dispensing, or administering an investigational drug, biological product, or device, or providing related treatment to qualifying terminally ill patients. Provides certain persons with immunity relating to use or nonuse of investigational drugs, biological products, and devices. Defines "investigational drug, biological product, or device" and "terminal illness." Exempts physicians from the sale of the new drugs provision in the Alaska Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act if prescribing, dispensing, or administering an investigational drug, biological product, or device. Provides that licensed health care facilities may not be required to increase services for accommodating a physicians' practice related to investigational drugs, biological products, or devices, or providing related treatment. (CSHB 43(JUD))

Effective Date: October 11, 2018

Chapter 54 LICENSES, TAGS, AND PERMITS ISSUED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME

Provides that a person charged with not having the appropriate license, tag, or permit in actual possession will not be convicted if the person furnishes evidence within 30 days of issuance of the citation of having a license that was valid at the time of the offense. Allows a license to be held in paper or electronic form. Makes a peace officer, who is presented with a license in electronic form on a device, immune from liability resulting from damage to the device, unless the damage is the result of the officer's intentional misconduct. (CSHB 260(FIN) am)

Effective Date: July 14, 2018

Chapter 55 <u>PUBLIC UTILITY INCOME APPORTIONMENT FOR CORPORATE</u> <u>INCOME TAX PURPOSES</u>

Requires a public utility to allocate and apportion income in accordance with the Multistate Tax Compact for purposes of the state corporate income tax. (SCS HB 398(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 3 takes effect July 14, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 56 REINSURANCE; STANDARD VALUATION

Amends provisions relating to reinsurance transactions for domestic ceding insurers. Amends reinsurance accreditation and certification provisions. Amends valuation requirements and the method of calculation of reserves. Creates a new section governing the standard valuation for insurance policies and contracts issued on or after the operative date of the valuation manual, a manual of valuation instructions published by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners and adopted as prescribed by law. (CSHB 401(L&C))

Effective Date: July 14, 2018

Chapter 57 ELECTRONIC SMOKING PRODUCTS

Provides that possession of an electronic smoking product or product containing nicotine by a person under 19 years of age is a violation. Provides an affirmative defense for the possession under certain circumstances. Prohibits selling an electronic smoking product or product containing nicotine unless the sale occurs in a manner that allows only the sales clerk to control access to the electronic smoking product or product containing nicotine. Authorizes the sale of electronic smoking products over the internet to persons age 19 years or older. Adds electronic smoking product or product containing nicotine to various crimes related to cigarettes. Defines "electronic smoking product." Adds electronic smoking product and product containing nicotine to statutes relating to business license endorsements for tobacco. Raises the fine for violations by a person who has an endorsement.

(HCS CSSB 15(L&C))

Effective Date: Section 28 takes effect July 14, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 58 BOARD OF PHARMACY; PRACTICE OF PHARMACY; BIOLOGICAL PRODUCTS

Amends the information required to be disclosed by a physician when dispensing a brand name drug to include disclosures if the drug is a biological product. Allows pharmacists to substitute an interchangeable biological product for a prescription with the consent of the patient. Requires the dispensing pharmacist or designee to communicate to the prescribing practitioner information regarding the interchangeable biological product provided to the patient within three days after dispensing the product to the patient. Defines "substitute," "biological product," "interchangeable biological product," "designee," "proper name," and "proprietary name." (HCS SB 32(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 8 takes effect July 14, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 59 ALCOHOL LICENSES; CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTORS

Allows the holder of a distillery license to combine the distillery's product with other non-alcoholic ingredients for consumption on the licensed premises. Amends the

fingerprint and fee requirement for renewal of an alcohol license or permit for specified corporations. Amends the operating hours required for renewal of licensure from 30 days to 240 hours. Allows the alcohol board to approve the renewal or transfer of a license for specified businesses relating to the tourist trade based on the minimum number of rental rooms required at the time of initial licensure. Authorizes a municipality to include an exemption for outdoor recreation lodges when voting on a local option. Exempts from contractor licensure an owner performing work independently or acting as the owner's own contractor on the owner's property. **(CSSB 45(FIN) am H)**

Effective Date: October 11, 2018

Chapter 60 SMOKING PROHIBITION

Prohibits smoking in public places and enclosed areas, including retail stores, office buildings, places of employment, and educational facilities. Prohibits smoking outdoors within 10 feet of playground equipment located at a public or private school or a state or municipal park while children are present, and within a certain distance of entrances, open windows, or ventilation systems. Allows smoking at a retail tobacco or e-cigarette store under certain conditions. Permits smoking at a separate enclosed smoking area in a terminal for international passengers in transit in a state-owned or state-operated international airport. Authorizes smoking in certain vehicles, vessels, private clubs, or residences, or establishments licensed under AS 17.38. Requires posting of signs regarding the smoking prohibition in places where smoking is prohibited. Raises fines for violation of smoking prohibition to \$50. Authorizes a municipality, by ordinance ratified by voters, to exempt the municipality from the smoking restrictions. Allows an established village to exempt itself from the smoking restrictions through a local option election. Defines smoking to include the use of an e-cigarette or other oral smoking device.

