Drámaíocht/Drama

Ros na Rún (8.30pm Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3rd September)

(Omnibus edition on Sundays at 10.30pm)

The popular soap returns to TG4 for a 18th season. A staple in the channel's schedule since its establishment, it is the only television drama series set in rural Ireland and has won plaudits and favourable reviews for its ability to portray the realities of contemporary life in Ireland with humour and subtlety. It deals with the major issues, both complex and simple in an understanding way.

This season's storylines continue with lots of local wrangling, gossip, love-stories that blossom and some that fade as well as all the wit and banter that is the daily stuff of social activity in shops, clubs and cafés throughout the country.

Having returned from Florida, Máire is reluctant to go back again. Even though Róise has forgiven her, Máire is torn because she'd promised her mother that they would all settle in the Sunshine State.

Berni discovers that her rare blood type is a godsend for bone marrow transplants and decides to donate. Her absence allows Cathal to pursue his affair with Róise but when Berni is left suffering with a deadly bug Cathal realises his mistake.

Jason recovers from his accident but discovers he has a complication that could be deadly, a secret he keeps to himself. After a few wobbles, it appears that Jason and Lee can finally get together. Tadhg, as usual, may have plans to keep his son close to home.

Alana, the new Garda is keen to end the local crime wave but her blunt ways seem to rub a few people up the wrong way.

Pádraig almost succeeds in ruining Gaudi's reputation but John Joe comes to the rescue by persuading a major country music star to make a surprise appearance. This proves a big success with the ladies.

Boss (Thursdays 11.15pm from 19th September)

A powerful and emotional political drama set in Chicago. Mayor Tom Kane (Kelsey Grammer) sits like a spider at the centre of Chicago's web of power. People expect results- they want disputes settled, jobs dispensed and loyalties rewarded. If this end requires deception and troubling morality, so be it, people look the other way.

Yet despite being the most effective mayor in recent history, a degenerative brain disorder is ripping everything away from him. He can't trust his memory, his closest allies, or even himself. Kane's wife Meredith (Connie Nielsen) knows nothing. Theirs is a marriage of convenience. Kitty O'Neil (Kathleen Robertson), his advisor, has her suspicions and others too remain questionless. Only Emma (Hannah Ware), Kane's estranged daughter, has a chance of learning his secret.

Nashville (Tuesdays 9.05pm from 3rd September)

Music legend Rayna Jaymes reigns as the Queen of Country, but after two decades, her grip on the throne is slipping. She is struggling to adapt and reinvent herself. Juliette Barnes is sexy, sassy, and trails trouble in her wake— she's also the country's biggest crossover artist. While she is determined to sit on Rayna's throne, she refuses to deal with her difficult past. Despite her charming naiveté, the beautiful, gifted songwriter Scarlett O'Connor, is destined to become music's next greatest star. With the backdrop of a thriving contemporary music scene, and a tense mayoral race, this series takes us into the cutthroat world of music and politics, showing what it really means to become a star and stay one.

Arne Dahl

Based on Arne Dahl's award-winning, bestselling novels about an elite unit within the Swedish police, these thrillers revolve around a team of specialists whose cases involve a mysterious connection between a jazz piece and the brutal slaying of top-level financiers ("Misterioso"); a serial killer who applies torture methods last used in Vietnam ("Bad Blood"); and a restaurant owner ("To the Top of the Mountain").

Borgen

One of the most acclaimed Scandinavian drama series of recent years, the season ("The Government") centres on the fight for political power in Denmark today - and about the personal sacrifices and consequences that this fight has for those involved on and behind the political stage.

The central figure is Birgitte Nyborg, who through her idealism and huge effort secures her party a landslide election victory. Now she faces the biggest challenge of her life how to wield power and to judge how far she is willing to go in order to gain as much influence as possible. Privately, she leads a happy family life with her husband and two children but she is a woman with a burning commitment, a big heart and too little time. This series has won many plaudits for its insights into the realities of political power in today's ever-changing world.

Justified

(Saturdays from 15th September)

Justified is the story of Deputy U.S. Marshal RAYLAN GIVENS (Timothy Olyphant), a true-blue hero and something of a throwback, given to wearing a Stetson and cowboy boots, carrying his sidearm in a hip holster – a weapon he only draws when he has to, and when he does, he shoots to kill, because, as he sees it, that's the purpose of a gun.

