THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Private Soldier, whose claims have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, for their conspicuous bravery during the recent operations in the Soudan, as recorded against their names :—

Regiment.	Name.	Acts of Courage for which recommended.
21st Lancers ...	Captain Paul Aloysius Kenna	At the Battle of Khartum on the 2nd September, 1898, Captain P. A. Kenna assisted Major Crole Wyndham, of the same Regiment, by taking him on his horse, behind the saddle (Major Wyndham's horse having been killed in the charge), thus enabling him to reach a place of safety; and, after the charge of the 21st Lancers, Captain Kenna returned to assist Lieutenant de Montmorency, who was endeavouring to recover the body of Second Lieutenant R. G. Grenfell.
21st Lancers ...	Lieutenant the Honourable Raymond Harvey Lodge Joseph de Montmorency	At the Battle of Khartum on the 2nd September, 1898, Lieutenant de Montmorency, after the charge of the 21st Lancers, returned to assist Second Lieutenant R. G. Grenfell, who was lying surrounded by a large body of Dervishes. Lieutenant de Montmorency drove the Dervishes off, and, finding Lieutenant Grenfell dead, put the body on his horse which then broke away. Captain Kenna and Corporal Swarbrick then came to his assistance, and enabled him to rejoin the Regiment, which had begun to open a heavy fire on the enemy.
21st Lancers ...	Private Thomas Byrne	At the Battle of Khartum on the 2nd September, 1898, Private Byrne turned back in the middle of the charge of the 21st Lancers and went to the assistance of Lieutenant the Honourable R. F. Molyneux, Royal Horse Guards, who was wounded, dismounted, disarmed, and being attacked by several Dervishes. Private Byrne, already severely wounded, attacked these Dervishes, received a second severe wound, and, by his gallant conduct, enabled Lieutenant Molyneux to escape.
2nd Dragoon Guards	Captain Nevill Maskelyne Smyth	At the Battle of Khartum on the 2nd September, 1898, Captain Smyth galloped forward and attacked an Arab who had run amok among some Camp Followers. Captain Smyth received the Arab's charge, and killed him, being wounded with a spear in the arm in so doing. He thus saved the life of one at least of the Camp Followers.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1896, and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of Pembroke, I hereby make the following Order:—

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County of Pembroke) Order, 1898."

II. BIRDS.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

(1.) During the period from the 1st of August to the last day of February following, the taking or killing of any of the following kinds of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Pembroke:—Cornish Chough, Goldfinch, Black-headed Bunting, Reed Bunting, Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Blue Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Woodpecker, Tree Creeper, Kingfisher, Kestrel, Owl, Buzzard, Merlin, Water Ouzel or Dipper, Gulls (except Black-backed Gull).

Additions to the Schedule of 1880.

(2.) "The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880," shall apply within the County of Pembroke to the Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Merlin, Hobby, Osprey, Hen Harrier, Choughs, Nuthatch, Wryneck, Water Ouzel or Dipper.

III. EGGS.

The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the county of Pembroke, viz.:—Goldfinch, Honey Buzzard, Merlin, Hobby, Hen Harrier, Kingfisher, Nightingale, Nightjar (Goatsucker, Nighthawk or Fern Owl), Blackcap, Reed Bunting, Cirl Bunting, Chiffchaff, Dabchick, Dove (Turtle), Wheatear, Whinchat, Flycatcher, Ring Ouzel, Pipits, Red-backed Shrike, Tree Creeper, Garden Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Wood Warbler, Wagtails (all).

To incorporate a Company (hereinafter referred to as "the Company") and to authorise the Company to construct waterworks, and to supply water for all purposes within the parishes and places of Brigstock, Sudborough, Aldwinkle, St. Peter, Lowick, Slipton, Islip, Thrapston, Titchmarch, Clapton, Twywell, Woodford, Denford, Great Addington, Ringstead, Cranford St. Andrew, Cranford St. John, Burton, Latimer, Little Addington, Raunds, Stanwick, Hargrave, Finedon, Irthlingborough, Chelveston-cum-Caldecott, and the parish and borough of Higham Ferrers, all in the county of Northampton.

2. To authorise the Company to make and maintain in the said county all or some of the following works, that is to say:—

(1.) A well, shaft, or boring, and pumping station, with pumping engines or engine, boiler-houses, and other works and conveniences connected therewith to be situate in or upon and near the centre of the field, in the Parish of Little Addington, numbered 22 on the Ordnance Map, to the scale of $\frac{1}{2500}$, published in 1885, of the said Parish.

