HB 49 S3 Handy's bill would have provided a one-time appropriation of \$20,000,000 from the state education fund to replace older school buses and create infrastructure for alternative fuel vehicles. It allows grants to schools to replace busses manufactured before 2002. **Failed in the senate.**

HB 110 S2 Modifies provisions related to motor vehicle emissions. Gives the Division of Motor Vehicles the authority to suspend a vehicle's registration if it does not meet air emission standards. **Passed both houses.**

HB 226 Was amended extensively. The original language that repealed the "no more stringent" provision

	was replaced with a provision that allows language different from the federal standard. The "no more stringent: standard currently hamstrings Utah's Division of Air Quality from imposing stronger or localized solutions to air quality problems. Passed both houses.
HB 396 S2	Prevents Utah's Division of Air Quality from enforcing restrictions needed to control particulate pollution from wood stoves. Oddly for the Utah Legislature, federal EPA standards would override anything Utah officials think might be necessary for public health. Passed both houses.
HB 398 S1	It would set the stage for unnecessary confrontation between state and federal officials while interfering with forest employees from protecting wildlife and water quality on public lands belonging to all Americans. Failed.
HB 407 S2	Would deny local governments the ability to protect scenic byways and the economies dependent on them from the blight of billboards. Failed.
SB 231 S3	Would have arbitrarily raised the registration fee for hybrid & electric vehicles disproportionately versus other vehicles. Harper sweetened the substitute with a one-time appropriation to the Clean Fuels & Vehicle Technology Fund, but it was still too sour. Failed.
SB 281 S1	Establishes a fund that could be used for building two legendary boondoggles--the Lake Powell Pipeline & a pipeline from the Bear River. It also provides a one-time appropriation of \$5 million from the general fund. Passed by means of conference committees.
