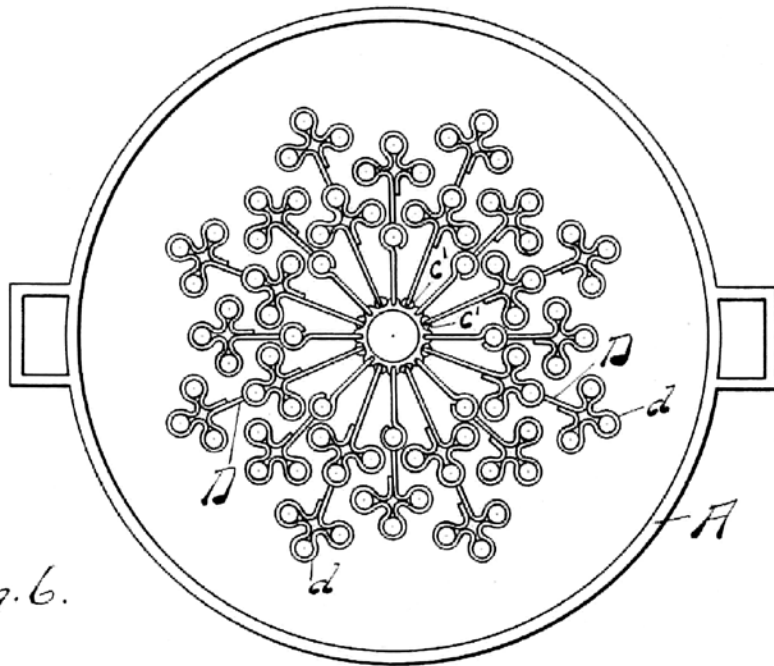

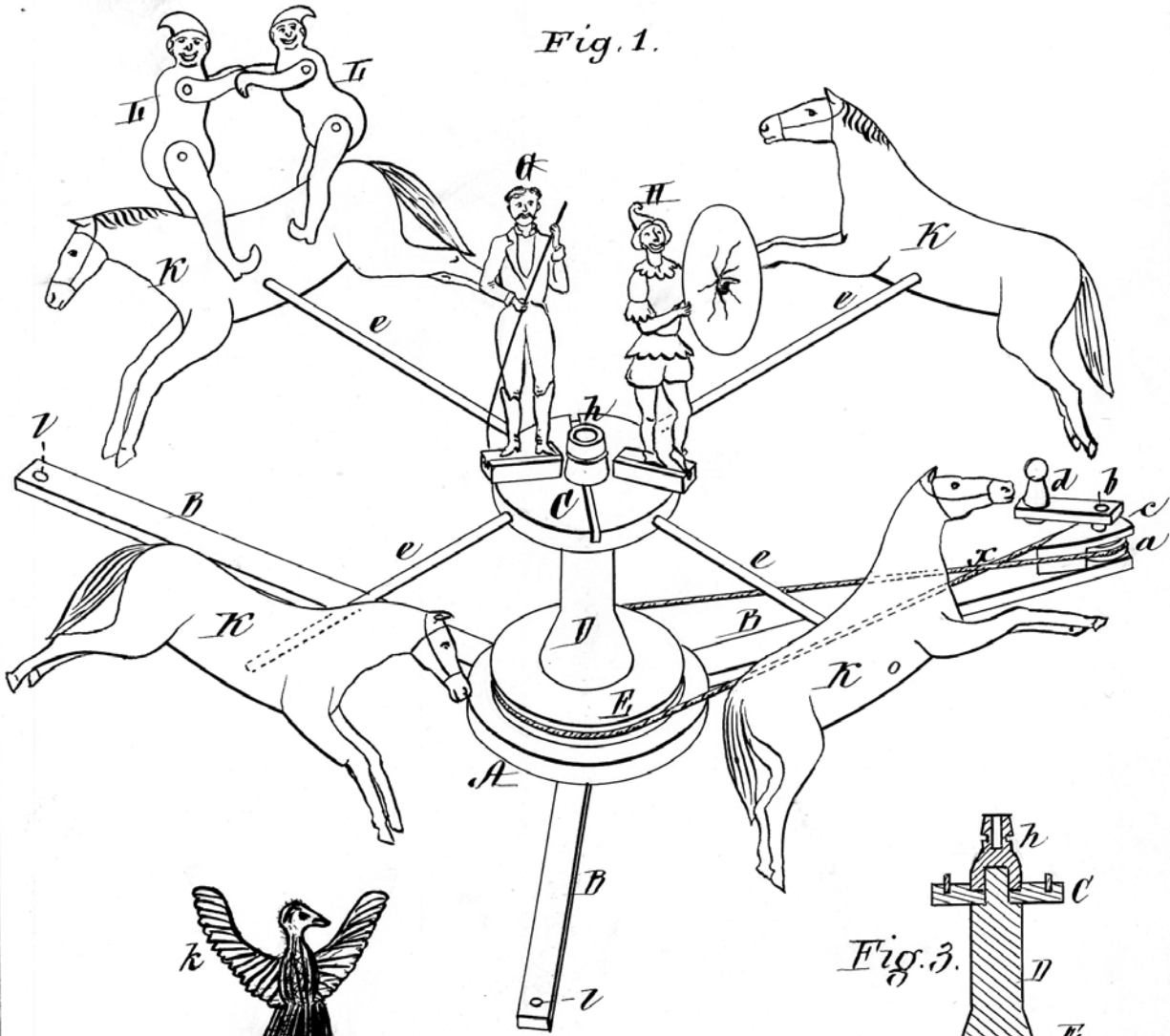

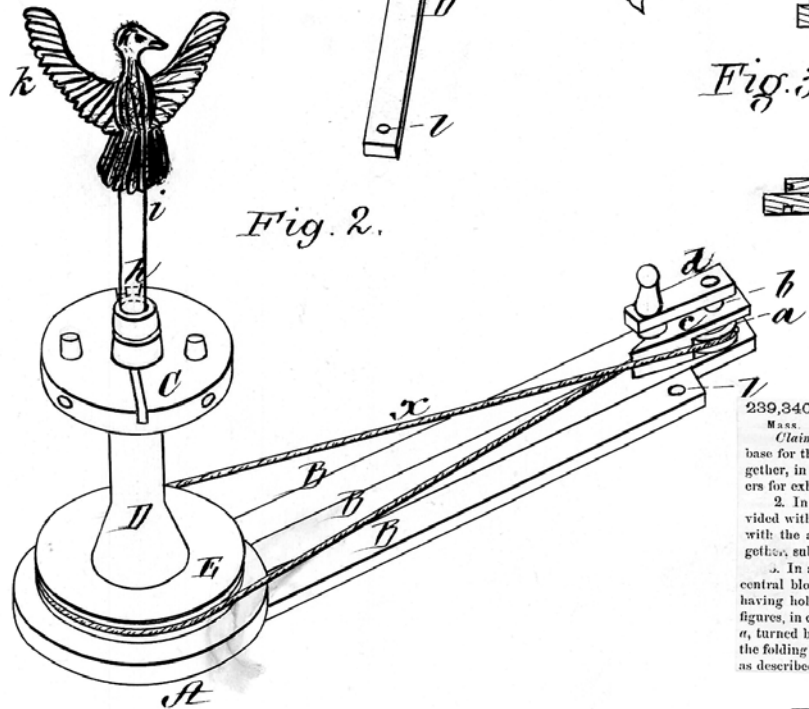

239,340. TOY CIRCUS. WILLIAM S. REED, Leominster, Mass. Filed Mar. 1, 1881. (No model.)
 Claim.—1. In a toy circus, two or more arms, B, forming a base for the block A, said arms being adapted to fold or close together, in combination with a central post, D, and suitable holders for exhibiting the figures, substantially as described.
 2. In a toy circus, a revolving post, D, and platform C, provided with means for holding the figures in place, in combination with the arms B, forming a base and adapted to fold or close together, substantially as described.
 3. In a toy circus, the wheel E, pivoted within the stationary central block, A, and provided with a post, D, and platform C, having holes or sockets for the reception of rods supporting the figures, in combination, and connected by a belt, x, with the pulley a, turned by a crank, d, at the outer end of one of the arms B of the folding base, constructed and arranged to operate substantially as described.