(HCS CSSB 63(RLS) am H)

Effective Date: Section 17 takes effect July 18, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect October 1, 2018

Chapter 61 LIMITS LEGISLATIVE PER DIEM, GIFTS BY LOBBYISTS, AND ELECTION CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES BY FOREIGN-INFLUENCED CORPORATIONS, AND ADDS PROHIBITIONS AND REQUIREMENTS TO THE LEGISLATIVE ETHICS ACT

Prohibits foreign-influenced corporations from making or promising to make an election expenditure and limits circumstances when foreign-influenced corporations may contribute to an election campaign. Prohibits the legislative fiscal officer from paying for a member of the legislature's travel outside of the United States unless a legislative purpose for the travel is established. Makes a member ineligible for per diem after the first 121 days of a regular legislative session until a state operating

budget is adopted or until the first day of the next regular session. Limits the food and drink a lobbyist may offer or give a member or a legislative employee, or that a member or legislative employee may solicit or accept, and repeals a requirement that a lobbyist disclose a gift of food or beverage to a member or a legislative employee. Restricts a member from taking official action that could substantially help or harm the financial interest of the member, the member's family, an employer of the member or the member's family, a person who pays the member or the member's family more than \$10,000 in a year, or a person from whom the member seeks employment. (SCS CSSSHB 44(STA))

Effective Date: July 20, 2018

Chapter 62 <u>REPEAL OF TAX CREDIT FOR GIFTS TO THE ALASKA FIRE</u> <u>STANDARDS COUNCIL</u>

Repeals, effective January 1, 2019, a credit against the insurance tax for a gift to the Alaska fire standards council. (CSHB 97(STA))

Effective Date: January 1, 2019

Chapter 63 FOREST MANAGEMENT AND FIRE PREVENTION; PROHIBITED ACTS

Amends the crime of criminally negligent burning in the first degree to include past convictions of misdemeanor crimes. Creates the crime of criminal burning of forested land in the second degree. Limits the right of entry on any land to instances when an employee of the division of forestry or authorized agent is responding to a wildland fire, suspected wildland fire, or enforcing Title 41, including entry for conducting investigations. Prohibits interference with authorized right of entry. Allows the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources to proclaim additional fire seasons. Prohibits a person from setting fires, using burning devices, and using land in a manner that increases fire danger and allows the commissioner to prescribe the conditions and manner for obtaining a permit. Limits the applicability of disposal of burning materials provision to the fire season, a burn closure, or restriction. Amends the burning or leaving fires restrictions for forested land areas. Prohibits a person from setting fires on forested land without consent and from leaving a fire unattended. Includes investigators among the officials that a person is required to assist in the prevention or suppression of a fire. Consolidates penalties sections. Allows for double damages in civil actions resulting from criminal burning. Allows designated persons to issue citations for violations. Exempts disclosure of a deadly weapon to an official designated under Title 41. (SCS CSHB 355(JUD))

Effective Date: July 21, 2018

Chapter 64 <u>ALASKA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND EXPORT AUTHORITY;</u> ALASKA RAILROAD CORPORATION

Limits, from November 30, 2017, to November 30, 2027, the taxable extent and value of interests created by an operating or nonexclusive use agreement between the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) and certain users. Amends the definition of "net income" and "unrestricted net income," and defines "market-to-market fair value" and "project or development" for purposes of calculating AIDEA dividends. Extends AIDEA's bonding authority for certain projects to June 30, 2023. Clarifies the Alaska Railroad Corporation's authority over rail property transferred under federal law. Requires the railroad corporation to notify adjacent landowners before offering land for sale. Repeals certain financing authority of the railroad corporation. Authorizes specified transfers of real property by the railroad corporation in exchange for land or for the cash equivalent to the fair market value of the land conveyed. Establishes an annual reporting requirement for the railroad corporation from 2019 - 2021. (SCS CSHB 119(FIN) am S)

Effective Date: Sections 1 and 3 - 24 take effect July 21, 2018; section 2 takes effect November 30, 2027; section 1 is retroactive to November 30, 2017

Chapter 65 SECURITIES

Updates and relocates the state's provisions that regulate securities transactions and the broker-dealers, agents, investment advisers, and investment adviser representatives that handle them. Separates the Native corporation securities provisions from the general securities provisions. Provides a specific exemption for small intrastate securities offerings. Protects older and vulnerable persons from financial exploitation. Increases the civil penalties for securities law violations if the violations harm older or vulnerable persons. Creates the securities investor education and training fund to help finance initiatives to educate the public about investing in securities. (SCS CSHB 170(L&C))

Effective Date: Section 31 takes effect July 25, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 66 THE BOARD OF PHARMACY; THE ALASKA COMMERCIAL FISHERIES ENTRY COMMISSION

Permits the Board of Pharmacy to establish an executive administrator position and to license and inspect the facilities of wholesale drug distributors, third-party logistics providers, and outsourcing facilities located outside the state. Defines "outsourcing facility" and "third-party logistics provider." Decreases the number of members of the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission to two members and decreases the members' monthly salary to Range 25. Provides that a single commissioner may exercise all powers and duties of the commission if there is a vacancy. Provides for a tie-breaking measure if there is a tie vote. (HCS CSSB 37(RLS) am H)

Effective Date:

Sections 1, 6, and 8 - 17 take effect July 25, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2019

Chapter 67 <u>REAL ESTATE APPRAISAL MANAGEMENT COMPANIES TO BE</u> <u>REGULATED BY DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, COMMUNITY, AND</u> <u>ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT</u>