Raylan was born and reared in the hill country of eastern Kentucky. It was in Harlan where he played ball, chased girls and dug coal. And it was from Harlan, at age 19, that he ran, determined to become a U.S. Marshal. Now, years later, after shooting a gun thug in a Miami hotel and thereby incurring the wrath of his Marshals Service superiors, Raylan has been sent in punishment (and by fate?) to the one place to which he vowed he would never return—Kentucky.

The character of Deputy U.S. Marshal Raylan Givens was created by America's preeminent crime novelist Elmore Leonard (Get Shorty, Out of Sight) and is played by Timothy Olyphant (Deadwood, Live Free or Die Hard).

Breaking Bad

The fifth and concluding season of the critically-acclaimed and multi-award winning US series will have its free to air premiere on TG4 later this year. High school chemistry teacher, Walter White (Bryan Cranston), having been diagnosed with incurable, advanced lung cancer has a double life in which he's become a major manufacturer and distributor of methamphetamine.

His justification - that he wants to provide financial stability for his wife, Skyler (Anna Gunn) and disabled son seems very faded now as he has become the key player in the Albuquerque drug trade. As the danger around him escalates, Walt is now entrenched in the complex worlds of a very troubled family on the verge of dissolution, and the ruthless and unrelenting drug cartel.

If you've missed previous season's the entire run is currently airing on TG4.

One of TG4's most popular series is a deceptively simple format – a conversation between the host, the award-winning broadcaster Máirtín Tom Sheáinín, and his weekly guest. His particular talent is to put his guest completely at ease - whether the person is a national figure or someone who has lived life far away from the headlines, all are happy to share their innermost feelings or experiences in a quiet conversation with Máirtín.

Among this year's guests are former Taoiseach Brian Cowen, veteran film-maker Bob Quinn, former leading trade-unionist Des Geraghty, former Minister Mary Hanafin, the current Catholic Bishop of Achonry- Dr Breandán Ó Ceallaigh and Michael McCann, President of Saint Vincent de Paul in- Galway.

Brian Cowen (05/09/13)

In his first TV interview since leaving public life, we get to see another side of Brian Cowen. He talks about his youth in Clara in Offaly, his upbringing in the family business that combined pub, butcher shop, undertakers and auctioneers. Young Brian worked in all of them. He also speaks about his life-long involvement in Fianna Fáil, about his late his father, Ber, a member of Dáil Éireann for many years until his untimely death and about the most controversial he had to make as Taoiseach - to accept the IMF bailout.

Séamus Ó Marcacháin (12/09/13)

A true blue Dub, Séamus is a native of Moore Street in the heart of the city, behind O'Connell Street. His grandmother and mother were also born and raised on this renowned street, the home of a famous street market for over a century. His grandfather was Italian and he came to Ireland over a hundred years ago.

Úna de Bláin (19/09/13)

Úna's father was a lighthouse keeper and she was born in a lighthouse in Sligo. Úna spent over forty years teaching, during which she taught in five different schools in various parts of Ireland.

Séan Ó Laoire (26/09/13)

A native of Kerry now living in Trim, his mother died when he was only eleven years old and he was then raised by his grandmother. A former teacher in Dún Laoghaire and Portarlington, he is now very active in traditional musical circles through the Meath branch of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann.

Bob Quinn (03/10/13)

Originally from Dublin, Bob worked in RTÉ in the early years of television but left in a highly publicised protest along with a few colleagues who were frustrated at the direction the new TV service was taking. He moved to the Connemara Gaeltacht agus has now spent forty three years there. His subsequent output as a film-maker has been wide-ranging and prolific, including the much-loved *Poitín* with Cyril Cusack, Dónal McCann and Mick Lally.

Des Geraghty

Dublin-born, he comes from a family of trade-union activists. He spent six years as President of Ireland's biggest trade-union SIPTU. He is a lover of music and a dab hand on the whistle and flute, and can sing too, as he demonstrates to Máirtín with his own Irish translation of *Raglan Road*.

