

Battle for the North

The Northumbria Masters has been a welcome addition to the UK tournament circuit. Over the last few years, the event has established itself as a calendar highlight for chess players in the North of England.

Among a range of sections, the Northumbria Masters boasts a strong international Open tournament, as well as round-robins specialising in creating title norm opportunities for aspiring players. This year's all-play-all sections produced two international master norms — one for James Moreby of Newcastle, and a final norm for Ondrej Svanda from the Czech Republic.

In 2024 the congress moved south from Newcastle to Darlington, finding a new home in the splendid setting of the town's Victorian Central Hall. Next year the organiser, FM Tim Wall, has ambitions to expand further, with plans including an open-air chess feetival

One of the most spectacular games of the Northumbria Masters took place between two grandmasters — Daniel Gormally of Alnwick, and Eldar Gasanov of Ukraine.

East-West at Table One were pleased with their defence on this amusing deal from a teams match, kindly sent in by reader Alan Brown from Surrey. However, their smiles evaporated when they scored up with teammates ..

Dealer South Neither Vul



- (1) 23 or more points, or (as here) an upgrade for shape.
 (2) Negative or waiting, the normal

Leading a singleton rather loses its lustre when you have no trumps, so West led a dia-mond. East won the ace (felling declarer's bare king) and switched to his singleton

West beat declarer's king with the ace and, knowing (unlike his partner) that declarer was also out of clubs, switched to his heart (for passive reasons, not for a ruff). East carefully inserted the ten, as opposed to the third-hand-high ace that would have let the game make.

Declarer won the king of hearts and cashed the ace of spades, West discarding. Needing to reach dummy to take the marked spade finesse, declarer tried the nine of hearts. However, East could win the jack and cash the ace. Although declarer could ruff East's fourth heart in dummy and pick up East's spades, that was one down. Tight defence.

Declarer (East) ruffed South's ace of spades lead in dummy and led a diamond to the ace, felling the king. He then turned to clubs, crossing to the ace and ruffing a club (exposing the 5-l split). He cashed the ace of hearts, ruffed a heart, ruffed a third club, ruffed a heart, ruffed a fourth club, ruffed a heart, ruffed a fifth club, ruffed a spade and triumphantly cashed the sixth club. That was all 13 tricks made and a whopping +1,580 to East-West.
