

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors
of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—I herewith transmit my report of the affairs of this office for the fiscal year terminating June 30, 1884.

During the year there were 5,000 deaths against 4,988 of the preceding year, an increase of 12. Of these 502 were Mongolians, and 4,498 were of other nationalities.

Estimating our population at 270,000, the annual ratio of deaths per 1,000 was 18.47, against 19.95 of the preceding year, when our population was estimated at 250,000.

Estimating the Chinese population at 22,000, the annual rate was 22.8, against 25.3 of the preceding year.

Estimating the population of other nationalities at 248,000, the annual ratio of deaths was 18.13, against 19.42 of the preceding year.

Among the more prominent causes of death were, from zymotic diseases: dysentery and diarrhoea, 63; cholera infantum, 91; diphtheria, 51; typhoid fever, 180; other zymotic diseases, 285.

From constitutional diseases: cancer, 166; phthisis pulmonalis, 907; other constitutional diseases, 82.

From local diseases: encephalitis, 151; apoplexy and paralysis, 210; other diseases of nervous system, 332; heart disease, 278; other diseases of circulatory system, 59; pneumonia, 360; bronchitis, 117; other diseases of the respiratory system, 173; gastritis, 34; enteritis, 176; hepatitis, 39; cirrhosis of the liver, 42; peritonitis, 55; other diseases of digestive system, 104; Bright's disease, 57; nephritis, 39; other diseases of the urinary

system, 56. From diseases of the generative system, 19. From diseases of the locomotory system, 25. From diseases not localized, 55. From developmental diseases: inanition, old age and debility, 375; other diseases of this system, 153. From violent deaths, 245.

There were 21 deaths from unascertained causes; of these 10 were whites and 11 Mongolians, against 64 last year.

By reference to Table IV, Abridged Mortality Report, it will be seen that 18.14 per cent of the entire deaths occurred from phthisis pulmonalis alone. Of these 205 were Mongolians—over 40 per cent of the entire number of deaths (502) of this race. Heretofore a large proportion of the deaths of the Chinese have been reported from unknown causes. As a rule they are examined after death by the Police Surgeon, and as he can ascertain but little of the history of these cases, the diagnosis is necessarily often of a doubtful character.

The three cases of yellow fever, of course, were imported.

This disease, in my opinion, can never prevail as an epidemic in San Francisco, our temperature being too low for the propagation of the germs of this scourge (see Table No. 20).

Only three cases of smallpox were reported during the year. These cases were all imported, and were immediately removed to the Twenty-sixth Street Hospital. No deaths occurred.

So long as the Restriction Act is faithfully and intelligently enforced against the immigration of Chinese, I have no fear of a serious smallpox epidemic, provided our people continue, as at present, to appreciate the necessity of thorough vaccination.

The almost universal adoption of bovine virus has removed the former prejudice against vaccination—a prejudice which was not confined to the ignorant, but was entertained and acted upon by many intelligent people in and out of the medical profession.

I wish to reiterate a statement made in one of my reports several years ago: "That no case, even of varioloid, has occurred in this city where the patient had been successfully vaccinated with animal virus before the period of incubation of smallpox; and that when the period of incubation had been going on for several days, the disease has been so modified by vaccination, in every case, as to make it harmless." I make this statement after an experience of more than eight years in the use of animal virus, during which time I have personally vaccinated thousands of cases exposed to the disease, with the above result.

The isolation of lepers is so important and its necessity so self-evident, that I scarcely think the subject worthy of discussion.

Heretofore the entire expense of supporting a lazaretto has fallen upon the people of San Francisco, and will continue to do so, unless the State, as it ought to do, takes in hand this important matter.

We probably have more than 100,000 Mongolians on this Coast, and even if the Restriction Act should be efficiently enforced, still you have the fact staring you in the face that leprosy will continue to develop, as heretofore, among these people.

Those of us familiar with the execution of our sanitary laws, know the fact that leprosy is not imported into San Francisco, unless a case in its incipiency should escape the careful inspection adopted both at Hongkong and the port of San Francisco.

This disease, like consumption, may lie dormant for years, and then develop at any period of life without any apparent exciting cause.