Permits the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development to establish fees for and regulate real estate appraisal management companies and appraiser panels. Allows the Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers to adopt regulations necessary to comply with the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act and the Truth in Lending Act and to establish procedures and standards for real estate appraisal management companies and the companies' appraiser panels. Requires the board to report relevant operating information, including disciplinary actions or state or federal law violations to the Appraisal Subcommittee established under 12 U.S.C. 3310. Establishes reporting requirements for federally regulated real estate appraisal management companies. Allows exemptions from regulation for certain persons. Defines "appraisal management services," "appraiser panel," "borrower," "company," "controlling person," and "principal dwelling." (HCS CSSB 155 (L&C) am H)

Effective Date: Section 9 takes effect July 25, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 68 FEES FOR PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Authorizes the Commissioner of the Department of Health and Social Services to establish a schedule of fees for services provided under a comprehensive smoking education, tobacco use prevention, and tobacco control program and for the administration of public health programs. Adds public health programs and services fees to the list of designated general fund program receipts. (CSHB 215(FIN))

Effective Date: October 22, 2018

Chapter 69 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES; CRIMINAL AND CIVIL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS AND REQUIREMENTS

Provides for national criminal history record checks for certain individuals and entities licensed or certified by the Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS). Requires that an applicant for renewal of registration as a marijuana establishment submit fingerprints for a national background check every five years. Changes the name of the "centralized registry" to "civil history databases." Clarifies that barrier crimes apply to individuals as well as entities and amends the definition of "entity." Establishes immunity from civil or criminal liability for an individual who makes certain reports during the background check process. Establishes procedures and requirements for civil history record checks, database review, and background variance requests by DHSS. Changes the name of the "central registry" to the "child protection registry" and clarifies what information is maintained on the registry. Allows DHSS to consider prior adverse licensing findings in determining whether to grant, deny, or place a condition on a license. Authorizes DHSS to investigate an employee or individual affiliated with a licensed entity and issue a report on the findings of that investigation. Authorizes DHSS to share information with a law enforcement agency under certain circumstances. Repeals prior prohibitions on issuance or renewal of a license or payment for certain services if the applicant commits certain barrier crimes. Repeals definitions for "criminal history records," "criminal justice activity," and "criminal justice agency."

Effective Date: July 25, 2018

Chapter 70 HMONG AND LAO VETERAN DESIGNATION ON ID CARDS OR DRIVER'S LICENSES; REGISTRATION PLATES

Authorizes a person who is a Hmong veteran or a Lao veteran who served in military operations in support of the United States in the Kingdom of Laos between February 28, 1961, and May 15, 1975, to receive a veteran designation on an identification card or driver's license. Amends the vehicle registration plates celebrating the arts as one of the standard registration plates and not a special request registration plate. Authorizes a chiropractor to provide proof of disability for a person to receive a disabled veteran registration plate. Authorizes special registration plates for recipients of the Bronze Star awarded for value, Silver Star, Navy Cross, Distinguished Service Cross, Air Force Cross, Coast Guard Cross, or other award reflecting valor. (HCS SB 204(STA) am H)

Effective Date: Sections 4 and 5 take effect January 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect October 27, 2018

Chapter 71 PRIVATE EMPLOYER HIRING PREFERENCE FOR MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL GUARD AND VETERANS

Allows a private employer, when hiring, to grant an employment preference to a member of the national guard or a veteran. (CSHB 2(MLV))

Effective Date: October 27, 2018

Chapter 72 UTILITY ON-BILL FINANCING FOR ENERGY EFFICIENCY AND CONSERVATION IMPROVEMENTS

Allows a utility to enter into an on-bill financing agreement with a customer to finance the purchase and installation of a renewable energy system, energy efficiency device, energy storage device, or energy conservation system by assessing a meter conservation charge on the customer's utility bill. Requires that a customer requesting an on-bill financing agreement be offered a repair and maintenance agreement. Describes requirements for the meter conservation charge. Requires notice be recorded for a property subject to a meter conservation charge. Allows a meter conservation charge to be transferred or, in certain circumstances, applied on the utility bill of rental property. (SCS CSHB 374(CRA))

Effective Date: October 27, 2018

Chapter 73 <u>SCHOOL CURRICULA; STUDENT INFORMATION AND RECORDS;</u> MARIJUANA EDUCATION AND TREATMENT

Prohibits the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) from requiring a school district to review textbooks, instructional materials, or curricula more than once every 10 years. Requires the Board of Education and Early Development (board) to review mathematics and English and language arts curricula every five years. Requires DEED to review, identify, and submit to the board for approval the best mathematics and English and language arts curricula. Requires publication of all curricula used by school districts for all subjects and curricula whether or not the curricula is approved by the board. Establishes a three-year pilot program to test the appropriateness and effectiveness of selected curricula and authorizes incentive payments under the program to assist selected school districts in implementing curricula. Requires DEED to report certain findings to the board at completion of the pilot program, and to report to the legislature regarding the pilot program and the curricula each school district has adopted. Establishes the curriculum improvement and best practices fund. Requires regional school boards, school boards, and state boarding schools to review curricula at least once every 10 years. Requires DEED to make available to school districts an electronic system for managing student information and tracking records relating to individualized education programs for children with disabilities. Establishes the marijuana education and treatment fund. Requires a deposit of 25 percent of the marijuana excise tax into the marijuana education and treatment fund. Requires the Department of Health and Social Services to administer a comprehensive marijuana use education and treatment program. (HCS CSSB 104(FIN) am H)

