In a few short weeks it will be Sukkot with a mitzvah of In the lead up to Rosh Hashana I have been reflecting on 'Leishev Basukkah' – dwelling in the sukkah. Luckily for me, and I'm sure many others, the mitzvah is not to build a sukkah. For if that were the case, I would be in a lot of trouble. In my view, the putting together of our 'Sukkah mart' sukkah takes too many people, too many hours and for some reason it always ends up a little bit wonky. Hashem knew what he was doing when he made the mitzvah Leishev; the mitzvah is consequently accessible to all, even the Ikea-challenged Jew.

The mitzvah of the Shofar has a similar theme. This mitzvah does not ask that we blow the shofar (thankfully, as my skills mean it just sounds like a spit-filled raspberry) but rather 'Lishmoah Kol Shofar' – we must listen to the sound of the shofar.

The mitzvah of Rosh Hashanah is to listen. In our observance of this mitzvah, we stay shtum and listen to the piercing sound of the shofar reverberate throughout the shule; one cannot talk between the brachot of the shofar and the first set of blasts until the very last blast at the end of musaf. Even when the chazan is racing that time of quiet, the period of listening and reflecting spans a few hours.

the importance of listening and the need for silence in order to properly do so.

There are many things that can be done simultaneously. Like walk and chew gum. But there are some cases where doing one thing negates the other, sometimes obviously and other times it is more subtle.

In in what might be seen as an extreme example, in the Torah reading of Rosh Hashana we read that the only one who heard Yishmael cry was Hashem. By Hagar crying herself, she drowned out her ability to hear the cries of her

of sound and refrains from emitting sound themselves; it We need to be quiet in order to hear the 'Kol Dmaama Dakka'.

This is something that is sometimes lost on children, and something that I see too often in our students at Yavneh. They think that talking and listening are like walking and chewing gum. This is not the case. In order for our children to really listen they need to stop talking. When you pause and listen, engagement in the conversation is truly two-way. Pauses in conversation allow you take in what the other person is saying, and to reflect and even edit your responses for an enriching conversation. As Steven Covey famously said: "Most people do not listen with the intent to understand; they listen with the intent to reply." He goes on to encourage us to consider a framework that encourages openness of mind, heart and will, which allows us to listen more deeply to one another and foster more meaningful relationships focused on things that matter. None of this is possible if we talk over the top of one another in conversation.

When I was growing up, Shabbat table conversation was controlled by the adults. Moving slightly from the mantra of my mother's childhood where 'children should be seen by not heard', we could join the adult conversation, but on the adults' terms. We were not allowed to dominate the conversation, nor could we converse among ourselves such that the adult conversation was disrupted. What this meant is that as children we were privileged to hear the conversation of adults which was often interesting, joyfully amusing and sometimes even inspiring. We got to hear well-formed and articulate arguments and synopses of recently read books or articles. And even though we took the mickey when my mother performed Shakespeare or recited (what she thought was a) relevant poem, it was an enriching experience. Not to mention the divrei Torah

and words on the parsha. Being silent in order to listen was not, nor did it feel, punitive. Quite the contrary. It was rewarding. Children who stay quiet long enough to listen to the adults in their life improve their oral language, general knowledge, logic and reasoning. (Might not work as well if the adults are loshing, but that's for another drosha). Adults and children who stay quiet long enough to listen to each other benefit from new ways of thinking and the opportunity to reframe, reconsider or better inform their views on the topic of discussion. But this enrichment of experience only happens when there is deep listening which comes from the absence of talking

Our Yavneh students have many endearing qualities. They are funny, curious and kind and give us countless nachas moments. But if I were to give one, generalised, point for improvement it would be that they need to talk less and listen more, both with adults and with each other. Their chatter is drowning out the voice of the other.

Give every man thy ear, but few thy voice

The mitzvah on Pesach is to talk, to tell the story of Yetziyat Mitzrayim and 'kol hamarbeh lesaper, harei ze meshubach'. But the ability to talk on Pesach in a way that is rich, nuanced and informed rests on the time and focus given to listening, starting with Rosh Hashana with the Shofar and continuing throughout the year.

