

## 2022 Legislative Scorecard

Planned Parenthood Affiliates of California (PPAC) represents the seven separately incorporated Planned Parenthood affiliates in California, operating more than 100 health centers and serving over 750,000 patients a year. PPAC advocates on legislative, fiscal, and regulatory issues that impact sexual and reproductive health care, health equity, sexual health education, and access to affordable and quality health care, including abortion.

The PPAC Scorecard is intended to provide the public with information about how their state legislators voted on these important issues and represents the top priorities for a given year based on legislative votes and actions. The PPAC Scorecard considers a member's vote or action during a critical opportunity to vote and/or their role in procedurally holding or delaying a priority bill. The scores listed are based on California legislators' actions on a floor vote and/or in the relevant committees for the following PPAC sponsored legislation and top budget priorities: AB 32, AB 1666, AB 2091, AB 2134, AB 2205, SB 107, SB 245, SB 1142, SB 1245, SCA 10, SB 154, AB 178, SB 184, AB 179, and AB 204. In addition to our top priorities, PPAC supported more than 80 bills and budget items impacting Planned Parenthood patients, operations, and our mission. This includes bills related to maternal health, racism as a public health crisis, access to menstrual products, health care coverage and payments, infrastructure to support telehealth, foster youth wellbeing, LGBTQ+ rights, behavioral health, intimate partner violence, access to comprehensive education, and health equity.

### Description of Scored Legislation

**AB 32 (Aguiar-Curry) Telehealth-** Requires the State Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) to extend the telehealth flexibilities in place during the COVID-19 Pandemic, like payment parity for telehealth services in Medi-Cal managed care and remote enrollment and the ability to establish patients remotely.

**AB 1666 (Bauer-Kahan) Civil Liability -** Protects patients and providers from civil liability judgments for providing reproductive health care to patients when the claims are based on laws in other states that are hostile to abortion rights and are contrary to the public policy of California.

**AB 2091 (Bonta): Medical Privacy-** Enhances privacy protections for medical records related to abortion care under California's Reproductive Privacy Act against disclosures to law enforcement and out-of-state third parties seeking to enforce hostile abortion bans in other states.

**AB 2134 (Weber): California Abortion and Reproductive Equity Act (CARE Act)-** Establishes the California Reproductive Health Equity Program which will provide grants to providers who provided uncompensated abortion and contraceptive care to patients with low-incomes.

**AB 2205 (Carrillo): Abortion Premium Transparency-** Requires qualified health plans under Covered California to report annually to the Department of Insurance and Department of Managed Health Care the total amounts of funds collected in the segregated abortion accounts to create greater transparency.

**AB 2223 (Wicks): Decriminalization of Abortion & Pregnancy Loss-** Protects people from prosecutions and criminalization of abortion or pregnancy loss.

**SB 107 (Wiener) Transgender Youth and Family Refuge-** Protects patients and providers in CA from civil liability judgments for providing gender affirming health care to patients when the claims are based on hostile laws in other states that are hostile to gender affirming care and are contrary to the public policy of California and protects medical privacy for patients seeking gender affirming care services in California.

**SB 245 (Gonzalez) Abortion Accessibility Act -** Removes cost-sharing for abortion services for patients on commercial insurance.

**SB 1142 (Caballero and Skinner): Access + Support for Abortion Patients-** Creates a website with comprehensive and accurate information regarding accessing abortion services in California.

**SB 1245 (Kamlager): Los Angeles County Reproductive Pilot Program -**Establishes a reproductive health pilot project in LA County to support innovative approaches and patient centered collaborations for abortion.

**June Budget Package (SB 154 Budget Act; AB 178 Budget Bill Jr., and SB 184 Health Trailer Bill)-** The June budget package included \$20M to support infrastructure of reproductive health care services, \$20M for grants to reproductive health care facilities for securing physical and digital infrastructure, including IT and cyber security, \$40M for grants to reproductive health care providers to offset the cost of providing care to low-and moderate-income individuals who do not have health care coverage for abortion care (and contraception) services.

**SB 179 (Ting) Budget Act of 2022-** Allocates funding to the 2022-23 Budget Act. Among nearly 115 key provisions, it amends the \$20M Los Angeles County Abortion Access Safe Haven Pilot Program to specify the role of the program administrator. Amends the Abortion Practical Support Fund to remove the in-state travel restriction in the June budget language. Provides for \$11.8M for HIV, viral hepatitis, sexually transmitted infection, and harm reduction interventions, including \$2.7M for the syringe exchange supply clearinghouse and \$9.1M for STI prevention and control. Provides \$9M for CDPH to provide grants local health jurisdictions for STI prevention and control, to address high rates of early syphilis or congenital syphilis (Fresno, Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, and San Joaquin).

**AB 204 (Committee on Budget) Budget Act 2022: Health Omnibus -** Health Omnibus budget bill to authorize DHCS to provide funding to eligible clinics to provide retention payments of up to \$1,000 to eligible workers at FQHCs, RHCs, and intermittent clinics.
