Hopi Vice Chairman Craig Andrews Declares Mask Man- date - Effective 11/3/23 for Hopi Tribal Government Offices, Employees and Its Visitors - Re-published

**Kykotsmovi, Ariz.– Friday,
November 3, 2023** At the end of
the October 29, 2023 work week,
Wilfred Gaseoma, Staff - Office
of the Vice Chairman issued an
email notification regarding,
“Re-mask memo” to the “HTALL”
List Serv with an undated MEM-
ORANDUM Word document
attachment addressed to “All Hopi
Tribal Staff” with subject line
“RE: Mask mandate for All Tribal
Employees and Visitors” noting
“mask coverings effective today.”

Hours later, at approximately
4:38 p.m. on the same day, Gas-
eoma issued another email with
Subject, “Emailing: Mask up”
with another undated “MEM-
ORANDUM” PDF document
attached. The memorandum was
addressed to “All Hopi Tribal
Staff” with Chairman Timothy
Nuvangyaoma’s signature “for”
Vice Chairman Craig Andrews
with an additional notation of the
effective date being “11/3/23.”

To provide the Hopi public
more information, Hopi Tutuveni
contacted Gaseoma and Vice
Chairman Andrews in attempts to
gather data and information and/
or a Press Release, noting what
prompted the mandate and how
long it would be in effect.

At publication submission dead-
line, no responses to the email,

which was sent by Hopi Tutuveni,
or a Press Release were received
from Gaseoma, Vice Chairman
Andrews or any other Hopi Tribal
Leadership, included in the email.

Other Hopi Tribal employees
did, however, make contact with
Hopi Tutuveni to express grati-
tude for submitting the inquiry, as
they too had questions and con-
cerns about why the mandate was
issued.

One employee provided statis-
tics about Arizona and noted that
Navajo County is listed as one of
three in the “yellow zone.”

While that information is true,
it still cannot be confirmed as the
reason for Vice Chairman issuing
the mandate, due to not having a
reply or Press Release confirming
reasons for the mandate.

To date, local businesses locat-
ed just a couple of miles away
from the Hopi Tribal Government
complex in Kykotsmovi, Ariz. are
not under a mask mandate. Nei-
ther are local Hopi schools or the
Hopi Health Care Center located
in Lower Polacca, Ariz.

For now, the public is being pro-
vided this limited notification that
masks must be worn in all Hopi
Tribal Government offices and by
Hopi Tribal employees, as well.

Hopi Tribe Department of Health and Human Services Covid-19 Emergency Response - Re-publication

Kykotsmovi, Ariz. - October 13, 2023 The days of long warm summer nights are long gone; as we move into the Fall and Winter seasons the immediate self-care we can give ourselves and our loved ones the message of taking necessary precautions against infectious diseases such as the flu, common cold and COVID. COVID viruses continue to be transmitted via close contact with someone with the virus. Data from the Hopi Health Care Center indicate a substantial decline in COVID-19 positive cases; what is not reflected in the Hopi Health Care Center weekly surveillance report are home COVID-19 test kits results. The COVID-19 home test kits have revealed positive cases which are then referred to the HHCC Public Health Nursing Department to provide care and guidance for the individual and their family. Recommendations to prepare for protection against the flu, common cold and COVID-19:

1. Everyone 6 months and older, regardless of current vaccination status, should get an updated COVID-19 vaccine.
2. People with cold like symptoms should still masks and get tested for COVID-19.
3. Those with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 should continue to follow current guidelines for isolation including staying home and wearing a mask around others for at least 5 days after their symptoms started or after a positive test if no symptoms.
4. Those exposed to COVID-19 should continue to follow recommendations including wearing a mask around others, monitoring for symptoms, and getting tested at least 5 days after last exposure.
5. People may choose to wear a mast at any time based on personal preference, but may be required in other places by local authorities (i.e., individual villages, businesses, and schools.)
6. Those that are concerned they may be at risk for serve disease, should talk to their health care provider about additional prevention actions.

Frequently asked questions:

How do I know if I have all my vaccinations up to date?

Your question on vaccinations would be best answered at the medical facility where you receive services. For example; you medical receive services at Hopi Health Care Center; the Public Health Nursing office can answer your vaccination questions such as last Flu vaccination and COVID-19 vaccination.

Where can I get vaccinated for the Flu or COVID-19?

The Hopi Health Care Center allows members to walk-in for vaccinations during operating hours. Operating hours for a walk-in vaccination is 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday; Wednesday from 1:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.

Where can I get a COVID-19 home test kit?

You can contact the Hopi Community Health Representative (CHR) program for a COVID-19 home test kit. A CHR will follow-up with you two business days to follow-up on test results. All COVID-19 positive tests are referred to the Public Health Nursing department for medical advice and guidance.

Are there FREE masks available on Hopi Reservation?

Yes, the Hopi CHR program has face masks for the community and is available Monday – Friday during normal business hours from 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Is the Hopi Tribe Executive Order lifted?

Hopi Tribe Executive Order No. 001-2023 remains in place. The Executive Order lifted the Face Mask Mandate; wearing of face masks is optional except in the case of a COVID-19 positive, the recommendation is wearing a face mask until symptoms clear.

How does the Executive Order impact me?

