PrimeGrid's Woodall Prime Search

On 13 Aug 2007, 1:42:08 UTC, PrimeGrid's Woodall Prime Search found the 32nd and largest known to date Woodall prime:

2367906*22367906-1

Woodall numbers are of the form: $W_n = n 2^n - 1$. Woodall numbers that are prime are called Woodall primes. For more information, please see "Woodall prime" in The Prime Glossary (<u>http://primes.utm.edu/glossary</u>).

The prime is 712818 digits long and will enter Chris Caldwell's "The Largest Known Primes Database" (<u>http://primes.utm.edu/primes</u>) ranked 1st for Woodall primes and 25th overall.

The discovery was made by Stephen Kohlman of Canada using an Intel C2D 6300 @ 1.86 GHz with 1 GB RAM. This computer took a little over 5 hours and 41 minutes to test. Stephen is a member of team Canada.

The prime was verified on 20 Aug 2007, 2:40:57 UTC, by Jeff Morales of the United States using an Intel Pentium 4 @ 2.8 GHz with 512 MB RAM. This computer took a little over 10 hours 27 minutes to test. Jeff is a member of team SETI.USA.

The prime will be listed as $1183953*2^{2367907}-1$. This is $1183953*2*2^{2367906}-1$ which is $2367906*2^{2367906}-1$. Entry in "The Largest Know Primes Database" can be found here: <u>http://primes.utm.edu/primes/page.php?id=82110</u>

This is PrimeGrid's second Woodall prime. Since the search began, just under 85,000 tests have been completed by 2555 users using over 5100 computers.

Using a single PC would have taken years to find this prime. So this timely discovery would not have been possible without the hundreds of volunteers who contributed their spare CPU cycles. A special thanks to everyone who contributed their advice and/or computing power to the search - especially Brian Rodenkirk, Lennart Vogel, Joseph M. Osiecki, Geoffrey Reynolds, and Paul Underwood.