Effective Date: October 28, 2018

Chapter 74 <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTANCY; LICENSURE OF PUBLIC</u> <u>ACCOUNTANTS</u>

Replaces the requirement that the Board of Public Accountancy mail each license or permit holder a copy of a proposed rule or amendment with a notice requirement. Amends qualifications for a certified public accountant license. Provides that an individual licensed to practice as a public accountant may not perform attest functions through a partnership, limited liability company, corporation, or other business entity unless they hold a valid permit issued by the Board of Public Accountancy to engage in the practice of public accounting as a partnership, limited liability company, corporation, or other business entity. Provides that information disclosed under applicable state or federal laws or regulations or as required by the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board are exceptions to confidential communications. Amends the definitions for "attest function," "report," and "state." Repeals exceptions to the education and experience requirements for an applicant for licensure as a public accountant. Repeals an exception for applicants who met certain requirements prior to April 26, 1960. Repeals a prohibition on using a title with the name of a partnership, corporation, limited liability company name, or legal entity under certain circumstances relating to accounting or auditing. **(SSHB 147)**

Effective Date: October 31, 2018

Chapter 75 MARITAL AND FAMILY THERAPIST LICENSING AND MEDICAL ASSISTANCE COVERAGE; HEALTH CARE SERVICES PRICE DISCLOSURE; EARLY CHILDHOOD TRAUMA

Amends the licensure qualifications and supervision of marital and family therapists. Adds marital and family therapy services to medical assistance coverage. Allows the Department of Health and Social Services to collect, analyze, and maintain databases of information related to healthcare services and price information. Establishes disclosure and reporting requirements for health care services, price, and fee information. Requires a health care insurer to provide a good faith estimate by request of a person receiving nonemergency healthcare services. Amends the state policy relating to children to include acknowledgment of early childhood and youth brain development. (HCS CSSB 105(FIN) am H)

Effective Date: Section 8 takes effect August 7, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 76 <u>COMMERCIAL MOTOR VEHICLES; OVERTAKING STATIONARY</u> <u>VEHICLES</u>

Amends the definition of commercial motor vehicle in AS 19.10.200 to exempt covered farm vehicles operating anywhere in the state. Amends the definition of commercial motor vehicle in AS 19.10.399 to add a reference to gross vehicle weight or gross combination weight of 10,001 pounds or more, and to transportation of hazardous materials under federal law. Exempts certain types of vehicles from the definition when operating in intrastate commerce. Adds a definition for covered farm vehicle. Amends AS 28.35.185(a) to add vehicles in the act of performing maintenance or road service work to the list of stationary vehicles that a driver must avoid by slowing down or pulling into the next lane when passing.

(HCS CSSB 163(RLS))

Effective Date: November 4, 2018

Chapter 77 <u>RELEASE OF CERTAIN RECORDS RELATING TO BIG GAME</u> <u>HUNTERS, GUIDED HUNTS, AND GUIDED SPORT FISHING ACTIVITIES</u> Requires the state to release certain records relating to transportation and accommodation of big game hunters, commercially guided or outfitted hunts, and guided sport fishing activities to a requesting municipality for verification of taxes payable. A municipality must maintain the confidentiality of the records and may only request a record relating to a hunt or activity that occurred within the four years preceding the date of the request. (CSHB 267(RES))

Effective Date: August 8, 2018

Chapter 78 EXTENSION ALLOWED FOR PAYMENT OF SHARE OF SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION GRANT BY SCHOOL DISTRICT

Authorizes the Commissioner of the Department of Education and Early Development to extend the time allowed for a school district to provide a participating share of the cost of a school construction grant project if certain requirements are met. (SCS CSHB 135(FIN))

Effective Date: November 6, 2018

Chapter 79 <u>SCHOOL_CONSTRUCTION_AND_MAJOR_MAINTENANCE_GRANT</u> <u>FUNDING</u>

Requires the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) to develop and periodically update regionally based school construction standards to achieve efficient and cost-effective school construction. Requires DEED, when reviewing school construction grant applications, to (1) encourage a school district to use previously approved design plans and building systems and (2) consider the regionally based construction standards. Authorizes DEED to require a school construction grant project to include the regionally based construction standards or use previously approved design plans and building systems. Authorizes the regional educational attendance area and small municipal school district fund to be used for major maintenance. Requires state aid for major maintenance to be included in DEED's annual report on school construction and major maintenance funding. (SCS CSHB 212(FIN))

Effective Date: August 11, 2018

Chapter 80 PERMANENT FUND DIVIDEND RAFFLE; PUBLIC SCHOOL TRUST FUND

Establishes a permanent fund dividend rafile. Creates the education endowment fund, which includes donations from the permanent fund dividend raffle. Provides for appropriation of donations from the permanent fund dividend raffle to the Department of Education and Early Development for educational purposes. Amends the public school trust fund provisions to allow the legislature to make an

appropriation from the fund each fiscal year in an amount not to exceed five percent of the monthly average market value of the fund for the five years preceding the previous fiscal year. Allows the public school trust fund to be managed using the percent of monthly average market value method. (SCS CSHB 213(RLS))

Effective Date: Sections 1, 2, 7, and 8 take effect January 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect November 8, 2018

