Russia Sanctions – Disinformation and cyber actors

Pito matua – Key points

- President Putin utilises sophisticated disinformation machinery to promote false narratives to justify Russia's illegal invasion of Ukraine. Russian media is by and large an extension of Putin's propaganda arm, while its state and state-backed operatives disseminate vast amounts of false information online.
- Russia's disinformation efforts reach beyond a domestic audience. False narratives, including "de-nazifying" Ukraine and purported threats to Russia's own security, are promoted globally, in an attempt to sow doubt, divide the international community, and undermine Ukrainian resolve.
- Russia has also engaged in a campaign of malicious cyber activity designed to undermine Ukraine's democracy and territorial integrity, including by attacking Ukrainian government websites and disrupting key infrastructure.
- This proposed tranche of sanctions builds on our earlier designations of key propagandists, and will expand our sanctions list to include those responsible for malicious cyber activity. It represents Aotearoa New Zealand's clear rejection of Putin's narrative and disinformation efforts, and our condemnation of all Russian actions aimed at undermining Ukraine's sovereignty. Advice will be provided to the Minister of Foreign Affairs proposing the specific actors to be considered for designation.
- Advice will also be provided to the Minister of Foreign Affairs proposing amendments to the substantive text of the Regulations. The amendments will:
 - allow for the automatic application of sanctions to relatives of designated individuals, thereby ensuring an avenue often used for circumvention of sanctions is addressed; and
 - refine the 'prohibition on dealing with services' to ensure it is fit for purpose and address matters raised by the Regulatory Review Committee.
- Approval is sought to authorise the drafting of regulations to amend the Russia Sanctions Regulations in order to implement both the proposed designations and refinements to the Regulations.
- We propose the following timeline for action:

28 April: Receive approval to begin work drafting regulations;

5 May: Advice on proposed designations and draft regulations goes to the

Minister of Foreign Affairs (copied for information to

Ministers with the Power to Act);

9 May: Executive Council:

9 May: Gazetting and public notification;10 May: Entry into force of regulations.