- Vulnerable Individuals can resume public interactions, but should practice social distancing wearing face masks, and minimizing exposure to social settings where distancing may not be practical, unless precautionary measures are observed.
- Employees can resume UNRESTRICTED STAFFING of worksites, Businesses must be able to demonstrate engineered workplace settings that build in social distancing and protections for staff.
- Specific Type of Employee – VISITS TO SENIOR CARE FACILITIES AND HOSPITALS can resume. Those who interact with residents and patients must be diligent regarding hygiene. LARGE GATHERINGS (e.g., eating out, sporting, ceremonies) may operate under limited social distancing protocols and sanitation protocols.
- WELLNESS CENTER GYM can remain open if they follow standard sanitation protocols and make SPECIAL ACCOMMODATIONS (i.e. hours or programs specifically for high risk individuals)

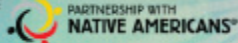
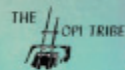

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PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Notice of Availability for Public Comment on Proposed Fencing Improvements within a 500-year floodplain at Polacca Airport (P10), Polacca, Ariz.

Kykotsmovi, Ariz. – November 11, 2023 The Hopi Tribe, as sponsor of Polacca Airport, intends to replace and realign the existing perimeter fencing at the Airport. The improvements would replace failed and deteriorated fencing surrounding the airport with new fencing to enhance the operational safety of the airport. The fencing would consist of seven-foot-tall chain-link fencing topped with barbed wire around the perimeter of the Airport property.

Access gates would be included as part of the fencing improvements. The improvements would have no anticipated impacts to the floodplain's natural functions. The functions of the existing floodplain would not be impacted as a result of the proposed project.

Due to the Tribe seeking Federal Aviation Administration funding and approval of federal actions occurring within a 500-year floodplain, a public notice and opportunity for comment is being provided.

The public may submit comments on the proposed projects and their potential effects on the 500-year floodplain for a period of thirty (30) days following the publication of this notice.

All comments received during the review period will be taken into consideration prior to the FAA making an environmental determination.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

November 27, 2023 - I read a Memorandum of November 22, 2023, from the Hopi Tutuveni, to "All", relating to the General Welfare Emergency Assistance Program (GWEAP), regarding application requirements for Hopi tribal members to apply and qualify for services. I respond specifically to the requirement for tribal members to submit an IRS Income Tax Form, the W-9 "Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification" form.

There appears to be confusion by the Hopi Tribe and its HTPRC regarding the need for tribal members to file an IRS W-9 form to receive this financial assistance. That is not correct. Funds made available by the U.S. Congress; and implemented by the U.S. Treasury Department, and other federal agencies, are intended to address direct impacts experienced by U.S. citizens resulting from COVID-19 pandemic.

These funds are intended to be provided to individuals as "Beneficiaries" or as "End Users". The U.S. Congress intended for these funds to be used direct grants to individuals to address the hardships they experienced due to COVID-19. Congress did not intend for these funds to be "earned as taxable income" because no work is required to be performed by individuals to receive this money. In other words, there is no federal requirement for individuals to submit W-9 forms (and be taxed).

The above reflects the same misunderstanding by the Hopi Tribe (its CARES Act Committee and consultants) when the initial CARES Act (and later ARPA) allocations were received by the Hopi Tribe. Villages were not or are not required to perform any portion of the work stipulated in the Hopi Tribe's federal grant awards (or the State of Arizona's federal grant awards). Accordingly, Villages did not serve as Subgrantees or Subcontractors to the tribe, nor to the State of Arizona. Instead, they are correctly regarded as "Beneficiaries" or "End Users" to use the funds to address their direct impacts, as they saw fit. In this regard, Villages are not subject to the Single Audit Act requirements.

Hope this clarifies this confusion. You might want to consult the ARPA Final Report of 2022 which stipulates requirements on the use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) appropriations. Kwak'wha - Ben Nuvamsa

Kyaamuyaw

This is the month when the Earth rests for the duration of the moon. This is the time when all construction activities should stop. If one is building around this time, he/she will be building for the dead. These Hopi lessons are real. We should not doubt them as something may happen. When it happens, they will either take your soul with them or one gets hurt seriously.

One should not yell, scream, drum, dig, or stump because the ground has become thin and the home of the people that live below us is closer to the top than other times. When the stomping and digging is going on, sand particles are coming down on the people below. Also, you should not cut your hair, your finger /toe nails because the Powakas will use that to do something to you.

They will be angered by that and sense that someone is not in respect of the sacred moon. Also, one must not whistle at night. This is the calling of the demon spirits and one pays a price for it. The spirits are saddened because consequences from these kinds of actions will come about.

You should stay at home at night and not go about because the Powakas will be out to prey on the innocent people. We do not know who they are. Your best friend maybe one and you don't know it. It goes as far as a man and wife don't know each other, one of them may be one. There is a demon spirit sitting between you and the next person and so therefore one should use ashes for protection.

The uncles are knowledgeable in these kinds of lessons and therefore should teach their nieces, nephews and family members. This is the time for our own cultural teachings to happen. Grand Parents, parents and uncles play a big role in the teachings. These kinds of teachings are very essential to Hopi and should be taught.

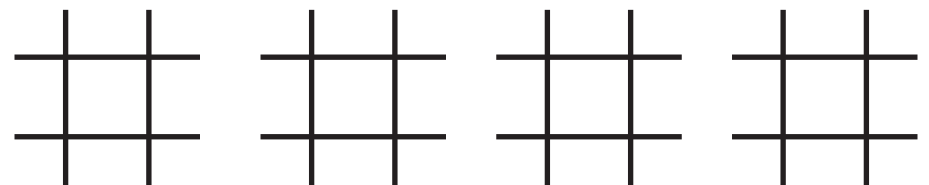

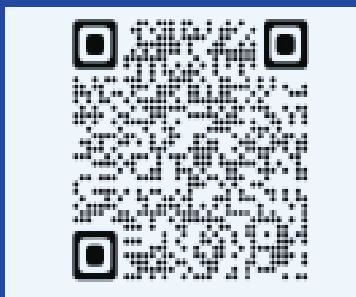