Chapter 81 <u>REEMPLOYMENT OF RETIRED TEACHERS</u>

Allows a school district to reemploy teachers who are retired under either the defined benefit plan or the defined contribution plan of the Teachers' Retirement System of Alaska. Allows the defined benefit plan to continue to make benefit payments to eligible rehired teachers during the period of their reemployment. Does not require reemployed retired teachers to make employee contributions to the defined contribution plan and does not allow them to receive credited service in the defined contribution plan while reemployed. Authorizes specified reemployed teachers to be covered by health insurance for active employees. Changes the calculation on which employer contributions to the retirement system are made. (CSSB 185(EDC))

Effective Date: November 8, 2018

Chapter 82 STATE AID FOR SCHOOLS THAT CONSOLIDATE; SCHOOL COUNT

Amends the calculation of state aid for public school funding for certain schools that consolidate and as a result of consolidation the district would receive less funding in state aid per student than the district received per student prior to the consolidation. The amended calculation provides that school funding for the affected districts remain at pre-consolidation level for two fiscal years post-consolidation, then gradually adjust over the subsequent three fiscal years post-consolidation. Allows for a community that has more than 425 students and one school for students in grades kindergarten through 12 to be counted as having one elementary school and one secondary school for purposes of school funding. (CSSB 216(FIN))

Effective Date: August 11, 2018

Chapter 83 ORGANIZED MILITIA WORKERS' COMPENSATION BENEFITS

Treats a member of the organized militia who is ordered into state active service or ordered into training under AS 26.05.100 and who suffers an injury, disability, or death in the line of duty as an employee of the state for workers' compensation purposes. Provides for calculation of gross weekly earnings for a member of the organized militia for workers' compensation purposes. (CSHB 126(MLV))

Effective Date: November 11, 2018

Chapter 84 ORGANIZED MILITIA: PAY, ALLOWANCES, AND BENEFITS

Provides for members of the organized militia to receive equal pay to a member of equal grade and rank who serves in the regular armed forces, and to receive allowances in the same manner, and under the same conditions as provided for state officials and employees. Compensation and benefits for members of the Alaska State Defense Force are provided as though the member were a state employee. Clarifies that an order into active service is an administrative order for purposes of continuing state employee benefits. Provides that, for training or full time duty, members of the Alaska National Guard and Alaska Naval Militia are entitled to receive the same benefits provided for state employees if the member would qualify for those benefits as a state employee. (HB 150)

Effective Date: November 11, 2018

Chapter 85 <u>CODE OF MILITARY JUSTICE; SERVICEMEMBERS CIVIL RELIEF</u> <u>ACT; COURT-MARTIAL AND CRIMINAL PROSECUTION;</u> <u>DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY</u>

Amends the definitions of "aggravated sex offense," "child kidnapping," "sex offense," and "offense" to include violations of the Military Code of Alaska. Requires persons who are convicted of certain sex offenses under the Military Code of Alaska to register as sex offenders under AS 12.63. Allows the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs to be a source of information in the central sex offender registry. Expands the applicability of the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act to pertain to consumer transactions and apply to all members of the organized militia. Allows for termination of contract by a servicemember in certain circumstances. Amends the Military Code of Alaska to remove the availability of a member from declining the imposition of a nonjudicial punishment in favor of a court-martial. Allows a military judge or summary court-martial officer to punish a person for contempt if the person willfully disobeys the military judge or summary court-martial officer. Defines an offense under the Military Code of Alaska that is punishable by a term of confinement of more than one year as a felony. Adds misprision as an offense. Includes a presidentially prescribed lesser included offense in the conviction of lesser included offense provision. Adds offenses for solicitation, wrongfully and falsely making or altering a military or official pass permit, discharge certificate, or identification card, jumping from a vessel, impersonating an officer or official, wearing unauthorized insignia, unlawful consumption of alcohol or drugs with a prisoner, wrongful interference with adverse administrative proceedings, wrongful refusal to testify, retaliation, certain acts while in correctional custody, making false statements, assault, and broadcasting or distributing a recording of another person's private area without consent. Adds controlled substance to the operation of a vehicle, aircraft, or vessel while impaired and drunkenness or incapacitation while on duty or while a prisoner provisions. Amends the sentinel provisions. Amends the sexual assault provision. Authorizes the convening authority of a court-martial to reduce a sentence of separation with characterization dishonorable discharge for assistance in

investigation or prosecution of another. Prohibits sexual activities with recruits or trainees by persons in positions of special trust. Increases the maximum punishment for sexual misconduct, indecent viewing, visual recording or broadcasting to seven years. Defines "recording" and "without the other person's consent." Requires a court-martial to provide information regarding sex offender registration. Establishes a public records offense, offense concerning government computers, and breach of medical quarantine offense. Defines "controlled substances." Authorizes the Department of Public Safety to collect samples for inclusion into the DNA identification registration system for persons convicted under the Military Code of Alaska. (SCS CSHB 307(JUD))

Effective Date: Sections 1 - 4, 6, 9, 10, 12 - 39, 41, and 42(b) - (d) are conditional; remainder of Act takes effect August 14, 2018

Chapter 86 REINSTATEMENT OF NATIVE CORPORATIONS

Extends the time for reinstatement of a Native village corporation that has been involuntarily dissolved under the state's laws for corporations. (HB 410)

