1. Transferred Request (Appeal):

3. Failure of Requester to Reasonably Describe Record:

This category is specifically based on Section 552(a)(3)(A) of the FOIA.

4. Other Failures by Requesters to Comply with Published Rules and/or Directives:

This category is based on Section 552(a)(3)(B) of the FOIA and includes instances of failure to follow published rules concerning time, place, fees and procedures.

5. Request (Appeal) Withdrawn by Requester:

This category covers situations when the requester asks an agency to disregard the request (or appeal) or pursues the request outside FOIA channels.

Computer Service Charges

Computer service charges will be based on actual computer configuration used and be based on direct costs only of the Central Processing Unit, plus Input/Output Devices, plus Memory Capacity. Transportation costs of records and personnel arising from searches for requesting reports will be charged at actual cost.

Audiovisual Documentary Material

Service charges for audiovisual documentary materials will include clerical and professional search fees as listed above as well as the direct costs of reproducing the photography or tape and shipping or mailing charges. Audiovisual materials provided a requester under provisions of this Directive need not be in reproducible format or quality.

Waiver of Fees

- 1. In general, charges shall be waived or reduced when it is determined that release of a requested record primarily benefits the general public and, therefore, is in the public interest. Examples of common situations in which such a determination may be made include:
- a. The recipient of the benefits is engaged in a nonprofit activity designed for public safety, health or welfare;
- b. Payment of the full costs or fee by a state, local government or nonprofit group would not be in the interest of the program;

- c. The incremental cost of collecting the fees would be an unduly large part of the receipts from the activity;
- d. The request emanates from a representative of the public information media seeking a reasonable number of records.
- 2. A refusal to waive charges by the official responsible for the initial decision on the request for the record may be appealed to the head of the component or his designee for purposes of final appeal.

Collections

- 1. Normally, collection of charges and fees will be made in advance of rendering the service. In some instances, it may be more practical to collect charges and fees at the time of conveying the service or property to the recipient, but only in those instances where the request specifically states that whatever cost involved will be acceptable or acceptable up to specified limit that covers anticipated costs.
- 2. Collection of scheduled fees and charges will normally be deposited to Miscellaneous Receipts of the Treasury.
- 3. Search fees are assessable even when no records responsive to the request, or no records not exempt from disclosure are found, provided the requester is advised of the requirement at the time the estimated charges are presented to the requester for approval and he agrees to incur the costs of search.

Other Information (Opinions) or Recommendations on Administering FOIA

A major problem which often arises in the day-to-day administration of the Department of Defense FOIA Program concerns the proper handling of requests for records created by other than U.S. Federal Executive Branch Agencies. Examples of these requests include:

- a. Private corporations seeking information produced by actual or prospective competitors.
- b. Requests for records or information provided by foreign governments.
- c. Requests for records including technical data which may otherwise be subject to the provisions of the Export Control Act, depending on the nationality of the requester.

Another major problem concerns the lack of an adequate DoD education program for continuing orientation and training of all DoD personnel concerning FOIA/Privacy Act requirements and objectives. Although this area of concern is more fully addressed elsewhere under Item 11 (FOIA Instructional and Educational Efforts), the primary concern stems from the Congressional prohibition of DoD development of a Department-wide FOIA training program.

Item 11

FOIA Instructional and Educational Efforts

DoD

In 1977, Congress, through its Appropriations Committees, deleted all funds for, and prohibited completion of, a DoD unique program of Freedom of Information Act and Privacy Act education and instruction. While this major, single Defense-wide training program was being developed by the Interservice Training Review Organization, DoD placed a moratorium on all other FOIA/Privacy Act training development within the Department to achieve maximum cost effectiveness. The Appropriations Committees' decision not only terminated abruptly this DoD educational development program, but also left the Department without a Defense-wide education/training program of any major consequence. Long-term compliance with the spirit of the Freedom of Information Act depends on preserving a positive attitude regarding the public's legitimate access to DoD's records. The cornerstone of the process which instills this positive attitude is a pervasive and effective training program. The Congressional prohibition of this Defense-wide training/education effort is a major setback to the Department's Freedom of Information Program, and remains the major DoD concern in the management of its Departmental programs implementing the FOIA.

OSD/JCS

During the first half of CY 1977, instruction to employees in the implementation of the FOIA Program within the Office of the Secretary of Defense and Organization of the Joint Chiefs of Staff continued to be augmented through conferences for program officials; notifications concerning Civil Service Commission FOIA courses; and a standard procedure to brief newly appointed program officials and other employees upon request. FOIA Program personnel continued to attend private sector FOIA conferences, symposia and seminars.

DEPT NAVY

The Department of the Navy (OP-09B1P) is in the process of establishing a board consisting of representatives from the various Naval Headquarters activities within the Washington area. The board will be known as "The FOIA/PA Policy Board," and will meet once a month to discuss: (1) problem areas encountered by the various activities, (2) more ideas on the administration of the Acts, (3) a training program within this Department,

and (4) comments on litigation concerning both Acts. Other efforts planned, developed, and utilized by headquarters and major field command organizations include:

- a. Many Freedom of Information office personnel have attended schools and seminars sponsored by the U.S. Civil Service Commission.
- b. All published documents for the Naval Facilities and Engineering Command are specifically cleared for impact on the Freedom of Information and Privacy regulations prior to issuance.
- DEPT AF

 Air Force has developed a 24-minute film designed to create an interest in and an understanding of the Freedom of Information Act. The film has received a wide viewing throughout the Air Force and will continue to be viewed. Personnel have attended FOIA Workshops sponsored by the U.S. Civil Service Commission.
- DCA provides a 45-minute briefing to all newly assigned personnel on the FOI and the Privacy Act.
- A DCAA Executive Conference, held semiannually, provides training on FOIA to the Agency's executive staff. Each of the six regions hold periodic regional conferences, which provide FOIA training to Field Audit Office managers. In addition, the Regional FOIA Monitors hold on-site visits to train members of the Field Audit Office staff.
- DIA Continued increase in participation by Command Elements in stressing importance of FOIA. Compliance with the Act is an item on the agenda of The Inspector General.
- All incoming agents undergoing training have received formal instruction on the Act. Headquarters Staff personnel have received detailed on-the-job training and have attended Civil Service Commission courses in this area. Due to the mission and centralized organization of the DIS, extensive formal training has not been necessary. Such training will be conducted when the Department of Defense training package is disseminated.

DLA

New employees were briefed on FOIA as part of orientation as well as continuous training on FOIA by Primary Level Field Activities.

DMA

The bulk of DMA's effort with regard to employee training was directed toward dissemination of useful information to the greatest number of employees possible. This was accomplished by publication of articles concerning the Act in all DMA Headquarters and Component newspapers, bulletins, etc. In addition, copies of other relevant publications, such as Commanders Digest, were widely distributed throughout the Agency. DMA Headquarters and Component Counsel and Public Affairs Officers also assisted in the educational process by delivering briefings and lectures to affected personnel concerning the requirements and implementation of the Act.

DNA

A mandatory annual briefing on Title 5 U.S.C. 552, as amended by Public Law 93-502, and DoD Directive 5400.7 is conducted for all assigned FOI Representatives.