The prejudice of our people against the Chinese has undoubtedly confined this disease almost entirely to that race; but as the Restriction Act will necessarily diminish this population, their labor will be more in demand; and when, by their industry and desire to learn, they acquire a more thorough knowledge of our language and become more assimilated to our manners and customs, will not this prejudice gradually subside? And will it not come to pass, in a few years, in this cosmopolitan city, continually being made more so by immigration from all parts of the world, that marriage between the Chinese and people of other nationalities will become a frequent occurrence? Although this disease may not be contagious, in the ordinary acceptation of that term, we are satisfied that it is commun-

icated by inoculation, and by other means not necessary to discuss here.

The fiscal year just terminated has been one of unusual healthfulness. We have had no epidemics. The annual ratio of deaths per 1,000 of population has been materially reduced. This ratio (18.47 per 1,000 of population), and especially the ratio of deaths per 1,000 from zymotic causes (13.4), is the best evidence that San Francisco, if not the healthiest, is one of the healthiest of the large cities in the world.

The reduction of our death rate is not the result of accident, but is due to the constantly improving sanitary condition of the city.

It gives me great pleasure to state that the present Board of Supervisors, assisted by a conscientious and industrious Superintendent of Streets, with intelligent and efficient assistants, have done more, and are doing more, to improve the sanitary condition of this city than has been accomplished by any and I may say all of their predecessors since my connection with the City Government, a period of more than eight years. worst public nuisances, such as the North Beach, and Bryant avenue, and Solano street nuisances, have been created by some of your predecessors, and in vain have I appealed, till now, by the most earnest communication to their Honorable Bodies and through the courts for an abatement of these sources of discomfort and breeders of disease. The people of the northern as well as the southern portion of the city have reason to thank you for doing what they and I have in vain sought to accomplish through other administrations.

The reconstruction of the most important sewers in the southern portion of the city, especially the Fifth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Eighteenth street sewers, will add most materially to the comfort and health of a large and densely populated portion of the city.

The extension of the Powell street sewer through the sea wall will relieve thousands of people who have patiently suffered for years from one of the most intolerable nuisances which has ever disgraced any city.

It is to be hoped that the Harbor Commissioners will hereafter, as the wall is extended, construct immediately a sewer through the sea wall at the foot of every street. This will permit the salt water to flow in and out of the basins which are necessarily created by the extension of the sea wall, until such time as the said basins are filled in and the city's sewers extended to deep water.

I invite your attention to the report of the Sanitary Inspectors and other officers connected with this Department, including the financial report of the Secretary, believing that you will find that the affairs of the Department have been honestly, intelligently and economically administered. The report of the Inspector of Plumbing and Drainage will furnish abundant evidence of the wisdom of the Legislature in enacting this law. The act would be more effective and salutary if the rules and regulations established by the Board of Health could be made to apply to old as well as new houses.

The masses of the people of San Francisco are better fed, better clothed, better housed, receive better wages, and consequently are more intelligent than the same class of people in any city of which I have any knowledge.

Such a people have a right to demand that our pure air shall not be contaminated by unneccessary nuisances, whether they be of a private or public character.

In conclusion, I desire to say that, with the sanitary improvement now going on and those projected, in a few months our city will compare in cleanliness and health most favorably with any large city in this or any other country.

The total expenses for the year amount to seven thousand four hundred and thirty-one dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$7,431 58).

The expenses for the fiscal year 1882-83 aggregate \$8,620 69. This shows a reduction of \$1,189 11 in favor of this fiscal year. The cost of coal consumed the past year amounts to \$814, against \$1,332 31 consumed the preceding year.

It became necessary to quarantine four steamers by reason of infection from yellow fever. Fifteen persons were treated on ship board, suffering from the above named disease. Twelve recovered and three died. One steamer was quarantined, having one case of small-pox on board, which developed while the vessel was en route to this port. No more cases developed, and the passengers were liberated after a detention of seventeen days.

A rigid quarantine is now in force, and will continue to be so during the future.

REPORT OF PLUMBING AND DRAINAGE INSPECTOR.

San Francisco, July 31st, 1884.

J. L. Meares, M. D., Health Officer, City and County of San Francisco:

SIR—I respectfully submit my report as Plumbing and Drainage Inspector for the period of eleven months, commencing August 1, 1883, and ending June 30, 1884.