Don't be afraid that insisting that our children stay quiet enough to listen might alienate them. It won't. Instead, it will open the door to more learning, laughing and wisdom, and richer relationships, which is something I'm sure we wish for all our young people.

May the year ahead bring quiet and peace to us and all of Am Yisrael.

# The Path of Lasting Change

How do we change as human beings? Inspired by the big, inspiring moments or crafted slowly by the day to day?

I think our Parsha, the final Parsha of the year, seems to suggest it is both.

So many of us feel that if only something big or dramatic could happen to us, THEN we would change. And so we wait for the big day. However, Moshe tells us that this is not the path. It is not in the heavens, that you should say, 'Who among us can go up to the heavens and get it for us and impart it to us, that we may observe it?' Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, 'Who among us can cross to the other side of the sea and get it for us and impart it to us, that we may observe it?'

# No, the thing is very close to you, in your mouth and in your heart, to observe it.

Based upon these famous words, Rav Yisrael Shapira says that developing a relationship with Hashem and making the necessary shifts in our life to live in line with these values does not require some dramatic experience—something "up in the heavens," or "beyond the sea." No, Hashem is to be found "in your mouth and in your heart." Spirituality is not beyond us or outside of us. It is within us, in the mundane, the every day. And positive change comes when we engage in making the mundane meaningful.

But our Parsha also has within in the mitzvah of Hakhel. Every seven years, after the Shemittah year, the nation are to gather together and the king would read the Torah to everyone. Our tradition is filled with many stories of how life-changing this gathering was.

One cannot deny the power of big, dramatic events and their ability to jolt us into a better version of ourselves. So this is the crux of it—there are transformative moments in our life that can alter us forever. However, the real challenge is what we do with that inspiration and how we make it part of our life. This is where the first idea comes in. We can take these big moments and get some momentum, but without a plan of how to add fuel to the fire every day, eventually these feelings will dissipate. After October 7th this past year, many people woke up. We were all jolted into this horrible new reality. And in response to the ongoing tragedy, many people took it upon themselves to grow and to change and improve their lives and relationship with Hashem. We all asked ourselves, what does it mean to be a Jew in the world today. But, with time, that momentum wore off, as we were worn down by the ongoing conflict and the travails of life. And this we know to be true. Big events, whether "good" or "bad," cannot be transformative if we don't seek out their resonance "in our hearts and our mouths."

We are coming up on some big moments. Please God, our experiences over the High Holidays should be powerful and inspiring and with a clarity borne of a difficult year behind us. But then the real work comes—then we must take that inspiration and channel it into our every day so that we can truly become the people and the nation we are supposed to become.

# Yavneh ELC News What if we lived like a bee? Charlene Orwin, Head of Yavneh Early Learning Centre


Our Rosh Hashanah learning is "abuzz" in our ELC, and one of the highlights of this time of year is our annual visit from "The Bee Lady" – learning all about how honey is made, the queen bee, looking at the hive, and watching them buzz about as they work and create. But for the purpose of this article, I would like to focus on the many valuable lessons we can take from the bee.

It may sound strange to suggest that humans can learn life lessons from bees. Obviously, these small insects are not as developed as we are. They don't talk, read, or write. Our homes are much more complicated than their hives, and we have imagination, consciousness, personalities, souls, and moral judgment. But despite this, there are some major life lessons we can learn from bees.

