Program Update

Composting Education/Outreach in Brasil

Jean Bonhotal and Mary Schwarz were invited by Embrapa, the Brasilian Agricultural Research Entity, similar to our USDA ARS, to participate in the "Workshop on Composting of Carcass and Residues from Ruminant Production." Through presentations, demonstrations and hands-on exercises concerning the composting of carcasses and butcher residual, topics including equipment, substrate and carcass preparation, pile building, parameters of control and utilization of the final product were covered during this 4 day workshop. Embrapa hopes to implement mortality composting throughout the country to improve biosecurity on farms and research facilities. Embrapa convened facility managers throughout the country for the workshops and facility tours. Locations visited included Fortaleza and Sobral in the state of Ceara, at Embrapa Goat and Sheep, Vassoura and Niteroi in the state of Rio de Janeiro and Juiz de Fora in the state of Minas Gerais, Embrapa Goat and Sheep in Sobral and Embrapa Dairy in Juiz de Fora. In the summer of 2011, Embrapa plans to send a group to New York for further education and hands-on training.