(10/10/13)

Máirín Mhic Risteáird (17/10/13)

Known by her local name, Máirín Joe Shéamuis, she spent much of her life as a post-primary teacher in Monaghan, Dublin and Donegal. She married Art and they settled in Bantry for many years. In 2005, they decided to retire back to Connemara but tragically their years together were cut short.

Máire Níc Niallais (24/10/13)

A well-known activist in Irish language circles, she has been prominent in cultural and literary developments in the Donegal Gaeltacht in the Oireachtas na Gaeilge festival for many years. She also is passionate about community development and the future of the Gaeltacht.

Morgan Ó Domhnaill (07/11/13)

His father was born in Baile na hAbhann in the Connemara Gaeltacht, a stone's throw from TG4 HQ but he grew up nearer Galway city in Furbo. His first job was in Galway's biggest garage, Madden's.

Nicholas Carolan (14/11/13)

Well known TV presenter, Nicholas, hosts programmes for TG4 and RTÉ of traditional music from the archive. His 'real' job is as Director of the Irish Traditional Music Archive. He is native of Drogheda and was a teacher for many years.

Muiris Ó Fiannachta (21/11/13)

A native of Corca Dhuibhne Gaeltacht in West Kerry, Muiris hails from Baile an Chótaigh. He is a farmer with a passion for Gaelic football, now as coach of the famous local team, An Ghaeltacht. His wife Phil runs the popular bakery Cístí Cheann Trá.

Mary Hanafin (28/11/13)

Originally from Thurles, where her family was involved in a number of business ventures, she also had politics in her genes. Having spent a few years as a teacher in Dublin it was inevitable that she would stand for election and did. She was a Minister in a number of Departments and a frequent contributor on radio and TV programmes. She lost her Dáil seat in the last General Election.

Bishop Breandán Ó Ceallaigh (05/12/13)

A native of Craughwell in Co Galway, he was ordained a priest in 1971 and spent the next twenty three years as a secondary school teacher. His first parochial duties were as Parish Priest in Lisdoonvarna in Clare, where he spent seven years before moving to the Connemara Gaeltacht as parish priest of An Spidéal. After a few years there, commentators were surprised when he was appointed Bishop of Achonry, a small diocese that spans east Mayo, south Sligo and a portion of Roscommon.

Michael McCann (12/12/13)

Michael is President of SVP (Saint Vincent de Paul) in Galway. Originally from Clonmel, he spent almost forty years teaching, first in Kildare and then in Galway, where he's lived ever since. He talks about teaching and about the huge increase in the demand for SVP support from families hard-hit by the recession.

An tAthair Padraig Ó Fátharta (19/12/13)

A native of Cois Fharraige in the Connemara Gaeltacht, Pádraig was ordained as a African Missionary priest in the late 1960s. He worked in Africa for a number of years before returning to his native place to serve as curate in Ros a Mhíl. He is an accomplished musician.

Fíorscéal (Tuesdays 10.30pm)

A new season of top-class international documentaries that continue to throw (a sometimes disturbing) light on issues which affect us environmentally, socially, politically and globally. Among the first documentaries of the new season are:

Sandgrains (17/09/13)

A documentary about the stark local effects of global fishing. As a young boy Zé left his Cape Verdean fishing village for a better life in Sweden. Years later he returns to find his village transformed. The beach where he once played football has disappeared. His family now has to dig sand from the ocean floor to sell for concrete manufacturing because fishing no longer puts enough food on the table. The story takes us all the way from Africa to the corridors of the EU Parliament where an effort to reform Europe's failing fishing industry is underway.

Spain's lost Children (24/09/13)

In the middle of the last century, up to 300,000 babies in Spain were stolen from 'undesirable' families and trafficked by an alliance of doctors, the Catholic Church and Franco's Secret police. Now, decades on, some of these stolen children are trying to find their biological families.

It started shortly after the Spanish Civil War as a way of stopping a new generation of Republican supporters, from emerging. But it continued until the early 1990s, decades after Franco's death, for economic reasons. Poor women or single mothers would enter a Church run hospital to give birth and be told that their child had died during labour. The babies would then be placed with 'appropriate' wealthy families, usually in exchange for a donation.

