








## This is William and Mary Soccer

Forty years ago, soccer was in its first year at William and Mary. It was for men only and the Tribe did not experience many winning moments. Times have changed. In 1967, the team's third year of existence, and first as a varsity sport, W&M defeated George Washington, 2-1, for the first victory in school history. That win was the first of more than 400 to come for a school that was destined to be a hotbed of soccer.

The groundwork was laid in the early 1970s when Al Albert, a 1969 graduate of the College, returned to his alma mater to teach and coach soccer. The program began to take off in 1975, Albert's fifth year at the helm. That season the Tribe went 9-4-1, beginning the current streak of 30 consecutive winning seasons, the fifth-longest streak in NCAA Division I history. Just one year later, in 1976, the Tribe won 10 matches for the first time, a feat which was repeated for the next 27 years. Albert retired following the 2003 season as just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to compile 400 victories. As head coach, he led William and Mary to 401 of the program's 432 wins.

Wins alone do not give a school national prominence. That came in 1980 when W&M advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Since then, the Tribe has gone to 11 more NCAA tourneys, including seven trips in the last 10 seasons (1995-2000 and 2002) as well as in 1987, 1992 and 1993. W&M won the ECAC-South title in 1983; the CAA tournament in 1987, 1995, 1996, 1999 and 2000 and the CAA regular season crown in 1987, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 2002, when it tied Virginia Commonwealth for first place in the league.

Last year W&M soccer took another step forward with the construction of a new grass

facility, Albert-Daly Field. Initiated with a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop, the new field will be crucial in improving the Tribe's chances to host top-quality teams and NCAA Tournament games in Williamsburg. Despite the tremendous success of Tribe soccer, the men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site. That is expected to change with the beginning of play at Albert-Daly Field.

Besides having strong team records, many W&M individuals have been standouts on the pitch. Eight players have been named All-Americans, 12 have international playing experience with various national teams and numerous others have received conference, state and regional honors. In the summer of 1994, goalkeeper Paul Grafer started for the U.S. Olympic team on its tour of Chile. In 1997 W&M alum Wade Barrett played with the U.S. under-20 team. All-American goalkeeper Adin Brown is the latest name to join this group, playing on the U.S. under-23 squad and with the U.S. Olympic Team.

The William and Mary women's soccer program has enjoyed a similar ascent to the upper echelon of the sport. Starting as a varsity sport in 1981 under original head coach John Charles and continuing under current head coach John Daly, the women's team has enjoyed winning seasons in all 24 years and has played in the NCAA tournament 20 of the past 21 seasons.

The women's team has also enjoyed its share of individual honors. Eleven Tribe players have been named All-America in the last 17 years. The women's team also has a history of sending players to various national teams. Former W&M All-American and National Player of the Year Megan McCarthy was a member of the national team, which is the current world champion. Nine years ago, Natalie Neaton earned the distinction of ISAA National Player of the Year.

What makes William and Mary unique in the soccer world is its combination of top-notch collegiate soccer and a variety of soccer-related activities throughout the year.

Traditionally, in September the year kicks off with the Tribe Soccer Classic, which features the W&M men's team and a regional rival facing off against top competition from around the country. Virginia, Duke, North Carolina, Davidson, Boston University, Rutgers and Portland are all traditionally strong teams that have come to Williamsburg for this early season tourney. In the 19 years of the Classic, the Tribe has won the title 10 times and has finished second seven times.

The spring finds the Busch Field turf occupied by teams of seven. W&M hosts a seven-a-side tournament for both college men's and women's teams in early April. The tournaments give top teams from around the region the opportunity to gauge their progress in spring prac-

tice against top-notch competition. Collegiate players are not the only ones enjoying the turf in the spring. In late April, a seven-a-side tournament for men's and co-ed teams draws many participants from Tidewater, Richmond and Washington, D.C.

In the summer, the fields of William and Mary are filled by thousands of youngsters taking part in the Tidewater Soccer Camp and John Daly's Soccer Camp. The camps are run by the William and Mary head coaches and the counselors are mainly current and former W&M players.

Beginning in the summer of 2002, Busch Field became the home turf for the Williamsburg Legacy, the Premier Development League (PDL) team owned by the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Each season, the Legacy roster features as many as five W&M players, while also adding individuals from a number of other local nationally-ranked colleges, including Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth, Old Dominion and Maryland.

Soccer is not just a seasonal event in Williamsburg, it is a year-long tradition. Both the men's and women's teams receive strong support from the student body and the residents of the Tidewater area, and these fans are rewarded with a great product.

The success enjoyed by Tribe student-athletes and the high-level of community involvement in the soccer program combine to make William and Mary a truly unique place in the soccer world.

## **Head Coach Chris Norris**

Chris Norris enters his second season as the head coach of the William and Mary men's soccer team. He was named to the position on January 23, 2004, after nine years as a Tribe assistant and four years as a standout defender for the Green and Gold.

