

The Path was constructed on the track bed of the former Midland Railway which closed for passenger traffic at the end of the 1960's. Between 1979 and 1986 the railway line was converted into the Railway Path.

The first stretch to be converted was between Bath and Bitton where the campaign group, Cyclebag obtained planning permission to create a 2m wide dust track. The route then developed westwards with Bristol being the last section to be tarmaced from the outset. The path today is a three metre wide tarmaced surface from end to end.

Some of the former stations along the Path are still popular stopping points - see section 'Attractions along the Path' for further details. The Path is owned mostly by Bristol City Council, South Gloucestershire Council, Bath and North East Somerset Council. However small sections are owned by Sustrans.

## THE AVON FROME PARTNERSHIP

### Railway Links

Temple Meads Railway Station is connected to the Railway Path via a bridge at Temple Quay which links to Avon Street.

Lawrence Hill Station is close to the path near the Bristol end.

Oldfield Park Station is near to West Bath Riverside Path that links the Railway Path with Bath City Centre. Bath Spa Station is not far from the end of the Riverside Path.

Keynsham Railway Station links to the Railway Path via a cycle path alongside the A4175 and a short section of main road (A431) to Bitton Station.

## NATIONAL CYCLE NETWORK

- Only use the official access points onto the path to avoid erosion and damage to nature
- Keep dogs under control
- Dog fouling endangers childrens health. Always clean up after your dog
- Cyclists - please travel at a speed that is safe and considerate to other path users
- Cyclists - Use your bell to warn other users that you are approaching
- Everyone should use lights and light coloured clothing to be visible at night
- Look out for and be considerate to others
- Motorbikes are not allowed

## NATIONAL CYCLE NETWORK

The National Cycle Network is a Millennium Commission project supported by £43.5m of National Lottery funds. It involves over 400 local authorities, as well as businesses, landowners, environmental bodies and others.

The first 5000 miles of the Network was launched in June 2000 and a further 5000 miles was completed in 2005.

About a third of the Network will be entirely traffic - free, using old railway lines, canal towpaths, forestry tracks, riversides and urban spaces.

## LOOK OUT FOR OTHER USERS

One national route of the NCN uses the Railway Path. Route 4, connecting South Wales and Reading and the South-east, uses the whole length of the Railway Path and Regional Route 10 (Avon Cycleway) takes in part of the Path to Salford.

Sustrans runs a national voluntary ranger scheme. Path Rangers monitor the coherence and quality of the signing, and do what they can to ensure that the Network is pleasant and safe for its users, such as reporting potential dangers and obstructions. ## ACCESS FOR DISABLED PEOPLE

There are a variety of different access points on the Railway Path. All level access controls will allow the majority of wheelchairs and pushchairs through. However, some at present can be difficult to negotiate with an electric scooter.

There are four main categories of access:

- No access controls and with level or ramped access
- Motorcycle barriers with level or ramped access
- Steps

The details below are for the major access points onto the Railway Path. It is by no means a definitive list. For more details contact any of the numbers on the right.

### Bristol end of the Path - St Phillips

No barriers, level access, dropped kerb. There are no barriers on most accesses within Bristol.

### Morrison's, Fishponds

Three access points, all with motorcycle barriers and dropped kerbs. There is access onto the Railway Path from Hockeys Lane.

### Warmley (Old Station)

Motorcycle barriers on both the north and south entrances to the Path.  
Disabled parking and toilet are available.

## ACCESS FOR DISABLED PEOPLE

### Bitton Station

Level access with controls on the path towards Warmley and Bath allows ease of use for the disabled. Disabled parking.

### Salford

Level, unrestricted access from Avon Lane with drop off point.