Lily is one of the thousands of babies illegally adopted. We follow her as she tries to track down her birth family.

The Battle for the Amazon (01/10/13)

What will eventually be the world's third largest dam is currently under construction in the heart of the Amazon Basin. The giant dam has become a symbol of the destruction and colonisation of the last remaining significant rainforest in the world.

The indigenous people, the Xingu, have been the guardians of the tropical forests here for centuries. They have never been more in danger. The dam will flood their land and change the environment forever. It will cause the displacement of 20,000 people and the expected migration of 100,000 others.

In the face of this danger the people of the forest have decided to fight. We follow their struggle.

Raising Resistance

(08/10/13)

Beautifully shot and interweaving interviews with scenes from soy fields in Paraguay, Raising Resistance explores Latin American farmers' struggle against the expanding production of genetically modified soy in South America.

Biotechnology, mechanisation, and herbicides have radically changed the lives of small farmers in Latin America. For farmers in Paraguay this means displacement from their land, loss of basic food supplies, and a veritable fight for survival. As corporate farms seize farmland and rapidly expand production of genetically modified soy, farmers like Geronimo Arevelos find themselves in a life and death struggle.

This documentary illustrates the mechanisms of a global economy that relies on 'monocrop' agriculture and corporate ownership of land. In telling the story of Paraguay, Raising Resistance poses the larger question of whether the global community wants to go on living with a system that allows one crop to prosper at the expense of all others.

Greece; The Point of No Return

(15/10/13)

Years of austerity and cuts have destroyed the lives of many Greeks. But more and more people are using the crisis as an opportunity and responding with innovative ideas.

When the pension of retired teacher, Mary Houpis, was reduced at the same time as taxes increased she founded a collective where people could exchange goods and services. Dimitris Kouretas could have stayed in the U.S, where he studied for many years. But he decided to return to Greece to start a business that uses the 1,600 plants that only grow in Greece to create natural products. Meanwhile Fanis Koutouvelis founded the start-up I-KIOSK

Sand Wars

(22/10/13)

A thought-provoking investigation into one of the most consumed natural resources on the planet. Due to the high demand for sand, the planet's reserves are being threatened. Three-quarters of the world's beaches are in decline and bound to disappear as victims of erosion, or of sand smuggling. Sand is the source if silicon dioxide, a mineral found in our wines, cleaning products and detergents, paper, dehydrated foods, toothpaste, cosmetics and an astounding variety of other products we use as on a daily basis. Houses, skyscrapers, bridges, airports and sidewalks are all partially comprised of sand. It is an elementary particle that is the foundation of our modern development. Triggered by building construction smuggling bands or 'sand mafias' plunder beaches and rivers for this prized commodity. Sand Wars will take us around the world to witness this new gold rush firsthand.

Little World (29/10/13)

Albert Casals is a young man who has been in a wheelchair since suffering leukemia at the tender age of five. But this hasn't stopped him from pursuing his dream to travel around the world his own way- without money, without companions and without luggage. Albert has been a world traveller since age 15, setting off from home armed with nothing but his imagination and his courage.

Little World takes us along on his greatest challenge yet; to reach the exact opposite side of the planet. This time, he is taking a handy cam and his girlfriend, Anna, along on the adventure. Mixing home video techniques and traditional documentary methods, this inspiring film tells the story of this insightful young man, his relationship with Anna, his philosophy on life, and his parents' approach to raising him.

Saol chlár/ Lifestyle

Róisín (Mondays at 8pm from 16th September)

A new weekly discussion show presented by broadcaster, journalist and mother Róisín O'Hara that throws a new light on today's issues and challenges, a combination of conversation, reports and debate, mixing the light hearted with the serious.

Each week Róisín will be joined in studio by guests with different views on family issues from politics, to child-rearing to education and health. We will hear from recently emigrated Irish people from countries like Australia and Canada to see how they are settling into their new environments. Are their lives that different in their new locations?

Ó Cuisine (Wednesdays at 8.30pm from 13th November)

In this 32 part cookery series, a guest chef prepares a three course meal as would appear on his/her own restaurant's menu and showcases local produce and artisan foods.

