Friendly volunteers in pink t-shirts with the GDIF logo are available to support you with The Way Ahead art installation


The signs are about the inequality D/deaf, disabled and neurodivergent people experience.

# **About the signs**



The signs are based on UK road signs.



Like on the roads red triangular signs give warnings.



Blue circular signs give instructions about what you must do.





Blue rectangular signs give directions.

Usually used on motorways.



Red circular signs- giving orders about what you must not do.
