WISEHART



Benita is part of the Jewish community in Birmingham, serving on the Council for Birmingham Progressive Synagogue, the "shul" she attended in her childhood. She is the lead for the synagogue's membership of Citizens UK Birmingham and involved in Nisa Nashim which seeks to build friendships between Muslim and Jewish women. She's currently co-chair of the West Midlands Faith Strategic Partnership Group working group on homelessness. Above all, she loves to celebrate the diversity of the city, and seeks to build bridges with different communities.

Benita is a Research and Evaluation Lead at BVSC, a key infrastructure organisation for the voluntary, community, faith and social enterprise (VCFSE) sector in Birmingham. Her primary role is to support the city council's Prevention First strategy through being a link between Adult Social Care and a number of commissioned VCFSE organisations across the city. Through lockdown Benita was often the first point of contact in the VCFSE sector for those wanting to know who to connect with, how to get help or funding and to share what was going well and what the challenges were. From this overview she observed, first hand, the resilience and ingenuity of the sector and the importance of digital accessibility and ability to organisations and citizens.

Prior to this she spent 14 years working in Birmingham City Council on both a major community regeneration programme and in Scrutiny, supporting elected members with policy reviews on a wide range of issues.

GULFRAZ RIAZ



I currently am the Cricket Development Manager for the Club Cricket Conference, a position I have held since 2012.

One of the main roles for me at the start was to reach out and work with less represented members of the cricketing community that play outside the traditional set up in the South East. I initiated and formed in the first few years the South Asian Cricket Development Group, working mainly with Essex CB & Surrey CF. At the same time, I reached out to understand, help, support and founded the African Caribbean Cricket Association which is based around South London.

After the initial work in the South East I commenced reaching out and connecting with the South Asian Cricketing Community on a national platform and from 2013 and over a period of 4 years I formed and currently Chair the National Asian Cricket Council, a body that acts in an advisory capacity to the ECB, first class and non-first-class counties and a number of key cricketing stakeholders.

I currently am on the Board of Directors with Hertfordshire Cricket and a Trustee with Berkshire Cricket Foundation.

As an ECB Level 2 Cricket Coach, I am a Bedfordshire County Age Group Coach as well as coaching and mentoring within Hertfordshire County Age Group.

FRASER



In January 2018, Keith Fraser was appointed as a member of the Youth Justice Board and chair of the Board in April 2020. Keith was recently appointed as chair of Local Partnerships. Keith is also the Non-Executive Director/Trustee at The WorkForce Development Trust Limited, Advisor for the National Police Chiefs Council Digital Engagement Project for Young People, and a Patron of Employability UK. Keith was made a Commissioner for the Commission on Race and Ethnic Disparities on 16 July 2020.

Prior to this, Keith was a Superintendent and Chief Inspector in the West Midlands Police, having joined as a Constable, during which time he produced the 2016-19 Preventing Gang Involvement and Youth Violence strategy.

Keith also produced the business plan for City of Wolverhampton council where he was the Chair of the authority's statutory Youth Offending Management Board. He led an innovative preventative project, targeting over 7,000 children and young adults, working with Sport England and was the Strategic Police Lead for the Princes Trust across the West Midlands.

She has been part of the Emerging Players Programme, Women's Academy and the Warwickshire Academy. Marie is also Head of Women & Girls Cricket at local coaching company Complete Cricket, who sponsor Warwickshire CCC red ball kit.