Effective Date: August 18, 2018

Chapter 87 <u>COMMUNITY SEED LIBRARIES</u>

Requires the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to regulate the noncommercial transfer, promotion, and labeling of seed. Creates, for the noncommercial transfer of seed between individuals or the giving or exchanging of seed through a community seed library, a limited exception from regulations and procedures requiring pre-sale classification, grading, and inspection of agricultural products. Allows establishment of community seed libraries for the giving or exchanging of seed for home, educational, charitable, or other noncommercial use. Encourages the development of community seed libraries and noncommercial seed transfers. Requires DNR to obtain and publish information about community seed libraries. (CSHB 197(FIN))

Effective Date: November 18, 2018

Chapter 88 ALASKA CAPITAL INCOME FUND

Specifying that money may be appropriated from the Alaska capital income fund for preventive or deferred maintenance of state facilities, including replacement of parts, systems, or components, or other activities needed to preserve or maintain state assets, and to cover annual debt service and reserves for debt service on bonds authorized by state law. **(SB 107)**

Effective Date: November 20, 2018

Chapter 89 COURT FILING FEES TO A CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES FUND

Allows an additional appropriation to the civil legal services fund of up to ten percent of the filing fees received by the court system during the previous closed fiscal year. (SCS HB 106(FIN))

Effective Date: November 20, 2018

Chapter 90 911 DIALING ON MULTI-LINE TELEPHONE SYSTEMS

Allows a municipality to adopt an ordinance that requires a multi-line telephone system operator, upon upgrade or installation of a new system after January 1, 2019, to ensure that the system allows a caller to dial 911 directly, provides specific location information about the origin of the call, and has an information database that stores the required information. Requires that, if the operator of a multi-line telephone system within a municipality is not required by ordinance to provide the location and other information otherwise required by an ordinance, the operator must post a notice that states that 911 services cannot be dialed directly, how a dialer can access 911, and provides specific information about the location of the dialer. **(SB 215)**

Effective Date: November 21, 2018

Chapter 91 WORKERS' COMPENSATION; INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS; LEGISLATIVE WORKERS' COMPENSATION WORKING GROUP

Allows the Department of Labor and Workforce Development to use a greater percentage of the service fees paid by insurers of the direct premium income for workers' compensation insurance. Updates reporting and notice requirements. Makes efficiency changes throughout the chapter. Ends reimbursement of claims from the second injury fund for an injury or death occurring after August 31, 2018. Excludes independent contractors from workers' compensation coverage. Defines independent contractor. Clarifies the requirements for corporate executive officers to opt out of workers' compensation coverage. Eliminates requirement that the board approve attorney fees as part of a settlement in certain circumstances. Establishes a legislative workers' compensation working group of six members to meet in the interim between sessions to review the workers' compensation system with certain stakeholders and to prepare legislation and a report of its findings before the First Regular Session of the Thirty-First Legislature. (SCS CSHB 79(FIN))

Effective Date: Sections 15, 16, 23, and 26 take effect August 25, 2018; section 19 takes effect September 1, 2018; section 18 takes effect August 1, 2019; remainder of Act takes effect November 22, 2018

Chapter 92 PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

Adds legislative findings related to persons with disabilities. Requires the Department of Health and Social Services to take a flexible approach to administering programs for persons with disabilities that allows each person to actively participate in managing the person's support services. (SB 174)

Effective Date: November 23, 2018

Chapter 93 STATE MARICULTURE REVOLVING LOAN FUND AND LOANS MADE FROM THE FUND

Establishes a policy of the state to promote mariculture and the enhancement of the state's shellfish fisheries by means of long-term, low-interest loans. Permits the mariculture loan fund to be used for loans to a resident or entity organized under the laws of the state that operates a hatchery for the purpose of producing aquatic plants or shellfish or that conducts shellfish experiments. Requires that 60 percent of amount available annually to make loans from the fund be available for loans to mariculture farms, with the remaining amount to be available for loans to hatcheries. Restricts the total indebtedness, the repayment term, and the annual amount of a loan that may be provided to a hatchery. Establishes additional lending and repayment standards, including interest accrual periods, to be implemented by the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development. Allows an association of commercial fishing permit holders to levy and collect an assessment from its members to secure and repay a loan from the mariculture revolving loan fund. (SCS CSHB 76(FIN))

Effective Date: August 28, 2018

Chapter 94 <u>RACE CLASSICS</u>

Amends the definition of "race classic" to authorize the Greater Ketchikan Chamber of Commerce to conduct the "Race to Alaska" classic. (HB 18)

Effective Date: November 25, 2018

Chapter 95 DIVE FISHERY MANAGEMENT ASSESSMENTS

Changes the procedure for levying, amending, or terminating a dive fishery management assessment. Provides that an assessment may be levied, amended, or terminated if approved by a majority of the eligible interim-use permit and entry permit holders at an election if at least 25 percent of the eligible interim-use permit and entry permit holders participate in the election. Provides that an election to amend the rate of a dive fishery management assessment in an administrative area will be held if at least 75 percent of the board members of the regional dive fishery management association for that area sign a petition and present it to the Commissioner of the Department of Fish and Game. (HB 354)

Effective Date: November 25, 2018

Chapter 96 <u>MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE PROHIBITING CELL PHONE USE WHILE</u> DRIVING IN SCHOOL ZONES

Allows a municipality to adopt an ordinance prohibiting the use of a cellular telephone by a person while driving in an active school zone unless use of the cellular telephone is hands-free. (CSHB 333(CRA) am S)

