\* **HB 461 Abortion Waiting Period:** Sponsored by Representative Eliason, the bill requires that women who have chosen to terminate a pregnancy travel to a clinic for face-to-face counseling, and then return in three days for the procedure. The bill extends the waiting period from 24-hours to 72-hours – one of the longest waiting periods in the nation. The bill passed the House and Senate and is slated to take effect in May 2012.

\* **HB 363 Health Education Amendments:** Sponsored by Representative Wright, the bill restricts local school districts to a state sanctioned "abstinence only" curriculum or to abstain from teaching sexual education at all. In addition, it would have prohibited or greatly restricted the discussion of sexual intercourse, homosexuality, contraception, and sex outside of marriage. The bill passed the House and Senate, but was vetoed by Governor Herbert.