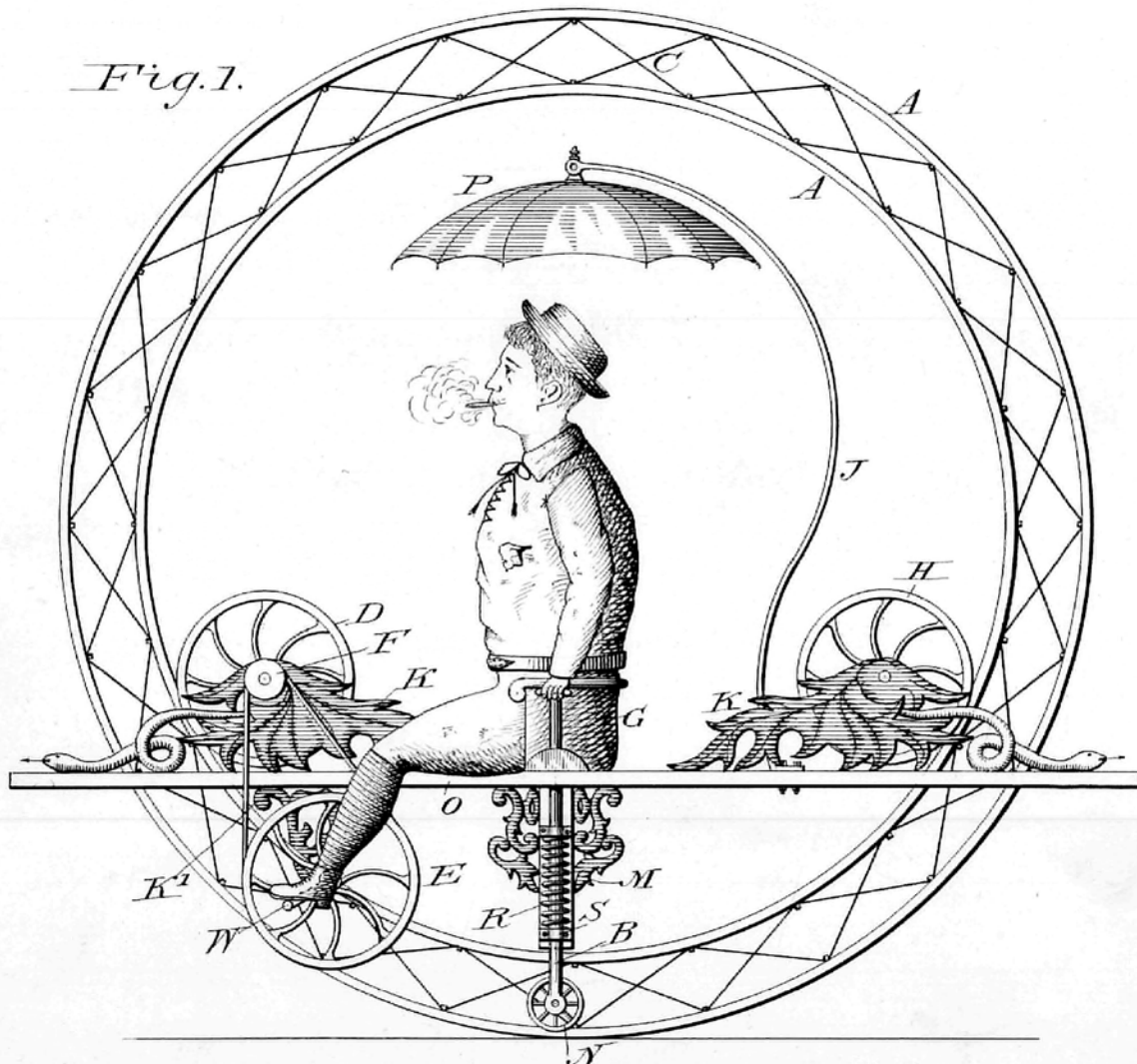

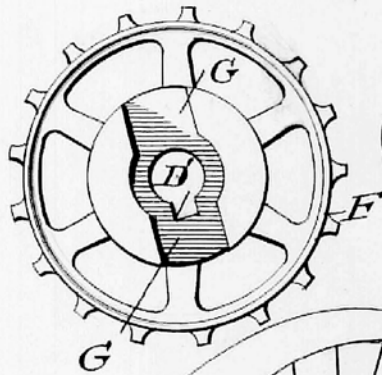

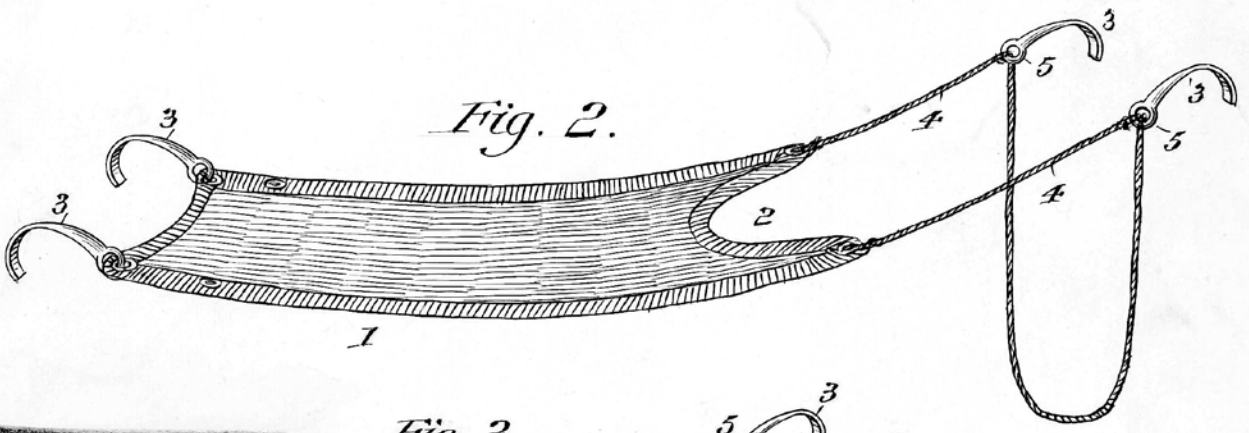
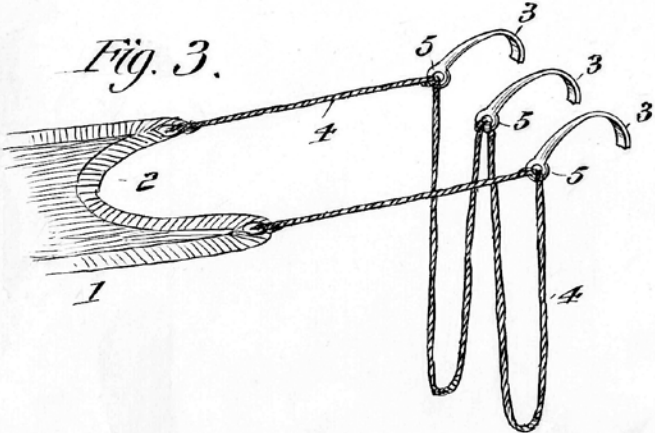

 Filed June 19, 1888. Serial No. 277,573. (No model.)
Claim.—1. A hammock consisting in a seat and back portions, supporting-hooks at the upper end of the back portion, a looped rope secured at its ends to the forward corners of the seat portion, and adjustable hooks on the parallel parts of the rope, the looped part of the rope forming a foot-rest, substantially as set forth.
 2. A hammock constructed with supporting-hooks at one end and having at its other end a curved recess, and supporting-hooks with a rope passing through eyes in the shanks of the hooks and attached at its ends to the corners of the recessed end of the hammock, substantially as shown and described.
 3. A hammock constructed with main portion 1, having curved recess 2, supporting-hooks 3 at one end and the looped rope 4 with its ends secured at the recessed end of the main portion 1, and supporting-hooks 3, having eyes 5, through which rope 4 passes, substantially as shown and described.