"Chris was an exceptional student-athlete at William and Mary and continued as an outstanding assistant coach for nine seasons," said W&M's director of athletics Terry Driscoll at the time of Norris' hiring. "His knowledge, experience and understanding of intercollegiate soccer and the College clearly made him the obvious choice for the position."



In Norris' first season leading the Tribe, the team extended its streak of consecutive winning seasons to 30, tied for the fifth-longest streak in NCAA Division I history. W&M went 5-1-3 in its first year at Albert-Daly Field, including a 1-0 win over top-ranked Maryland in just the second home game at the College's new facility. The Green and Gold allowed opponents to score just 21 goals all season, the fewest since 1999 and resulting in a 0.99 goals against average for the team. Five W&M players earned All-Colonial Athletic Association honors, including first team selection Pat Scherder, who also earned all-state and second team all-region accolades.

Norris joined the Tribe soccer staff in 1995 after a solid playing career at the College. He made the transition from the field to the sideline and played a major role in helping former head coach Al Albert develop one of the premier soccer programs in America.

A captain his senior year, Norris was the team's defensive leader, starting all four seasons (1991-94). During his career, W&M compiled an impressive 1.04 goals against average, including two seasons (1992 and 1994) with a team GAA of less than 1.00. He was a two-time All-CAA performer and was also selected to the VaSID All-State squad and the All-South Atlantic second team in 1994. The team's Most Valuable Player as a junior, Norris received the Coaches' Award in 1992 and earned W&M Rookie of the Year honors in 1991. Norris also earned the team's Freshman Academic Achievement Award in 1991 and graduated from the College with a degree in kinesiology.

Prior to his return to William and Mary, Norris served as junior varsity boys' soccer coach at Lafayette High School in Williamsburg. Along with his coaching duties for the Tribe, Norris is involved in coaching with the Williamsburg Soccer Club and serves as the co-director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp. He holds a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) advanced national diploma and serves as an associate staff member for the NSCAA.

**Chris Norris** was hired as W&M's third varsity soccer head coach on January 23, 2004. A four-year starter for the College from 1991 through 1994, Norris was an assistant coach for the Tribe for nine seasons, from 1995 through 2003.

## **Assistant Coaches**



#### Chuck Connelly Assistant Coach (Sixth Season) • Old Dominion (2000)

Now in his sixth season on W&M's staff is Chuck Connelly. He has worked primarily with the Tribe's goalkeepers and was promoted to a full-time assistant in January of 2004.

Connelly graduated in 2000 from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia, where he was the team's starting goalkeeper as a junior and senior. While at ODU, he recorded a career 1.50 goals against average with 17 shutouts and was regarded as one of the top goalkeepers in the conference. In 1999, he started all 19 matches for ODU and his 0.79 GAA was tops in the league and 17th in the nation. He earned second team All-CAA honors as a senior for the Monarchs.

A native of Rockville, Maryland, Connelly has coached at numerous camps along the East Coast, including a position as the assistant director of the Adin Brown Goalkeeping Academy. He currently coaches a youth traveling team for the Williamsburg Soccer Club. Connelly also serves as director of the Williamsburg Summer Soccer League and assistant director of the Tidewater Soccer Camp.

Connelly's younger brother, John, is a fifth-year senior goalkeeper on the ODU soccer team.



## **Jeff Dominguez**Assistant Coach (Second Season) • William and Mary (1999)

Entering his second season on the W&M coaching staff is Jeff Dominguez, who returns to the College after a successful professional playing career in Europe.

Most recently a starting defensive central midfielder for BV Cloppenburg in Germany, Dominguez set the club record with 68 consecutive starts and helped the team earn a promotion to Germany's third division in 2004. He also played with the Virginia Beach Mariners and Nashville Metros of the A-League, prior to spending time in Europe.

A three-year starter for W&M, Dominguez graduated from the College in 1999 with a degree in economics. A crucial member of the Tribe during the most successful four-year period in the program's history, he helped the Green and Gold win two Colonial Athletic Association titles and advance to the NCAA Tournament four times, including a quarterfinal appearance in 1996, as the Tribe went 67-23-5 (.732) from 1995 through 1998. Dominguez holds the school record with eight NCAA Tournament game appearances.



#### Tom Duffy Assistant Coach (Seventh Season) • Le Moyne (1965)

In his seventh season with the Tribe's staff is Tom Duffy. Prior to helping with the coaching duties at William and Mary, Duffy spent six seasons on the staff at Hartwick.

A 1965 graduate of Le Moyne College, Duffy played and coached soccer in England after completing his undergraduate work. Duffy's first coaching experience was with the Royal Air Force Upper Heyford team for three years.

Duffy also spent four seasons as the head coach at Oneonta State in New York where he compiled a 39-33-3 record. He coached at Oneonta High School from 1972 to 1987, putting together a 226-71-25 mark and sent over 60 of his players on to play at the collegiate level.

