

# Meet Oliver Meet Oliver A top athlete & teacher too!

He studied BETC Business studies, BETC Science, Design Technology, Statistics and Maths in 6th Form and went onto University studying Agriculture. A member of the GB Team, he has participated in the European Triathlon (U25) in the Netherlands 'Weerts'. Since leaving Mary Hare, Oliver has been up to quite a lot!







To be honest, I had no idea what I wanted to do in the future after Mary Hare. But, I did know that I wanted to do something that involved the 'outdoors'. I also struggled to choose whether I wanted to go to university, into an apprenticeship, a job or a gap year.

I somehow came up with an idea that I would travel the world a little and see if I could find anything interesting. That way, I thought I could see if any university did a course in whatever had interested me. That's how I found the enjoyment of Agriculture and The Royal Agricultural University.

What was it like as a deaf student studying at The Royal Agricultural University (RAU)? It was a shock for both me and the

University. I was the first deaf student that the RAU had had. Most of the rooms were not deaf friendly and some of my lectures were outside and mother nature wasn't nice all the time. I always had problems

with the wind. Over time I slowly found the confidence to sit in the front, recording lectures and asking the lecturer to wear a microphone which connected to my cochlear. By the end of my university life, I was not afraid or shy of the equipment that I had, and I was always learning something. I could easily type on my laptop without needing to lip-read the lecturer.

# Tell us a bit about your gap year and what did you gain from it?

It made me feel like everyone should experience a gap year once in their life as you learn so many new skills. It teaches valuable lessons and opens future opportunities and experiences. There are so many different routes you can take during your gap year; volunteering, backpacking, a seasonal job, and they all branch into their own paths. I found my love of agriculture from my gap year and having the chance to experience agriculture in different cultures too.

I went to Australia and South Africa. I wanted to do another gap year after university but sadly COVID got in the way.





# You are a successful athlete. Can you tell us a bit more about your achievements?

I am very fortunate to be a successful athlete too! I have heavily invested into my running and triathlon and I've achieved some achievements along my sporting journey. I have travelled around England and Europe to do some races with friends and I can proudly say that I had the chance to represent GB in both deaf and all body competition.