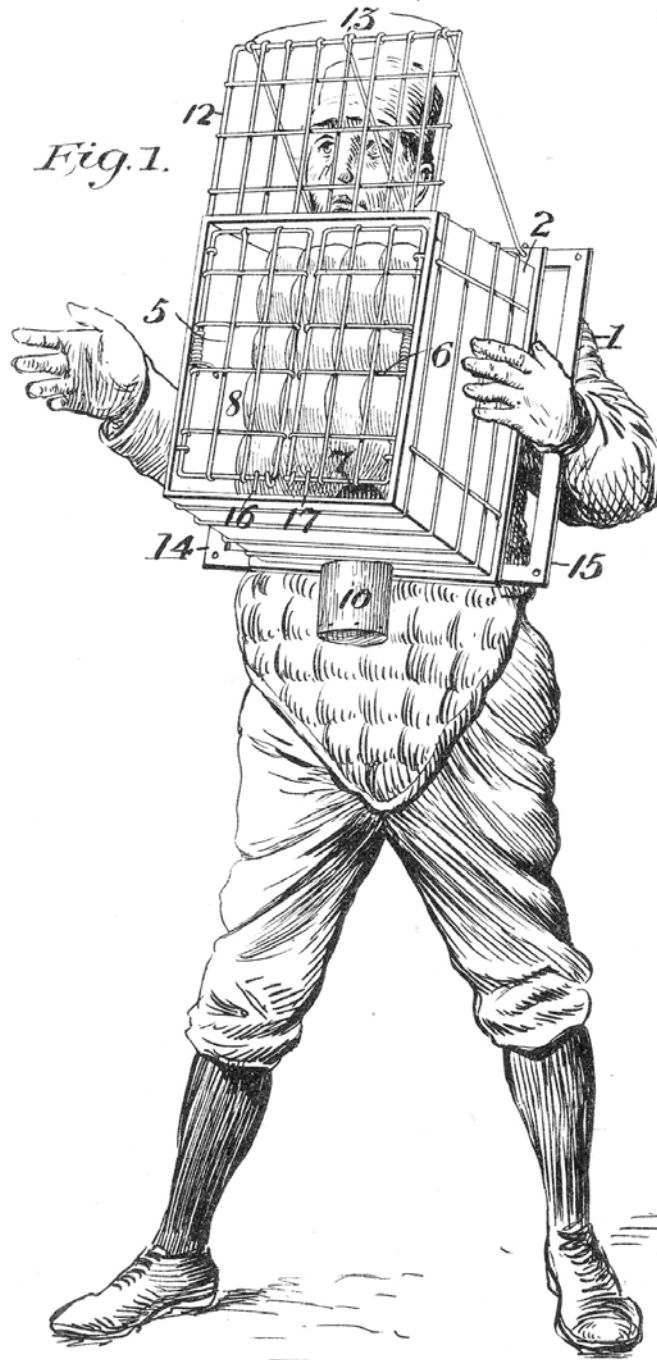

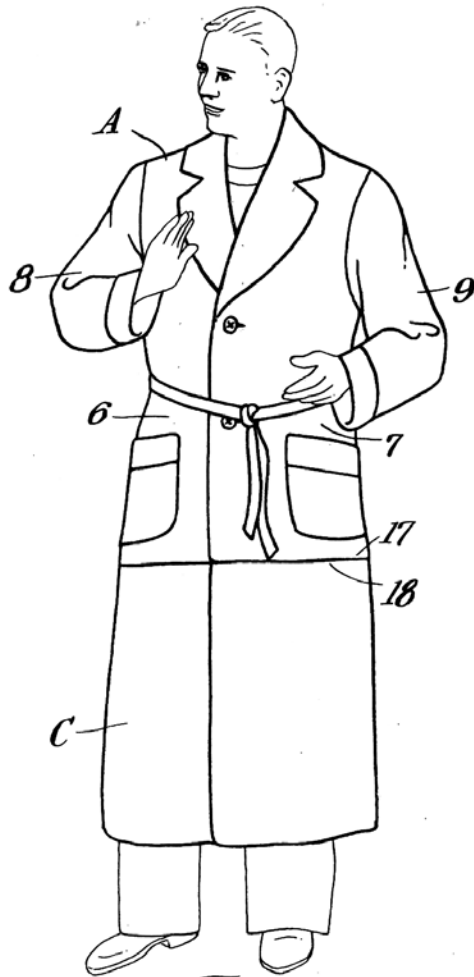

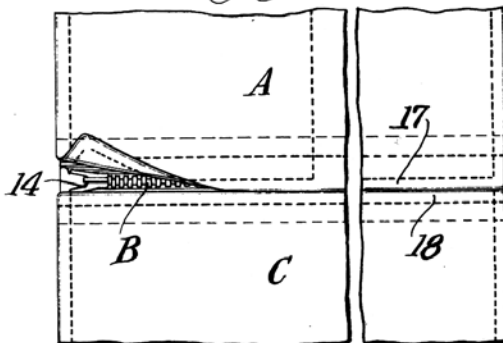