Duffy was also involved with New York's Empire State Games where he coached three Central Region teams, claiming one silver and two bronze medals. He also served for four years as the soccer chairman for the Games. In 2001 Duffy was selected to the New York State Section IV Hall of Fame for his years of service at the high school level.

A resident of Williamsburg with his wife Peggy, the couple has three daughters; Brigid, who is married to Doug Prevelige, Jenn, who is married to current Hartwick College men's soccer coach Ian McIntyre, and Kate. Duffy holds an advanced coaching diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.





## **2005 Season Outlook**

William and Mary had a number of notable accomplishments last year in **Chris Norris**' first season as head coach. Most impressive was the first win in school history over the nation's top-ranked team, when the Tribe upset No. 1 Maryland, 1-0, in just the second game at Albert-Daly Field. The Green and Gold also extended its streak of consecutive winning seasons, now up to 30 straight campaigns, tied for the third-longest active streak in NCAA Division I. Five W&M players earned all-conference accolades, led by first team All-Colonial Athletic Association and second team all-region selection Pat Scherder.

Involved in 17 matches decided by less than two goals, the biggest factor in preventing the Tribe from achieving even greater success in 2004 was its lack of offense. Forced to play in a 4-5-1 formation for much of the season, the Tribe was limited to just 20 goals in its 20 matches, the fewest in a season since 1974. What kept the Tribe competitive was terrific defensive play. W&M allowed just 21 goals by the opposition, and had six shutouts, including the double-overtime victory over Maryland, which had entered the match leading the nation with an average of five goals per game through its first six matches.

With W&M's defensive corps stocked with veterans who have significant starting experience, Norris expects that the club's defensive success should continue through this season. The future is bright on the offensive side of the ball as well, as the Tribe returns two of its top three goal scorers from last season. Combined with the increased college experience gained by the remainder of the returning offensive players, and the arrival of two freshmen attackers who were among the best high school players in Virginia last season, Norris and his staff believe that this season the College's scoring will increase significantly.

#### **Forwards**

With Norris planning on returning to a two-forward lineup this season, senior **Pat Scherder** is expected to return to the front of the lineup after spending last season as a wide midfielder. Often the fastest player on the field, the first team all-conference and second team all-region pick had three goals and two assists last season, starting every match except for the three he sat out completely due to injury.

"Statistically, Pat did not have the kind of year last season that he had as a sophomore (11 goals and three assists), however, his impact on the team was phenomenal," said Norris. "We asked him to play as a wide midfielder and he was consistently our most dangerous player. We intend to move him back up front and if he can stay healthy, we think that he will have a big year for us."

One of the most interesting battles in preseason will be for the other starting forward position, with senior **Andreas Nydal** and juniors **Brendan Mc-Curdy** and **Jarrett Thomas** the early frontrunners for the role. Nydal had an outstanding redshirt freshman campaign in 2002, when he finished third on the team with eight goals. Since then, he has been affected by the one-forward lineup more than anybody, which, along with an ACL injury, has limited him to just five goals in 26 matches over the past two seasons.

"Andreas got frozen out last year, not because he wasn't playing well, but because the way we were playing didn't lend itself to his game," said Norris. "He should be an important part of our plans this fall. He is tremendous around the goal at creating his own shots and we expect him to score some big goals."

Despite playing most of the season as a reserve back or midfielder, McCurdy led the Tribe with four goals, including two game-winners, in 2004. He continued to impress last spring and has put himself in contention for a starting role.

"Brendan is the consummate team player," said Norris. "He started out as a right back for us last fall, then we ultimately moved him wide in the midfield and also used him some as a forward. In the spring we made the decision to move him up front. He's a great competitor and an excellent athlete and we think that he will play a key role for us."

Also figuring into the mix will be junior **Jarrett Thomas** and freshman **Andrew Hoxie**. Thomas saw limited action last season, but scored four goals and added an assist as a rookie in 2003. Hoxie was named the National Christian School Athletic Association Player of the Year after scoring 38 goals and 16 assists as a senior last year at Denbigh Baptist in Newport News.

"Jarrett is arguably the best finisher on our team," said Norris. "If he can regain the confidence and fitness level he displayed his freshman year, he could become an important part of our attacking plans. Andrew possesses good speed, great size, a good soccer brain and has a knack for scoring important goals. We expect him to challenge for a place on the team right away."

#### Midfielders

The Tribe suffered most of its losses due to graduation at the midfield position and that is where most of the question marks will center entering this season. The only player with significant experience at the position is senior holding midfielder **Craig Myers**, who will likely start in the same position this season. His role has continued to increase throughout his career and last season he was named the team's most improved player after appearing in 19 matches with 17 starts.