### End of Path - Brassmill Lane, Bath

Open access on slope. Dropped kerb. Advice on disabled persons access onto the Railway Path from:

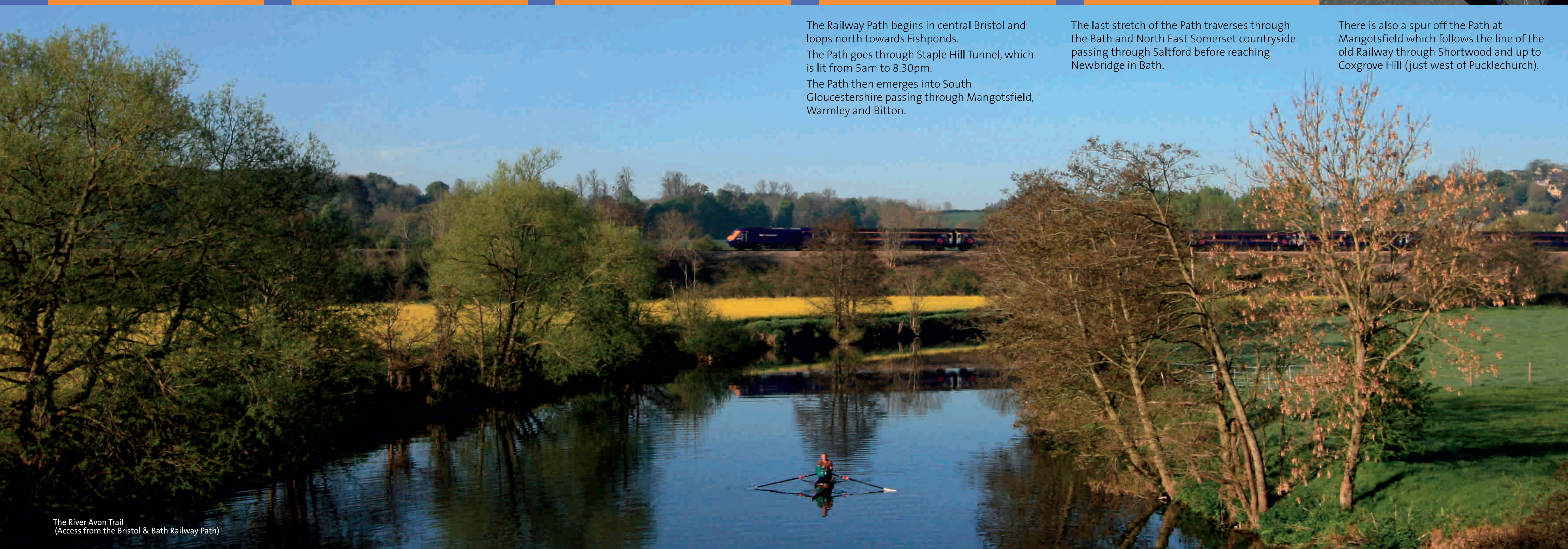
The Railway Path begins in central Bristol and loops north towards Fishponds.

The Path goes through Staple Hill Tunnel, which is lit from 5am to 8.30pm.

The Path then emerges into South Gloucestershire passing through Mangotsfield, Warmley and Bitton.

The last stretch of the Path traverses through the Bath and North East Somerset countryside passing through Salford before reaching Newbridge in Bath.

There is also a spur off the Path at Mangotsfield which follows the line of the old Railway through Shortwood and up to Coxgrove Hill (just west of Pucklechurch).

