## What is a Finding Aid?

- Guides to most of the state agency records, manuscript, map, and photographs collections.
- History of the agency, records, and organization in a narrative format.
- Folder inventory.
- Most are available on our website: <u>www.tsl.texas.gov/arc/index.html</u>

#### Descriptive Guides

Descriptive guides help researchers in the use of archival holdings that have been prepared for research. Many of the finding aids to the holdings of the State Archives are available on the Web at <u>TARO</u> (Texas Archival Resources Online).

Processed State and Locan Accords and Processed Manuscript and Photograph Collections are indexes to the finding aids of the prepared holdings of Texas State Archives. The indexes include finding aids available only in print in the Archives search room as well as links to those finding aids that are also available on the loweb at the TARO site. Finding aids that have been newly added or revised in the last 90 days are also listed at Archives. Finding aids (New F Revised).

#### Guides to Specific collections

**Index to Confederate Pension Applications** is a database which provides the name, county of residence, and pension number for some 54,634 approved, rejected, and home pensions issued by the Texas government between 1899 and 1975.

**<u>Confederate Indigent Families List</u>** is an index to the names of families that received aid through the 1863 "Act to Support the Families and Dependents of Texas Soldiers."

<u>Annual Reports of Railroad Companies</u> is an index to reports 1859-1867, 1873-1885, 1890-1996. Each report details the company's organization, operation, and financial condition. The index includes the names of the rairoad companies and the dates of the reports as well as the call numbers for the reports, annotations made on the reports, the forms used, and the companies' alphabetical rankings.

The <u>Andrew Jackson Houston collection is tabase</u> is a searchable index of the collection, which is comprised of papers inherited by A.J. Houston from his father, Sam Houston. The collection of approximately 4,800 items contains correspondence, reports, resolutions, proclamations, affidavits, depositions and a wealth of other material dated, primarily, between 1835 and 1859. As Governor of Tennessee, Commanding General of the Texian Army during the Texas Revolution, twice President of the Republic of Texas, U.S. Senator from Texas and Governor of Texas, Sam Houston witnessed and participated in significant political, military, and governmental affairs. Topics covered in the collection include Texas politics during the Republic era and the pre-Civil War period of statehood, annexation, secession, and Indian affairs, to name a few. Correspondents include many Texas political and military figures of the era, as well as members of the public.

Many of the records of Texas state agencies and certain local governments are processed and described in finding aids. This list is alphabetical by the name of the agency or county, a division within if applicable, and the title of the records. Printed finding aids are available in the Archives search room in the named volumes. Finding aids available online may be accessed by this list directly, or you can go to **TARO** (Texas Archival Resources Online). Several finding aids in the index below (primarily certain state records held at other repositories) are noted as having finding aids available online, though not on TARO.

### How to Use a Finding Aid




The Case files are in off-site storage. Records requested before 10:00 a.m. will usually be mable for review by an archivist by 4:00 p.m. the same day. Records requested after 10:00 a.m. and before 3:00 p.m will usually be ailable for review by an archivist by noon the next day.

Case files may possibly contain documents sealed by the court, and therefore excepted from public disclosure by the Texas Public Information Act, Section 552.107(2). When a researcher requests a case, the file will be reviewed by an archivist in order to remove sealed documents. The researcher will be informed that sealed documents have been removed from the file and it will then be up to the researcher to obtain permission from the 5th Court of Appeals to access the documents.





Abstract:	The 16th Texas Legislature, Regular Session, 1879, created both the Texas Capitol Building Commission (CBC) and Texas State Capitol Board (SCB) to oversee the construction of the Texas State Capitol. The CBC and SCB worked together to manage the construction of the Capitol. The SCB managed the survey and sale of public domain lands used to fund construction and took care of legislative matters while the CBC managed day-to-day construction activities and reported progress and problems to the SCB. After the 1853 Limestone Capitol burned in 1881, these entities also oversaw the building of the temporary Capitol. Records date 1879-1890 and document the planning and construction of the temporary Capitol (completed 1883) and the Texas State Capitol (completed 1888). Drawings include the winning competition drawings, dated 1881, used to select an architect for the Texas Capitol Building and the original architectural drawings used in the construction of the Texas State Capitol, dated 1882-1888. Also included are derivative images of the drawings, dating 1980-1997. A portion of the architectural drawings, color slides, and color transparencies have been digitized and are part of the <u>Texas Digital Archive</u> .