Amongst the chefs featured in this series, are well-known foodie, Peter Ward from Country Choice in Nenagh; Brian Ó Domhnaill who owns Danny Minnies in Annagary, Donegal; Síle Gorman from Gorman's Clifftop House on the Dingle Peninsula; Enda Conneely from the cookery school and restaurant South Aran House in Inis Oírr, Niall Ó Conchubhair from An Canteen in Dingle, Stiofán Mac Donncha, head chef at the Menlo Park Hotel in Galway City, Luke Flinter, from The Malt House in Galway City, Louise Ní Bhrosnacháin from The Global Village in Dingle, Pól Ó hEannrachaidh owner and chef at the Bloom Brasserie in Dublin's Baggot Street and Ruairí Ó Moracháin, The Druid Chef, who aims to showcase Celtic Cuisine.

The series starts with a 6 part mini-series about baking. We will see Galway's award winning baker, Jimmy Griffin from *Griffin's Bakery* make some of their most popular cakes, Jackie Ní Fhlatharta, a baker of speciality cakes, Mary Carr from the *White Gables Restaurant and Café* in Moycullen as well as Brian Danny Minnie and Niall Ó Conchúir from *An Canteen*.

Fíorasach/Factual

Cogar (9.30pm Sundays from 1st September (repeat Mondays 7.30pm)

This the generic title for a series of TG4's most popular original. Irish language content, comprising specially commissioned half-hour programmes that are highly personal in nature and often show a more hidden side of Irish life.

Programmes concentrate on people more than on issues and this allows participants to tell their own story in their own ways.

Amhráin an Fhir Bháin (01/09/13)

The life and song compositions of Seán Bán Mac Grianna from Rann na Feirste in the Donegal Gaeltacht. Seán Bán, brother of renowned Donegal writers Séamus Ó Grianna and Seosamh Mac Grianna, was himself an accomplished and prolific writer, poet, storyteller and musician. He is best remembered through the significant body of beautiful songs that he composed that have provided hits for many performers, including local groups Altan, Clannad, and many others.

Deartháireacha; An Sagart agus an Rock Star (08/09/13)

The story of two very different brothers, Caoimhín and Darrach Mac Giolla Catháin. Born and reared in the Shaw's Road, Belfast Gaeltacht, they had a similar upbringing but now lead very different lives - Caoimhín is the lead singer of the Irish Language reggae band *Bréag* and his brother Darrach, is the Parish Priest at Corpus Christi Church in Belfast.

This documentary explores the similarities and differences between the two brothers, portraying how their upbringing has influenced and shaped them. It will explore how siblings who have the same childhood can take vastly different career paths, have different attitudes and opt for very different lifestyle choices.

Frank Patterson - Guth Órga na hÉireann (15/09/13)

The life and musical legacy of the Clonmel-born tenor Frank Patterson to mark the 75th anniversary of his birth in 1938. Presented by Catherine Foley, it takes a nostalgic look back at the singer's life and his love of music, his rise to fame and his many successes. Although feted around the world, Patterson never forgot his strong Clonmel roots.

He first joined the family's printing business but decided to go to Dublin to pursue his singing career. After only two years of study, Frank entered the Feis Ceoil in 1964. He won every major prize at the national competition. His career as a tenor had begun.

He met Eily O'Grady, the pianist and musician, shortly after this and after they were married, the two toured and played together until Frank's untimely death in 2000.

During his career, he sang for two US presidents, Pope John Paul II and released over 40 albums in six languages. His top-rated television show, *For Your Pleasure* ran from 1974 to 1984. He died in 2000.

Dlí Rory - Dóchas ó Neamh (29/09/13)

In April 2012 Rory Staunton, aged twelve died in a New York hospital four days after scraping his arm playing basketball at school. His devastated parents, Orlaith and Ciarán, were devastated but also determined to ensure that such a tragedy can never happen again.

The cause of Rory's death was sepsis, a condition unknown to his parents. It went undetected when he was first admitted to hospital and he was sent home. By the time he was readmitted and doctors diagnosed sepsis, it was too late to save him.

Now Rory's parents, Ciarán and Orlaith, are campaigning to raise awareness of sepsis and to change the law regarding how the condition is managed in hospitals. This is their story – one of hope in the face of tragedy.