Escape the traffic and explore this wonderful 13-mile off-road route that links the cities of Bristol and Bath. The Bristol & Bath Railway Path is a fully tarmaced, easily accessible route for walkers, cyclists and disabled people. 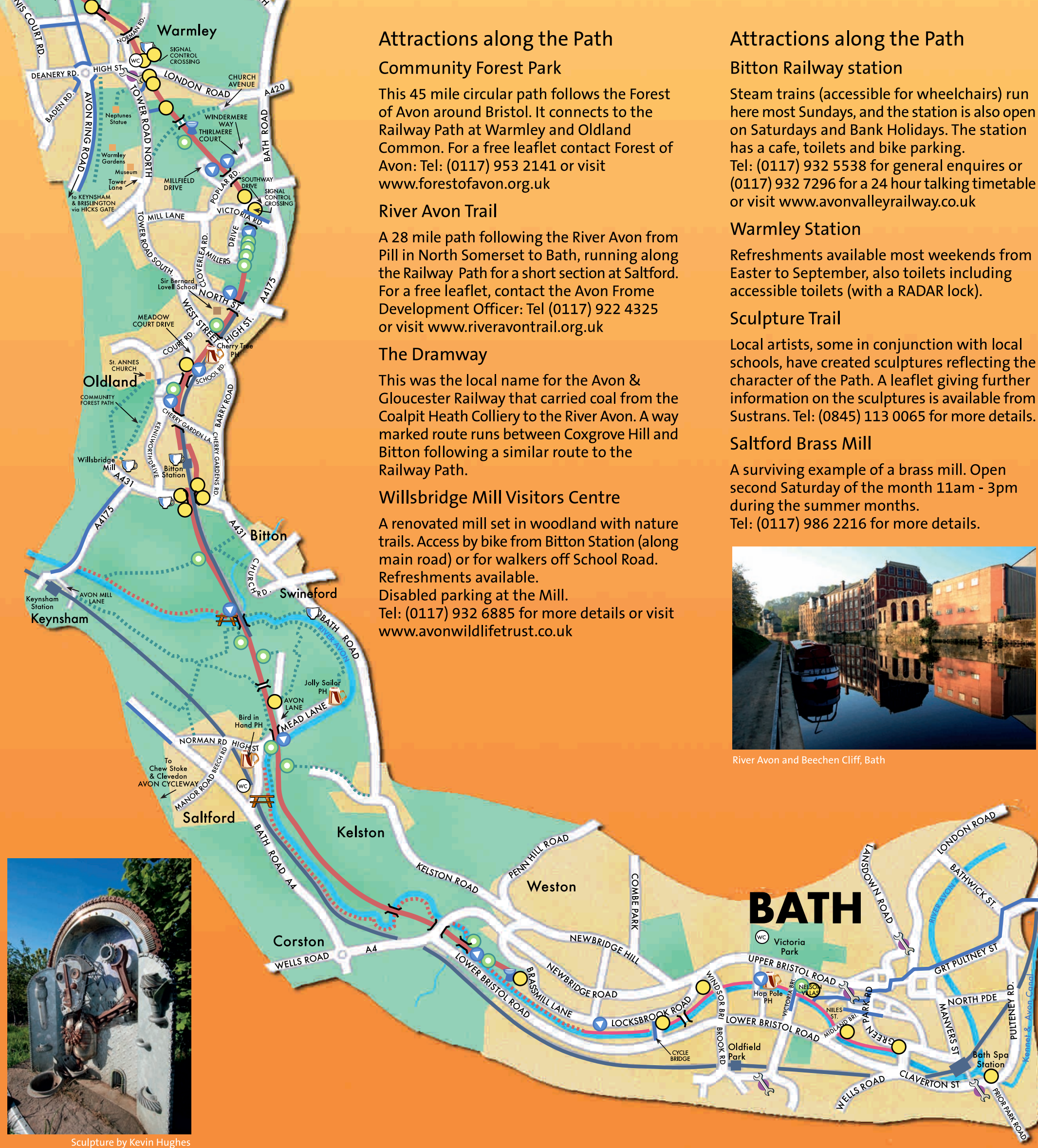

### Attractions along the Path

**Community Forest Park**

**River Avon Trail**

**The Dramway**  
This was the local name for the Avon & Gloucester Railway that carried coal from the Coalpit Heath Colliery to the River Avon. A way marked route runs between Coxgrove Hill and Bitton following a similar route to the Railway Path.

**Willsbridge Mill Visitors Centre**  
A renovated mill set in woodland with nature trails. Access by bike from Bitton Station (along main road) or for walkers off School Road. Refreshments available. Disabled parking at the Mill. **Bitton Railway station**  
Steam trains (accessible for wheelchairs) run here most Sundays, and the station is also open on Saturdays and Bank Holidays. The station has a cafe, toilets and bike parking. **Warmley Station**

  - Saltford to Bath (Brassmill Lane) 3 miles (5 kms)
  - Brassmill Lane to Bath city centre 2 miles (3 kms)