I have, during said period, inspected the plumbing and drainage of six hundred and one (601) buildings, and tested twenty-three hundred feet of ironstone sewer pipe, where the same was laid inside the wall lines of buildings. During the first month after the plumbing and drainage law went into force, I found considerable trouble from the want of a proper knowledge and understanding of the rules and regulations of the Board of Health, on the part of the public, and it is with pleasure I am now able to state that, as the public become acquainted with the beneficial results of the said rules, they become more popular. In the performance of my duties it has been necessary to cause the arrest of thirteen persons for violations of the rules. Three cases were brought to trial, and the parties convicted and fined. Nine cases were withdrawn upon the parties arrested complying with the rules. One case is now pending in Court.

CITY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

San Francisco, August 4, 1884.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors
of the City and County of San Francisco:

Gentlemen—In compliance with Resolution No. 15,214 (New Series), I have the honor to submit for your consideration my eighth annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

The House of Correction and the County Jail have maintained a very good sanitary condition for the past year. Most of the cases there treated by me were contracted by the patients prior to their admission to those institutions. To the zeal and efficiency of the officers of both institutions is largely due the state of general health of the inmates. The dispensaries of the County Jail and House of Correction have been refitted in a satisfactory manner at a nominal expense, which is commendatory to your Honorable Body, as the expense of compounding prescriptions elsewhere will be curtailed.

There has been an increase in the number of indigent sick during the past year. As the accommodations at present furnished by the city, where these unfortunates are to be treated, are entirely inadequate for the purpose, I am obliged to call your attention to a recommendation made by me in my last annual report, as follows: "I would request the attention of your Honorable Body to the absolute necessity of establishing a Public Dispensary in some central portion of the city. Upon the same premises there should also be attached a Receiving or Accident Hospital, thus removing the latter from its present location in the City Prison. One building could be used for both purposes, under the charge and control of the City and Assistant City Physicians. It will at once suggest itself to the minds

of all citizens, that it is extremely undesirable to remove persons injured on the public streets inside prison walls for medical treatment. The present Receiving Hospital is better than none at all, but I know of no other city which locates such an institution inside the walls of a prison. Such a state of affairs is not in accord with the size and wealth of San Francisco, nor is it in consonance with the laws of Hygiene."

My private office has been converted into a branch Health Office, where the sick apply for admission to the City and County Hospital or the Alms House, thereby excluding my private patients from visiting my office. The indigent sick who are unable to visit my office or enter the Hospital, must suffer without the establishment of a systematically arranged dispensary.

The question of a public Morgue having been freely discussed during the past ten years, I feel it my duty to state that this city should maintain its own Morgue. Commodious apartments should be provided for the Coroner, where a large well-ventilated and lightsome autopsy room could be selected for the City Physician and assistant, wherein they would be able to make complete and efficient post mortem examinations. Moreover, from my extensive experience relative to the Morgue, I would unhesitatingly recommend its removal from thickly settled neighborhoods to the water front. There are a score of reasons why the Morgue should be under the immediate management of the city, several of which were advanced by Coroner Marc Levingston in his annual report, filed two weeks since. I have taken occasion to make this recommendation as I am called to the Morgue almost daily in my official capacity, and foresee the benefits that would accrue from its adoption.

I request your attention to a subject of paramount importance, viz: The holding of autopsies by the City Physician or Assistant for the Coroner. In this connection, I deem it my duty to divulge a few facts which will convince your Honorable Body and the public that this grave duty should be imposed upon physicians other than upon me or the assistant. In brief, I would state that a terrible, yea, a fatal danger is incurred by attending the sick and wounded after the making of an autopsy.

No means more propitious for the propagation of infection could be devised.

In view of the possible spread of the cholera in this city, I desire to impress upon your Honorable Body the necessity of furnishing all our public institutions with the requisite sanitary precautions against the dread disease. To the officers and attaches of the several departments visited by me, I would suggest to have garbage and all decaying vegetable matter removed daily, and oftener, if necessary.

In conclusion, I beg leave to tender my thanks to those who have generously aided me in the discharge of the duties of my office.