Effective Date: November 26, 2018

Chapter 97 <u>MEDICAL ASSISTANCE COVERAGE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH</u> CLINIC SERVICES

Authorizes the Department of Health and Social Services to require behavioral health clinic services to be provided by a licensed physician or under the direct supervision of a licensed physician for the purposes of medical assistance coverage. Defines direct supervision to mean that the licensed physician is available either in person or by a communication device to provide certain supervisory oversight of the behavioral health clinic services. **(CSSB 169(RLS))**

Effective Date: November 27, 2018

Chapter 98 SOBRIETY AWARENESS MONTH

Establishes the month of March as Sobriety Awareness Month. (SB 208)

Effective Date: November 27, 2018

Chapter 99 <u>COMMERCIAL FISHING LOANS MADE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF</u> <u>COMMERCE, COMMUNITY, AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT</u>

Raises the maximum limit on total balances outstanding on certain commercial fishing loans made to a borrower who is a state resident from \$300,000 to \$400,000. (HB 56)

Effective Date: November 29, 2018

Chapter 100 <u>PRESCRIPTION PRICES; PHARMACIES; PHARMACY BENEFITS</u> <u>MANAGERS; INSURANCE</u>

Provides that no contract may prohibit a pharmacy, pharmacist, or pharmacy benefits manager from informing a patient of a less costly alternative to a prescription drug, medical device or supply. Requires a pharmacist or their agent to notify the patient if a known less costly alternative is available. Defines "health care plan," and "pharmacy benefits manager." Includes the potential for a civil penalty for noncompliance. Establishes registration requirements and duties of pharmacy benefits managers. Establishes pharmacy audit and recoupment procedures. Creates

an appeals process for pharmacy audit appeals. Defines "fraudulent activity." Exempts from certain audit procedures suspected fraudulent activity or other misrepresentation and claims paid for under the medical assistance program. Requires a pharmacy benefits manager to create a drug pricing list and establish a process by which to appeal the reimbursement of a multi-source generic drug. Defines "audit," "claim," "extrapolation," "list," "multi-source generic drug," "network pharmacy," "pharmacy," "pharmacy acquisition cost," "pharmacy benefits manager," and "recoupment." (CSHB 240(FIN))

Effective Date: Sections 1, 3, 6(b), and 7 take effect September 5, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect July 1, 2019

Chapter 101 EXTENSION OF EDUCATION TAX CREDITS

Extends the repeal of the education tax credits against the insurance tax, income tax, oil and gas production tax, oil and gas property tax, mining tax, fisheries tax, and fisheries resource landing tax from December 31, 2018, to January 1, 2025. Allows a contribution of equipment to be eligible for an education tax credit. Allows a contribution to an Alaska two-year or four-year college accredited by a national accreditation association to be eligible for an education tax credit. Reduces the amount of a tax credit for a contribution between \$100,000 and \$300,000 to 75 percent of the contribution (the first \$100,000 and amounts over \$300,000 remain at 50 percent of the contribution). In 2021, reduces the amount of a tax credit to 50 percent of a contribution, regardless of the amount donated. (SCS CSHB 233(FIN))

Effective Date: Sections 1, 2, 4 - 7, 9 - 12, 14 - 17, 19 - 22, 24 - 27, 29 - 31, 33, 35, and 36 take effect January 1, 2019, section 32 takes effect December 31, 2020, sections 3, 8, 13, 18, 23, 28, and 34 take effect January 1, 2021, remainder of Act takes effect September 6, 2018

Chapter 102 ALASKA MICROLOAN PROGRAM

Makes changes to the Alaska microloan revolving loan program. Adjusts the loan amount that triggers the requirement that a loan applicant submit proof that a financial institution denied the applicant a loan or made a loan contingent on receiving a microloan. Increases the basic loan term to a maximum of 12 years. Increases the interest rate that may be charged for a microloan. Requires the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development to report to the legislature on the activity, effectiveness, and suggestions for the improvement of the microloan program by January 15, 2022. (SCS CSHB 304(FIN))

Effective Date: December 4, 2018

Chapter 103 PROMOTION OF LOCAL AGRICULTURE AND LOCAL AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS

Allows the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources to sell or license the sale of merchandise related to the "Alaska Grown" trademark. Limits civil liability of farm tour operators for injuries caused by farm touring. Allows a municipality spending state money to buy a locally harvested agricultural or fisheries product so long as it is not priced higher than 15 percent above a similar product available from another state. Establishes, for a required preference, a range of not less than seven percent nor more than 15 percent applied to the price of a purchase by the state or a school district of an agricultural product harvested in the state. (CSHB 217(FIN))

Effective Date: January 1, 2019

Chapter 104 NORTH STAR MEDAL

Creates the North Star Medal. Authorizes the governor to award the medal directly or posthumously to any peace officer, correctional officer, firefighter, first responder, or member of a volunteer search and rescue group who dies or is seriously injured in the line of duty and has displayed exceptional bravery or heroism while performing those duties. Requires nominations for the medal to be submitted to the Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety (DPS) by the highest ranking supervisor in the department or organization of the nominee. The commissioner of DPS will submit the names of those recommended for the medal to the governor for approval. (CSHB 235(STA))

Effective Date: December 10, 2018

Chapter 105 PATRIOT DAY AND POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS INJURY AWARENESS DAY