- **Teamwork**: Honeybees are nature's ultimate team players. They work together in everything they do. They also behave as if others matter, while at the same time keeping the common good of the hive as their main priority. If one bee is suffering or falling behind, the others step up and do the work, making sure that collective productivity is never reduced.
- As with all well-functioning teams, bees thrive on collective decision-making. They display flexibility and adaptability, robustness, and self-organisation. Bee life really is a "one for all and all for one" society.
- Do good, for goodness' sake: When bees pollinate flowers, they don't do it with the reward in mind, but rather in the act of pollination itself – this ensures the continuity of bees in the long run. Honeybees do not control the cycle of life, but their acts of kindness always pay off.
- **Efficiency**: Bees don't multitask. Instead, they focus only on their top priority their main focus. Each bee has different jobs, and they stick to them. They don't interrupt any other bee and they don't suffer from "FOMO." This is how they remain efficient. They don't waste time on anything other than living their purpose and contributing where they are most capable.
- Flexibility: Bees survive by adapting to their surroundings. They are continuously evolving. If relocated from one region to another, they quickly scout the new environment and communicate their findings. They are not discouraged by new locations or temperatures... they are not discouraged by change. They certainly understand the benefits of a "growth mindset."

- Leadership: Each bee colony has a queen. The
  queen knows her role and performs her duties
  without interfering with the work of her subjects.
  And although the bees depend on their queen, she
  still behaves as a servant to her hive. All bees
  respect their assigned roles and carry out their
  duties accordingly.
- Communication: Bees are deeply engaged with each other. They keep each other informed about changes in their environment. They never break contact with the group and are constantly passing on information they receive.
- Zoom in: Have you ever taken a photo of a frame of bees? What's really interesting is what happens when you zoom in on those photos. You can see what's happening under all those bees. In each cell of the honeycomb, there is pollen, an egg, larvae, or capped brood—when the larvae begin to pupate (turn into a bee), the worker bees cap the cell. When the new bee is ready, it chews its way out of the cell. Zooming in is a valuable life lesson—seeking to understand what's happening beneath the busy surface can be enlightening!
- Time out: Contrary to the common belief that they
  work all the time, bees actually spend two-thirds of
  their time doing nothing. They work hard with
  unwavering dedication and discipline, but they also
  get plenty of rest to recharge.

In conclusion, if we all lived our lives with the simplicity of purpose that bees use in their family (hive), we could improve our lives... one day at a time.

### SHO-FAR SHO-GOOD

For our Rosh Hashanah learning, like all our teaching learning, we always prepare using our G.A.N.A.G schema.

First, we get clear on our lesson GOALS. What are we going to learn about? Answer, we are learning about Rosh Hashanah and more specifically, about the Shofarin relation to Rosh Hashana. We also think about how our children will show their understanding and what dispositions do we want to nurture through throughout the learning process.

Then we ACCESS PRIOR KNOWLEDGE of our children through guiding questions or an image. We record the children's responses on the board using words and/or drawings. Questions like: What is a Shofar? Where does it come from? What sounds do they make? What else do you know about Shofars?

NEW LEARNING is the next stage of our learning process. We explain and add to what they already know. This can be done by showing examples of a Shofar, a video, someone coming to demonstrate the sounds and/or how a Shofar is made, and any other relevant information.













APPLYING KNOWLEDGE reveals to teachers how much children have understood. They are encouraged to apply what they have learnt about the shofar through arts and crafts, writing, a personal Machzor, etc

Finally, we conduct a GOAL REVIEW. We review our lesson goal and check again for learning and understanding. We refer to the visual which captured their prior knowledge and add to it to make their learning visible to them.

Rosh Hashanah is a major learning experience for all children with very many lesson goals.



While many of us are eagerly anticipating various grand finals, the grand finals in Mathematics tend to be a bit more low-key. Mathematics competitions inspire students to challenge themselves intellectually, improve their problem-solving and critical thinking skills, and build proficiency in mathematics. This is why, at the College, we continue to encourage our students to participate in both the Australian Mathematics Competition and the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) Competition, run by the Australian Mathematics Trust. At last Friday's assembly, I explained that an algorithm is a process we can follow repeatedly to complete a task or function. Algorithms are part of our everyday liveswhether we're using a mobile phone, checking social media, or even blowing the Shofar during Elul. For those who remember mathematics competitions from years past, the mode of delivery has changed. Competitions are now conducted via a secure website, rather than on a bubble sheet for multiple-choice answers. However, students are still given "scribble sheets" with diagrams where they can perform their calculations.


# Commemoration for October 7th