7. To authorise the Company to make, lay down, maintain, alter, repair, take up, and renew mains, pipes, culverts, and other works for the distribution and supply of water to and within the limits of supply, and to open, break up, divert, alter, or stop up, whether temporarily or permanently, all such public and private roads, highways, streets, pipes, sewers, canals, navigations, rivers, streams, bridges, railways, and tramways as it may be necessary or convenient to pass along, cross, divert, alter, or stop up for the purposes of the Company for or in connection with the supply of water or of the intended Act.

8. To authorise the Company to supply water by meter, and to manufacture, sell, and let meters and water-fittings, and any apparatus used for the supply of consumption of water, and to make, demand, and recover rates, rents, and charges for the supply of water by meter and otherwise, and for the sale, hire, and supply of water-meters and fittings, and other purposes.

9. To make provisions with respect to the waste, misuse, and undue consumption or contamination of the water to be supplied by the Company, and as to the fittings to be used for the purposes of such supply, and for the protection of the works, fittings, property, and water supply of the Company, and for defining and regulating such supply, and for preventing frauds and abuses in the use of the water, and to empower the Company from time to time to make, vary, and rescind bye-laws and regulations for or with respect to such matters, and to impose and recover penalties for the breach or non-observance of any such rules, bye-laws, or regulations or any of the provisions of the intended Act.

10. To enable the Company, on the one hand, and any county council, corporation, or other

local authority, or any company, bodies, or persons, whether within or beyond the limits of supply, on the other hand, to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements for the supply by the Company of water in bulk, or otherwise, and to vary or extinguish any such contracts or agreements, and to confer all necessary powers on that behalf upon all such authorities, companies, bodies, and persons, and to enable them to raise and apply for the purposes of such contracts or agreements all necessary capital, and to levy the necessary rates.

11. The intended Act will or may make provision for the sale of the undertaking to the local authorities within the limits of supply, and for the purchase of the same by the local authorities, by agreement or otherwise, at such period, and upon such terms and conditions, pecuniary or otherwise, as may be previously agreed upon, or prescribed by the intended Act.

12. The intended Act will vary or extinguish all existing rights and privileges which would interfere with any of the purposes thereof, and will confer upon the Company all such other rights and privileges as may be necessary for such purposes, and will incorporate, with or without alteration, all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts, the Companies Clauses Acts, 1845, 1863, and 1869, the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863, and such portion of the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, as relates to roads and the temporary occupation of lands.

13. (Construction of Waterworks; Acquisition of Lands; Interference with Lands, Springs, Streams, Rivers, Roads, and other Property; Power to Supply Water and Levy Rates, Rents, and Charges; Prevention of Waste; Regulations; Supply in Bulk; Borrowing Powers; Incorporation of Acts, &c.)

To empower the Corporation to make and maintain the following waterworks and other works, or some of them, or some part or parts thereof, wholly in the county of Somerset, namely:—

Work No. 1.—A well or covered tank, situate in the parish of Pilton, in plantation or enclosure numbered 952 on the 1-2500th Ordnance map for the said parish of Pilton, at a point 15 yards or thereabouts, measured in a straight line, in a north-westerly direction from the south-easterly corner of the said plantation or enclosure.

To empower the Corporation to purchase and take, or acquire by compulsion or agreement, or to take on lease, any lands, springs, streams, waters, houses, and hereditaments for the purpose of constructing the said intended works or for the purposes of the Bill, or of their Waterworks undertaking.

To enable the Corporation to take, intercept,

collect, impound, use, divert, and appropriate, for the purposes of the Waterworks, and other purposes of the Bill, the water from or to be met with within the limits of deviation defined upon the plans hereinafter mentioned, or which can or may be intercepted or abstracted by means of the Waterworks hereinbefore described, or any of them.

To make such provisions as may have been, or may be, agreed upon, or as may be thought proper by Parliament to be prescribed or authorised by the intended Act, for the protection and benefit of the landowners, mineowners, owners of mills and other works, and other bodies and persons whose property rights and interests will, or may be, affected by the intended works, and of their property, rights, and interests, and to authorise, confirm, and give effect to any agreement, agreements, or arrangements which may be entered into between the Corporation and such land, mine, millowner, or owners, bodies, or persons, or some other of them.