Establishes September 11 of each year as Patriot Day and establishes June 27 of each year as Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Day. (HCS SB 152(MLV))

Effective Date: December 10, 2018

Chapter 106 UNIFORM ENVIRONMENTAL COVENANTS ACT

Adopts the Uniform Environmental Covenants Act. Requires the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to establish an environmental covenant to record activity and use limitations on property if an environmental response project results in remedial contamination or an engineered feature that requires monitoring, maintenance, or operation. States that an environmental covenant is not an interest in real property and that a person that signs an environmental covenant is bound to its terms. Describes the priority of an environmental covenant when compared with various property interests. Provides for the standards and procedures for recording an

environmental covenant. States that an environmental covenant is perpetual unless it is terminated by DEC or another prescribed action. Allows an environmental covenant to be amended or terminated under certain conditions. Allows DEC to administer and enforce an environmental covenant. Allows a property owner or DEC to record a notice of activity and use limitation into the public land records instead of entering into an environmental covenant. Allows a notice of activity and use limitation to be amended or terminated. Requires DEC to maintain a registry of environmental covenants and notice of activity and use limitations. (HCS SB 64(RLS))

(1105 52 0 (1115))

Effective Date: Section 2 takes effect September 16, 2018; remainder of Act takes effect December 14, 2018

Chapter 107 OFF-ROAD VEHICLES WITHIN THE DALTON HIGHWAY CORRIDOR; CONTAINED OR CONFINED LOADS

Authorizes a person to use off-road vehicles within the James Dalton Highway corridor to access private property that is outside the corridor and has a history of use as a homestead. Defines "highway corridor" or "corridor." Amends the elements, exceptions, and penalties for the crime of failure to contain or confine a load. (SB 199 am H)

Effective Date: December 23, 2018

Chapter 108 SUPPORTED DECISION-MAKING

Provides a method for an adult to receive decision-making assistance from another adult by authorizing voluntary supported decision-making agreements. Establishes the formalities for the agreement and what the agreement must contain. Describes types of decisions subject to the agreement. Allows the assisted adult to terminate the agreement at any time. Prohibits the supporting adult from making decisions for the assisted adult. Requires the agreement to be substantially the same as the form provided in the statute. Requires other persons to recognize decisions made or requests communicated with the assistance of the supporting adult. (CSHB 336(JUD) am)

Effective Date: December 26, 2018

Chapter 109 PENSION OBLIGATION BONDS

Reduces the pension obligation bond limit from \$5,000,000,000 to \$1,500,000,000 or a funding ratio of actuarial assets to accrued liability greater than 85 percent, whichever is less. Requires submission of a proposal to the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee (LBA) before issuance of pension obligation bonds or other liabilities. Provides for a 45-day wait period after submission of a proposal to LBA before pension obligation bonds or other liabilities can be issued, unless earlier recommended by the committee. Requires an additional review and statement of intent if LBA recommends that the pension obligation bond proposal not proceed within the 45-day wait period. (HCS SB 97(FIN) am H)

Effective Date: December 26, 2018

Chapter 110 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES FOR DISABLED SUBSCRIBERS

Updates the requirement for telephone services to require telecommunications utilities to provide to subscribers who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech disabled services that permit the subscriber to communicate by telecommunications device with persons of normal hearing. (HCS CSSB 80(L&C))

Effective Date: September 30, 2018

Chapter 111 <u>REGISTRATION AND TITLING OF BOATS; ABANDONED AND</u> <u>DERELICT VESSELS</u>

Amends boat registration requirements and establishes titling requirements for certain boats. Creates fees for barge registration and boat titling. Adds a definition for "barge." Amends the standards for establishing a vessel as derelict. Amends the procedures and notice and hearing requirements for a state agency, municipality, or peace officer to impound and dispose of a derelict vessel. Establishes civil and criminal liability for derelict vessels. Creates the derelict vessel prevention program fund. Requires the Department of Natural Resources to establish and administer the derelict vessel prevention program, establish various programs relating to derelict vessels, establish a derelict vessel advisory council, and develop and maintain a publicly available database of known derelict vessels in the state. Provides procedures for the sale or disposition of a vessel abandoned on the premises of a vessel storage business. Authorizes certain individuals to serve as peace officers for enforcing laws relating to derelict vessels. Amends the definition of "vessel." Adds definitions for "abandoned," "department," "owner," and "state agency." Provides that program money received from receipts deposited to the derelict vessel prevention program fund are accounted for separately and that appropriations from these program receipts are not made from the unrestricted general fund. Amends contingent repeal of AS 05.25.055, relating to boat registration, and AS 05.25.096, relating to fees. (HCS CSSB 92(FIN))

Effective Date: Section 35 takes effect October 12, 2018; sections 5 and 8 are conditional; remainder of Act takes effect January 1, 2019

Chapter 112 <u>NATIVE CORPORATION LIABILITY FOR RELEASE OF HAZARDOUS</u> <u>SUBSTANCES</u>

Exempts from strict liability a Native corporation for the release or threatened release of a hazardous substance on land acquired by the corporation under the Alaska

Native Claims Settlement Act unless the corporation caused or contributed to the release or threatened release of the hazardous substance. (HCS SB 202(JUD))

Effective Date: January 15, 2019

Chapter 113 WAIVER OF CLEANUP AND CONTAINMENT COSTS FOR CERTAIN OIL AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE RELEASES
