In order to do this I will sponsor and pass a Community Benefits Agreement Ordinance that will provide inclusionary zoning, property tax relief and investment in affordable housing and job training. The Obama Center is estimated to attract 750,000 tourists per year. The University of Chicago is currently building a hotel, dorm and converence center in the ward. A deep transformation is underway in the ward.