"Craig is very professional," said Norris. "He understands the role that we have asked him to fill. He positions himself well, wins a lot of 50-50 balls

and has become much more efficient with his possession."

The competition for the rest of the starting midfield positions is wide open, with seven players, including three sophomores and three first-year players, vying for playing time.

Sophomore **Martin Brady** has the most experience of the seven, with a goal and an assist in 15 matches, including three starts.

"Martin had a solid freshman year," said Norris. "We started using him as an outside midfielder in the spring and he really embraced that role. Tactically he is one of the top players on the team. We expect him to have a productive fall."

Junior **Chris Rodd** will move to the midfield this season after two years as a center back. A second team All-CAA selection last year when he started all 20 contests, he scored his first career goal with just 37 seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime in an eventual tie with Hofstra.

"Chris had a good spring playing in the midfield," said Norris. "He's a great ball-winner and very disruptive. The more games he gets in the middle of the midfield, the more of a factor he will become in the attack."

The only other midfielders with college experience are sophomores **Doug Ernst** and **Ryan Overdevest**. Ernst played in 14 matches, while Overdevest saw action in just eight contests, but was named CAA Rookie of the Week after his first career goal proved to be the game-winner in a 2-1 victory over Drexel.

"Doug showed flashes last fall of what he is capable," said Norris. "He is very tricky and clever and we hope to be able to use that on the flanks this year. Ryan is another player who had a very good spring for us. His off-the-ball running is excellent. He puts himself in great scoring positions and can also score from distance."

The three newcomers are redshirt freshmen **Brock Jones** and **Doug McBride** and true freshman **Jeremy Harris**. Jones scored 26 goals and 32 assists in his high school career and was a first team All-New England selection as a senior. McBride was a first team all-state pick in his senior year at Atlee High School in Mechanicsville, scoring seven goals and a team-high 17 assists. The Eastern Virginia Group AAA Player of the Year, Harris was also selected as the top athlete at Frank W. Cox High School in Virginia Beach, leading his team to the state semifinals with 22 goals and 10 assists last season.

"Brock is a little bit of a wild card for us, he can play anywhere, and during his career probably will," said Norris. "He has very good pace and is good around the goal. Doug was our biggest surprise of the spring season. He established himself as one of the best possession players on the team and will certainly figure into our plans. Jeremy has outstanding physical qualities and his first five steps are as quick as anyone we've had in our program. The impact that he has as a freshman will depend on how quickly he adjusts to the different level of competition."


#### Backs

As was the case last season, this year Norris and his staff expect the team's defense to once again be superb. The team returns three of the four starters from last year's back line that helped shut out six teams and post a 0.99 goals against average.

A mainstay on the back line for the last two seasons, junior co-captain **Jeff Marklin** will once

again be the anchor of the Tribe defense this fall. He started all 20 matches last season and has 34 starts in 36 games over the last two years, a stretch in which W&M has posted nine shutouts and a 1.19 goals against average.

"Jeff is an unbelievable presence and a tremendous professional in the way that he approaches things," said Norris. "His determination and hard work are universally respected on the team. He was one of the anchors of a good young defense last year and we expect him to continue in that role and make the group even more solid."

The other two returning starters are third-year sophomores **Ryan Sells** and **Michael Yakovac**. The pair shared the team's Rookie of the Year award in 2004, with Sells playing in 19 matches with 18 starts and Yakovac making 12 starts in 18 appearances. They each also contributed to key goals during the season, with Yakovac, who was named to the CAA's all-rookie team, setting up the game-winner in extra time against top-ranked Maryland, while Sells assisted the only goal in a 1-0 win over George Mason.

"Ryan surprised a lot of people with his steady play last season," said Norris. "It's not always easy for a young guy to come in to a team that doesn't score a lot of goals and maintain that intensity game-in and game-out. He did a great job in the fall and will obviously be a factor this year. Michael was in a very similar situation. As a redshirt freshman he also exceeded our expectations and did a great job filling in at left back and making that spot his own."

Senior **Clayton Voss** has been another player who has seen his playing time steadily increase throughout his career, but he will be challenged this year as he moves to the defense after three years as a midfielder. Last season he played in all 20 matches with 17 starts, scoring his first career game-winning goal in a 1-0 victory over Drexel.

"After spending three seasons as an outside midfielder, Clayton made the transition to outside back this spring," said Norris. "He was one of our best players in the spring season and we expect him to be a fixture in our back four this fall."

Also pressing for time on defense this year will be

sophomores **John Lee** and **Chris Wayne**. They each started one game last season, with Wayne playing in 10 matches and Lee seeing action in nine, including a 1-1 tie with Hartwick in which he scored the gametying goal late in regulation on his only shot of the season.

"John started to show glimpses in the fall of what he is truly capable of, but has had some trouble with injuries that kept him from establishing any kind of rhythm to his play," said Norris. "He had a very good spring and we expect him to challenge for time as a center or right back. Chris had a solid year as a true freshman reserve last season, playing mostly out of position. He really began to assert himself in the spring and he became a regular as a center back."

