# **BILL SUMMARIES**

# LD 202: Ranked-Choice Voting Constitutional Amendment - OPPOSE

This bill would amend the Maine Constitution to allow Ranked-Choice Voting (RCV) to be used in races for Governor, State Senator, and State Representative, instead of solely in primaries and Federal elections. Claims from proponents that RCV will herald more civil campaigns and greater democratic representation have not come to fruition. The confusing system continues to depress engagement and turnout in demographics already less likely to vote. RCV should be repealed from Maine law entirely, not expanded.

# LD 750: Expand Right-to-Shop - SUPPORT

Maine's Right-To-Shop law aims to encourage patients to seek out lower cost services in comparison to their network. Current law provides that insurers must offer at least one plan that provides this as an option. LD 750 would ensure that incentives offered to consumers for shopping for a cheaper medical procedure out-of-network are at least 25% of the price difference, based on the average statewide price on the Maine Health Data Organization website. It would also include surgeries in the list of services for which Mainers may shop and would remove the requirement that an "out of network provider" be based in Maine, New Hampshire, or Massachusetts, and enrolled in MaineCare and participate in Medicare. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

# LD 927: Repeal Certificate of Need for Major Medical Equipment - SUPPORT

Certificate of Need (CON) is a lengthy bureaucratic process by which healthcare facilities must prove to the state (and their competitors) that a "need" exists in order to be allowed to make a large expenditure or expand their services. Maine's CON law should be repealed in its entirety because doing so would increase competition, lower costs, and give health care facilities the flexibility they need to respond to future health care crisis. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

# LD 942: Waive All Occupational Licensing Fees for 2020 - SUPPORT

This bill would waive all licensing and certification fees for professions and occupations governed by the Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation (OPOR), including barbers, chiropractors, electricians, and many others. Those who have paid a licensing or certification fee for calendar year 2020 would be reimbursed. In a normal year, most of Maine's occupational licensing rules are too onerous. Skilled workers deserve the easiest path possible to providing their services to Mainers who need them. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

# LD 1039: Balanced Emergency Powers Reform - SUPPORT

This bill would require majority legislative approval in order to extend a Civil State of Emergency declared by the governor beyond 30 days, and every 30 days thereafter. Legislators may terminate any emergency order issued under a state of emergency with a two-thirds vote. Under current law, the legislature would be able to terminate a state of emergency at any time with a majority resolution, so dependent on political make-up, executive powers may continue unabated in perpetuity. Emergency powers vested in the governor are exceptional and extraordinary, and should be frequently adjudicated and affirmed in order to avoid abuse of separation of powers. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

#### LD 1083: Voter ID - SUPPORT

This bill would require the presentation of photo identification when voting in person. Acceptable forms of ID include a valid driver's license, non-driver identification card, passport, military ID, or a permit to carry a concealed handgun if that includes a photograph. The bill also allows a person who does not possess a photograph identification document to request a free special voter photograph identification card from the Secretary of State. Requiring voters to present a photograph of themselves to prove identity to vote is neither difficult nor discriminatory. Mainers deserve this basic level of trust in their voting systems. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

#### LD 1142: Prohibit "Non-Essential" Business Designation - SUPPORT

This bill would prohibit the Governor from restricting the operation of a private business during a state of emergency unless the Governor restricts all private businesses in the same manner. The fact that this bill needed to be submitted is bad enough. There is no reasonable justification for the state to define some businesses and community organizations as "essential" and some as "non-essential," and to enforce such designations through its police power as it did for most of 2020. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

# LD 1252: Raise Child Care Limit Without Licensure - SUPPORT

This bill would codify an executive order Governor Janet Mills issued in late March 2020 allowing small child care providers to watch up to three children, four if a pair are siblings, before a state license is required. Maine lost more than 40% of family child care providers over the last 10 years, leading to limited space, higher prices, and more uncertainty for young families. Lifting the barrier of licensure for smaller, neighborhood-level child care would give families more options and help stabilize the labor market and economy at large. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

# LD 1259: Local Charter School Authorization - SUPPORT

Maine's charter public schools have been kneecapped by state-imposed limits on the number of charters which can operate, and the enrollment levels of virtual charter schools. This bill would allow local school boards to independently authorize charter public schools to operate in their district. While a small step, this would increase educational options and opportunities for families across Maine, especially in areas where student academic outcomes are lacking. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

#### LD 1342: Local-Option Sales Tax (LOST) - OPPOSE

This bill would allow municipalities by referendum to enact a 1% tax "on the value of rental of living quarters in any hotel, rooming house or tourist or trailer camp," raising costs for patrons of presumably the state's biggest services centers. Sales taxes are regressive, meaning they disproportionately harm low-income individuals who spend a larger share of their earnings on the tax. There is no provision in state law or in the bill which would require municipalities to lower their property taxes with LOST revenue. Lawmakers should be reducing taxes, not creating new ones.

#### LD 1402: Right to Work - SUPPORT

This bill would bring Maine law into compliance with Supreme Court precedent set in the 2018 ruling on Janus v. AFSCME by removing the requirement for public-sector workers who choose not to be part of a labor union to pay a portion of dues used for "representational activities," also known as agency fees, to that union. All workers should be guaranteed free association and not be forced to support a union's political activity as a provision of their employment, especially those who are paid by state tax dollars. (MPI advocated a "no" vote on the OUGHT NOT TO PASS floor motion.)

#### LD 1514: One-Time Asset Tax - OPPOSE

Mainers are already taxed on their personal incomes, business incomes, dividends from investments, nearly-every purchase, and net worth upon death. Somehow, that is not enough. Initial language proposed to tax the total value of all individual assets over \$5 million, including bank accounts, financial instruments, and precious metals at the end of the 2021 tax year. This short-sighted policy would surely drive high net worth residents out of Maine, since they are better able to afford moving to escape onerous taxation. Maine lawmakers should be reducing, not increasing, both taxes and spending.

#### LD 1708: Power Company Takeover - OPPOSE

This bill would create the Pine Tree Power Company, a privately operated, nonprofit, consumer-owned utility controlled by an elected board, and endowed with eminent domain power to seize the assets of the currently-operating power transmission and distribution (T&D) companies. Mainers need a more competitive market for energy, not less. An immense transfer of T&D assets to a quasi-public corporation, whose leadership is under no obligation to understand or embody the economics or science of reliable energy transmission, presents a crisis of accountability. There is no guarantee LD 1708 would solve current consumer dissatisfaction with how electricity is distributed across Maine and New England, but could very well make it worse.

# LD 2003: Affordable Housing & Single-Family Zoning Density - OPPOSE

The bill would require municipalities to accommodate doubled housing density in single-family residential zones, and quadrupled in areas served by public water and sewer, as long as projects conform with existing local ordinances. Though it was framed as a free-market approach by proponents, LD 2003 would centralize local land use, zoning and community growth management, giving central planners at the Department of Economic and Community Development and the Maine State Housing Authority unprecedented power to establish state and regional housing production goals that municipalities would be required to enforce.