Eoin McDonncha had a normal Connemara childhood in An Cheathrú Rua. The boy fished with his father, played Gaelic football and had no exposure to dance of any kind until contemporary dancer Ríonach Ní Neill started dance classes on the local GAA pitch. Eoin went along out of curiosity and discovered his passion. At first his family thought little of this new fad, but when Eoin quit his studies and announced that he wanted to be a professional dancer, eyebrows and tensions were raised.

His father struggled to understand his son's vocation while his mother worried about his future. But nothing could deter the young dancer, and through a combination of hard work, stubbornness and raw talent he has managed to win over his family and prove to that he was a dancer.

Tyrone Power, a great Hollywood star who was born in 1914 in the U.S, always knew that his ancestors came from Kilmacthomas in Co Waterford. In this new documentary,

The documentary recalls Power's star status, his charisma, his short life as well as his connections to Waterford and the story of his ancestors.

Presenter Catherine Foley wonders if there's any truth to the rumours she's heard over the years that she might be related to him! When the star came to Dublin for the making of the film "The Rising of the Moon" in 1957, he took time out to visit the Co Waterford village and it's said he was disappointed that no-one recognised him. Only the local postman Michael Murphy came out to get his autograph. Tyrone went back to finish the film. The postman's son, Seán, recalls the meeting and the exuberant reaction to the local screening of *The Rising of the Moon*, when Power announces proudly that his folk came from a small village in Southern Ireland called Kilmacthomas.

Tyrone Power was married three times and had three children. He died suddenly at a young age when he collapsed on set half-way through the making of Solomon and Sheba in Spain. It was 1958 and he was only 44 years of age.

When Mayo met Donegal in the 2012 All Ireland Football Final, Mayo people around the world held their breath, barely daring to believe that they could bring the Sam Maguire home after a gap of over sixty years. Alas, the Ulster team's blistering start put paid to those hopes and yet again, the oft-spoken phrase 'Mayo, God help us' was to be heard. The doomsayers reminded us that the Mayo 'curse' had once again dashed their footballer's dreams.

The legendary curse dates from 1951, the last time Mayo won the All-Ireland. The story goes that while passing through Foxford, on their victorious journey home, the team neglected to pay proper respect to a local funeral. Enraged, it is claimed that the local priest cursed the team and the county, saying that while any member of the 1951 team lived, Mayo would not win a senior All Ireland. Sixty two years on, and Mayo have yet to win again (but have qualified for the 2013 All-Ireland Senior Final at the time of writing). Is this a curse or a coincidence?

Tar Abhaile

Hosted by broadcaster Evelyn O'Rourke, this is a new and inspirational six part series on TG4 that follows local Irish communities as they welcome people from across the globe in search of their Irish ancestors.

Instead of waiting for people of Irish origin to trace their roots, groups of community volunteers tirelessly work together under the auspice of Ireland Reaching Out (or Ireland XO) to uncover individuals and families who left their local area in the 1800's and 1900's. Once they have gathered enough information, they then reach out and invite these descendants back to Ireland, their spiritual home, to share local knowledge, walk the land of their ancestors, show them their final resting places and where possible, introduce them to long-lost living relatives.

Over six weeks, the audience will be introduced to 12 different Irish descendants and their families, scattered all over the USA, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and the UK, as they travel to Ireland to reconnect with their Irish roots. We visit each of them and see where and how they live in their respective homes but, more importantly, find out what motivates them to visit Ireland, their spiritual home. Once they travel over and meet the volunteers who helped them unearth their roots, their emotional journey begins.

For the descendants, it proves time and time again to be an extremely moving and humbling experience: the history and stories of their forefathers are revealed to them, they walk in the footsteps of their ancestors, visit the homesteads where they lived or bow their heads are their graves often brings tears to the eye. But nothing beats the experience of meeting living relatives, very often cousins they never knew they even had.

And finally, the whole village comes out to formally welcome the descendants into their own community through song, dance and... scones! It unquestionably gives the whole experience a real meaning and leaves both the local volunteers and the descendants with an enormous sense of pride and satisfaction. Ultimately, Tar Abhaile is about real people and their unique stories, their unique journey and their unique connection with Ireland.