#### **Goalkeeners**

W&M's outstanding goalkeepers have been a hallmark of the program for more than two decades and the tradition continues in starting keeper and team co-captain Kris Rake. A junior who has started every game the Tribe has played in the last two seasons, Rake has already put himself in the Tribe's career top 10 lists for saves (150, sixth), shutouts (eight, sixth) and goals against average (1.20, fifth). He played every minute for the College last season, posting six shutouts and making eight saves, while compiling a 0.99 GAA. He earned national recognition early in the year, tying a career high with 10 saves in a double-overtime shutout victory over Maryland, a team that was not only first in the national polls at the time, but entered the match leading the nation with 5.00 goals per game through its first six contests of the season. Ending the week with a 1-1 tie with Hartwick and another shutout of American, Rake was named the nation's top goalkeeper that week by both Soccer America and College Soccer News and was featured in the "Faces in the Crowd" segment of the October 11 issue of Sports Illustrated.

"Kris had a very good season for us last year and positioned himself statistically in most of our single-season top 10 lists," said Norris. "We expect him to continue to improve and take more of a leadership role this season as a co-captain."

Waiting in the wings are backup goalkeepers Scott Kelsey, a junior, and sophomore Brennan Wergley. While neither has any college playing experience, Norris has faith in both of them coming through in a game, should the need arise.

"Scott is potentially the best athlete in our goal-keeping corps," said Norris. "He hasn't had the opportunity to show what he is capable of, other than in spring situations, but we're very confident that he can come in and do the job should anything happen to Kris. Brennan continues to improve and will definitely challenge Scott for the backup role. He has the best tactical understanding of all of our keepers and as he continues to develop physically, he will make himself more of a factor."

#### Schedule

As always, the Tribe will face a challenging schedule in 2005, with the Green and Gold slated to face six teams the competed in last season's NCAA Tournament.

"Once again, we will be facing a very tough schedule," said Norris. "As coaches, we certainly like to challenge ourselves and the players obviously want to put themselves up against some of the best teams and the best players around. This schedule enables us

to do that once again. We've got a number of out-of-conference opponents that are very well respected, including Maryland, North Carolina, Clemson, UNC Greensboro and Rhode Island."

After opening the season at home against Saint Joseph's, the Tribe will play its last six September matches away from Williamsburg. The first three will be in-state contests, with games in Norfolk against Clemson and Rhode Island and a game at the Virginia Military Institute. After that, W&M will play two road matches in four days against teams that ended last season ranked in the top 10 nationally, traveling to play UNCG on Saturday, Sept. 24, before taking on Maryland the following Tuesday. The Tribe will end the month with its first conference match of the season, traveling to first-year CAA member Georgia State.

"We'll have to be ready right away," said Norris. "The schedule doesn't allow for us to have a bad start. We're on the road almost the entire month of September, which will obviously be difficult."

The benefit in having the vast majority of the team's early matches coming on the road is that the club will end the season playing mostly at home. W&M will have five straight matches in Williamsburg at one point and will be away from home just two weekends in the regular season after the start of October. Of the last 12 matches, 11 will be against CAA opponents, with the only non-conference matchup being a Tuesday evening home game against North Carolina. Along with addition of Georgia State, Northeastern also joins the league this season, giving the CAA 12 men's soccer teams and making the fight for one of the six conference tournament berths even more fierce.

"It has become clear that it will be tough to make the conference tournament," said Norris. "Geographically, the two new teams are both in great places (Atlanta and Boston) and arguably, joining our conference should really help them from a soccer standpoint. The way things stand now, getting into the top six in the standings in our league is a good accomplishment for any team."



## **2004 Season Review**

#### **Tribe Records 30th Consecutive Winning Season**

With a record of 9-7-4 in 2004, William and Mary extended its streak of consecutive winning seasons to 30 ... That keeps the Tribe tied with SMU for the third-longest active streak in NCAA Division I ... Only UCLA (38) and Indiana (32) have longer active streaks ... The Tribe's run of winning campaigns began in 1975, when W&M went 9-4-1 on the year ... The College has had just four losing seasons since men's soccer became a varsity sport at W&M in 1967.

#### **W&M Opens Play at Albert-Daly Field**

In 2004 the Tribe men's and women's soccer teams began play at Albert-Daly Field a new grass facility named after former men's head coach **Al Albert** and current women's mentor **John Daly** ... The Green and Gold posted a 5-1-3 record at the facility last season, including a 1-0 win over Maryland, then ranked No. 1 in the nation ... Constructed partly to aid in bringing higher quality opponents to Williamsburg, the facility paid immediate dividends, as the Tribe hosted both Maryland and Virginia Tech, the first two Atlantic Coast Conference opponents to play W&M in Williamsburg since October 23, 1996, when the Tribe defeated NC State, 2-0 ... Prior to last season, the Tribe's last 20 games against ACC opponents had been on the road or at neutral sites ... W&M defeated VMI, 2-1, in the first match at Albert-Daly Field, with current junior **Brendan McCurdy** scoring the first goal at the facility in the 33rd minute.

