Welcome to the southeast United States! It's important for you to take some time to get familiar with this area's weather and make sure you're prepared.



March, April, and May is when most severe weather occurs

BUT

severe weather can happen anytime of the year



About 40% of this area's tornadoes happen at night. This makes them even more dangerous!

Know the Difference Between a Watch & Warning!

Watch means <u>be prepared</u> as severe weather <u>could</u> happen. Have a plan.

Warning means <u>take action</u> as severe weather is <u>happening</u> or is <u>imminent</u>. Seek shelter now!

Have MULTIPLE ways to receive warnings!