Yet, before becoming a hero, Steve Jobs was the only one to believe in the Macintosh's success. He fought hard against serious competitors such as IBM but mostly against his famous rival, Bill Gates. From the days of a kid in a garage somewhere in San Francisco with great invention and design skills to the man who changed the world for ever.

Ingvar Kamprad (IKEA) (11/09/13)

Ingvar Kamprad was born in 1926 in Småland, a deprived Swedish region. A small shopkeeper in the 50s, he quickly grasped that the world and business models were changing and that the furniture business needed to change too.

He founded IKEA with a whole new approach. Furniture would be manufactured in factories for the first time and it would not be crafted, bulky or expensive but practical, cheap and easy to transport. The company motto is FSE: Functional, Shape and Easy to produce. His revolutionary approach spread and now IKEA owns more than 250 stores worldwide and has over 600 million visitors passing through his doors every year.

He is now the 4th richest man in the world but he remains unassuming and hidden from the public glare, content in the Swiss countryside.

Mark Zuckerberg (Facebook), (18/09/13)

At only 27 years, Mark Zuckerberg is worth about €30 billion. Launched in his dorm eight years ago, Facebook now has over 850 million followers and is an incredible success story. If everyone knows about Facebook, few people know about its creator's real life. From his childhood in an upscale suburb of New York until the day the site was created at Harvard and his impact on Silicon Valley, this is the amazing true story of Mark Zuckerberg as told by colleagues, employees, investors and biographers.

Bill Gates (Microsoft)

(25/09/13)

This is the true story of a visionary genius and a ruthless businessman, the founder of Microsoft. His fortune is estimated at \$56 billion. Yet, as he reached the age of 20, this gifted and ambitious young man was the despair of his parents, always dreaming of computers and making money with software. It seemed a crazy bet at the time. But when the microcomputer market skyrocketed, Bill Gates won his bet and became the first software provider to the planet. Now a billionaire and icon of the American dream, he also fashioned a reputation for going to any extreme to crush his competition. This is the story of his rise to power, his strokes of genius and his bluff plays.

Philip Knight (Nike) (02/10/13)

While studying at Stanford University, Phil Knight went to Japan and discovered the first cheap and sturdy sneakers made by a Mr. Onitsuka. Knight's entrepreneurial spirit led him to bring a few pairs back home with him in order to sell them and immediately copy them. Gradually, he developed the concept of "sportswear" and created his "Nike" brand, inspired by a Greek goddess. The company logo, bought from an art student for \$35, is one of the most visible and best-known symbols in the whole world and now worn by millions, including many of the best-know sports men and women. The company is still run by this mysterious entrepreneurial innovator.

Richard Branson (Virgin) (09/10/13)

The story of the most nonconformist businessman on the planet. He was considered a dunce by his post-primary teachers but has built up a global empire encompassing music, telecommunications, aviation and spatial tourism.

Having established a small record label, Virgin Records, Branson used the controversial *Sex Pistols* to launch the success of the label and staged and spectacular and often provocative events to increase his own and his company's profile and profits. He was without parallel in using his image to maximize free publicity around the world.

To understand his unique business style the makers of this documentary followed him during his business trips and to his private Caribbean island, where he runs the 400 companies of the Virgin empire.

This is the generic title (literally 'soul-revealing') given to TG4's channel's highly regarded documentary series of hour-long treatments. Subjects include profiles, personalities, movements, places and ideas that have shaped modern Ireland or that reveal a hidden or repressed aspect of our cultural, historical or social heritage.

Each programme is different in tone and perspective and true to its own topic but also combines with the others in the series to give a real *súil eile* perspective.

This lyrical film explores the epic journey taken by Mary Devine who crossed America on foot with her four year old daughter during the 1860's in a desperate attempt to return home to West Kerry, from where she had left a number of years earlier.

We hear a lot about those who left, never to return but rarely do we hear about those who came back. This is a story of stoicism, suffering, nobility, strength, will-power and the ultimate survival of a heroic woman, revealed through the personal discovery of her direct descendant, broadcaster and poet Dónal Mac an tSíthigh.