#### Tribe Upsets No. 1 Maryland for Program's First Win Over a Top-Ranked Team

W&M upset Maryland, then the top-ranked team in the nation, 1-0, in double overtime on September 22, in just the second game played at Albert-Daly Field ... It was the College's first ever victory over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation ... The Tribe had an outstanding defensive effort in shutting out a Terrapin offense that entered the match leading the nation with an average of five goals a game ... Senior **Brannon Thomas** headed in the game-winning goal in the 103rd minute, off a cross from current sophomore **Michael Yakovac** ... Goalkeeper **Kris Rake** tied a career high with 10 saves in the contest ... It was the first time that a top-ranked team had come to Williamsburg since October 21, 1992, when the Green and Gold tied No. 1 Virginia, 0-0.

#### **Goalkeeper Kris Rake Earns National Recognition**

Junior goalkeeper **Kris Rake** earned national recognition last year for a week of oustanding play, which began with the Tribe's upset of No. 1 Maryland ... Rake tied a career high with 10 saves and did not allow a goal in 102:48, shutting out a Terrapin offense that entered the match leading the nation in goals per game ... Later that week, he made three saves in a 1-1 tie with Hartwick and made three more saves in a 1-0 shutout win over American ... Rake was named the top goalkeeper in the nation that week by both *Soccer America* and College Soccer News, and was named the ECAC Goalkeeper of the Week ... He was also featured in the "Faces in the Crowd" section of the October 11, 2004 issue of *Sports Illustrated* ... Rake has started all 39 matches the Tribe has played in his career, and ranks in the top 10 in school history in career goals against average (1.20, fifth), shutouts (8, sixth) and saves (150, sixth) ... As a redshirt freshman in 2003, he became the first rookie to start in goal for the Tribe since MLS standout **Adin Brown** in 1996.

#### **Tribe Working Overtime Again in 2004**

For the second straight season, W&M had seven matches go to overtime last year, the most since 1998, when 10 contests went to extra time ... 2004 was also the second straight season that the Tribe had four matches end in a tie, one short of the school record of five, set in 1985.

#### **W&M Defense Holds Strong**

The Tribe shut out its opponent in six of the 20 matches last season, and allowed only one goal in eight more contests ... The team allowed just 21 goals all season, the fewest since giving up just 20 in 1999 and tied for the third-fewest in a season since 1990 ... Goalkeeper Kris Rake and the rest of the W&M defense posted a 0.99 goals against average on the year and allowed less than 20 percent of opposing shots to score.

## Wade Barrett Defender San Jose Earthquakes Major League Soccer

Former Tribe midfielder Wade Barrett returned to the United States this season to play for Major League Soccer's San Jose franchise, following two years of play overseas. Barrett was the 12th selection in the first round of the 1998 MLS Draft by the San Jose Clash (now the Earthquakes). After a successful four-year stint in the MLS, Barrett moved to Denmark

in 2003, where he played two seasons for AGF Arhus of the Danish First Division. In 2003, he became the first W&M men's soccer player to receive a cap for an international team when he played for the United States National Team. Barrett is a 1997 All-American and CAA Player of the Year, and was the second player in league history to be a four-time first team All-CAA selection.

## Steve Jolley Defender FC Dallas Major League Soccer

When his name was called by the Los Angeles Galaxy, Steve Jolley became the first W&M alum to be selected in the first round of any major sports draft. The first-round pick at number nine, Jolley completed his Tribe soccer career ranked fourth on the all-time scoring list with 109 points. A starter for the Galaxy, Jol-



ley was making a strong case for the league's Rookie of the Year Award in 1997 until a knee injury ended his season prematurely. He was traded to the MetroStars during to the 2000 season. In 2001 he started and played every minute of every game, including the postseason, just the second player to accomplish that feat in franchise history. That season he was selected to his first MLS All-Star game and four times was named to the Soccer America Team of the Week. Jolley was traded to FC Dallas prior to the start of the 2004 MLS season, when he started 28 matches and finished second on the team with 2,428 minutes played.

