

Clause 12 (Discrimination) Analysis 1 July to 30 September 2023

IPSO will publish information on a quarterly basis where we have received more than ten complaints under Clause 12 of the Editors' Code of Practice about the same issue. The information below gives a brief summary of the types of complaints received and the outcome. It is not intended to be exhaustive and the statistics about the numbers of complaints received are accurate up to the end of the relevant quarter. These statistics do not include any cases still under investigation; cases relating to any non-regulated publications; or cases where IPSO received fewer than 10 complaints.

			were being held in the forest. Complainants believed the
			article used pejorative language towards naturists and
			equated naturism with "swingers" and orgies. They also
			said that the claims were inaccurate and that the article
			had been written to cause disgust against naturists. No
			complaint of discrimination against an individual.

		presenters	had been investigated for sending explicit photographs of
			themself to an individual. Complainants believed the
			articles were written with a homophobic agenda and
			discriminated on the grounds of sexuality. The presenter
			was not named in the articles but complainants believed
			that speculation had caused other BBC presenters to be
			falsely named on social media and face discrimination.
			Complaints were made by third parties.