Mary Devine emigrated, married a violent man and found herself isolated with him in the Mid-West of the USA. Undaunted, she did the extrordinary, put her child on her back and walked hundreds of miles to New York. Obtaining work there, she made enough money to pay her passage home. Having arrived in Queenstown (Cóbh) she then put the child on her back again and walked all the way home to Corca Dhuibhne where she lived out the rest of her life on her home ground.

This is a story of emigration and the search for the elusive promised land but most of all it is a story of self-belief, hope and survival. The enduring cinematic image is that of this lone woman carrying her child across a lawless, wild and wind-swept American landscape, going home.

(Thursdays 8pm from 12th September)

Author, journalist and broadcaster Catherine Foley presents this provocative, four-part analysis of the role religion in Irish society over the past three generations. She takes as her time-line the history of religious events between the International Eucharistic Congress of 1932 in Dublin and the most recent Congress held again in the same city in 2012. In the intervening period, Christian faith and religious practice has undergone profound change in Irish society and religion is no longer at the centre of social and cultural life in Ireland.

Institutional religion impacted on so many aspects of Irish society – education and health, socio-economic development, culture, law and even politics. However, scandal and crisis in the institutional Catholic Church has emerged over the last 20 years and generated feelings of hurt and anger, frustration, bewilderment, indifference and rejection.

Catherine's journey takes her to locations across Ireland to meet believers and nonbelievers, theologians and historians, ex-priests and loyal Catholics, radical thinkers and the curious in search of spiritual enlightenment.

Everyone has an opinion – good or bad – on religious matters; religious belief, attitudes, values, organisation and practice remain hot topics in Ireland today.

Most of the analysis of religion in contemporary Irish society has focused on the failings and irrelevance of the institutional Catholic Church. But it is not the whole story.

Mná Díbeartha (Wednesdays 9.30pm from 25th September)

From 1787 to 1853, over 25,000 women, nearly half of them Irish, were transported in the dark holds of ships on a 16,000-mile journey to the other side of the world as bonded labour. Arriving alone, or with small children in the colonies, these single, married and widowed women, lived, loved, toiled and died under Australian skies.

This new and pioneering 4-part documentary series fuses history, genealogy and drama to reveal for the first time, the stories of these forgotten women and their experiences in the strange and harsh new world of Colonial Australia

In a two-year period during the Famine, over 4,000 young orphan girls, inmates of the overcrowded Irish workhouses, were carefully selected and transported on what became known as the Famine Bride Ships, to colonies where men outnumbered women by 10 to 1 in the outback.

Such infusions of Irish female blood at the end of the 18th and in the 19th centuries had a telling influence on the development of colonial Australia. Neither damned whores or passive victims, these women and young girls and the choices they made, shaped the world in which they lived.

1916: Seachtar Dearmadta (Wednesdays from 06th November 9.30pm)

On the evening of Sunday, the 30th April, 1916, the last of the Dublin rebels to surrender after the Easter Rising were rounded up and escorted to Richmond barracks. Over the following two weeks, fourteen of them would be executed by firing squad in Kilmainham Gaol.

Seven of the executed men had signed their own death warrant by putting their names to the Proclamation of the Irish Republic, but the other seven were executed for more obscure reasons. Some of them were well known to Dublin Castle, others had played a central role in the fighting. In certain cases, the British Empire was settling scores against old enemies, and others were simply victims of circumstance.

In this sequel to their award-winning profiles of the seven executed signatories, Abú Media's new series explores the lives of these seven other executed men. One hourlong programme is dedicated to one of them: Michael Mallin, Ned Daly, John MacBride, Willie Pearse, Michael O'Hanrahan, Seán Heuston and Con Colbert.

Through a combination of interviews and dramatic reconstructions 1916: Seachtar Dearmadta brings their stories to life and shows the path each of them took to rebellion and examines the contribution they made during Easter week, a contribution that has often been overlooked.

In 1967, games were played between Australia and a touring County Meath Gaelic football team, Meath being that year's All-Ireland Football Champions. Following intermittent international tests between Australia and Ireland, the International Rules Series has been played intermittently since 1984 – when Ireland played Australia in 3 matches – once in Páirc Uí Chaoimh and twice in Croke Park.

The sport has raised considerable interest amongst fans from both countries with matches generally being a closely matched contest.