## Adin Brown Goalkeeper Aalesunds FK Norway Tippeligaen (First Division)

After a successful career in the MLS, Adin Brown went overseas this year for his first season with Aalesunds FK in Norway. Selected with the third overall pick by the Colorado Rapids in the 2000 MLS SuperDraft, Adin Brown became the highest draft pick ever from William and Mary in any sport. He is the third William and Mary soccer player, joining Steve Jolley and Wade Barrett, to be a first round MLS draft pick. A three-time All-American for the Tribe, Brown holds almost every goalkeeping record in W&M history. In the summer of 2004 he became the second W&M player to compete with the U.S National Team, when he was selected to the



American team that competed for the Gold Cup. He was also a member of the U23 National Team and was a member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team until an injury forced him to miss the trip to Sydney. Brown was traded in the 2001 season to Tampa Bay and signed with the New England Revolution on Jan. 15, 2002. In 2002, he finished fifth in the MLS with a 1.23 GAA and he recorded four postseason shutouts as he led the Revolution to the 2002 MLS Finals.

## **Jon Stewart**

A three-year starter on the men's soccer team, 1984 William and Mary graduate Jon Stewart is the program's most famous and well-known alum. Currently the host, executive producer and writer of the Emmy Award-winning "The Daily Show with Jon Stewart" on Comedy Central, he returned to campus in the spring of 2004 to deliver the College's Commencement address, the first Tribe soccer player ever to be selected for that honor.


Stewart ended his playing career at W&M with 10 goals and 12 assists, helping the Tribe to a 40-15-9 (.695) record in his three seasons. In an interview with *Soccer News*, he said that soccer was the thing he enjoyed most about his time at W&M. Stewart recalled that his most exciting memory from his playing days was scoring the only goal in a 1-0 win over Connecticut in the 1983 ECAC Championship, giving the Tribe just its second league title and the first since 1976.

Stewart began his professional career at some of the top comedy clubs in New York City, eventually earning appearances on "Late Show with David Letterman" and HBO's "Young Comedians Special." That led to hosting "The Jon Stewart Show" on MTV in 1994 and 1995. From there, he starred on "The Larry Sanders Show" before taking over "The Daily Show" in January 1999. Stewart wrote the best-selling *Naked Pictures of Famous People* and starred in a number of feature films, including *Death to Smoothy* and *Big Daddy*.

"The Daily Show" has won five Emmy Awards, including beating out "Late Show with David Letterman" for the 2003 and 2004 awards for outstanding variety, music or comedy series. The program was recently nominated for that honor and three others in the 2004-05 Emmy competition. In March, Stewart signed a deal to extend his contract to host "The Daily Show" through 2008.

Recently ranked second on *Entertainment Weekly*'s list of funniest Americans, Stewart was awarded an honorary doctorate of arts at W&M's 2004 graduation ceremonies after delivering the Commencement address.

"I am honored to be here and receive this honorary doctorate," said Stewart. "When I think back to the people that have been in this position before me, from Benjamin Franklin to Queen Noor of Jordan, I can't help but wonder what has happened to this place. As a person, I am honored to get it; as an alumnus, I have to say I believe we can do better."

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school

## **Ouoting President Gene Nichol**

The College of William and Mary has struggled, endured and prospered, becoming a central part of our culture, because, at heart, it touches the deepest concerns of the human spirit. The need to examine, to explore, to probe, to question, to contribute. The challenge to understand—and to share the fruits of that understanding with our fellows. The powerful, unquenched belief in excellence, in the call to a better future, in the opened door, the extended hand, the brightened lamp. A recurring sense of both blessing and obligation; a belief in the marriage of knowledge and virtue; a determination to become, in Madison's words, beneficiary and benefactor of the commonwealth.

And, this College, distinct, perhaps, from the nation's other great public universities, is committed to pressing these values in the context of a small, life-changing liberal arts experience. Where academic rigor can actually apply as an overarching norm; where an ennobling faculty-student engagement is the hallmark of the institution; and where the most important questions of human existence are repeatedly presented center stage. Insisting that, in a viable democracy, the most powerful and uplifting structures of higher education cannot be relegated to the private sphere.

That is our legacy. It is our challenge as well.

Nichol is the co-author of the text Federal Courts and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the Harvard Law Review, Yale Law Review, and the University of Chicago Law Review. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the Encyclopedia of the American Constitution, and one on the civil rights movement to the Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.

## **Athletics Administration**



**Terry Driscoll Director of Athletics** 

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 10th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament ny. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii can, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America

pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks

chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in million currently. He also has served on numerous 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services compa-MVP. In addition to being named an All-Ameri- Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, After graduating from BC, he was the fourth Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 29, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 25, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



**Barbara Blosser Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director** 

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. 

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

## **Athletic Excellence**

The 2004-05 season was another outstanding year for W&M athletics, as the Tribe added five CAA titles to push its conference-leading total to 81, 30 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Championships, highlighted by the football team's appearance in the I-AA semifinals. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Championship each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. In 2004-2005, the College finished 76th, and was the highest-ranked team in the CAA and was third among all schools in the state of Virginia, making this the ninth time in the 12-year history of the Directors' Cup that the College has finished both in the top four in the state of Virginia and first or second in the CAA.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

## **Academic Success**

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities, as W&M has produced 36 Academic All-Americans since 1992.

In the NCAA's inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores for all Division I institutions, William and Mary once again excelled in its mission of fostering true student-athletes. The College boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

Additionally, W&M had four student-athletes recognized as CAA Scholar-Athletes of the Year in 2004-2005: Pat Comstock (Men's Cross Country), Megan Bishop (Women's Cross Country), Keith Bechtol (Men's Track and Field) and Lena Sherbakov (Women's Tennis).

## STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

## Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

- An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
- 2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
- 3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

## **Compliance and Academic Support**

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



## **Sports Psychology**

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

## Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and

flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.



## **Sports Medicine**

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

## **Albert-Daly Field**

This season will be the Tribe's second on its new grass facility, Albert-Daly Field. Named for William and Mary's long-time men's and women's soccer coaches, Al Albert and John Daly, the field is used by both soccer teams, as well as by the College's lacrosse team.

The previous home of the Tribe soccer teams was Busch Field, which features an artificial playing surface that prohibited the College from hosting NCAA tournament games over the past several years. W&M's men have been forced to play their last 15 NCAA Tournament matches on the road or at a neutral site.

"The College has done a fantastic thing for our programs, because not only will we have an opportunity to host NCAA games, we have also enhanced our ability to schedule quality opponents," said Albert. "Just the overall perception of our program in recruiting and talking to people will be enhanced. It's a great thing. The College took a great step when we got a home at Busch Field and now they're taking another great step with this new facility. It's one of the final pieces that we need to go all the way."

The new field paid immediate dividends last season, as W&M hosted two Atlantic Coast Conference opponents (Maryland and Virginia Tech), the first ACC teams to play W&M in Williamsburg since 1996. In just the second match played at the facility, the Tribe earned the first win in school history over the nation's top ranked team with a 1-0 victory over No. 1 Maryland on September 22. The Tribe ended the year with a 5-1-3 home record in its first season at the facility.

The project began in the spring of 2001, when William and Mary received a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop of Richmond, Virginia to build a natural grass field adjacent to W&M's baseball stadium, Plumeri Park, located at the College's Dillard complex.

As graduates of William and Mary, Jim and Bobbie Ukrop have long been generous supporters of the College and have touched the lives of thousands of students, both in the athletics department and general college community, with their philanthropy.

"The challenge grant provides us the opportunity to enhance the competitiveness of three of our very

successful programs, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse," said William and Mary Athletics Director Terry Driscoll. "At the request by Mr. and Mrs. Ukrop, the facility would be named in the honor of those two coaches recognizing their long service and the success of their programs here at the College of William and Mary."

Al Albert led the Tribe men's soccer team as head coach for 33 of the 37 seasons that the College has fielded a varsity team before retiring from coaching in January of 2004. He amassed a record of 401-187-64 (.664) during his tenure and became just the eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach 400 wins, and just the third to have earned all those wins at just one school. Throughout the 1990s, the Tribe ranked as one of the top programs in the nation, placing eighth in wins (149) and 13th in winning percentage (.708).

A 1969 graduate of William and Mary, Albert's teams put together 29 consecutive winning seasons (a W&M record) and 26 straight campaigns of 10 wins or more. W&M made its 12th appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2002, when the Tribe advanced to the Sweet Sixteen with wins at Duke and Virginia. Albert was named CAA Coach of the Year a confer-

ence-record four times (1987, 1992, 1994 and 1996), and earned the South Atlantic Region's top honor in 1992, 1998 and 2002.

John Daly reigns among the most successful coaches in America, leading the Tribe's women's soccer program over the last 17 years. Daly ranks among the top 10 in victories (241) among his Division I peers. He has also directed W&M to the NCAA postseason 17 times, including the last 13 seasons in a row. Overall, the College has sponsored women's soccer for 23 years with the team advancing to the NCAA Tournament 20 times.

"I'm very, very happy," said Daly. "I think it's badly needed for both the men's and women's soccer and lacrosse programs. Jim and Bobbie Ukrop's gift gesture is just tremendous. It's going to help in every way from scheduling and recruiting to the perception of the program."

On the field, during Daly's tutelage, 12 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 25 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). Daly has been named CAA Coach of the Year three times (1993, 1994, 1999) and Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997).

The women's lacrosse program has appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times since 1983 including three consecutive years (1996-98) and has produced 34 All-American awardees. Since starting play in the Colonial Athletic Association Championships in 1992, the team advanced at least to the semifinal round in every year but two, winning the championship outright in 1992. The Tribe program posted double-digit wins 10 times in the 11 year span between 1987 and 1997 and has finished the season ranked in the top 20 in six of the last nine years.

"This is a great step forward for the program," said head lacrosse coach Tara Kelly. "It was a much needed facility that will benefit the team for years to come. The generous gift started by the Ukrops will not only allow the team to host NCAA and other championship events, but it will also play a vital role in attracting new recruits."




